## County Equalization Board Sets Values

Tyler county commissioners, court, sitting as the county board of equalization since May 15, adjourned at its session Monday for all purposes except approving the tax roll when prepared by the tax assessor-collector.

In a summary of its activities given to County Clerk Otha Miles (the board did not keep a transcript of proceedings), the valuation on most property in the county was shown to have remained about the same as in 1967.

The summary included the following notes: All valuations on improved property will be the same as in 1967 as reflected on the tax roll approved by the board of equalization; All oil producing properties shall be reduced from 25% to 15% of 100% valuation; Pipelines shall be put back on the schedule; All railroad land will be assessed at \$15 per acre in rural areas and \$1000 per acre in townships in the county; New renditions of property as presented by utility companies were accepted as rendered; Valuations on unimproved and undeveloped land shall be the same as in 1967, which is \$15 per acre; All dry minerals shall be assessed at a value of \$1 per acre for tax purposes; That no property shall go on the tax roll under a \$25 minimum.

A. L. (Pete) Thornton, county tax assessor, said that tax statements will be mailed late this year due to the fact that he couldn't prepare them until after the board of equalization had set the tax values. Phone your news to BU 3-2434.

Parents of first grade pupils are reminded that they must bring a photostatic copy of the child's birth certificate and proof of a smallpox vaccination. The school will observe the following holidays: September 2, Labor Day; November 28-29, Thanksgiving holidays; December 23-January 1, Christmas holidays; April 4-7, Easter holidays. Eighth grade graduation exercises are set for May 16, 1969 and high school graduation on May 16, 1969.

The City Council of Woodville at its meeting Monday night decided to call an election on September 21 on a one per cent city sales tax. Mounting costs of city services and indebtedness for improvements will necessitate either a sales tax or an increase in property taxes and higher utility rates. Council members said that

the election will give voters of the city an opportunity to express their preference for either the city sales tax or an increase in property taxes. They expressed the view that a sales tax, cost each individual a very small amount annually and would be more equitable than increasing property taxes. Several neighboring cities

have voted for the sales tax since the legislature passed the statute allowing this levy by cities. City secretary Walton Davis, in an open letter to the people of Woodville, explained the problem thusly: Most of you who have kept up with the current events in the papers, and taken time to give thought to the rapid growing needs of our city, have probably given thought to the methods that are available for securing the needed money to keep our city operating. Most of you that have expressed an opinion, feel that the expenses should be shared equally by all, and not just the property owners having to carry all the load for the needed revenue by higher taxes.

# HOMEMAKING HINTS

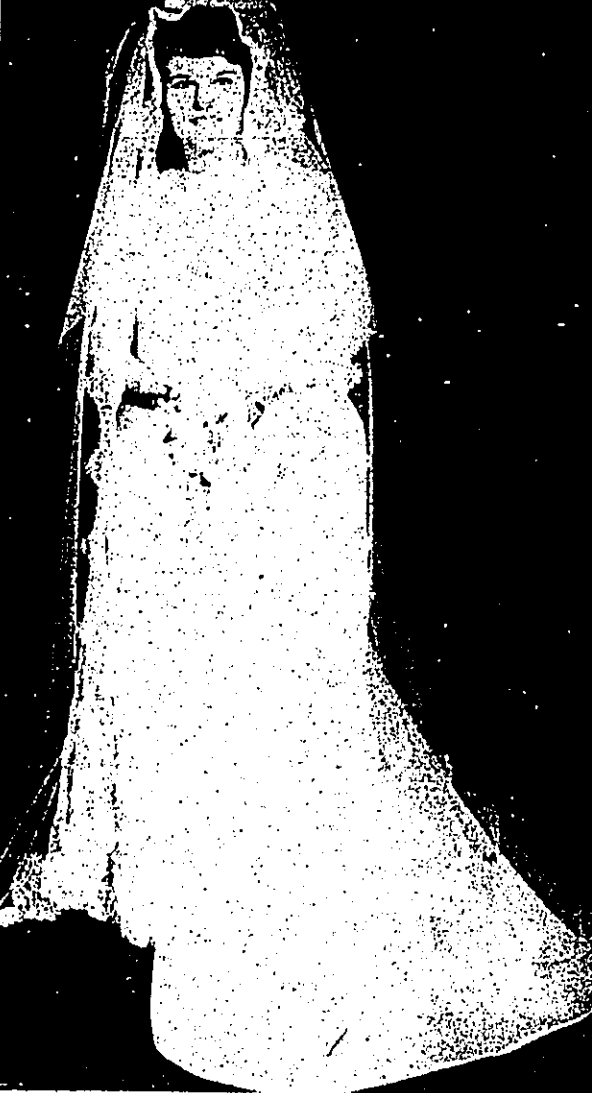

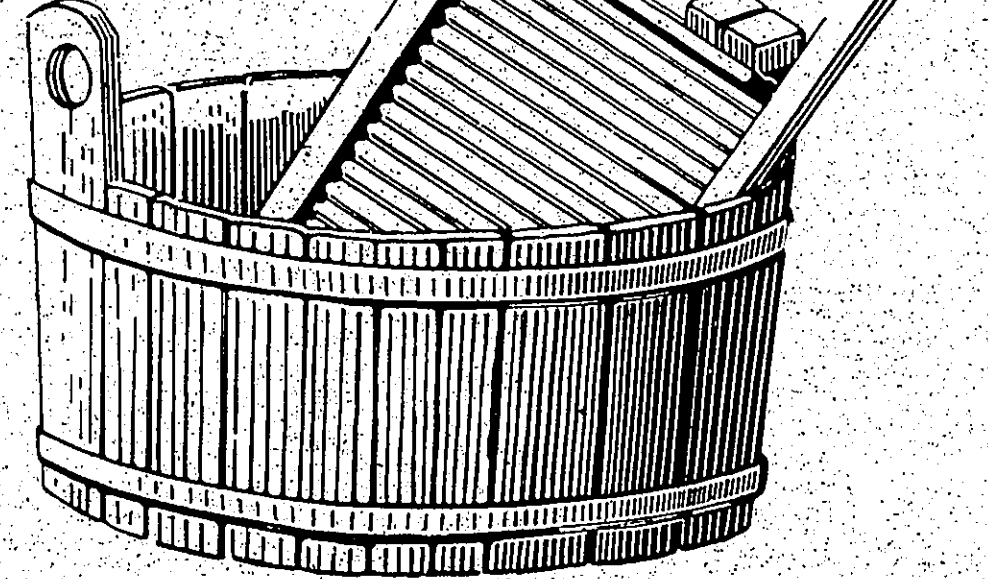

## DOWDY REPORTS

U.S. Rep. JOHN DOWDY

**BACK TALKS.** In the fourth and fifth Paris talks, 30 results. The United States is still demanding substantially more military "restraint" by North Vietnam before considering final cessation of hostilities in North Vietnam, and the North Vietnamese are still demanding a complete cessation of hostilities in the South before they will discuss an issue raised by the United States. The North Vietnamese "peace" delegate said his delegation completely rejects the "extremely absurd" U.S. demand for reciprocity. Otherwise, the North Vietnamese are not looking for peace in the Paris conference. They want to get class than surrender.

**FOREIGN AID.** Perhaps you have not heard about the foreign aid that was lost in Washington. He walked into the Agency for International Development office to ask Director and came out with a \$500,000 bill and six shiploads of surplus equipment.

**WIX LAWS.** The anti-quitlawyer claims that drug cause crime, and therefore should be strictly regulated, with registration and licensing, and they are England as an example. England does have strict gun laws, but so does New York. The crime rate in New York is ten times higher than in England. The way to curb crime is to punish law violation. England has quickly tried and punished criminals, thus has had a low crime rate ever since their country abolished the death penalty. The murder rate has increased rapidly, demanding that punishment should fit the crime. Furthermore, even though New York does have the toughest kind of gun law, in 1967, 12 New York residents who were arrested at the Appalachian "crime convention" could not be charged for carrying their weapons, because they had proper permits.

**FEDERAL BUDGET.** Final budget results for the fiscal year which ended on June 30, 1968, have been reported. Total spending was \$178.9 billion, a record high, and tax receipts were \$159.5 billion, also a record high. The deficit was \$22.4 billion, which was the largest deficit since World War II. Even with the higher taxes, it appears to me we will have more of the same this fiscal year! Pay-day must come some day. It is inevitable. Through far too many administrations, this government has followed the false "spend now, pay later" theories of the "new economists."

**CONGRESSIONAL RECESS.** Congress is recessing today, until after the presidential conventions, and will come back into session September 4. During the recess, I will be in regular contact with my office, 2301 House Office Building, Washington, D. C. 20515. ## "Get Out of My America"

(The following letter was sent by Sgt. Harold L. Douglas from his Vietnam duty station to his wife in Elmira, N.Y. His very eloquence won it a place in the Congressional Record for Pearl Harbor Day, 1967.)

**Open Letter to a Protester:**

I have heard again and again the odious echo of your sophomoric plea to "Get out of Vietnam." Now I feel compelled to make a plea of my own: "Get out of my America."

I have more right, more dignity and more honor being in Vietnam than you have being in my America.

What will happen when I return to America? Are you willing to answer to me when I come home? Do you really think you have all the answers?

If Vietnam is not supposed to be of concern to me, then why should it cause you so much concern?

Do you feel remorseful that American men are dying here? Then why do you insult the dignity of the passions that bring them to spend their lives in the aid of Vietnamese people. I, and thousands of servicemen like me, chose to come here. There are thousands of us that the government did not send here. We asked to come.

When did you ever ask to help humanity? You see fit to question our right to be in Vietnam, yet I cannot help but wonder about your right to be in America.

Let's talk about Vietnam and the Vietnamese people. They have never known anything but a lifetime of war. I don't mean a television war, a newspaper war or a political war.

When speaking specifically about burning homes, destroyed crops and murdered children, I am speaking of the fear that comes with the knowledge that today might be the very last day of all. This has been the heritage of these people for countless years.

Now they are on the threshold of escaping all this. They cannot do it alone. As Americans we have been entrusted to see that the Vietnamese are allowed to live as they choose. What about you as an American?

What are your plans for tomorrow? A football game? A concert? Or a protest rally and a march on Washington? One thing is certain: your village will not be raided next

your crops destroyed. You will not return home to find your house burned to the ground with your five children lying outside with their stomachs slit open from navel to neck. No, your tomorrow—and you will have a tomorrow—will contain the same freedom of pursuit and peace that have filled all of your days.

I choose to be in Vietnam because these people are being denied the right to their own pursuit of life. They need the help that I am able to give.

My country has given these people the same promise of tomorrow that our country has given you. You contend that we should break our promise, should our country also withdraw its promise to you?

We are working hard to free a people from Communist oppression and terror.

Please explain to me: Just what is it that you are trying to do for America? What does America need that your protests will give to it?

I hesitate to call you all the worn names that fit your kind. I do, however, submit that you are uninformed, misguided and have the proclivity of a fool for pseudo-intellectualism. I submit that you have been conned by a lack of initiative into adopting false ideologies that even a child would sense to be wrong. I further submit that you are making a vain attempt to enlist others in your parade of idleness.

My sickness cannot be cured. I can only hope to contain it so that you do not poison others. The only answer I can give to your morose babbling is no, I won't get out of Vietnam. Will you get out of my America?
