Registration Dates Set By Schools

Woodville . . .

The opening day for the schools of Woodville has been set for Tuesday, September 3, according to B. H. McGuire, superintendent. Classroom instruction will begin on that day. Registration of senior high school pupils will be held at the Kirby High School Thursday and Friday, August 29-30. Senior high pupils will meet in general assembly Thursday, August 29, at 8:30 a.m. in the Kirby auditorium for registration instructions, according to Bennett Hanna, principal.

Elementary and junior high school pupils will register Friday, August 30. The Woodville Elementary School and the Wheat Junior High School will operate a half-day session on Friday. Buses will operate Friday for the half-day session. Elementary pupils in grades 1-4 will report to the Woodville Elementary School campus, and elementary pupils in grades 5-6 will report to the Wheat Building on the Kirby campus. Pupils in grades 7-8 will report to the Wheat Junior High building.

Pupils who will register in the first grade must present birth certificates and must be six years of age on or before September 1, 1968. First grade pupils must also present immunization certificates.

DO NOT PASS UP

THE WHITE LINE

In this world of confusion, war, riots, unrest, and demonstrations, we often forget our thinking gets so cloudy, so narrow and so biased that we have forgotten some of the most important humanitarian acts that have done more for our American way of life, and saved more lives than anything we can think of right now. This thought was brought to our attention by our friend Walter Kemp who is not only an artist in his profession as a sign painter, but is also a philosopher in his own rights. THE WHITE LINE referred to in our by-line is the white line in the middle of our highways. Have you ever given this sort of thing a thought? It came to this writer as a shock when I thought of just what an important idea this was when some person thought of it and put it into the standard procedure of highway construction. The "White Line" has been improved upon and added to with the yellow stripes that warn of where you cannot pass another car and other danger that could fall on your highway. The originator of the "white line" has probably saved more lives than any other invention or safety device in the world.

Where did the idea come from? Someone had to think about it as an idea before it became a fact. Of course, our fine State Highway Department, the placers of the white line in the middle of our routine part of highway construction and road paving, but I can't help but wonder if the men operating the "stripping machine" ever thought about how many lives they would save after they put the stripe on the road, or if they ever thought who thought of the white line to start with. We've had our Edisons, Whitneys, Wright Brothers, Bell, and others, but I often wonder if any of them, great as they were, contributed more to our safety and welfare than the fellow that conceived the idea of putting the "White Line" in the middle of the highway.

UNLAWFUL: The anti-pollution claims that can cause crime and disorder should be strictly regulated, with registration and licensing, and then England as an example. "Get Out of My America"

(The following letter was sent by Sgt. Harold L. Douglas from his Vietnam duty station to his wife in Elmira, N.Y. Its very eloquence won it a place in the Congressional Record for Pearl Harbor Day, 1967.)

"It's much more than a letter...it is a searching appraisal of true Americanism."

Open Letter to a Protester:

I have heard again and again the odious echo of your sophomoric plea to "Get out of Vietnam." Now I feel compelled to make a plea of my own: "Get out of my America."

I have more right, more dignity and more honor being in Vietnam than you have in my America.

What will happen when I return to America? Are you willing to answer to me when I come home? Do you really think you have all the answers?

If Vietnam is not supposed to be of concern to me, then why should it be so much concern?

Do you feel remorseful that American men are dying here?

Then why do you insult the dignity of the passions that bring men to spend their lives in the aid of Vietnamese people, 1,000,000 of whom like me chose to come here. There are thousands of us that the government did not send here. We asked to come.

When did you ever ask to help humanity? You see fit to question our right to be in Vietnam, yet I cannot help but wonder about your right to be in America.

Let's talk about Vietnam and the Vietnamese people.

They have never known anything but a lifetime of war. I don't mean a television war, a newspaper war or a political war.

I'm speaking specifically about burning homes, destroyed crops and murdered children. I am speaking of the fear that comes with the knowledge that today might be the very last day of all. This has been the heritage of these people for countless years.

Now they are on the threshold of escaping all this. They cannot do it alone. As Americans we have been entrusted to the Vietnamese people are allowed to live as they choose. What about you as an American?

What are your plans for tomorrow? A football game? A concert? Or a protest rally and a march on Washington? One thing is certain: your village will not be raided nor

your crops destroyed. You will not return home to find your house burned to the ground with your five children lying outside with their stomachs slit open from knavel to neck.

No, your tomorrow--and you will have a tomorrow--will contain the same freedom of pursuit and peace that have filled all of your days.

I choose to be in Vietnam because these people are being denied the right to their own pursuit of life. They need the help that I am able to give.

My country has given these people the same promise of tomorrow, that our country has given you. You contend that we should break our promise. Should our country also withdraw its promise to you?

We are working hard to free a people from Communist oppression and terror.

Please explain to me: Just what is it that you are trying to do for America? What does America need that your protests will give to it?

I hesitate to call you all the worn names that fit your kind. I do, however, submit that you are ununiformed, misguided and have the proclivity of a fool for pseudo-intellectualism.

I submit that you have been conned by a lack of initiative into adopting false ideologies that even a child would sense to be wrong. I further submit that you are making a vulgar, vain attempt to enlist others in your parade of idiocy.

You say that the profession of arms is without honor. You also say that to aid an oppressed people is without honor. I ask you then what is honor?

I think when I come home to the haven of America I shall teach you just what communism is and why it must be faced by Americans who are empowered to stop it.

How would it be to you, when you turned your draft card, the government burned your house? What would be your consolation? If, when you marched along with a sing in one hand and a club in the other, the government clubbed your children to death? You would truly learn the meaning of tomorrow if all your tomorrows were taken away from you.

As a human being I cannot help but feel sorry for you. Your sickness cannot be cured, I can only hope to contain it so that you do not poison others. The only answer I can give to your moronic babbling is no, I won't get out of Vietnam.

Will you get out of my America?






