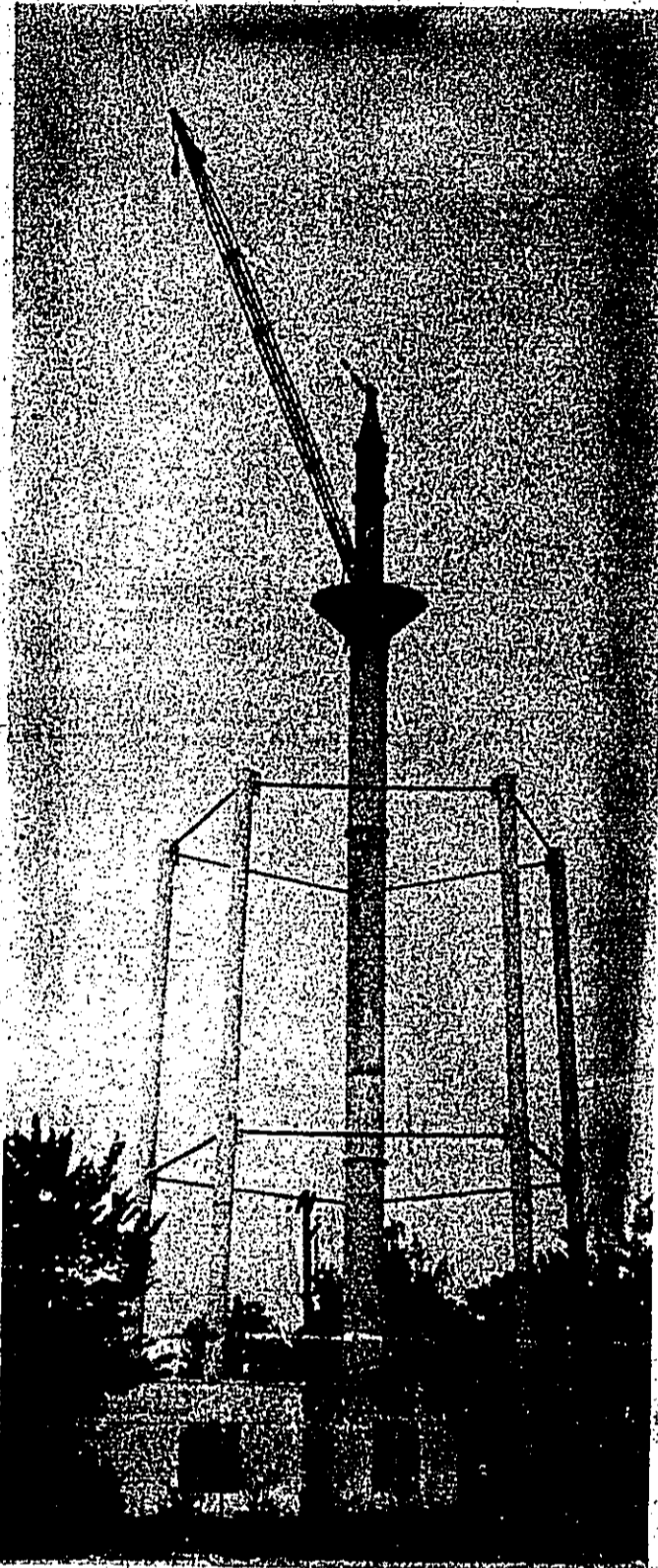

Bookmobile Service To End December 31

The Bookmobile operated in Polk, Tyler and Hardin counties for the past seven years will be discontinued December 31 by mutual agreement of the commissioners, courts of the three counties and the Multi-County Library Board.

They praised the work of Mrs. Ruth White, the Bookmobile Librarian, for making it a tremendous success. County Judge Payton Walters of Polk County said the purpose of the Bookmobile in the three county area has been accomplished far in excess of expectations. It has reached a plateau where it is in reach of the smaller communities to establish permanent library facilities if the people have a desire to work toward that goal, he said.

Miss Katherine Ard, field representative of the Texas State Library Board, met with the members of the Bookmobile board and county officials and agreed with their decision. The Bookmobile will begin picking up books on September 1 and none will be issued after that date.

The Bookmobile has made its headquarters at the Allan Shivers Library in Woodville, and the local library facilities are available to all the people of Tyler County. Local officials said that they hoped the people of the county and especially those who have been using the Bookmobile will avail themselves of the facilities at the Allan Shivers Library.

Opening of the Colmesneil School for the 1968-69 school term will be Thursday, August 29, as announced by Lee A. Taylor, superintendent.

The school buses will run Thursday on the same time and schedule as last year. Lunches will be served in the lunchroom and there will be a full day of school.

Holidays announced for the school term include Labor Day, two days for Thanksgiving, December 23-January 3 for Christmas and New Year's; March 14, a student holiday while teachers go to the district T.S.T.A. convention in Beaumont; and April 3-8, Easter holidays.

The pupils of the Woodville Independent School District will register August 29-30. Senior high school pupils will register at the Kirby High School Building, Thursday and Friday, August 29-30.

Elementary and Junior high pupils will register Friday, August 30. The elementary and Junior high schools will operate a half-day session from 8:30 to 12:00, for the purpose of registration. The buses will operate over regular routes for the half-day session on Friday. Pupils in grades 1-4 will report to the Woodville Elementary campus. Pupils in grades 5-8 will report to the Wheat Building on the Kirby campus.

The first regular day of instruction will be Tuesday, September 3.

WOODVILLE BOARD OF TRUSTEES ADOPT BUDGET FOR SCHOOL YEAR

The 1968-69 budget for the Woodville Independent School District was adopted at the regular August meeting of the Board of Trustees. In general, the budget is about the same as for the 1967-1968 school year, and the tax rate of \$1.85 per \$100 assessed value remains the same.

The budget shows revenue receipts in the amount of \$873,546. The revenue is derived mainly from three sources: (1) local taxes, \$267,590; (2) state and federal funds, \$444,855; and (3) bond sales in the amount of \$50,000, including carry-over, bank balances and unpaid state and federal funds. Grand total revenues should be about \$917,451.

Allocations for expenditures are listed as follows: administration, \$36,500; instruction, \$548,565; health service, \$4,380; transportation, \$41,359; plant operation and maintenance, \$61,790; fixed charges, \$10,650; food service, \$6,179; capital

outlay, \$60,000; and debt service, \$108,576. Grant total expenditures are \$877,999. Largest appropriations are for instruction, debt service, and The district employs 82 professional employees and 47 full-time and part-time auxiliary employees. The cost for current operation during the 1968-1969 year will be about \$433,000 per pupil.

Other matters acted upon by the Board of Trustees were the awarding of the contract to supply gasoline and oil to the district during the coming school year to the Gulf Oil Corporation, and the approval of the order of issue bonds in the amount of \$50,000 to provide funds to construct a vocational building.

Largest appropriations are for instruction, debt service, and plant operation and maintenance. The district employs 82 professional employees and 47 full-time and part-time auxiliary employees. (Cont. on Page 7)

Tyler County's five school districts will enroll over 3,000 pupils this weekend and next for the 1968-69 school term, school census figures in the office of County School Superintendent B. M. Minter.

School census figures show a total of 2,998 scholastics in the county as of February, and Mr. Minter said there will be an increase of around 230 pupils above that number when actual enrollment is completed. Largest enrollment will be in the Woodville Independent School District in which census figures show 1561 children of school age. Actually another 100 or so will likely enroll, Mr. Minter said.

Warren Independent School District in which census figures show 1561 children of school District, with a scholastic census of 690, will likely enroll another 50 pupils this term. Colmesneil schools will probably enroll around 330 pupils, an increase over the census figures of 297 scholastics.

In the Spurger Independent School District the census figure of 245 will likely be increased by at least 20 pupils by actual enrollment.

Chester school enrollment may reach 250, Mr. Minter said. The district had a scholastic census of 205.

Mr. Minter said that enrollment in Tyler County schools was gradually increasing as new families moved into the various school districts. Largest increases in enrollment is in the southern part of the county where a good many families have established homes from outside the county.

The school will observe the following holidays: September 2, Labor Day; November 28-29, Thanksgiving holidays; December 23-January 1, Christmas holidays; April 4-7, Easter holidays.

Eighth grade graduation exercises are set for May 16, 1969 and high school graduation on May 16, 1969.

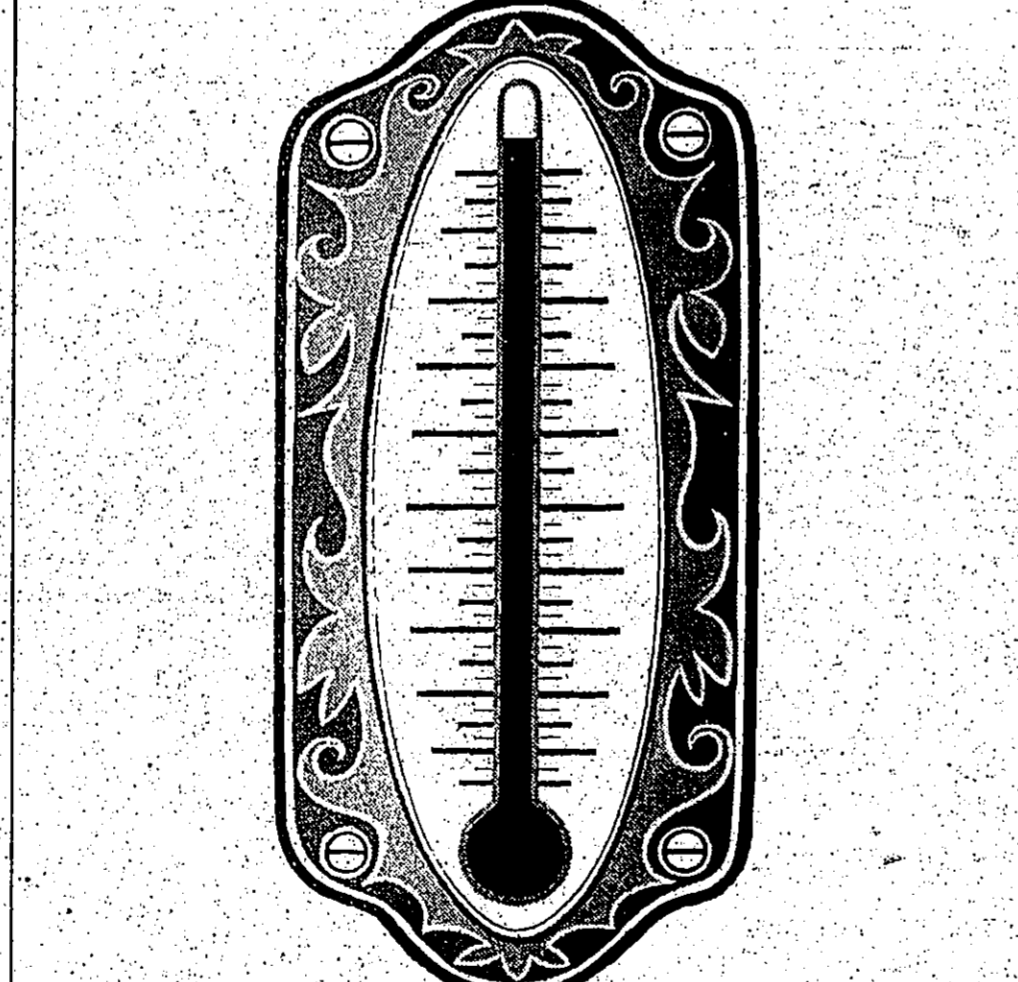

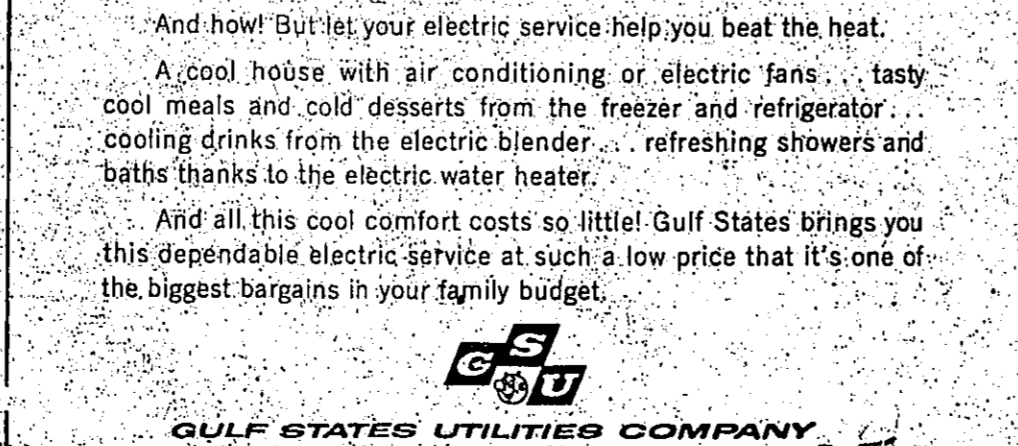
