Pennington, Jim Best and Marlin Young. Mr. Best died Thursday last week in Tyler County Nursing Home. He had been in ill health for several years. Mr. Best was founder of the present J. B. Best and Company which began as a general mercantile store on July 8, 1919. Previously he had been a wagon salesman for Watkins Products in the county. Mr. Best was a native and lifelong resident of Tyler County. He was the son of Julius Jasper Best and Eliza Jane Reed, pioneers in Tyler County. He was a member of the Methodist Church and was a steward for many years. He served on the building committee when the present building was constructed. He served on the Woodville City Council for 14 years. Survivors include one daughter, Mrs. J. H. Kennerson Jr. of Woodville; one son, James B. Best of Woodville; one sister, Mrs. Albert Pennington of Houston; and three grandchildren.

Precinct Three Votes To Pen Cattle Saturday

Voters in precinct three Saturday voted against letting cattle run at large, 168 to 91. Cattle is the only livestock allowed to run at large in the precinct, since others had been penned in a previous election. Precinct three was the last of the county's precincts in which stock law elections had not passed for all stock, and the result of the election Saturday will make the roaming of stock illegal in all of the county when it goes into effect. Cattle owners will have 30 days in which to put their stock under fence.

WOODVILLE BOARD OF TRUSTEES ADOPT BUDGET FOR SCHOOL YEAR

The 1968-69 budget for the Woodville Independent School District was adopted at the regular August meeting of the Board of Trustees. In general, the budget is about the same as for the 1967-1968 school year, and the tax rate of \$1.85 per \$100 assessed value remains the same. The budget shows revenue receipts in the amount of \$873,545. The revenue is derived mainly from three sources: (1) local taxes, \$287,590; (2) state and federal funds, \$555,955; and (3) bond sales in the amount of \$50,000. Including carry-over bank balances and unpaid state and federal funds, grand total revenues should be about \$917,451. Allocations for expenditures are listed as follows: administration, \$36,500; instruction, \$548,565; health service, \$4,380; transportation, \$41,359; plant operation and maintenance, \$61,790; fixed charges, \$10,650; food service, \$6,179; capital

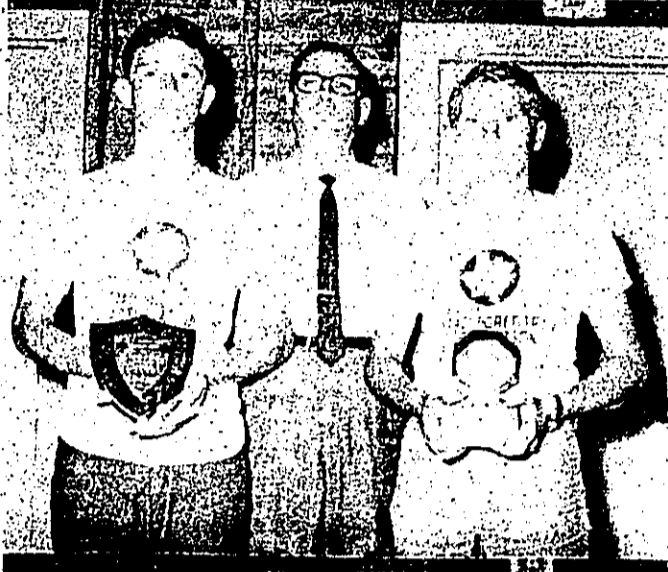
Bob Bowman Presents Program At Kiwanis Tuesday

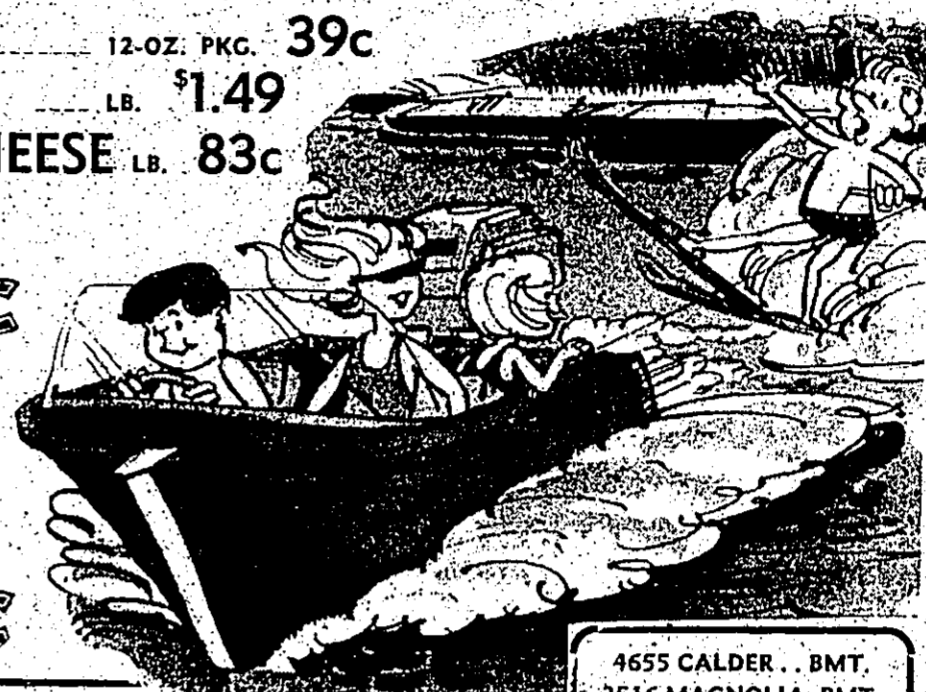
