Why Does The City Need More Money?

For the same reason it costs more to run a business or industry that it did, say, five or ten years ago. Labor costs have gone up, materials are higher, equipment cost more, the people are demanding more services than they did in the past.

The minimum water rate is the same as it was in 1932. The higher user has had one small raise since 1932. The gas rate was raised in 1963. In 1962 the tax rate was raised only 25¢. This did not take care of what we have to pay on the Tax bond passed in 1962. This year, 1968, the city will have to begin paying \$22,000.00 a year for a 20-year revenue bond. We are installing more pumps, a new well, and a sewer lift station which will increase our electricity bill about \$300.00 a month.

Why Is The Sales Tax Needed?

It's needed to provide the income necessary to make Woodville a better, more attractive, safer, and more progressive community. A City that gives the best opportunity possible to all its citizens; one that will attract industry, be able to give the services its citizens want, and in general, be a better place to live.

How Much Revenue Will The Sales Tax Raise?

That depends on the amount of retail business in Woodville. Based on a study by the Texas Municipal League, Woodville could conservatively expect to raise \$15,000.00 a year.

What Items Will Be Taxed?

Items taxed will be exactly the same as items taxed by the state sales tax and exemptions will be the same as under the State Sales Tax.

When Would The Tax Go Into Effect?

The sales tax would go into effect January 1, 1969.

Who Will Collect The Tax?

The Tax will be collected by the State, on a contract basis with the City. Allowing the State to collect the Tax will make it simpler and more convenient for the business firms, who can file their report in one place rather than two.

Why Is A Sales Tax The Best Way?

A sales tax means that everyone pays at least something toward the cost of running their City. A sales tax is paid in very small installments, spread over an entire year. This makes it almost unnoticeable.

What If The Sales Tax Does Not Pass?

Our City must have additional funds—there is no question about it. If voters do not approve the sales tax, the City Council will be forced to increase other revenues—such as Water, Gas and Sewer Rates, or Property Taxes, or to levy and collect a personal property tax on automobiles and other personal property. More Municipal funds must come from some source. The Sales Tax is the fairest and easiest way of all.

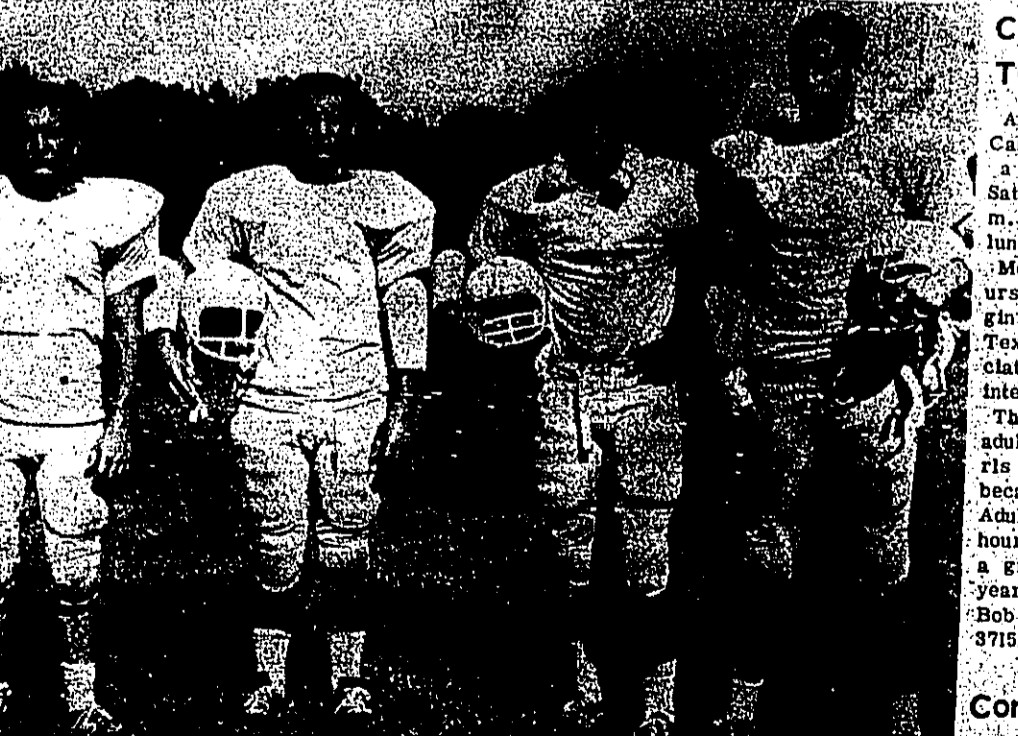

Eagles Go To Livingston; Colmesneil Plays Corrigan

Tyler County teams will continue the football war Friday night on strange fields—Woodville goes to Livingston, Colmesneil plays at Corrigan, Chester at New Waverly and Warren at Splendora. All games begin at 8 p.m.

Eagles Defeat Center, 21-12

Not Center, not the gray over-cast skies, but even Friday the thirteenth could stop the Woodville Eagles from winning their 66-69 season opener from the Center Roughriders here last Friday night. With both teams having a slow start Center was first to score late in the first quarter with a 80 yard run by quarterback John Pigg. With the point after touchdown successful, Center went into the second quarter leading 6-0.

They early in the second quarter Wayne Simmons capped a 69 yard drive by scoring from 9 yards out with George Cortez, booting the point after. Then again, late in the second quarter Keith Koutler scored on a 25 yard pass from John Pigg giving Center a half-time lead of 12-7. During this second quarter action Center fumbled and had a pass intercepted. Junior Lewis recovered the fumble and David Collier intercepted the pass for Woodville.

The second half began with both teams returning to the field with renewed vigor but Center just had soon had stayed in the dressing room as Woodville manipulated the rest of the game. Center was able to move the ball very little the second half as the Eagle defense held them to a 21 yard rushing but did allow a passing gain of 59 yards. About five minutes into the third quarter Phil McClure scored on a 6 yard run in pass from Wayne Simmons. Cortez once again kicked the point after putting Woodville in the lead 13-12. Center fumbled once again during the third quarter with Charles Spurlock of Woodville recovering.

Again, late in the fourth quarter, Simmons made the last Woodville score on an out-sweep from 10 yards out clinching the half game. With the extra point attempt good, Woodville won the game 21-12.

The magnificent running of the offensive backfield, and the hard hitting line teamed with the defensive unit to give victory and to meet Livingston this Friday night with spirits as high as the most distant star. Yes, the Eagles are truly great in 68.

Mayor Urges Voter Turnout Saturday In Sales Tax Election

To the Citizens of Woodville: On Saturday, September 21, 1968, the City of Woodville will hold a sales tax election. It is my hope that all eligible voters will turn out for this important election.

The City must have more revenue. A majority of the City Council feels that the sales tax will be the most fair and equitable way to raise it. It will give every citizen the opportunity to pay at least a part toward the cost of running their city.

Please read the additional information in the Booster concerning this election. As of September 30, 285 cities in the State have passed the sales tax and only 42 have turned it down. As Woodville continues to grow, additional revenue will be needed to provide the demand for additional services. As Woodville grows, receipts from the sales tax will grow to help provide these services. I ask that you consider this very carefully and vote for the 1% city sales tax on September 27. Jimmy Freeman, Mayor

Qualified voters in the City of Woodville will go to the polls Saturday to decide whether a one-cent sales and use tax will be collected by the city.

The polls at the city hall will open at 8 a.m. and close at 7 p.m. J. Wood Fain will serve as election judge with Mrs. Neil Fuller assistant judge.

The city council in August voted to call the special sales tax election. Mounting costs of providing needed services and expansion of utilities created the necessity of collecting additional revenue either through the sales tax or higher property taxes and utility rates, council members said. Council members expressed the opinion that a sales tax will more equitably provide the additional revenue needed. It is estimated that the sales tax will cost around \$5 per capita. Registered voters who live within the city limits are eligible to cast a ballot in the election Saturday.

The city's financial needs have increased because of expansion of services to new customers and to meet bonded indebtedness incurred to improve the water system and other city utilities.

City secretary Walton Davis pointed out that surrounding cities, including Sibley, Kirbyville, Center, Crockett, Huntsville, Nacogdoches and Beaumont have already decided upon this method as being a fair one to all concerned, property owner and renter alike.

Latest tabulation shows that 285 Texas cities and towns have voted the sales tax since it was authorized by the state legislature. The sales tax, if voted, will go into effect on January 1, 1969. The tax will be collected by the state along with two percent state sales tax, and will not increase bookkeeping for merchants.

Marker Slated For Site Of County's First Baptist Church

The Official Texas Historical Marker for the site of the first Baptist Church in Tyler County will be erected soon, announced Mrs. R. C. Schlemmer of Woodville, chairman of the Tyler County Historical Survey committee.

The marker will be placed at 205 West Wheat St. in Woodville, original site of Bethel Baptist Church which was built in 1852. Dedication plans will be announced by Mrs. Schlemmer.

The cast aluminum marker with Swedish steel effect measures 14 by 24 inches and is sponsored by the Tyler County Historical Survey Committee. This is the 14th Official Texas Historical Marker to be erected in Tyler County.

This marker and its location will appear in the next edition of the "Guide to Official Texas Historical Markers," in tourist guides and on maps to stimulate tourist interest in this area, to provide interest on historical tours, and to acquaint the people of Tyler County with their own unique historical past.

Plan to secure the marker was initiated by Morris Clemmons, Jr., in 1957 during his tenure as chairman of the historical society. Inscription on marker will read: Original site of Bethel Baptist Church, first church in county. Organized by Thomas Rock, Milton McQueen, Mrs. Mary Parsons. First pastor was the Rev. J. B. Masters. Court house was used for worship until church was built 1852. Last of old structure was dismantled in 1957. The original bell is now mounted here.

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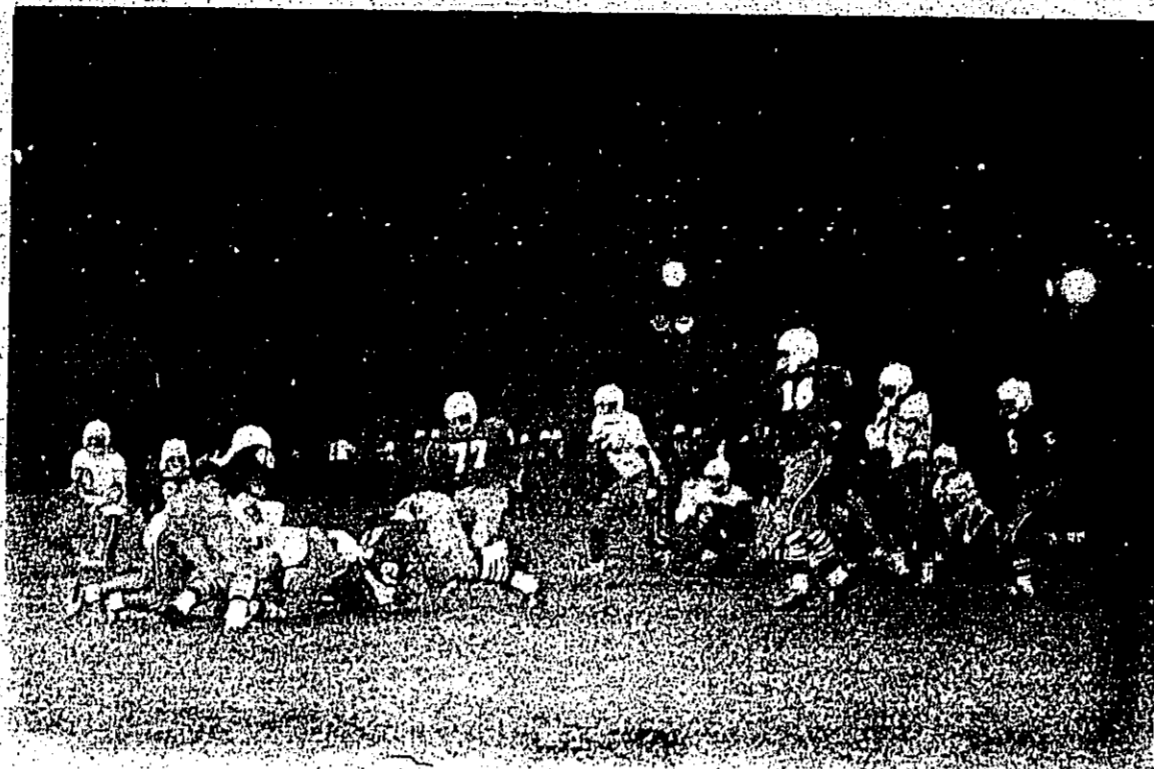
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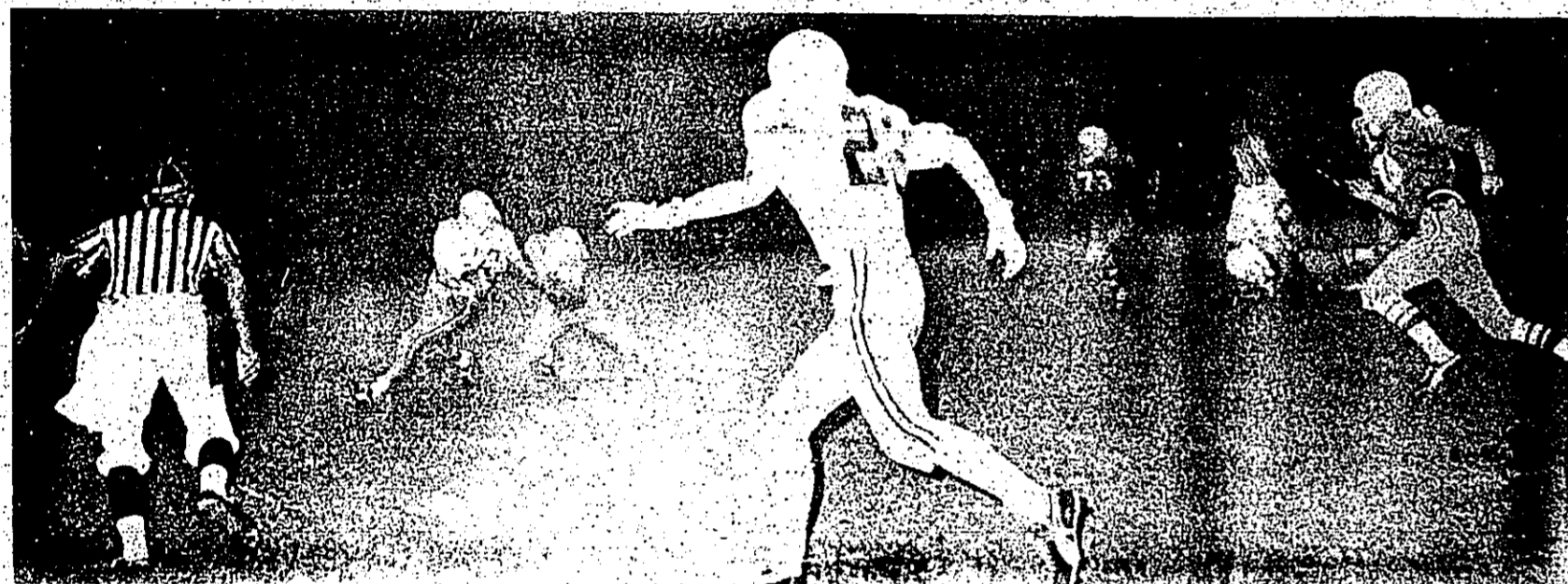

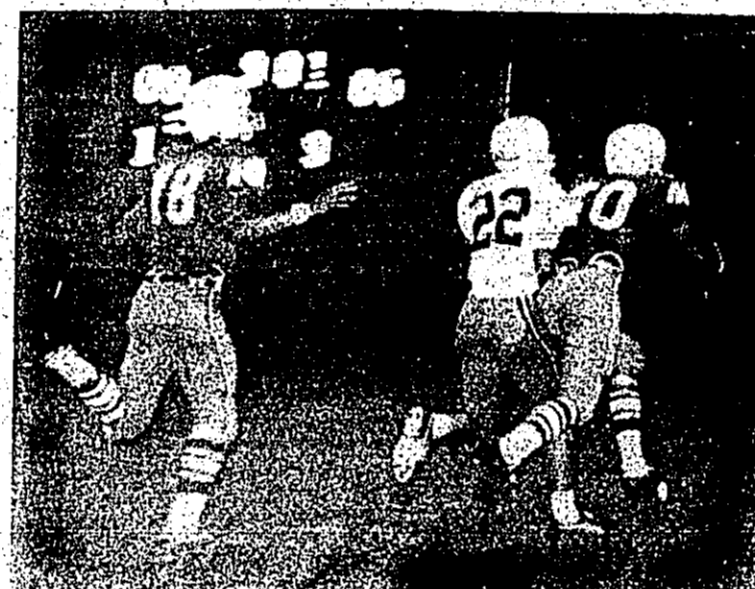

COTTON DECORATION: NEW VERSION OF AN OLD CRAFT

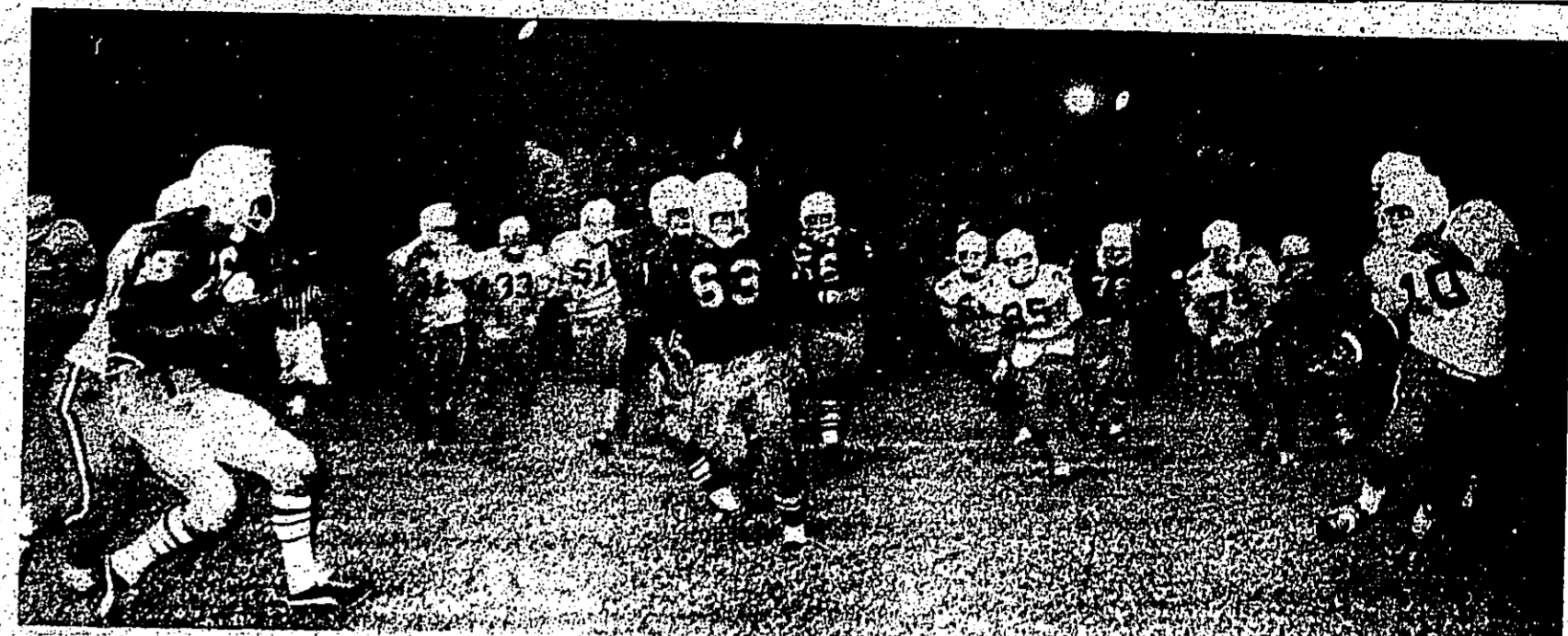
If you haven't tried decoupage yet, now's the time. It may sound like a new kind of thing, but it's really just a fancy version of a simple handicraft that has taken the fancy of millions of women.

The word itself (phonetically pronounced "day-coo-pee") is from the French and means the art of decorating surfaces with applied paper cutouts.

However, there's more to it than that. The craft demands the surface to which it is allied must be covered with coats of a special varnish. This gives the item which might be a decorative box, wall plaque, or picture frame, that "reticulated" finish that resembles lacquer.

Several years ago, don't you recall, this age-old craft sprang up with the "old world" revival of art. Materials were sought in every corner yard for odd pieces of wood suitable for making intricate wall plaques. Mosaics and art periodicals yielded prints for picture designs.

To make the wood work even more colorful and weather-beaten, decorative artists had invented it, even some of the

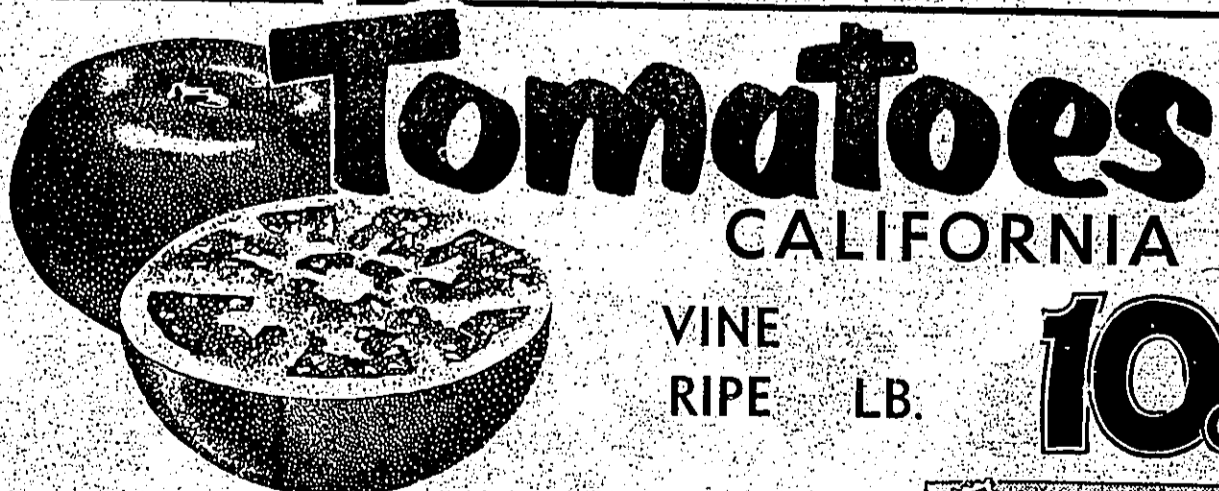
