The Woodville Eagles will go to Jasper Friday night for a non-district game with the Jasper Bulldogs. Game time is 7:30 p.m.

The Eagles have won their first two contests, defeating Center and Livingston, both Triple A teams. Jasper will be the third game for the Eagles against Triple A competition, and will be one of the hardest.

Jasper has won one and lost one. They dropped their opener to Nacogdoches, and came back last week to swamp Carthage by a 42 to 8 score.

While the Jasper lineup is sprinkled liberally with sophomores, Juniors and seniors are in key positions. Their quarterback, Ronnie Pickett is a sophomore, but at 175 pounds is both a good runner and passer. Their line may be heavier than the Eagles with guard positions manned by players from 227 pounds down to 165. They have a 213 pound center, tackles weighing 220 and 217 and the others just under 200 pounds, and a number of good halfbacks in the 175 and 180 pound class. The Bulldogs have a good reserve strength that will equal that of the Eagles.

Eagles Romp Over Lions, 57-0

The Eagles traveled to Livingston last Friday night to meet the Lions in a non-district game and turned out to be one of the biggest victories Woodville has ever had. As one could tell from the score, Woodville dominated the ball game, offensively as well as defensively. The first score came in the middle part of the first quarter when James Ivy galloped over from 8 yards out. With the point after no good, Woodville went into the second quarter leading 6-0.

The second quarter turned out to be Woodville's best as they picked up 30 points. Early in the quarter Simmons scored from five yards out followed by the point after. Minutes later, after a 20-yard punt return by Bob Lilley and some excellent running on the part of Wayne Simmons and Chris Tucker, James Ivy capped the drive with a 10 yard touchdown run. Cortez made the extra point good making the score 20-0 Woodville's favor.

Thereafter Robert Greenwood of Woodville spoiled a Livingston drive by recovering a fumble. Though the following drive failed, George Cortez managed to kick a 33 yard field goal. The final score of the half came when Tommy Hensarling recovered another Livingston fumble, this time on Livingston's 9 yard line. On the first play from scrimmage John Candada took a pitch back from Simmons and scored. Cortez once again attempted the point after, but it was blocked. Woodville lead at half time 36-0.

The second half began with the Woodville fans going wild with the return of their team to the field. Receiving the second half kickoff Woodville started a drive from their own 34 yard line. After a short running gain and a large penalty, as Woodville was plagued the whole game with 15 yards, the Eagles were forced to punt, but the Lions once again fumbled the ball and Charles Spurlock of Woodville came up with the recovery. On the play that followed Stann hit Willie Gill for a 33 yard touchdown pass. Cortez again booted the conversion. Minutes later, after the ball had changed hands several times, Junior Lewis of Woodville broke through on some excellent blocking and galloped 43 yards. With the conversion good Woodville went into the fourth quarter leading 50-0.

Woodville's final score of the game came when George Cortez intercepted a pass and carried it deep into Lion territory, where Alan Bell on first play from scrimmage barreled into the middle for 15 yards and a T.D. Cortez, as usual, booted the final extra point with Woodville winning the game 57-0.

Woodville's fine defense held the Lions to 36 yards total rushing and allowed them only one penetration. Woodville helped Livingston in one aspect, you might say. They gave their punters plenty of practice.

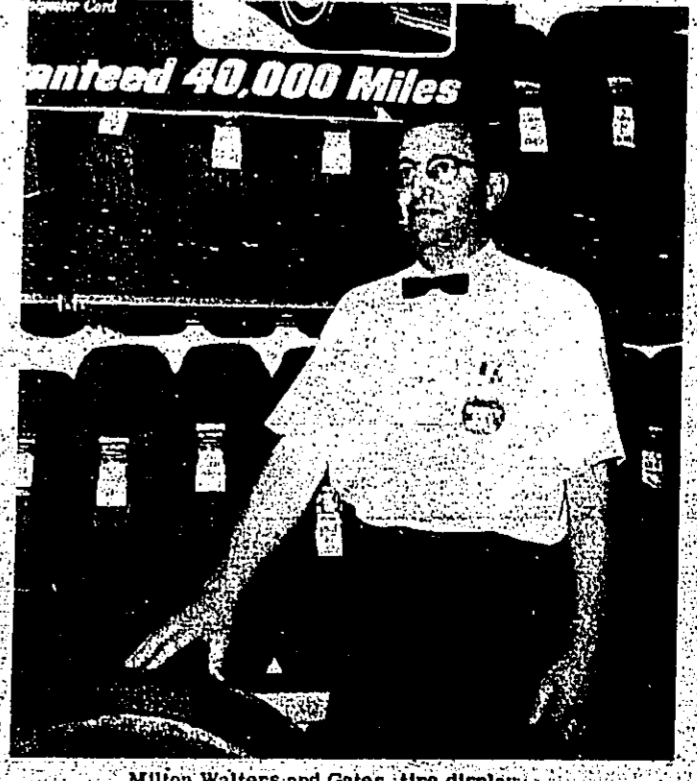
