Among the scores of persons summoned for petit jury duty in 88th District Court Monday was one who had a legitimate excuse for dismissal—but who insisted that she would like to serve.

When District Judge H. A. Coe informed the panel that persons over 65 did not have to serve, and would be excused if they made it known, she raised her hand. She told the judge she was over 65.

"Do you want to be excused?" the judge asked. "You have the right to be excused, or you may serve if you wish to do so."

"Oh, I'd like to serve," the lady said.

She was selected on a jury for a civil suit. After the jury was selected, court recessed for lunch.

When the jury got back from lunch, it found that the attorneys for the two sides had reached an agreement and the jury was dismissed.

However, Mrs. Wanda Pedigo, the willing juror, said it had been a great experience anyway. A retired school teacher, she had never been in a courtroom before.

Mrs. Pedigo is 77.

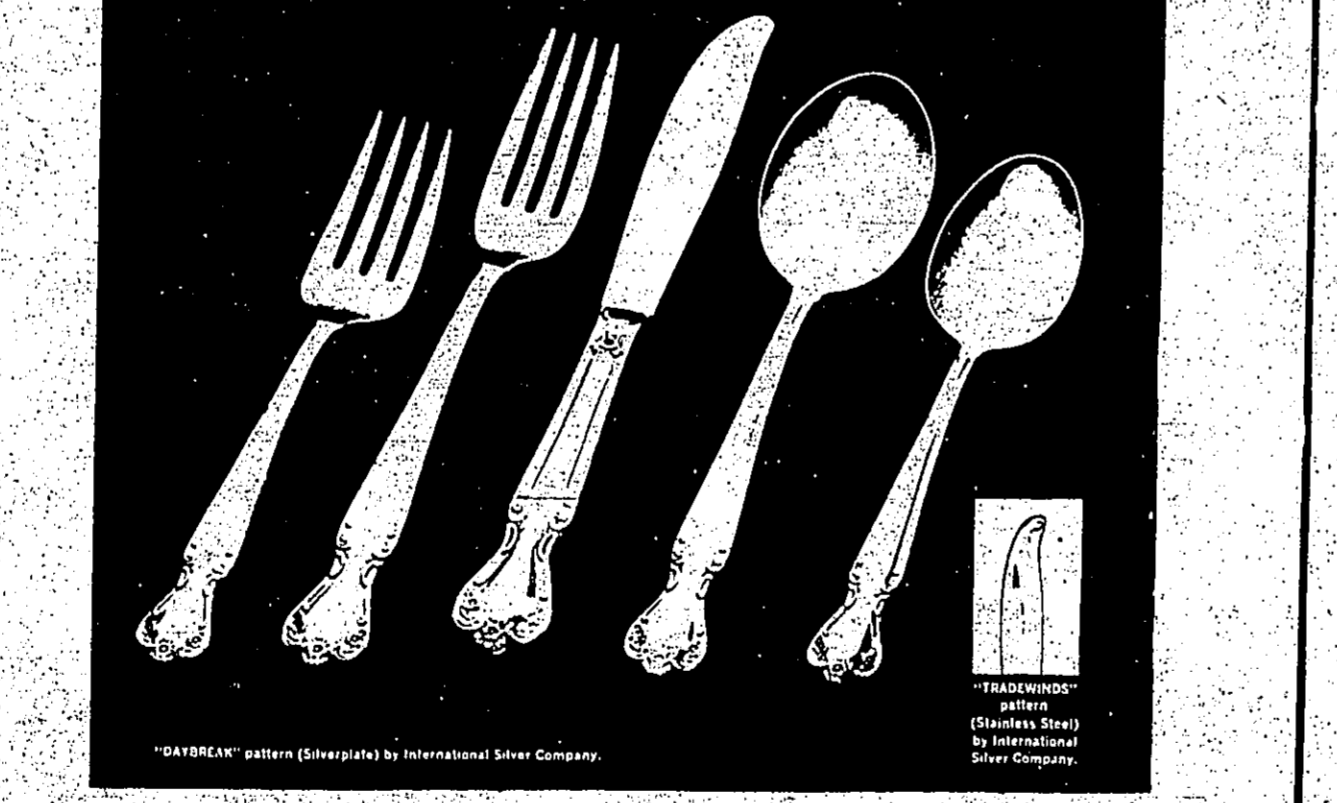

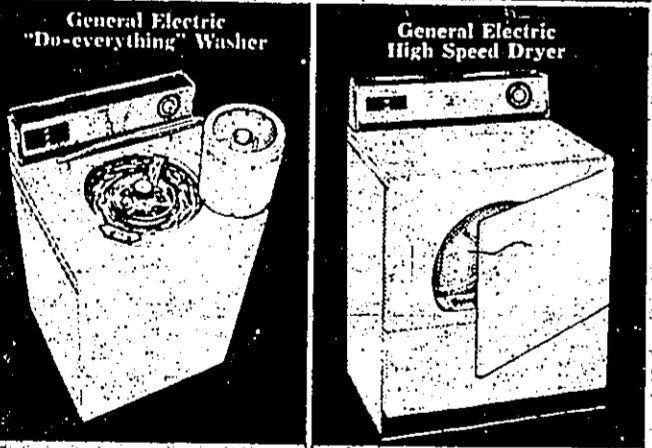

STATE CAPITOL HIGHLIGHTS & SIDELIGHTS

Presidential Campaign, 1968 is starting to roll full speed in Texas.

Democratic Hubert Humphrey's official state organization for the 57th District Court of Bezar County to fill the vacancy created by resignation of Judge Solomon Casser Jr. Spears is the unopposed Democratic nominee for the post.

Young established a saw mill in Warren in 1882. There was a narrow gauge railroad there for a number of years. It was chartered and called the Warren and Corsicana Pacific. It was later made a standard gauge in the late 1890s. This line ended up near the Seigo Oil Field in Hardin County and was considered the best saw mill railroad in this county.

Fort Lindsay is on this road and is 7 miles west of Warren. This is the home of the Hon. D. S. Lindsay, Mr. Lindsay was born in 1897 and moved to this area when he was about 30 years old. At that time all of this area, was virgin long leaf pine from the Neches River throughout Tyler and Polk counties.

Seneca, Texas has a saw mill in 1887 owned by Robert W. Snelling who was also the first postmaster.

From time to time there has been several mills at this location. Dr. W. P. Callen owned a mill there about 1895.

Colmeseel came into existence when the Yellow Pine Lumber Company was organized in October, 24, 1882 with Pat Larkin as the first postmaster. Colmeseel had two railroads. The # 7 & 8 came from Trinity to Colmeseel and then to the Sabine & East Texas west from Beaumont to Rockland. Both of these roads were built about 1883 or 82.

Rockland post office was established in July 1883. W. H. Nuttidge owned a mill there after 1894. He then sold to William Cameron in 1898. There is timber along the Neches River had been cut and floated to Bezar County for a number of years before the saw mill days in old Tyler County.

Saw Mill Days In Tyler County

Two saw mills were in operation as early as 1881. John Struck owned a saw mill on Williams Creek near the mouth only a few miles from the Neches River. Mr. Struck had the lumber to Woodville with ox teams and at that time there was only three lumber houses in Woodville, the court house, and two hotels. There were more than 20 log houses in Woodville at that time. The Hart mill was built in 1881 and was run by McGeehan and Hart until 1880.

J. S. and W. N. Rice came to Tyler County in 1882 and built a mill at Hart and operated it until 1907 when the operation was moved to Ward, Louisiana.

Henry Hart's narrow gauge railroad which hauled the logs to the mill and was included in Hart's Creek. County Agent Reports

By Clinton R. Currie

As you prepare your spring garden, select a few choice plants to store for the winter. A bit of cheer and color to the indoor landscape during the winter months.

Bulbs that are good for indoor forcing include Crocus, grape hyacinth, daffodils, tulips and cyclamen.

Put the bulbs as soon as they are available. Prepare the soil by mixing equal parts of soil and sand. Place a one-inch layer of gravel in the bottom of the pot. Firm the soil around the bulbs, leaving the tips of large bulbs showing above the surface. Barely cover small bulbs with soil.

Keep the bulbs in the pot until they are ready to be planted. The newly potted bulbs should be stored at a temperature of 40 degrees to 50 degrees F. Success with forcing bulbs depends upon their developing roots during the cold storage period. Keep the soil moist but not saturated. A period of six to ten weeks will be required for the bulbs to make good root growth and to be ready for forcing.

After the cold storage treatment, place the bulbs in a cool, well-lit location. They usually move to a sunny location for good growth and color. Do not allow the bulbs to dry out. Water them as the soil surface begins to dry.

Most bulbs will be in flower by Christmas. For complete information, a period of six to ten weeks will be required for the bulbs to make good root growth and to be ready for forcing.

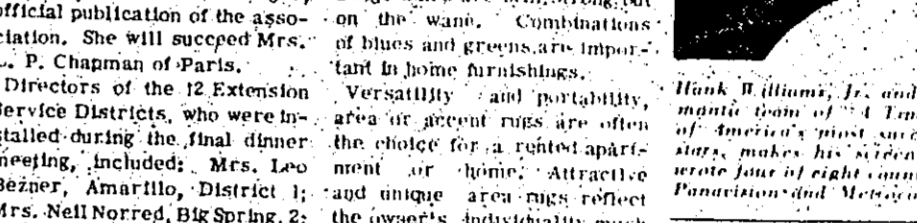

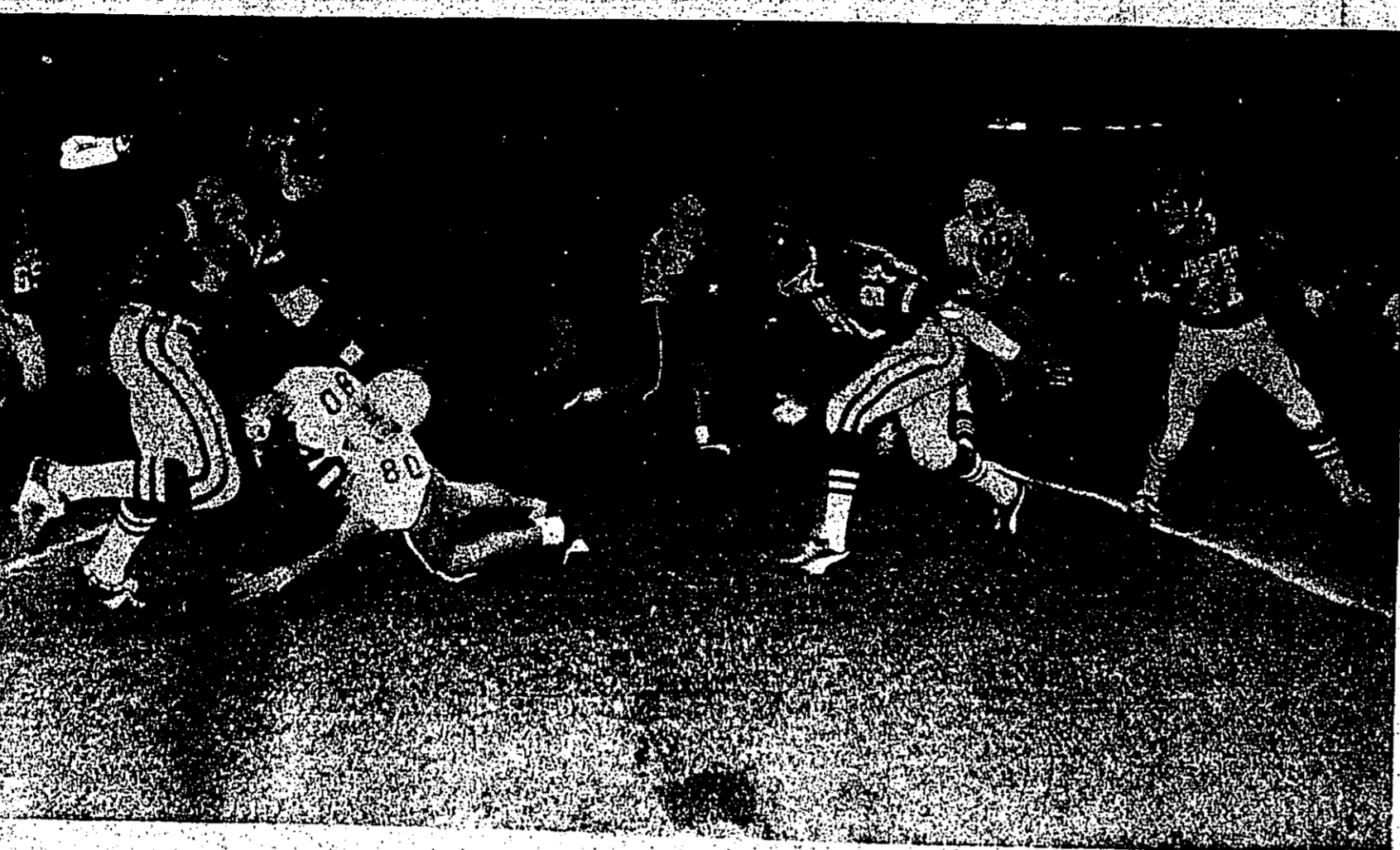
