Eagles Trip Rebels 14-0 Friday

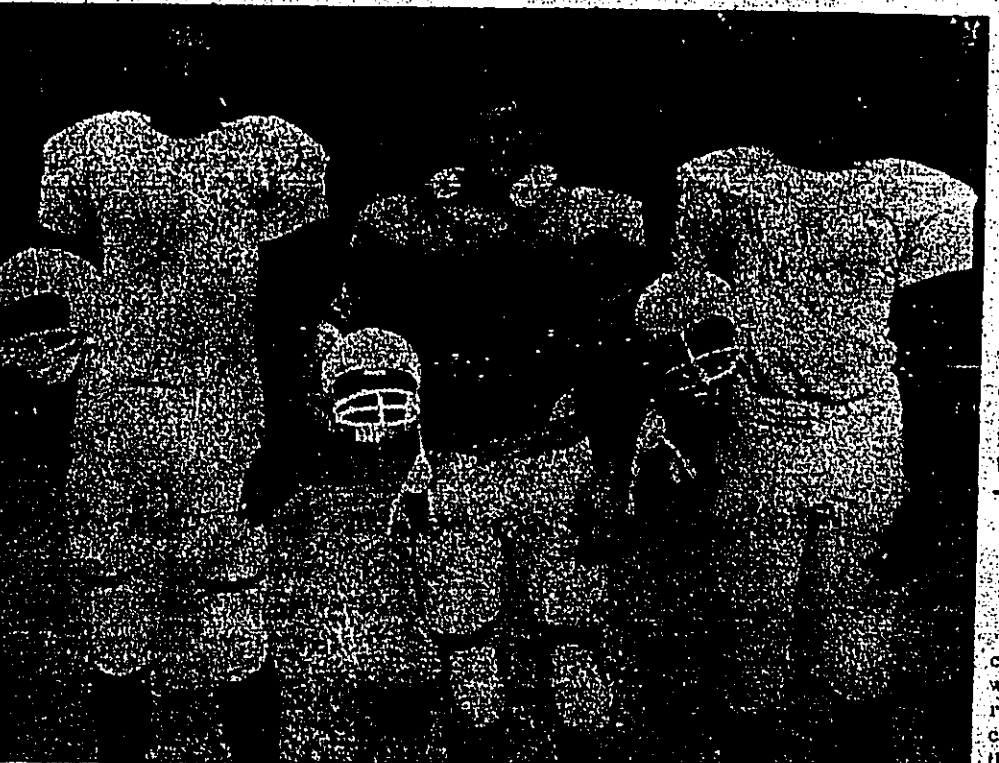

The Woodville Eagles returned to their winning ways here last Friday night as they blanked the Hardin-Jefferson Rebels in a battle that wasn't decided until the last eight minutes of play. The first half was largely a defensive battle for both teams with Woodville definitely dominating the offense, however, unable to score. During first half action the tough Woodville defense did not allow the "gray-shirts" once inside their twenty

and limited the Rebel running and passing attack greatly as these first half statistics show: Hardin-Jefferson: rushing, 42 yards; passing, no completions out of three attempts; first downs, three; penetrations, none; total yardage, 42; punts, five for average of 35 yards; kickoffs, one for average of 55 yards; penalties, 3 for 20 yards; fumbles, none; interceptions, none. The Woodville offense, though it didn't show on the scoreboard, looked great as these

first half statistics point out: Woodville: rushing, 100 yards; passing, 38 yards, 2 completions of 7 attempts; first downs, 5; penetrations, 2; total yardage, 138 yards; kickoffs, none; punts, 4 for average of 30 yards; interceptions, none; fumbles, none. The third quarter was much the same only the offensive domination shifted to the Rebels as they kept the ball for most of the quarter; twice getting inside the Woodville 25. 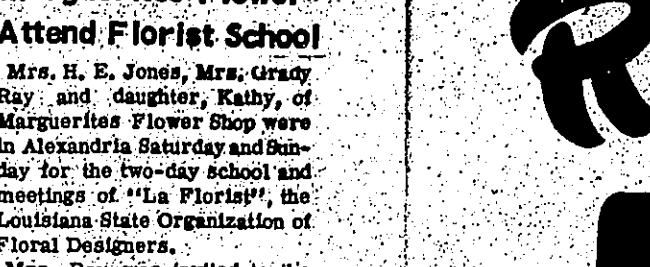

The Gropps are members of the Lutheran Church and have long been active in PTA work. He is a member of the Lions Club of Pasadena.

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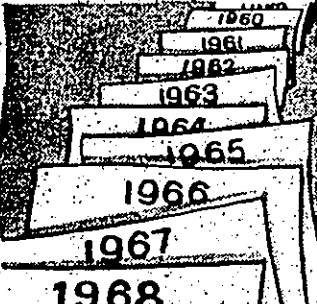


Slow Motion Divorce

Not long ago a man filed suit for divorce on the ground that his wife had committed adultery—20 years earlier. But his case was dismissed because of too much procrastination. The court, noting the difficulties of finding out what really happened that long ago, commented:

"A husband cannot wait to make his charges until the years dim the proofs to the contrary."

Like most lawsuits, a divorce suit too long delayed may be barred automatically by a state's statute of limitations. But even if there is no automatic bar, courts are usually skeptical of divorce suits in which the complaining



spouse has postponed action for an excessive period of time.

One reason, mentioned above, is the problem of evidence—of dredging facts out of a distant past. Another reason is the feeling that a grievance, if acted upon so slowly, could not have been too serious in the first place.

Thus a woman failed to convince the court that two blows by her husband, inflicted 40 years before, had ruined her marriage.

"There must be some limit to judicial credulity," said the judge. "We think it has been reached here."

Nevertheless, there may well be a legitimate reason for delay. For example, a man who put off a divorce suit for a number of years, after learning of his wife's infidelity, gave an excuse that satisfied the court: he wanted to spare his young children from scandal as long as he could.

In another case a husband was held justified in waiting gallantly, before suing for divorce, while his wife recovered from a severe illness.

Perhaps the best reason for delay is that the wronged spouse continues to have hope that the marriage may yet be preserved.

Thus, a court found no fault with a man who waited seven years—in recurring hope of a reconciliation—before finally seeking a divorce on grounds of marital cruelty. The court felt it would be unfair to blame him for wanting what the law itself encourages: the saving of the marriage.

SOCIAL SECURITY ? QUIZ ?

Q—This week I received a letter saying that I am not eligible for disability benefits because I can do some work. Well, I tried to work last week but I got sick and the doctor told me to stop. Can I file a new application?

A—Since it has been less than six months ago that the determination was made in your case, it will not be necessary to file a new application. You may request reconsideration and furnish additional evidence of your disability if you wish to do so.

Q—Does social security pay disability insurance benefits on a percentage of disability as some other agencies do?

A—No, the person must be totally disabled in order to qualify. There is no payment for a partial disability.

Q—When I reach age 65 my wife will be only 62 years old. She plans to take a reduced benefit. Will she also be eligible for Medicare?

A—No. She must be 65 years old in order to be entitled to the health insurance.

Q—I applied for disability insurance benefits last year and was told that I did not have enough credits to qualify. I have heard that the number of credits has been changed. How will this affect me?


A—It depends upon your age at the time you became disabled. For most workers there was no change in the work requirements for disability insurance benefits. However, if you became disabled before age 31 you should inquire about fil-
