Local Candidates Want Your Vote, Too

Democratic nominees for county and precinct offices whose names appear in the Democratic column on the ballot in Tuesday's general election may feel like forgotten men—unless Tyler countians take the trouble to make an X in the square before each of their names. Of course, voters who cast a straight Democratic ticket by making an X in the square before Democratic Party at the top of the ballot will automatically vote for all names in the column, including president, state, district and local offices. But a large number of regular Democratic voters are not going to vote the ticket straight this year. As many as half or more of the votes cast in Tyler County could go to Nixon and Wallace.

They want to vote—and that includes the county and precinct Democratic nominees. Since candidates for county and precinct offices have no opposition in the Republican or American Party columns, they have no fear of not being selected. But several have mentioned the possibility of many voters who are splitting their ticket by voting for either Nixon or Wallace falling to mark the X in the squares before the local candidates.

So voters should check out county and precinct candidates. If you are one of those casting a split ticket ballot this year, take a minute to mark the X in the squares before the local candidates. After all, it's not every day that you'll be able to vote for local candidates even though they are impossible to see.

Tyler County voters will go to the polls next Tuesday to cast ballots for candidates for office from president to precinct functionaries. Receiving the most attention here, as it is across the nation, is the three-way race for president of the United States.

The three presidential candidates, together with their vice-presidential running mates, are on a Texas ballot that lists candidates on Democratic and Republican tickets for most major state office. The third party, the American party, has no candidates other than for

the office of president and vice president. All three parties are claiming that they will carry Texas with its 25 electoral votes in the presidential race. In races for state office, the Republicans claim that they will also swing some of their candidates

into office if the Republican ticket of Richard M. Nixon and Spiro Agnew carry the state. However, if the third party candidate, George C. Wallace, should carry the state, no one can foresee whether this support will swing to the Democratic or Republican column for state offices.

In his speech, Nixon will likely point to Texas as the Democratic stronghold. Hubert H. Hays, a prominent Democrat, said that he would vote for Nixon. County Agent Reports

There are always jobs for the home farmer and right now is the time to give vegetable and flower gardens a head start in spring. The job that will do it is the destruction of the winter home of disease-causing organisms. Many gardeners, although familiar with plant diseases in the growing season, are not aware that the pests causing the trouble remain active during the winter. Much like the plants they attack, these organisms, such as fungi, bacteria and nematodes, become dormant during the winter. By knowing the places where these pests spend the winter, they can be reduced in numbers or even destroyed, thus eliminating much of their damage next spring and summer. Favorite overwintering home for the trouble makers are dead or diseased plant parts. The fungus causing black spot of roses overwinters on dead, but not yet rotted, leaves. The fungus capable of surviving in the soil, can overwinter in much larger numbers in the remains of infected plants not destroyed in the fall. Bacteria causing potatoes spend the winter in soil piles or other plant refuse.

Have you winterized your car? You should do it soon because temperatures often drop to damaging levels at this time of the year. Winterizing means more than just an oil change and an antifreeze check. Things you need good, even treated to bite and grip, avoid- ing skids and spinning starts on slippery pavement or snow. Keep your tires at recommended pressures; low pressure doesn't improve traction, it only increases wear. Brakes—check and adjust, if necessary. Use new pads or brakes that grab too easily can send you into a skid. Windshield—live wiper blades with a sharp edge prevent streaking. Also be sure the wiper arm tension is correct, and that you have the wiper-to-glass contact solution in your windshield washer reservoir.

Two Receive State Awards For Water Works Proficiency

An official State Health Department citation for work proficiency has been awarded to L. E. Greenwood, assistant water superintendent for the city of Woodville and to William W. Davis, Woodville city secretary. The citation reflects the men's standing among state water officials.

Signed by the State Health Commissioner and authorities of the Texas Water Utilities Association, the certificate of competency is awarded only to those utility plant operators who have successfully demonstrated their skill and knowledge in modern principles of plant management.

To qualify for certification, a plant operator must have accumulated a prescribed amount of actual work experience. He must also have attended both

regional and statewide short schools at which the techniques of water treatment and waste water disposal are taught, and must have passed an examination given by State Health Department sanitary engineers. State law requires that at least one operator per shift be certified for competency by health department engineers, but many operators seek certification on their own time and at their own expense to increase their efficiency as key public servants to their community and state.

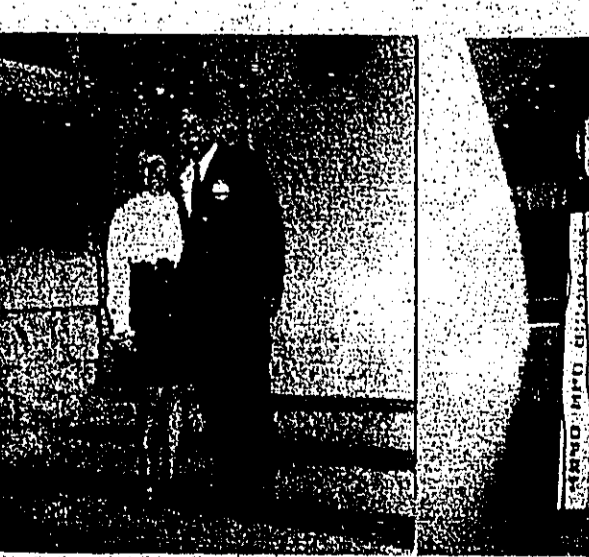

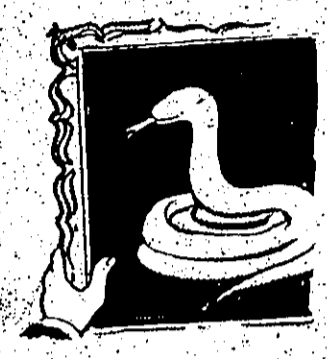
Legacies of Hate

"To my sister, one dollar and my curse. To my son-in-law, a good snuff-rape with which to hang himself. To my partner, my portrait of a viper."

These hateful legacies are examples of a peculiar phenomenon in the field of wills. The maker of a will probably not come to light until after his death—when he is safe from retribution. Under this protection, as one expert put it, "Human nature removes its mask."

Are such legacies valid? In making a will, is there a "right to be mean"?

Generally speaking, the answer is yes. The law is reluctant to con-



demn the motives of someone who is not present to make explanations. No court can be sure what real grievances might have lain hidden in his heart.

Besides, the very idea of a will is to give the maker the right to pick and choose among the possible objects of his bounty, favoring one, rejecting another.

On the other hand, if a will is sufficiently unnatural, that may be some indication that the person who made it was either under undue influence or mentally incompetent.

For instance, a spinster will left all her money to a niece, cutting off the brother she had long loved dearly. This was held sufficiently strange, along with other circumstances, to justify the conclusion that the woman had been subjected to undue influence by the niece.

Furthermore, unnatural provisions won't be upheld if they are contrary to state laws or in conflict with public policy. Thus, a court would not approve instructions to "Burn all my money" or "Hire a gunman to do away with my boss."

Fortunately, the "average" will does not reflect either venom or spite. Most people find something better to do with their last words than to leave a legacy of hate. Not many individuals care to be remembered that way.

Man Versus Beast

Hot tempered Brown, seeing a neighbor's Airedale frolicking on his lawn, took out a pistol and fired a fatal shot. Sued later for damages, Brown protested that the dog had been "trespassing on my private property."

But the court held him liable anyhow. The judge commented: "A dog should not be the object of target practice simply on the grounds that it was outside the custody of its master."

"Generally speaking, you are not justified in killing someone else's domestic animal merely because it



is trespassing on your premises. Nor is killing justified by other annoyances of a similar petty character.

For example, a court held that a man had no right to kill a dog for walking across his freshly-painted porch. And another court reached the same conclusion when a man killed a dog for chasing his pet cat up a tree.

But the life of a domestic animal is not sacrosanct, either. If the animal inflicts damage that is sufficiently serious, this fact may justify his aggrieved victim in striking back.

Accordingly, a court ruled that a suburban home owner could not be blamed for slaying a rat which had a long record of raids on his hen house.

This right of retaliation is usually recognized even in the animal is one which comes under the protection of the local game laws.

One community had a game law forbidding the killing of "monkey face" owls. But a farmer, who killed one of these creatures was exonerated when he pointed out that this particular owl had done away with more than 100 of his chickens.

Of course, the strongest justification for killing an animal arises when it is menacing not just a person's property but his own or his family's safety.

Thus, by centuries-old doctrine, the law puts its stamp of approval on the killing of a dog that is rabid. The right to kill a mad dog belongs to every man, because a mad dog is every man's enemy.

State Bar Adopts Memorial For Late James E. Wheat

The board of directors of the State Bar of Texas October 19 adopted a memorial resolution in honor of the late James E. Wheat, prominent Woodville lawyer and civic leader.

The resolution reads as follows: "The State of Texas sustained the great loss of one of its most illustrious leaders in the passing of J. E. Wheat of Woodville."

He is the father of our distinguished colleague on the Board of Directors and President-Elect of the State Bar of Texas, Josiah Wheat, also of Woodville. From his coming to the Bar in 1914 after graduation from the University of Texas Law School until his death October

10, Mr. Wheat lived with intelligence, integrity, energy and devotion to his family, his profession and his State and Nation.

During his more than half-century in the practice of law at Woodville, he twice served with distinction on the Texas State Bar's governing Board of Directors.

In state affairs, Mr. Wheat served with distinction on the Texas Prison Board from 1912 to 1948 and was largely responsible for a reform which resulted in the creation of the Texas Department of Corrections. He organized and was the first President of the Texas State Historical Society Committee.

In the spring of 1948, he was elected to the position of State Bar of Texas, as-
sembled at Austin this 19th day of October, 1968, express to the family of the late J. E. Wheat our deepest sympathy and record this tribute to the memory of an outstanding lawyer and leader of the Bar and of the State of Texas. Through we miss now his presence and what he did, the influence of his personality and character remain for the benefit of us all.

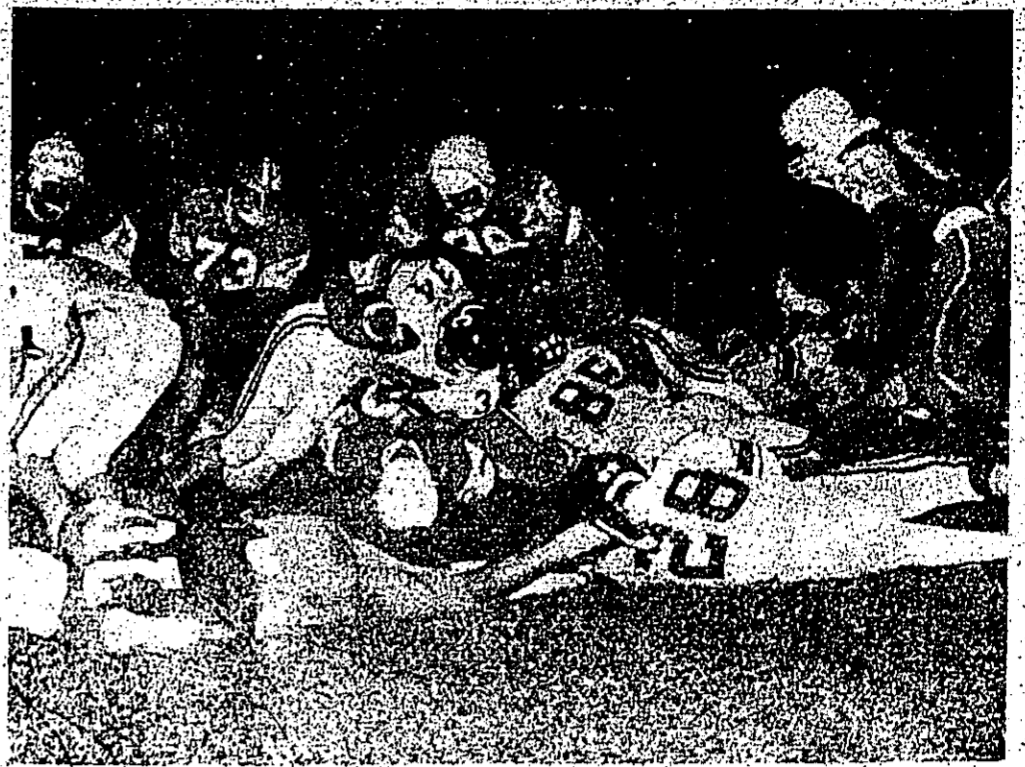

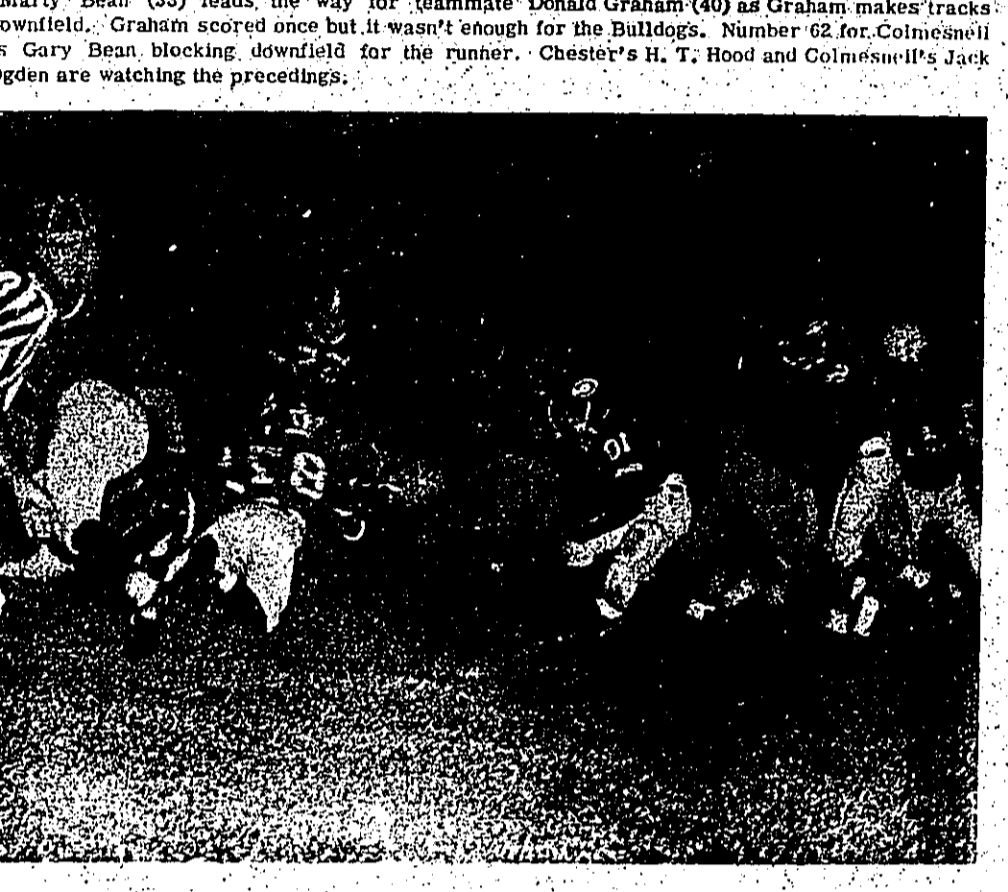

Mervin A. Frautke is the director of the 50-piece band, and Kaye Owens is the drum major.

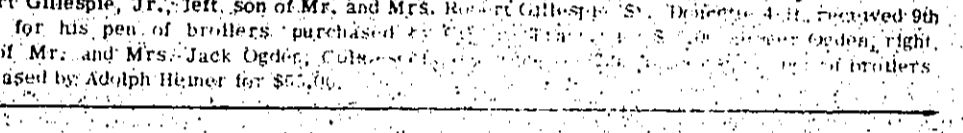
TSTA Urges Passage Of Amendment 9
