Historical Markers To Be Dedicated Saturday

Mooney Receives OEDP Report

County Judge Jeff R. Mooney has received his copy of the Deep East Texas Development Council's OEDP report from Neal Pickett, DETDC Executive Director.

In presenting Judge Mooney a copy of the Overall Economic Development Program report, Pickett pointed out that it is the most complete compilation of data on the Deep East Texas area available. The report brings together in one place, much data from the U. S. Bureau of the Census, U. S. Corps of Engineers, Texas Education Agency, Texas Employment Commission, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, Texas A&M University, Texas University, and many other sources.

According to Pickett, the report deals with the economy of the area, its human, economic and physical resources, and gives statistical data on population, economic activity, and available community facilities.

DEER HUNTING IN COUNTY GETS FAST START

The deer hunting season in Tyler County started at Camp Umland Saturday morning when one of the best seasons in the county's history is under way. While not all hunters bagged a buck this morning, the number killed was larger than usual and several good specimens were added to the booster office trophy collection. The largest deer, and weight was killed by J. B. (Jug) Spurrack at his home on the old J. L. Jordan place. While it had only 10 points it was by far the longest and heaviest reported to the booster. Dedication ceremonies for three historical markers which were postponed last week because of inclement weather will be held Saturday at the Tyler County Historical Survey Committee and the Tyler County Chamber of Commerce-announced today.

The marker for the original site of Bethel Baptist Church will be held at the First Baptist Church in Woodville at 10 a.m. J. C. Clark, Jr., deacon and Spurrack School superintendent of the First Baptist Church, will be the speaker. The marker was given to S. D. O'Brien and the late Eloise Reed O'Brien. The dedication of the marker at the old Enloe Mill will be made at the site between Cimposed and Chester at 11 a.m. by a group of the Enloe and Moore families. Following this dedication the caravan will go on to Fort Teran for the dedication ceremonies there at 12 o'clock noon. The address here will be made by Rep. Adams, state representative-elect from District 7. Fort Teran was named a historical site by the Texas Centennial Committee in 1936 and a centennial marker placed there 101 years after the closing of the fort. The marker was moved this year to the site following the completion of all weather roads to Fort Teran. Fort Teran Park is comprised of five acres which was given to Tyler County in 1966 by Mrs. Wannie Wilson in memory of her husband, S. Earl Wilson, who presided over the site. After the dedication, those attending will have a picnic lunch. Those attending are asked to bring a basket lunch.

Col. Richmond Makes News With Attack On Black Market

Col. Melvin E. Richmond, the Army's top comptroller in South Vietnam, recently was the subject of an article in Time Magazine following a crackdown on black market dealers in Military Payment Certificates. Col. Richmond is a graduate of Kirby High School and attended Texas A & M one year before going into service. He completed his education in the service, receiving two masters, one of which is in accounting from Wharton School of Accounting, Philadelphia. He has been in Vietnam since May. He has three sisters living here: Mrs. Louis Galt, Mrs. C. E. Wright, and Agnes Richmond. He also has a nephew, Jim Miller, living here. He has a niece Mrs. James Whidden of Beaumont, another sister Mrs. Chester Sanders of Odessa, and a brother James Richmond of Temple.

Months in the planning "C-day" broke bright and early across South Viet Nam. U. S. command posts received coded radio instructions while most troops were still asleep, promptly ordered all personnel to muster for an alert. Base commanders dismissed Vietnamese civilian employees for the day, and sealed off installations to all outsiders. "We needed a period of limited combat activity," said Colonel Melvin E. Richmond, the man who oversaw the mission. "Operational requirements dictated the timing."

A top-secret assault on a Viet Cong stronghold? No. What took place last week was a strike against speculators in Military Payment Certificates, the U.S. issued scrip used to pay American fighting men in Viet Nam.

Colonel Richmond happens to be the U.S. military command's top comptroller, and C-day was the moment chosen for a surprise conversion in the \$50 million worth of MPCs in circulation in Viet Nam.

Fast Profit: Military scrip was introduced three years ago as a way of curbing the growing black market in regular U. S. currency. The new red-colored MPCs were meant to be valid only in such U. S. establishments as post exchanges and officers' clubs.

The trouble was that a new black market, this time dealing in MPCs, quickly developed. Although scrip was not supposed to be tendered off the base, G.I.s who were shot of

Vietnamese plasters often used to pay bills in native stores and bars, generally exchanging it near the official rate of 18 plasters to the dollar. Such MPCs would then wind up in the hands of Chinese and Indian money-changers, who in turn realized a fast profit by selling them at 140 plasters to the dollar. Some of the buyers were Americans, who preferred to spend MPCs whenever possible and save their regular dollars to sell on the black market. They had ample reason. "Green" dollars, which wealthy Vietnamese coveted for squirreling away outside the country, brought about 200 plasters in Hanoi. (See RICHMOND, Page 10)
