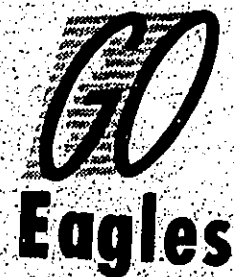

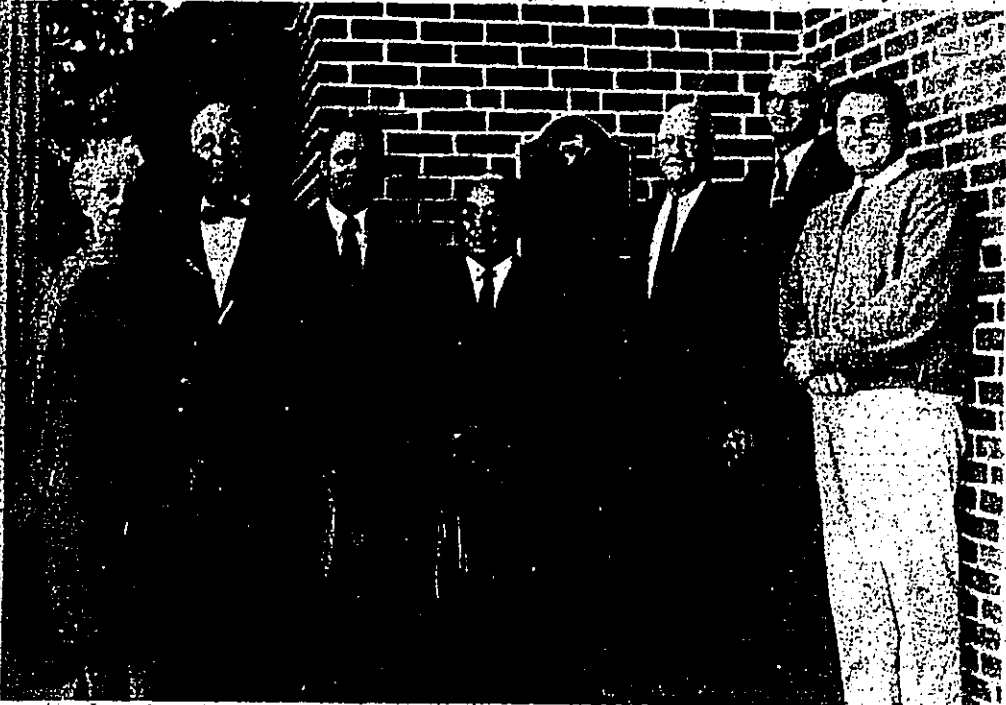

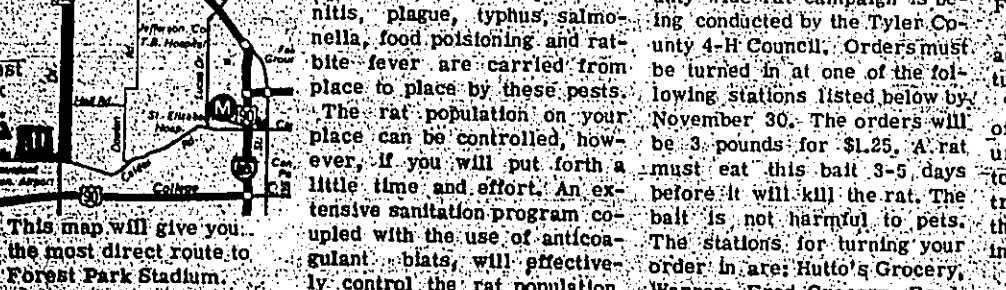

## Rat Eradication Drive Begins

Rats are one of the most destructive and dangerous pests to have around a farm or ranch. They contaminate stored grain and exposed food and feed, they kill poultry and young livestock, and they start fires. Diseases such as leptospirosis, contagious abortion, trichinosis, distemper, streptococcal meningitis, plague, typhus, salmonella, food poisoning and rabies-fever are carried from place to place by these pests. The rat population on your place can be controlled, however, if you will put forth a little time and effort. An extensive sanitation program coupled with the use of anticoagulant baits will effectively control the rat population.

# STATE CAPITOL HIGHLIGHTS & SIDELIGHTS

A dramatic 40 per cent increase in benefits to injured Texas workers is proposed in compromise legislation agreed to by labor, employers and trial lawyers.

AFL-CIO, Texas Manufacturers Association and Texas Trial Lawyers Association unveiled details of agreement on workers' compensation administrative reform bill which will go to the Legislature in January.

Proposal would raise the maximum weekly benefits for the first 104 weeks from \$35 to \$40 but the limit from work. This will cost employers 48 per cent more in insurance costs, or about \$36 million in additional annual premiums.

With the Legislature apparently satisfied with that, state officials would also be brought into the bill, and that all bills must be passed by a majority of three parts of the Legislature.

Propositions for 12 hearing sessions for 12 months. The board would have to make recommendations on the bill.

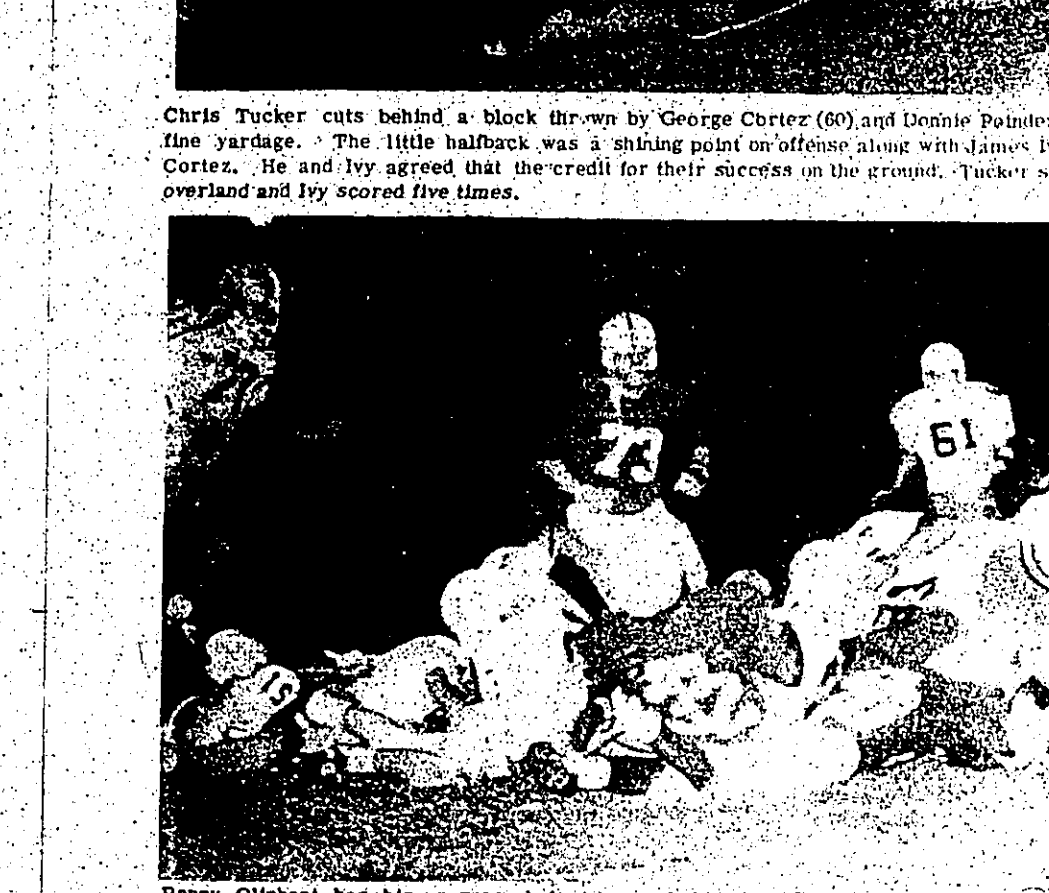
