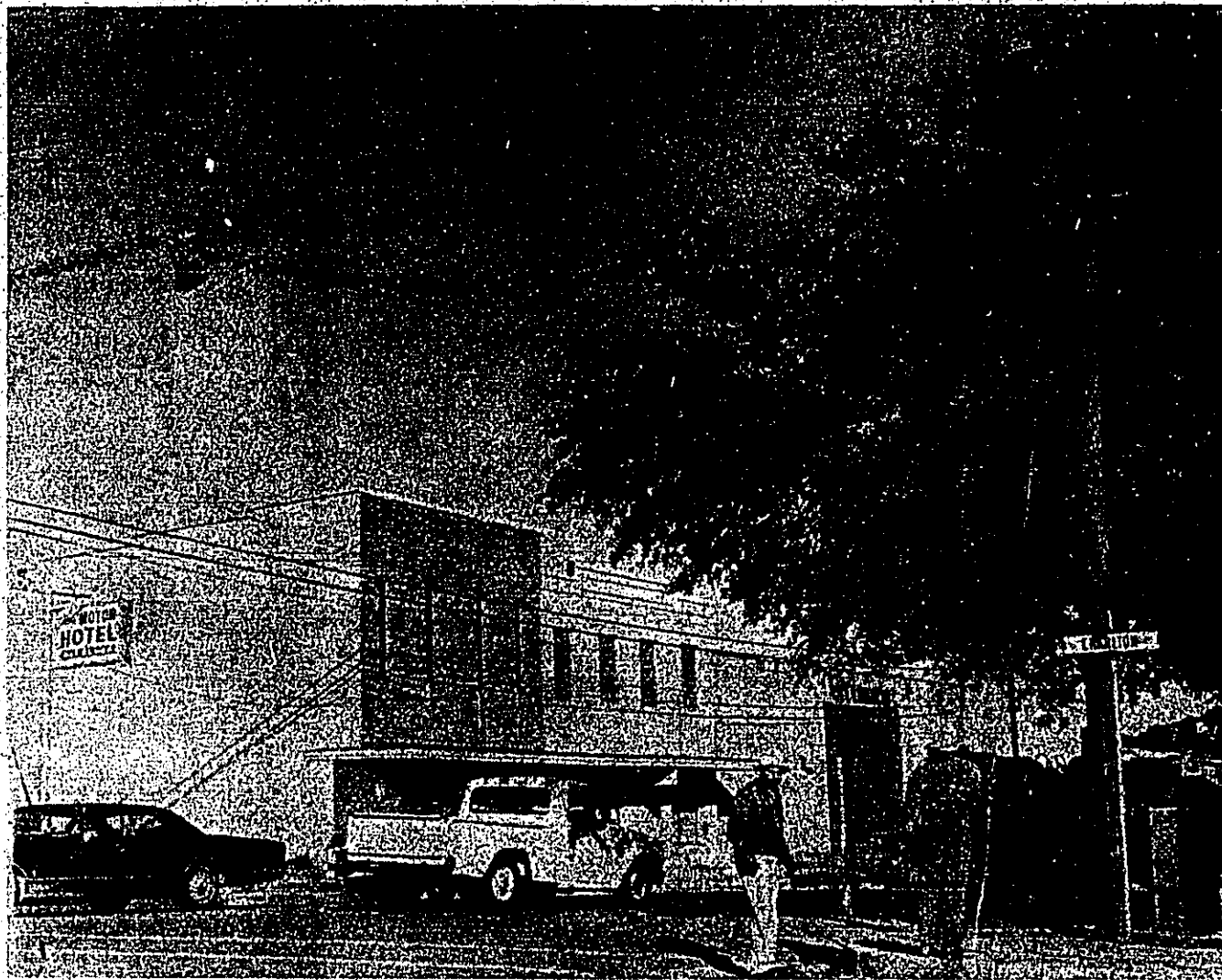

The Chester Yellow Jackets put up a gallant fight against the weather and the Sheridan Broncos Saturday night on a windy, muggy football field at Magnolia but went down to defeat by a 39 to 0 score. It had rained all day at Magnolia and the rain continued for most of the game. The field was a sea of mud on which both teams sloshed back and forth in a cold, brisk wind. The few spectators hovered under umbrellas and clear plastic. The field conditions and the sweeping rain put a damper on the offense of the lighter, aerial minded Yellow Jackets. Sheridan's hard running attack fared better as Sidney Sims, Bruce Pollach and quarterback Allen Pollach made consistent gains—their uniforms slick with mud from the field. Chester tried four passes, completed none and had one intercepted. It just wasn't the night for an aerial game. In fact, neither team made any yardage in the air.

Sheridan scored once in the first quarter, twice in the second and once in each of the final two quarters. Sidney Sims was the big gun for Sheridan as he scored three touchdowns and gained 163 yards in 35 carries. He scored the first one in the initial quarter, ran the extra point over, and Sheridan lead 8 to 0. He scored two in the second period. Bruce Pollach went over for the third period touchdown, and Ike Peterson scored the final touchdown. For Chester Van Hamilton at quarterback, back Robert Martin, end J. T. Hood, Alfred Bryan, Charles Fairchild, Willie Johnson, Randy Hickman and Charlie Jones, among others, stood out on offense and defense.

In spite of the weather and the condition of the field and several bad breaks, the Yellow Jackets were fighting hard in an effort to get back into the game. The game was cleanly played by both sides. Each team received an offside penalty, and Chester got one holding penalty.

Rat Bait Deadline Saturday

Saturday is the final day to turn in orders for rat bait in the Tyler County 4-H Council rat control campaign, according to county agent Clinton Currie. Everyone who plans to order the bait at the special price should contact one of the delivery stations by Saturday to insure receiving the bait. Price of the bait is three pounds for \$1.25. The bait is not harmful to pets, and everyone whose place is infested with rats are urged to use the bait in order to bring the rat population under control. Besides being destructive to food and feed, rats are also known carriers of many diseases. Two Civil Cases Settled; Criminal Cases Monday In 88th District Court

Judge H. A. Coe empaneled the December term grand jury, dismissed 28 old divorce cases and 15 criminal cases dating back to 1962 in which those charged had not been apprehended at the opening of

the December term of 88th District Court here Monday.

The divorce cases had been filed during the past several years and have not been prosecuted by the plaintiffs in

the notices from the district clerk.

One civil case set for trial Monday had been settled and the jury panel for the second was incomplete. Judge Coe dismissed court at noon and requested the sheriff to pick up 12 extra jurors from which to empanel a jury Tuesday morning.

However, when the court convened Tuesday morning, lawyers for the plaintiff told the court that the case had been settled out of court. The 17 holdover jurors and the 12 extra jurors were paid and dismissed.

Next week's session will be the trial of criminal cases (see docket list in last week's Booster). Civil cases will resume December 17.

District court officials Tuesday morning were highly critical of the lawyers representing both the plaintiff and defendant in the civil suit which was settled Monday after recalling the 17 jurors for Tuesday morning and having the extra 12 summoned by the sheriff's department.

After the case was settled Monday, court officials said, the lawyers should have notified the district clerk so that the jurors could have been notified not to report. As it was, the jury panel of 39 persons had to report and the county was out the expense of another day's pay for the panel members. This was needless trouble to the jurors as well as expensive for the county.

Had the lawyers notified the court, it might have been possible to set another case for trial Tuesday morning.

Court officials say that this is a common practice among lawyers by civil suits not only in Tyler County but in other counties as well. Each side in a civil suit often uses the court as a means to reach a settlement and often neither side is anxious to go to trial as a result hundreds of suits clutter the court dockets. Many of the civil actions are a serious effort to reach a settlement but many others are never destined to come to trial by the lawyers involved on one side or the other.

This idle and expensive practice and mouse game between plaintiff and defense lawyers is one reason so many prospective jurors are reluctant to serve on juries, court officials believe. It also causes trial delays, which in civil cases is largely determined by attorneys for plaintiffs or defendants, or both.

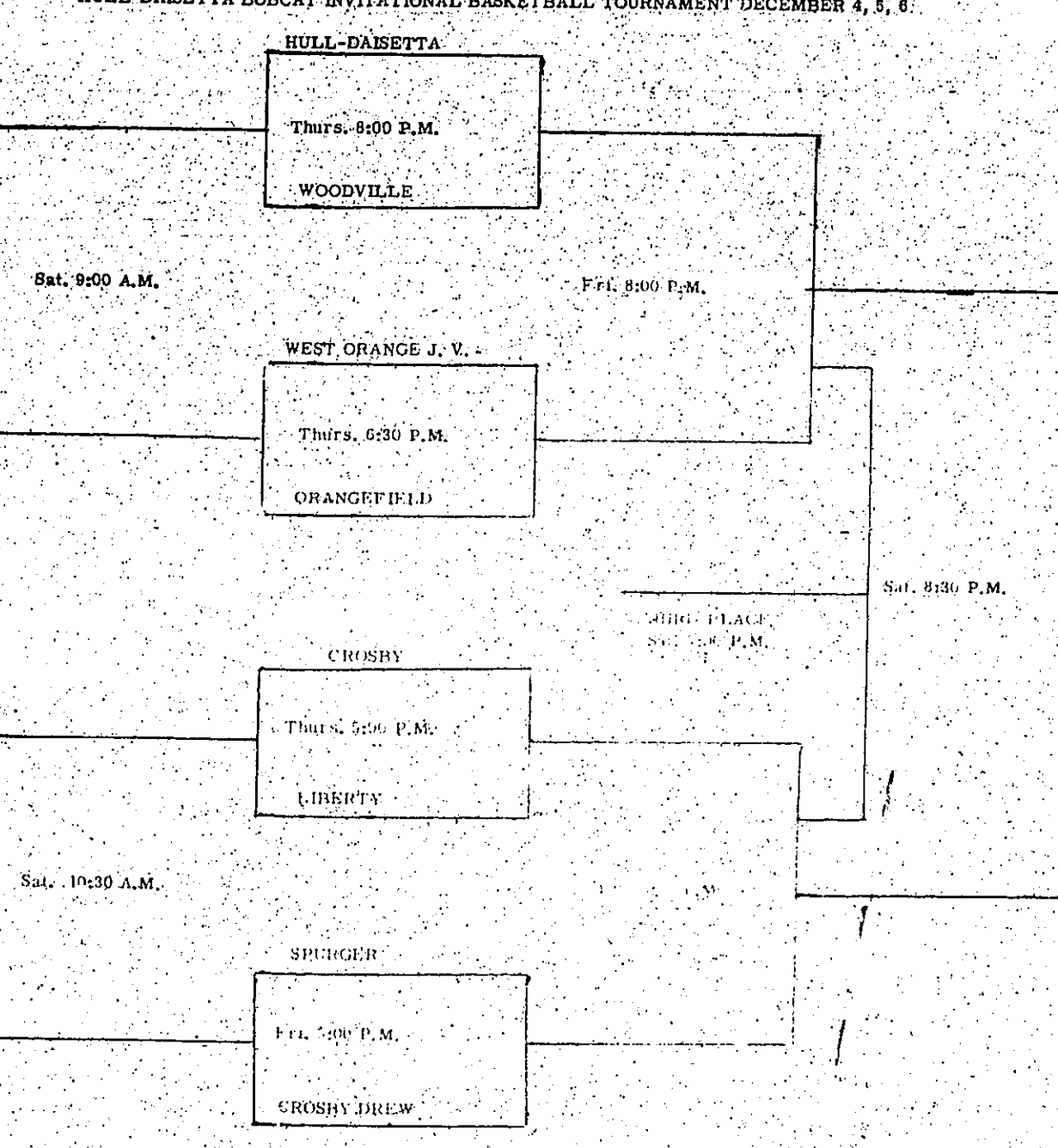
