Official designation, the Texas Historical Building Modulation with Interpretive plate giving a capsule history of the structure will be affixed to the structure.

Dedication of the marker will be announced by Mrs. R. C. Scholten, president of Woodville, chairman of the Tyler County Historical Survey Committee. A certificate signed by Gov. John Connally, Charles Woodburn and Mrs. Scholten will be presented at the dedication.

The inscription on the marker reads: Early law office, built 1884 at Wood and Magnolia, in the heart of city. Office of H. N. Stegler West (1880-1902), first trial judge, first to East Texas. Leaders: U. S. Congressman Hanson, County Gov. Wm. P. Gobby, Railroad and lumber magnate J. H. Kirby.

Moved to this site 1920, Recorded Texas Historic Landmark 1968.

The Texas State Historical Survey Committee also has advised that the Woodville academy and Woodville college marker has been approved and reads as follows: Woodville Academy and Woodville College organized in 1849 in the new county courthouse. (Formerly at this site). The Woodville academy offered advanced courses of study. Some of the subjects were astronomy, orthography (spelling), surveying, and logic. In 1850 the school moved (550' S.E.). It was sold in 1856. That same year the town of Woodville and Woodville college were chartered. The school, in the old masonic lodge (1,200 ft. W.) closed after a few years. Among some 40 higher schools chartered in Texas 1845-1861, these two reflect a statewide surge of interest in education. This marker and the Ende M.H. marker are state matching funds markers, which means just what it says; the state gives a marker of equal value for each one erected by an individual or historical committee.

NOTE: For each additional 24¢ per \$100 in excess of \$100, add 1¢ to the tax. 4% Sales tax schedule is for collection within Woodville city limits only.

The 4% sales tax schedule is reported by request. The city sales tax is collected only on those items in which the state tax is collected, and merchants report it along with their state taxes. At the end of each quarter, the state comptroller sends the city for its 1% of the taxes collected within the city limits.

NEW WELFARE NURSING HOME PROGRAM IN EFFECT JANUARY 1, SMITH SAYS

Rev. Rowat Smith, administrator of Woodville Nursing Center, announces that public welfare recipients receiving nursing home care will be provided care under a new Multiple Levels of Service program which began January 1.

The new program is designed to place the patient in the nursing home that offers the level of specific care program that the individual needs," stated Rev. Smith.

Nursing homes and those welfare recipients requiring nursing home care will be classified into three types: Skilled Care, Intermediate Care III, and Intermediate Care II. Skilled nursing homes will serve patients needing nursing care, but of a lesser degree. Intermediate II homes will serve residents who do not require professional nursing care, but are incapable of independent living.

A welfare recipient classified as Skilled, Intermediate III, or Intermediate II will be provided care in a nursing home of like classification, where possible. However, when not possible, special personnel, volunteers, have been developed to insure that all eligible recipients receive necessary nursing care. Volunteers may be granted for various reasons, some of which include: physician orders that a move would be detrimental to the patient, where beds of like classification of the recipient are not available in the area, and to avoid the separation of family members who may not have the same classification.

In order to better serve the needs of the community, many of our member nursing homes will establish distinct part-classifications. This means that a nursing home might care for two or three type patients with in one facility," Rev. Smith said.

He commented that, "approximately 29,800 welfare recipients will be provided care under the program. The distribution of patients will approximate 8,500 classified as needing Skilled Care, 15,600 needing Intermediate III care, and 7,700 needing Intermediate II Care."

This Joint Federal-State program for recipients requiring Skilled Care will be financed under Title XIX of the Social Security Law passed by Congress in 1965 and Senate Bill #2 passed by the Texas Legislature in May, 1967. The recipients requiring care under the intermediate definition

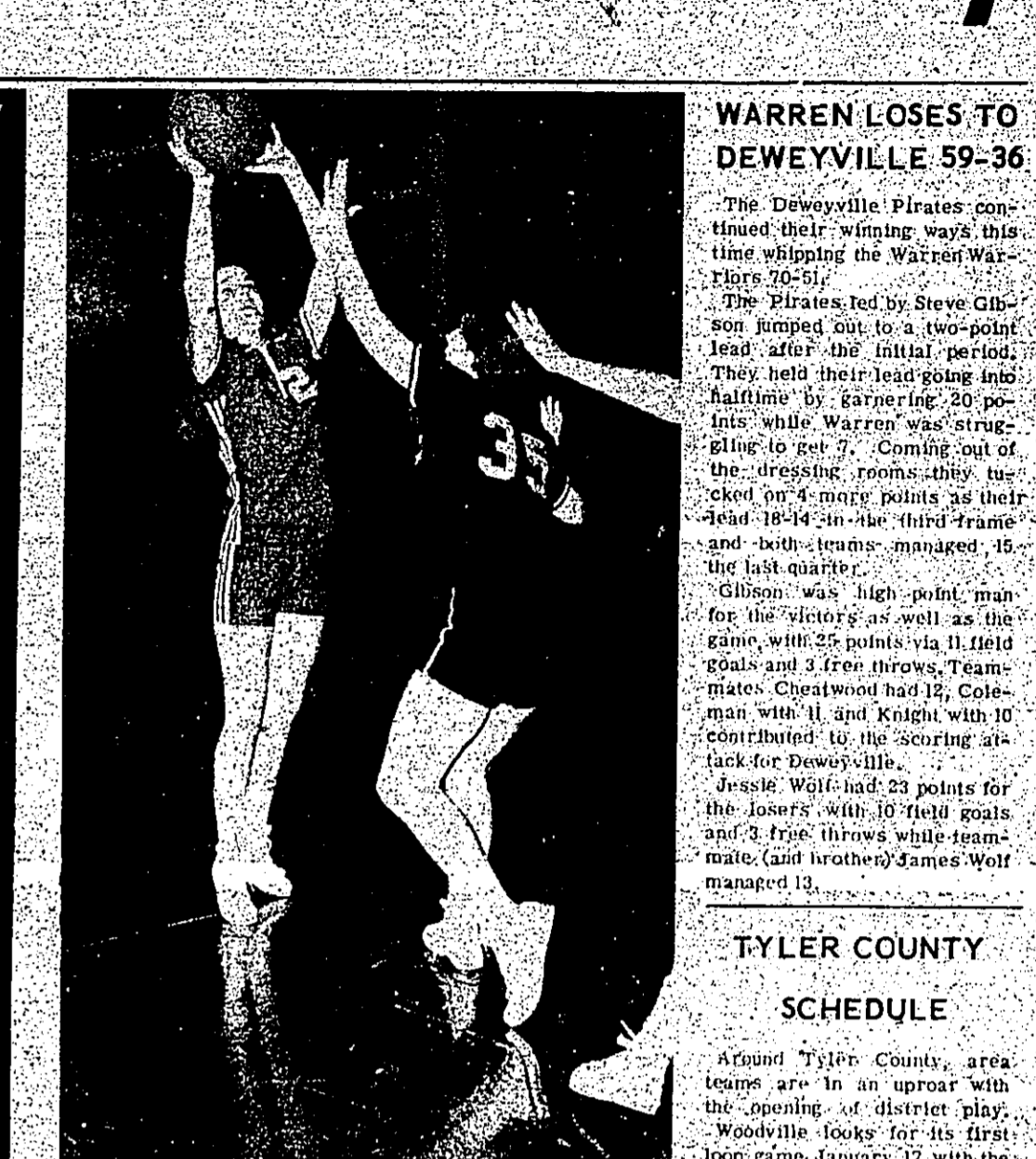
