Pastors and laymen from several Baptist churches in the county met last Monday evening for a prayer retreat.

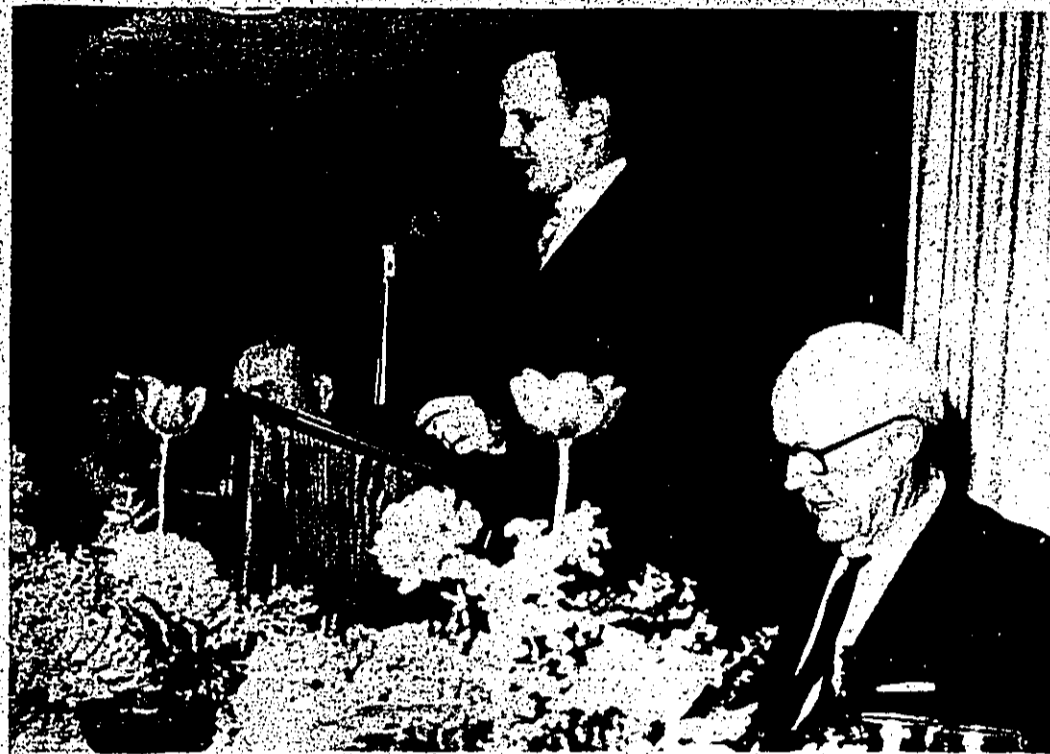
The meeting was for the purpose of planning and praying for participation in the Crusade of the Americas this spring and summer.

Traffic Accidents Claim Heavy Toll In Lives, Property

The year 1968 tabulation of traffic accidents in the 16 county Beaumont district shows that property damage is much higher, although the number of accidents increased only slightly, according to the Department of Public Safety report.

In Tyler County, 176 accidents caused seven deaths, 84 injuries and property damage amounting to \$164,000.

In the 16 counties in the district, there were 4684 wrecks, 159 traffic deaths, 2174 persons injured and property damage totaling \$4,479,825.

This is an increase of three fatalities, 300 wrecks, 230 injuries and \$1,417,137 in property damage.

These figures include only wrecks investigated by the State Highway Patrol. Wrecks in towns and cities which were investigated by local police is not included.

Counties having less accidents in 1968 than Tyler were San Augustine with 49 and two fatalities; Sabine County with 76 and six fatalities; San Jacinto with 117 and one fatality; and Trinity with 138 wrecks and three fatalities.

In comparison, Polk County to the west had 329 accidents, 12 fatalities, 198 injuries and \$276,276 property damage. Jasper county to the east had 265 accidents, four fatalities, 101 injuries and \$158,799 in property damage.

In the 16 county Beaumont district, Chambers county had the most fatalities in 1968 with 25; Jefferson County was close behind with 23 while Liberty County, which led in 1967 with 24, had only 10 fatalities in 1968.

Number of wrecks and fatalities in the other counties in 1968 were Angelina, 367 and 15; Hardin 478 and six; Nacogdoches 270 and 9; Newton 190 and 8; Orange 505 and 11; and Shelby 216 and 11.

Don Utley Named To Committee For UT Center

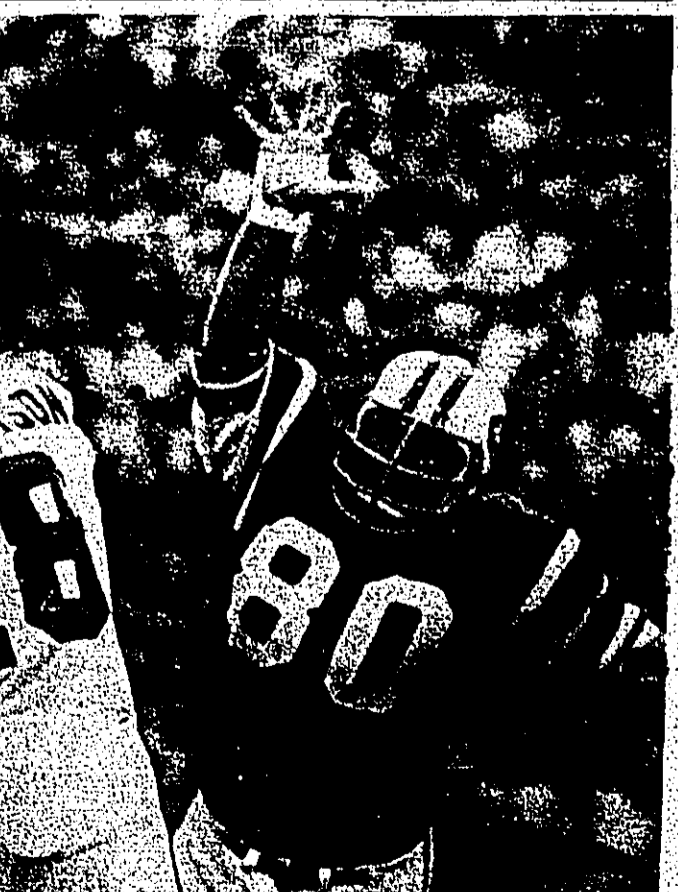

For your hearts' sake and your namesake, too—obey the calendar. It's the best month of the year, but you can make this February the most important month of all the years by taking it from the American Heart Association. Their advice to homemakers is simple: "Preventive measures should be instituted early in life to have the best chance of preventing or retarding coronary heart disease. First, example, correction of established adverse eating and smoking habits, while 'prevention' is still in the future, is the most important practice never to be forgotten. Doctors have set up simple tests to determine whether you are at risk of developing a heart disease, and these tests should be taken seriously, for they hint at what you can do to prevent a heart attack and simple surgery.

In past years it was thought that the best way to reduce the risk of heart disease was to eat a diet low in fat and cholesterol. But the new research shows that the key is to eat a diet low in saturated fats and high in unsaturated fats, and to eat plenty of fruits and vegetables. So, eat plenty of fruits and vegetables, especially those that are high in potassium, such as bananas, apricots, and avocados. Also, eat plenty of fish, especially those that are high in omega-3 fatty acids, such as salmon, mackerel, and tuna. And, of course, eat plenty of whole grains, such as oatmeal, brown rice, and whole wheat bread. And, of course, exercise regularly. A 30-minute walk every day can help to reduce your risk of heart disease. And, of course, don't smoke. Smoking is the leading cause of heart disease, and it can increase your risk of heart disease by as much as 50%.

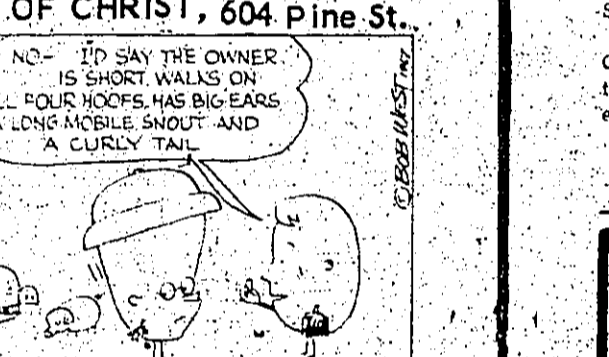
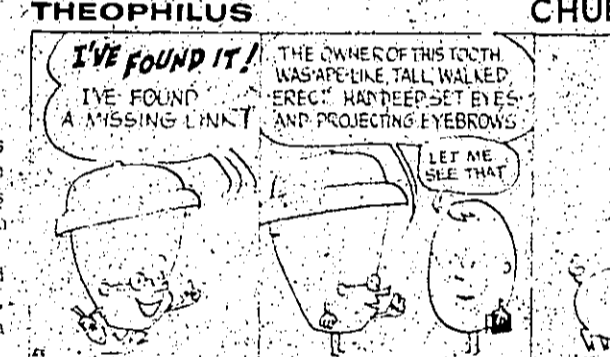
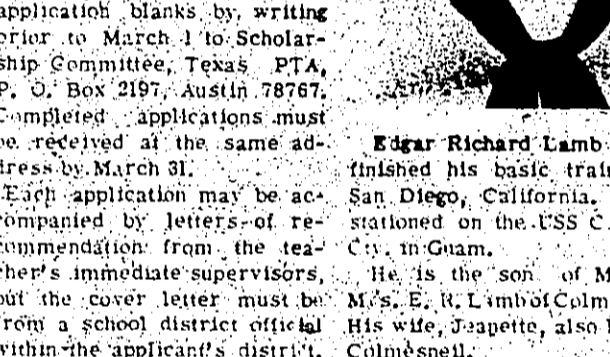
