## Tree Seedlings Available From Forest Service

Forest and windbreak tree seedlings are available at the Texas Forest Service tree nursery near Alto. Tree planters who need additional seedlings and those who have put off ordering their trees still have time to get their orders in before the tree planting season ends.

Regular slash and seed production area loblolly pines, suitable for reforestation and windbreak plantings, are in good supply. Seedlings recommended for windbreak plantings include black walnut, stratified seed Chinese elm, cottonwood (cuttings and seedlings), oriental arborvitae, and sweetgum.

The slash pines sell for \$5 per thousand, plus sales tax, and the seed production area loblolly pines sell for \$7. Both species are shipped F. O. B. the nursery at Alto.

## Small Park Plan Endorsed

The Long Leaf Soil and Water Conservation District adopted a resolution favoring the establishment of a Big Thicket National Park of Monument of not more than 35,500 acres on January 28. The resolution was signed by W. A. Mahan, chairman and M. A. Fain, secretary.

The resolution reads: WHEREAS, The National Park Service recommended in May, 1967 the establishment of a Big Thicket National Monument in Southeast Texas; and

WHEREAS, the string of parks

containing 35,500 acres as proposed by the Park Service would preserve the unique ecology and historically interesting characteristics of the area; and

WHEREAS, the dispersal concept would have the further advantage of distributing the economic benefits from tourism to all sections of the area involved; and

WHEREAS, the economic progress of Texas is, to a large extent, dependent upon our renewable forest resources and the industries supported by these resources; and

WHEREAS, the forest products industry has since the earliest days of this country supplied the materials to help build our homes, our schools, our churches, towns and cities;

Now, therefore, Be It Resolved, that the Long Leaf Soil and Water Conservation District endorses the establishment of a Big Thicket National Park of Monument of not more than 35,500 acres as proposed by the National Park Service in May, 1967.

If college is planned, the award may be used for that, and if college is not a reality of possibility, it may be used to attend business college, nursing school, technical training, trade school or apprenticeship.
