Washington (Not Geo. But D.C.) Slept Here

There are two ways to kill a City, County, or Community in a way that no one can be blamed, where the fault is always with the "other" side, and after the funeral, all concerned can go off shaking their little heads and say, "It is a shame that all this happened because I did all I could." And frankly, they are all in the right because they did all they could to kill it.

The two methods mentioned above are: first, split the area desired to be killed right down the middle. Now it is important to split it evenly so that neither side will have enough power to come back and re-unite it, and this takes a lot of fact and study because you have to sell yourself on the idea that you are absolutely in the right, and although there is "money" involved, what you are doing is positively right because you are an "authority" on what is right for ALL the people. Now when this first method is induced you have two powerful sides, money, political power, prestige, squared off against each other. This is great because the only people left is the "sincere, hardworking, honest, group that really want their area to grow and be progressive so their children can find employment here and stay to help the area grow, pay their taxes willingly, do the best they possibly can on their debts, go to church, love their neighbors, and although not getting ahead very fast financially, happy that they are adding to a growing progressive community. These are the folks that the "power-groups" who are split, must ignore and try to confuse. The second method of "killing" will automatically come under the first method, "Starve the community to death." Not for the lack of food, but take away the desire to try to do anything constructive.

We at the Booster felt compelled at first to remain silent with regards to who owned, what has happened, and what will happen to the big motel. Now that the big city papers seem to get a big kick out of printing as much adverse publicity as they do

constructive publicity for Tyler County, we thought we might add a few thoughts to this "Motel controversy".

In the first place there isn't a financial institution in the world that would have laid out in "hard money" the amount our Government put into the Motel here in Woodville, and let it go on and on without keeping a daily account of it, or if they saw it slipping, putting someone in it or taking steps to see that it was kept in a condition to properly serve the area in the manner for which it was constructed. However this is all water under the bridge and very typical of a lot of Government projects. But in the meantime, Tyler County and Woodville, putting a lot of future hopes in the fact that we were beginning to get things here that might attract industry, went pretty happily along because Dogwood Festival visitors, tourists and others talked about what a nice Motel we had and how it was such an attraction, and Ole Woodville was on the go.

So here we are again, newspaper publicity, radio and TV, a District Judge, then a Federal Judge, trying to figure it all out, and right here at the time we are getting ready to prepare for the biggest Dogwood Western Day, and Dogwood Festival crowd we have ever had, setting our sights on a great increase in tourist traffic, trying every angle possible to lure added revenue to a slowing economy because tourism on all sides are luring our customers away, "strapping the bottom of the barrel" to put out an 8 and 10 page paper that should have enough advertising for at least a 12 to 14 page weekly, and on we go, wondering if anyone... cares.

So, here we are, visiting singers making reservations "elsewhere" for next winter's session, and in one seems to care... not even the Government, and it looks like the ranches will continue to run rampant, the paint continues to peel and the sincere folks in the middle continue to shake their heads and wonder what it is all about. So do we.

Little Red School House Group Formed

A statewide committee to represent rural landowners and those who enjoy living in the country during the expected struggle over school district consolidation in the current session of the Texas Legislature was announced here Wednesday.

The group, known as "The Little Red School House Committee", is composed of a cross-section of farmers, ranchers and rural landowners

from throughout the state. Charles Schreiner III, a prominent rancher from Mountain Home, is chairman of the committee.

"We believe the forced consolidation of small school districts, as proposed in the report of the Governor's Committee on Public School Education, will go a long way toward destroying rural life as it is now enjoyed in Texas," Schreiner de-

clared in a news conference at noon Wednesday.

Schreiner pointed out that the Governor's Committee recommends the forced consolidation of Texas' 1,218 school districts into a total of 353.

"This would virtually wipe out 865 community centers, since most rural schools are the primary symbols of community identification," Schreiner said. He refuted the claim that big-

ger school districts would automatically provide better education for students. "Merely 'bigness' is not an absolute guarantee of excellence," he said.

"The Little Red School House Committee has been formed to awaken rural landowners and residents of small communities to the unseen dangers of forced consolidation and to acquaint legislators in Austin with the feelings of the rural people of Texas," Schreiner said.

Commissioners Accept Bids

Tyler County commissioners court at its regular meeting Monday accepted bids for two dump trucks, fuel and oil for the county, and the depositary for county funds for the next two years.

Low bidder on the two dump

Trucks was Ogden Chevrolet Company of Colmesneil. The trucks are for precincts one and four.

Gulf Oil Corporation was low bidder on the county's fuel and oil supplies for the year.

Citizens State Bank of Woodville was accepted as the depository for county funds. The bank offered interest of 4.6 percent per annum on certificates of deposit which are for six months or more.

The commissioners also authorized the sheriff's department to fly a man to Los Angeles to return a prisoner, Timothy Wayne Reeves, who faces burglary charges here. Reeves escaped from the county jail some time ago while absent without leave from the armed forces and will be released from custody there February 15.

Current bills as approved by the county auditor were approved for payment.

Colmesneil School Board Orders Trustee Election

The Colmesneil School Board in regular meeting February 3, 1969 orders trustee election to be held on Saturday, April 5, 1969 for the purpose of electing three trustees for the Colmesneil Independent School District. Members of the board whose terms expire are Floyd L. Owens, Jack Ogden, and Ross Gardner.

T. E. Sturrock was appointed judge to hold the election and E. C. Harden was appointed assistant judge in charge of absentee voting. Mrs. Faye Seamans and Mrs. J. A. Owens were appointed clerks to help hold the election. Mrs. Faye Ratcliff was appointed alternate clerk in case one of the others could not serve.

Anyone wishing to file may receive the forms for filing from the office of the superintendent in Colmesneil, and must file with the County Judge on or before March 5, 1969.

"It's Dogwood Time in Tyler County!"

Eight weeks from Saturday night this traditional announcement from the stage of Dogwood Amphitheater will herald the start of the 26th Tyler County Dogwood Festival and its colorful coronation ceremonies and historical pageant.

It is now Dogwood Festival preparation time with all committees for this annual affair activated and talk of these activities is heard everywhere.

The Dogwood Festival with its parade, coronation of the queen, and the balls which follow is a county-wide civic project which has been carried on through all these years by residents of Tyler County. It attracts thousands to the county and is recognized far and wide as a fine example of community spirit and cooperation.

The Flower Making Committee, which consists of everyone in the county who will work, is busy with plans for decorating the amphitheater where the coronation and pageant will be presented on the night of April 5. The workshop is in the recreation building on the school campus at 610 Reid Street. It is open from 9:00 a.m. until noon and from 1:00 to 5:00 p.m. each weekday. Main work here to help make the thousands of artificial flowers for the festival, and others can pick up materials here to work on at home or on the job. Cookies and coffee are served to those who work in the building.

Many persons prefer to take the materials home and invite neighbors and friends to help make the flowers. The process of making the flowers is simple and easy to learn with practice. Last year at least one-half of the flowers were made by women in Spurger, Colmesneil, Warren, Doucette, Fred and in the rural areas. Members of clubs such as the Garden Club and Home Demonstration Club and the Recreation Club worked in groups and individually.

Tom McGintee, chairman of the committee, would like for every woman in the county to feel especially invited to participate in the project.

The first flowers made each year are the dogwood blossoms. Under the supervision of Mrs. Sue Brackman for 40,000 dogwood blossoms have been cut and are ready at the workshop for distribution to workers in the county. It takes from 1,000 to 1,500 dogwoods to decorate a tree.

Other types of flowers such as azaleas of different shades, yellow jasmine, magnolias, tulips, sunflowers, will be made to add a variety of color to the amphitheater on April 5.

The flower-making projects requires many willing workers throughout the next several weeks. Those who will assist may come to the recreation building at 610 Reid Street. The telephone number there is 283-8865.

PTA Will Hear Report On School Legislation

The Woodville Parent-Teachers Association will meet Monday, February 17, at 7:30 p.m. in the Kirby Auditorium, according to Mrs. S. J. Roberts, president.

At this meeting Dr. Gayle Burton, Jim Parks and Gerald Maynard will discuss the proposals of the Governor's Com-

mittee for the re-organization of the schools of Texas. The discussion will deal with the recommendations in general for the improvement of public school education, and in particular with the consolidation and financial implications of the program.

The report of the Governor's Committee recommends that all of the schools of Tyler County be combined into one county-wide district. The report also provides for the abolition of the economic hubs as a means of a district's financial ability to participate in the Minimum Foundation Program and the substitution of Full Market Value of property within the district to determine the district's share of state program.

At this meeting, the benefits that would accrue to the enlarged district will be measured against the increased fiscal responsibilities of local property owners.

The Incredible Machine To Give Lions Program

Members of the Woodville Lions Club will see rare computer-produced movies, and laser-produced photographs when James B. Sage presents his program, "The Incredible Machine," at the group's meeting tonight (Thursday) at 6:30 p.m. at the Lions Den.

Sage is science demonstrator for Southwestern Bell Telephone Company.

The program will feature the latest developments in computer science, and how they have been adapted for possible use in the field of communications. The world's largest computer—the telephone switching network—will be discussed by Sage. He also will give the Lions a look at possible future services provided by Bell System, such as three-dimensional Picturesphones and 3-D television.

During the show, Sage will use his telephone and computer to transfer calls, turn off lights, and turn on air conditioners. His entertaining "incredible machine" will talk, sing, play music, and recite passages from "Hamlet" during the 30-minute program.

Sage also will explain laser-produced photographs or "holograms." The three-dimensional pictures are currently being studied by Bell Telephone Laboratories scientists, as possible storage areas for computer information.

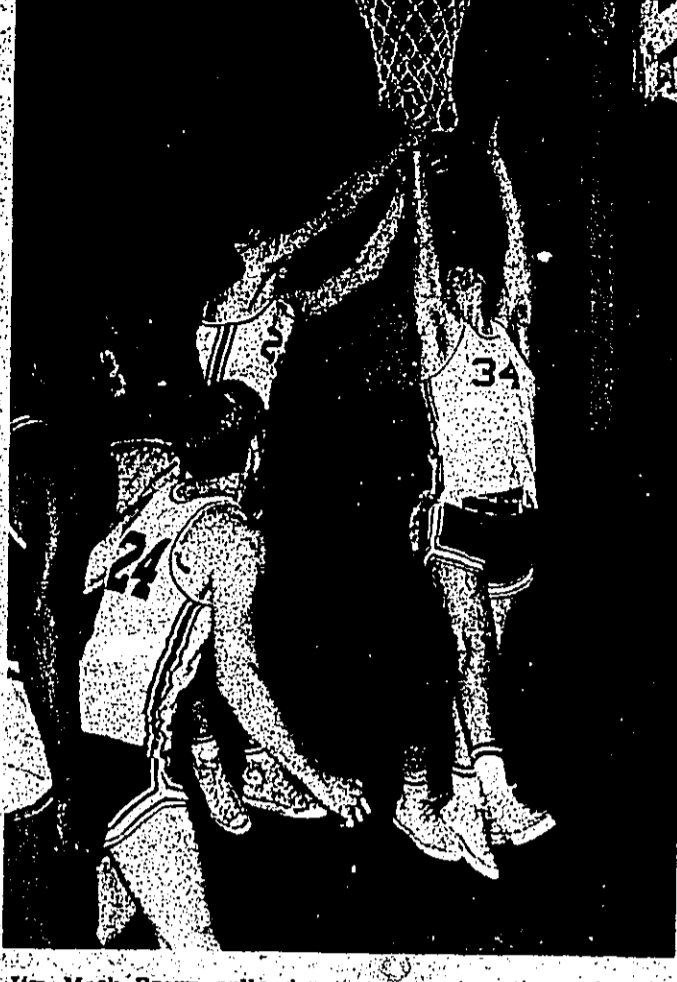

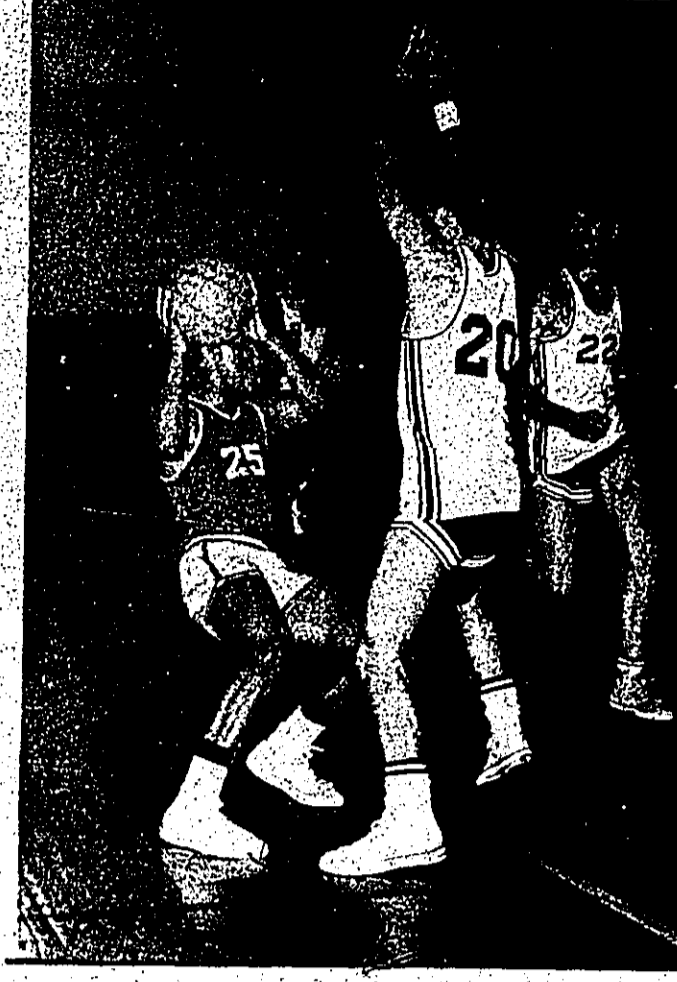

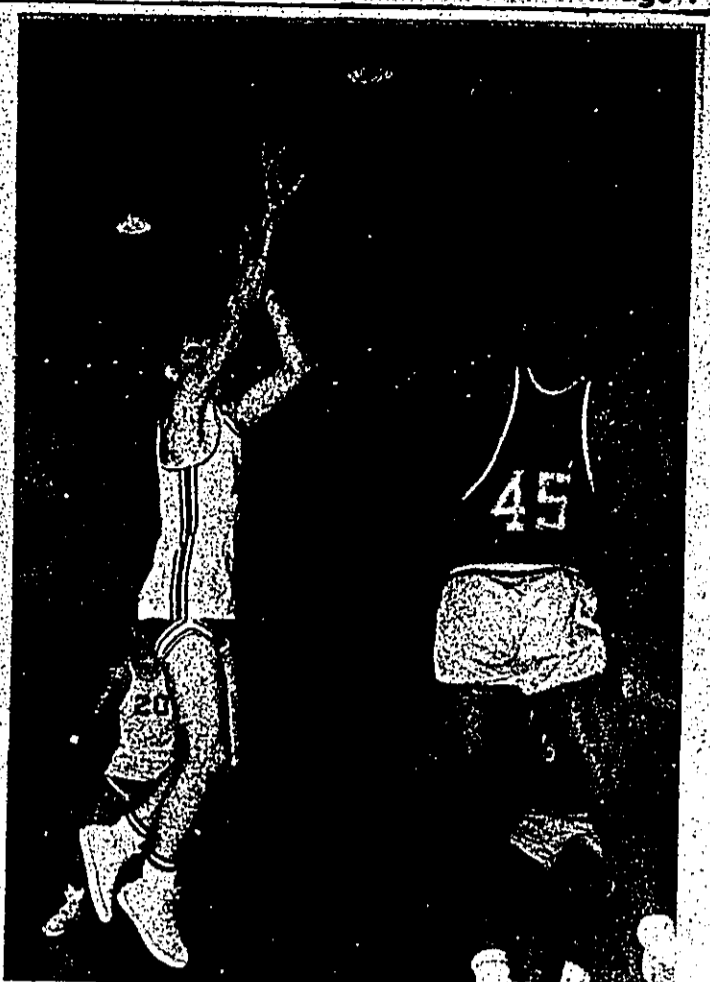

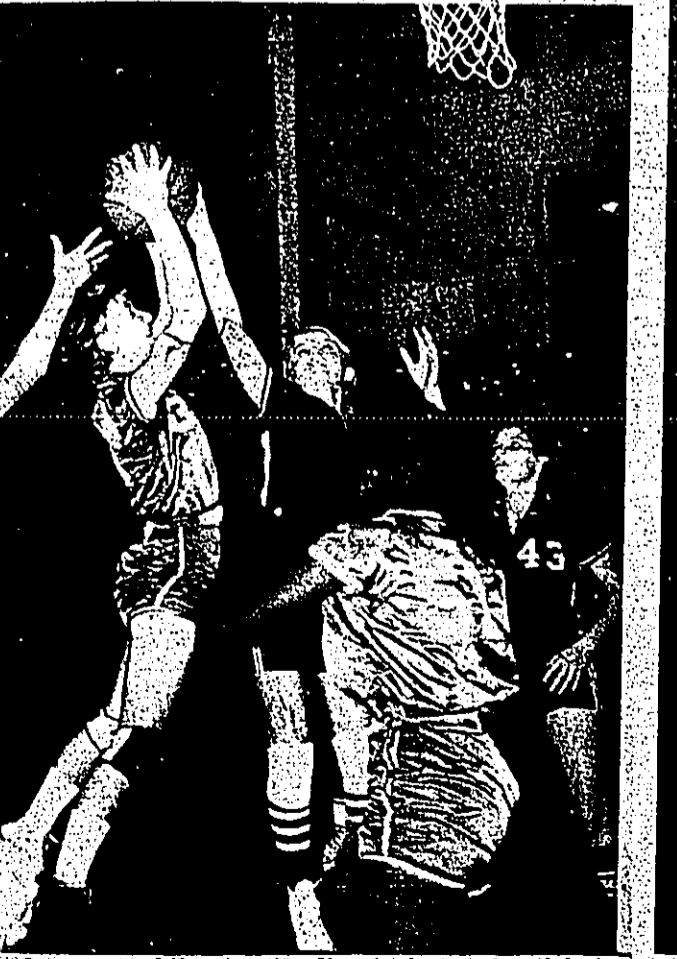

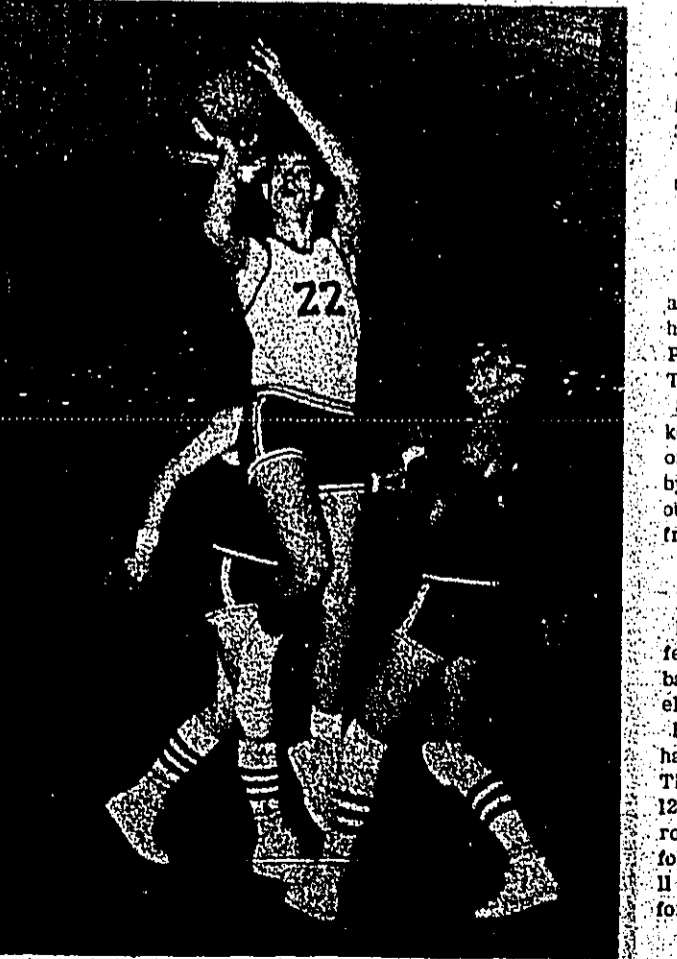

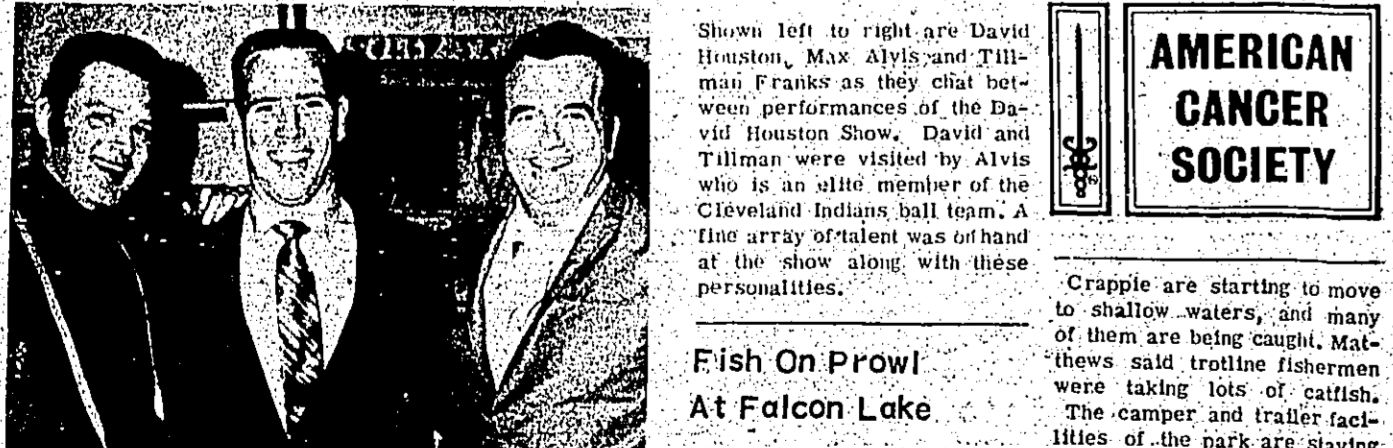
