Dillion Makes Statement On Motel

James H. Dillion, Woodville attorney and president of Tyler Investments Inc., Tuesday issued the following statement in answer to last week's editorial in the Tyler County Booster regarding the controversy over the Dogwood Motor Hotel. Addressed to customers of the motel and local residents, it reads:

Memo To The Customers Of The Dogwood Motor Hotel And Residents Of Tyler County:

Since there has been much publicity over the Dogwood Motor Hotel, it is my opinion that we should make a statement to help clarify the present operation and management of the hotel.

First, we have no control over the present operation of the Dogwood Motor Hotel, nor its management.

We do however own the mortgages on the property which were formerly held by the Federal Government. In the Fall of 1968, the Notes held by the Federal Government were purchased by Tyler Investment Incorporated. The Federal Government held these Notes at that time. An original Note, in the amount of \$420,000.00, a second Note in the amount of \$35,000.00, and these two Notes were covered by a second Mortgage on the Motel with supporting papers. There was also another Note in the amount of \$219,970.00, and this Note was secured by a first lien and Mortgage on the Motel. This \$219,970.00 Note was first held by the Fidelity Savings and Loan Association of Port Arthur, Texas, and was purchased by the Federal Government on October 22, 1964. All three of these Notes mentioned above, were sold to Tyler Investment Incorporated.

This Corporation is primarily owned by Fred A. Rhodes, Jr. and Avron Eisenberg both of Houston, and James H. Dillion of Woodville, Texas. It is my understanding that the Woodville Community Inn of America, Incorporated never paid a penny on either the principal or interest of these two original Notes, which were held by the Federal Government. There were, as I am told, some small payments made on the Note held by the Fidelity Savings and Loan at Port Arthur, however, these payments were made before the Note was sold to the United States Government.

After the Deeds of Trust, Notes, and Mortgages were assigned by the Federal Government to Tyler Investment Incorporated, the Tyler Investment Corporation attempted to foreclose and secure the property, but were enjoined from doing so first by a Temporary Restraining Order, in the State Court, and this action took place the first part of January. In the first part of February there was a new lawsuit filed in the Federal Court, and Judge Fisher has now enjoined Tyler Investment, Inc. from taking the property at this time, as many people have read in the Beaumont and Houston papers.

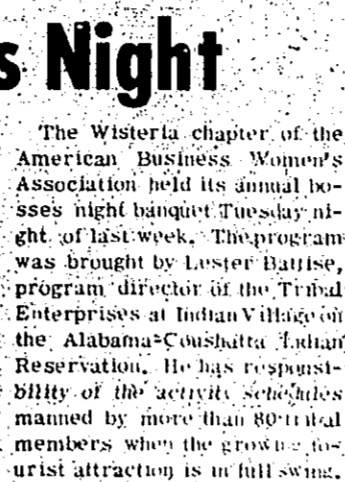
Let me assure you if we had gotten possession of the Dogwood Motel the first part of January, we would by this time, had the place completely repainted inside and out, exterminated, repairs made, new bed spreads, shower curtains, carpeting, etc., so as to put the Motel in a first class condition. Since we have no control as to the operation of the Motel at this time, being only the holder of the Mortgages and Notes, we have absolutely nothing to say about the present operation.

I again want to emphasize that we do not have control of the operation of the Hotel. It is not being operated by Jim Dillion, nor Tyler Investment Incorporated, but I understand it is being operated by the Woodville Community Inn of America Corporation, and the Directors of that organization. I personally can assure you that we are not in a power struggle or power play with anyone, or any organization. We bought these Notes held by the United States Government as a business investment, with the intention of cleaning up the Motel, advertising it extensively, with plans to change the name to THE WOODVILLE INN, to promote the city of Woodville and Tyler County. However, we certainly had in mind of being able to make a fair return on our investment, but knowing nothing about the books and operation, our investment is a calculated risk.

I would like to further state that I want to be a good citizen of Tyler County. If I had not had this desire, and did not want to live in this beautiful County, which God gave us, I would never have moved my family here to begin with.

Tyler County Hospital Open House Slated

An open house will be held at Tyler County Hospital Sunday from 2 to 5 p.m. to allow the public to inspect the expanded facilities and improvements which have recently been completed, according to Jerry Stephenson, administrator.

The new construction increases the bed capacity to 49, a physical therapy room, two nurses stations, new admitting office, new medical record department, an examining room, storage and laundry room. The existing building also was remodeled and repainted. The expansion of the hospital facilities to the board of managers endeavors to serve the people of

Tyler County by providing them with a more fully equipped and modern medical facility, Stephenson pointed out.

The hospital was built in 1950 and was originally named Tyler County Memorial Hospital in memory of the men and women of the county who served in the armed forces during World War II. The first patients were admitted in July 1950 with the administrative duties assumed by the Baptist churches of Tyler County who supported it until 1955. In 1955 the commissioners court took over the administrative responsibilities and appointed a board of trustees to act as the governing board.

At the time the name of the hospital was changed to Tyler County Hospital.

In 1964 the people of Tyler County voted a hospital district. The name of the governing board was changed to board of managers of the Tyler County Hospital District.

Serving on the board of managers at the present time are Cecil Smith, president; Morris C. Clemmons, Jr., secretary; M. S. Olna Oden, R. C. Fairchild, Roy Peterson, L. B. Hicks, and County Judge Jeff R. Money, ex-officio member.

Others who have served in the past are A. King and J. E. Wheat, both deceased, and S. H. Reid, Jr., who now lives in Nagogoches. On February 17, 1955, the board of trustees elected Cecil Smith permanent president of the board and he still holds that position.

The original structure was a 23 bed hospital with six bassinets in the nursery, an emergency room, operating room, laboratory and x-ray room. In 1964 the hospital was renovated and two new wings added to house a new operating room, central supply, emergency room, laboratory, x-ray and a new kitchen and dining area. The bed capacity was increased to 32 at that time.

Seven persons have served as administrators in addition to Mr. Stephenson, who came here in June 1968 from Memorial Hospital in Lufkin where he was business manager for four years. They include Mrs. Rice, 1950; Mrs. Ina Neal, 1950-1955; Mrs. Irma Forse, 1955; Miss Edith Hatton, R. N., 1955-56; M. S. Cecil P. Kent, 1956-1961; Eldon A. Easley, 1961-1964; and William Kirk Krautter, Jr., (deceased), 1964-1968.

Present medical staff of the hospital is: John Q. Gilchrist, J. D., president; R. F. Swearingen, M. D., vice president; Curtis Garner, M. D., secretary-treasurer; L. Gayle Burton, M. D., J. M. Radford, D.D.S., and James S. Jimette, D.D.S.

The consulting staff includes: Gordon W. Johns, M. D., radiologist; Howard R. Wilcox, M. D., pathologist; Beaumont and Thomas A. Lombardo, cardiologist; Beaumont Courtes staff members are: George L. Campbell, M. D., Williams, C. F. Fugate, M.D., Bernard D. Koshkin, M. D., Joseph R. Fame, M.D., Robert S. Orricks, M. D., Gerald Johnson, M. D., Albert Walden Harrison, M. D., all of Beaumont; Michael Henderson, M. D., Port Arthur; R. B. Barelas, D.D.S., and Milton Davis, D.D.S., both of Woodville.

Furnishings for some of the new rooms have been donated. Donors include W. C. Carlisle in memory of his son, W. C. Carlisle, Jr.; Mr. and Mrs. H. E. Dishman and Dr. and Mrs. J. M. Radford; Mrs. Zora A. Johnson and children, Mrs. Marie King and Paul E. Walker in memory of L. Howard Johnson; Mrs. and Mrs. Cecil Oden; Mrs. Reedith Krautter and son Kenneth in memory of W. K. Krautter, Jr.; Mrs. Tussie Tubb in memory of E. W. Tubby Tyler County Hospital Auxiliary in memory of W. K. Krautter, Jr.; Tyler County Hospital Medical Staff consisting of Dr. R. E. Swearingen, Dr. John Gilchrist, Dr. Curtis Garner and Dr. Gayle Burton; in memory of W. K. Krautter, Jr. and the Tyler County March of Dimes donated the furnishings for the physical therapy room. Dr. and Mrs. Herbert O. Muecke of Huntsville gave a \$25 donation to be used to plant shrubs around the new building.

Woman's Page

Homemaking Hints

Mid and late February is the season of availing plant life in north and east Texas. Spring flowering trees and shrubs are coming into colorful bloom and spring bulbs Harold the soon to arrive spring.

February is the time to study seed and plant catalogs, visit nurseries and gardens and make plans for spring gardening, and to tend immediate and timely gardening chores.

1. Continue to select and plant ornamental trees and shrubs. Be sure each plant choice satisfies a definite landscape need. Remember that simplicity is the key to good landscape planting.
2. Post-Planting Care. Newly planted plants, because they are not well established, demand careful care and attention immediately following planting.
3. Water well after planting and do not allow the plant to dry out.
4. Prune back newly planted deciduous trees and shrubs to supplement for the loss or to correct a defective growth habit.
5. Select disease and insect free corals. The #1 size bulb is the best.
6. Prepare planting areas for floods well in advance of planting. If possible do not grow gladioli in one of the same area over three or four years to prevent spread of soil disease.
7. Prepare the corns at a depth of approximately 4 to 5 inches deep.
8. Prepare to stake plants.
9. Water planting area during dry periods.

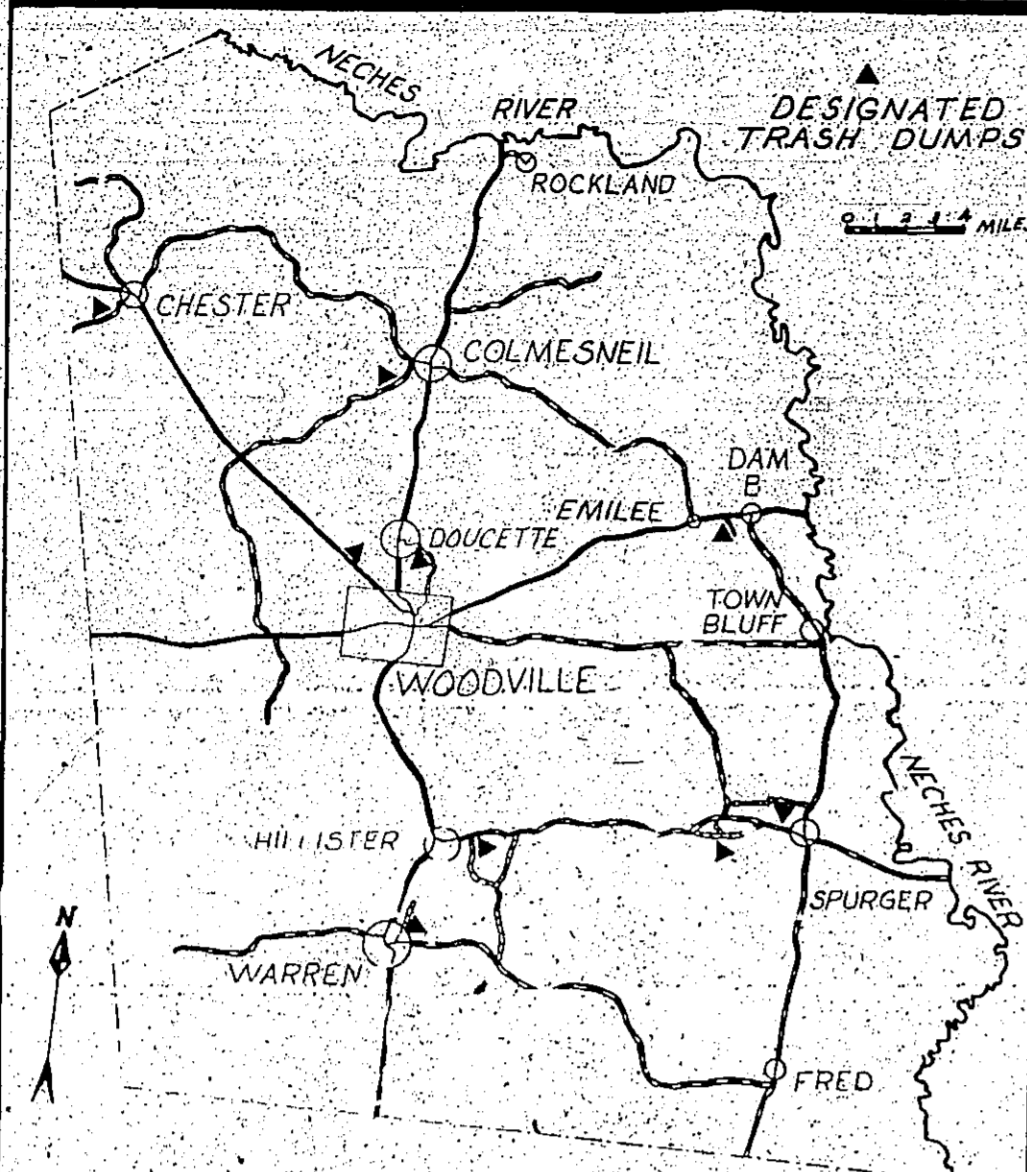

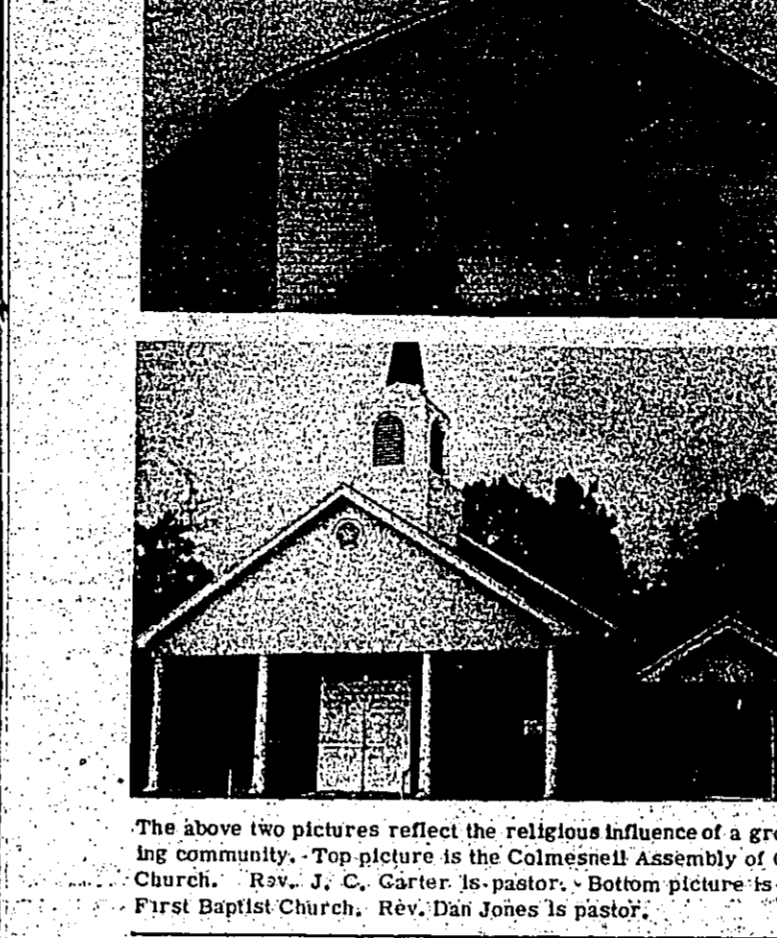

Community Center Serves Need For Public Meetings
Throughout the decade prior to the '60's the leading citizen of Colmesneil could often be seen in little groups discussing the need and possibility of a community center for the town. The churches, which were the only available buildings at that time, were inadequate for the demands. In time a group of enthusiastic citizens serving as officers during those years and plans were drawn for our own community center.

The setting on a little knoll under the pines near the business section of the town was the ideal site. It was leased to Herbert Sutton and Cecil Ogden owned this lot. With no time lost, a deed was made by which they gave the lot and a liberal donation to get the project under way. Other donations came and funds were raised through dinners, musical programs, talent shows, etc. until necessary funds were in. New community interest, which centered around the building, was evident. During the first three years after completion, '60 through '63, annual community improvement programs were launched, sponsored by the Electric Utility Company and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Among those serving as officers during this period were Iva Shurrock, Alvin Crews, Mattie Fortenberry, Jesse Riley and Douglas Vandenburg. 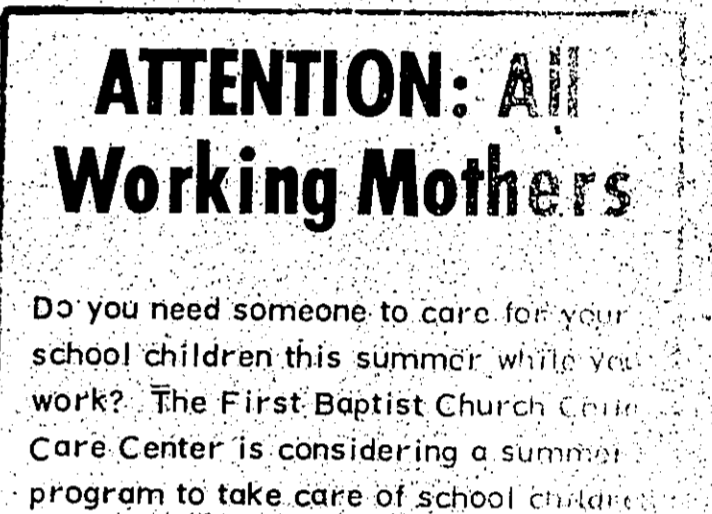

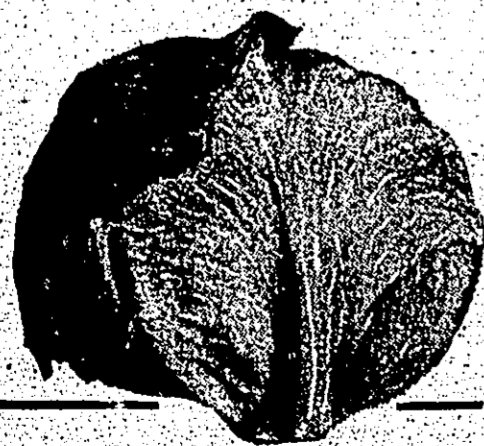
