## Grand Jury Returns Six Indictments; Two Sentenced To Prison

The regular Fourth Monday session of 88th District Court in which non-contested suits and non-jury trials are heard was held Monday with Judge H. A. Coe presiding.

Hilda Coats, district clerk, reported that three divorces were granted, two pleas of guilty to criminal charges accepted, and six indictments were returned to the court by the grand jury.

Carson Gilder, charged with burglary, was sentenced to five years in prison on a guilty plea.

Charles David Huggins, charged with murder of an elderly Negro woman during a burglary of her residence and for assault to murder in another burglary, was given two concurrent sentences of 50 years in prison.

Gilder and Huggins were transported to Huntsville Tuesday by Deputy Sheriff B. J. Varde-man and Liquor Control Agent Woodrow Russell.

The grand jury indictments were three for DWI, two for warrants for prison, and one for removing mortgaged property from the county.

## Senate Resolution Honors J. E. Wheat

The Texas Senate on February 17 passed a resolution in memory of the late James E. Wheat commemorating his many years of civic activities and service to the state. The senate resolution, introduced by Senator Charles Wilson, reads as follows:

WHEREAS, The interesting and distinguished career of the Honorable James E. Wheat, pioneer attorney and former chairman of the State Democratic Executive Committee, came to a close on October 10, 1968, with his death at the age of 82;

WHEREAS, He was born on January 6, 1887, in Chester, and attended Sam Houston Normal and The University of Texas Law School; he was graduated from the University with an LL.B. degree in 1914; an enterprising young man, Mr. Wheat financed his education by teaching school in Polk County, at Indian Creek near Mineral Wells, and he also acted as superintendent of schools at Johnson City; his other jobs included work as a salesman of books and stereoscopes, work on tram roads in the woods, and digging ditches for the Gulf Pipeline Company; and

WHEREAS, After his graduation from law school, he became county attorney of Tyler County, serving for four years; and

WHEREAS, He practiced law in Woodville for 54 years, and in partnership with his son, Josiah Wheat, president-elect of the State Bar of Texas, in the firm of Wheat, Wheat & Stafford; and

WHEREAS, Despite his busy law practice, he found time

## Quotations Given School Trustees On Steel Building

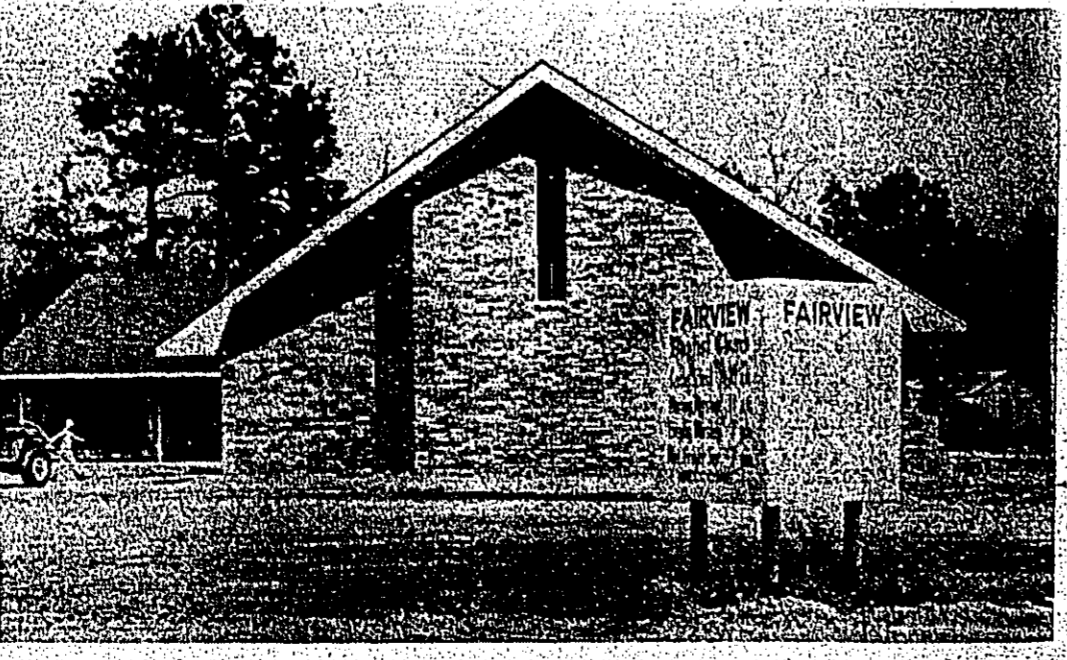

Memorial services for Bronson Cooper Sylestine, 89, Chief of the Alabama-Coushatta Indians, will be held at 11:00 a.m. today (Thursday) at the Indian Presbyterian Church on the Indian Reservation, 15 miles west of Woodville.

Chief Sylestine died at 5 a.m. Monday in Tyler County Hospital after being in ill health for several months.

Private burial services will be under the direction of Edwards Funeral Home of Woodville. Sylestine had been chief since January 1, 1936. During that time many changes have taken place at the Indian Reservation including the developing tourist attractions in recent years to provide employment for residents on the reservation. He

was a lifelong resident of the Indian Reservation and his first concern was always for the improvement of economic and educational opportunities for the Indians there.

Chief Sylestine was a lifelong member of the Presbyterian Church. He had served approximately 50 years as a deacon and later an elder of the church. He also taught Sunday school for many years.

He is survived by his wife, two daughters, Miss Cora Sylestine and Miss Martha Sylestine, both of the reservation; two sons, Clem Sylestine of Holland, Texas, and James Sylestine, stationed at Fort Gordon, Georgia; four grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.
