Two young men from Kirbyville had a streak of good and bad luck early Tuesday morning which started with the killing of a doe deer near Chester. The two, Simon L. Drake and Willard Hayes Day, thought they had good luck when they were able to kill the deer near Chester with a rifle—although deer season is closed and night hunting is illegal at any time. They had bad luck when Game Warden R. B. McReynolds attempted to stop them as they drove toward Woodville on Highway 287. Instead of stopping, Drake, driver of the convertible auto, stepped on the gas and tried to outrun the warden.

Assistant Police Chief Ed Summerall, who saw the car roar past him after it entered the city limits, said that he knew it would never make the curve over the hill at the city water works. He estimated its speed at 100 miles per hour as it left the road, clipped one large tree, smashing a mail box, and flipped over just as it smashed into a tree in the yard of Raymond Pope at the intersection of Highway 287 and Nellus street.

Western Weekend March 28-29 Pageant and Coronation April 5

The accident was investigated by Summerall and Police Chief John Grammer.

Cowboy John and Black Bart, television characters with station KJAC-TV, channel 4, in Port Arthur, will be parade marshalls for the Western Weekend parade on March 28. The parade will begin at 2 p.m. with 10 trail ride groups taking parts.

Besides the nine trail rides named last week, one more has indicated it will make the trek to Woodville to participate in the parade. It is the Wildwood Trail Riders from the resort city near the Hardin-Tyler county line near Village Mills.

Also in the parade will be the Triple D Guest Ranch stage coach and the H. L. Davis shetland ponies pulling two buggles. Four mounted quadrille drill teams will be here Saturday, March 29, for the special events program at the 4-H and FFA Rodeo grounds west of Woodville. These events will start at 4 p.m. following the parade.

The Orange County Junior and Senior Drill teams will also take part in the parade. Also at the special events program will be the Jefferson County Mounted Drill Team, and the Jefferson County All-Girl Drill Team. Besides performances by the drill teams will be contests in pole bending and barrel racing by age groups.

Dances scheduled for Western Weekend include the Trail Riders Dance Friday night, March 28, in the high school gym from 8 p.m. until midnight; a teenaged chaperoned dance Saturday night from 7:30 until 11 p.m. at Dogwood Motor Hotel, and a western dance Saturday night, March 29, from 8 until 1:00 a.m. at the high school gym.

Civil Cases Resume In District Court

Civil suits will be heard in 88th District Court during the third week of this session which will get underway Tuesday.

Ordinary criminal cases were on the docket this week. Eight charges were dismissed, two were continued until March 24, one man was sentenced to one year in prison on a guilty plea to DWI second offense, one defendant's bond was forfeited when he failed to appear, and several other cases were continued at a date to be set later.

An 88th District Court jury, in a lawsuit taking up all of the second week of this session of the December term, returned a verdict in favor of the defendant on all counts in the case of Citizens Bluff Corporation against Clinton Collier.

Testimony in the case evolved around a \$30,000 note made by Collier with Citizens State Bank on April 10, 1963, which was conditional upon Collier being a successful bidder on a State Highway project. Collier made the conditional note so that he could qualify financially to bid on the project and claimed that the note was not to be effective if he failed to get the contract.

In making the \$30,000 note, Collier claimed that he was persuaded to make a note for \$16,862.32 on indebtedness owed to a relative of Robert A. Mann, president of the Citizens State Bank at the time. Collier claimed that the bank did not in fact honor the \$30,000 note and that he was unable to qualify for the State Highway project bid.

Testimony showed that the bank had taken possession of road machinery owned by Collier for non-payment of the \$16,862.32 note, and had sued Collier for a balance of \$3,731.71 on it and for \$1,522.36 on the \$30,000 note.

The jury was given a 10-point charge to answer by the presiding judge, H. A. Coe, on which it found affirmatively in favor of Collier.

The charges, briefly, were (1) did a preponderance of evidence show that the \$30,000 note was not to become effective until Collier obtained the road contract upon which he was attempting to bid; (2) was the note conditional; (3) was the agreement that rate of interest on note, if any, would be 6 percent; (4) did jury find that interest was changed to seven percent; (5) did jury find that such change was made without consulting Collier; (6) did jury find that at time Collier turned equipment over to Citizens State Bank that he and Mann agreed that equipment would be accepted in full payment of note, if any, in amount of \$16,862.32; (7) did they find that Collier turned over to Citizens State Bank all equipment listed in defendant's exhibit 7 and 7A; (8) do you find that Citizens State Bank did not give Collier credit for all the equipment, if any, turned over to it by Collier on the note, if any, dated April 10, 1963, in amount of \$16,862.32 should have been cancelled and considered by Citizens State Bank as paid in full; (9) do you find that note dated April 10, 1963, in the amount of \$30,000 should have been cancelled and considered by Citizens State Bank to have been paid in full?

Absentee voting will begin March 17 and run through April 1. Voters may apply for an absentee ballot at the city hall.

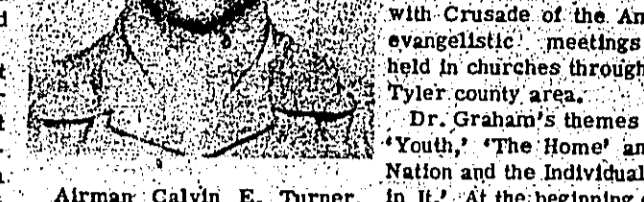

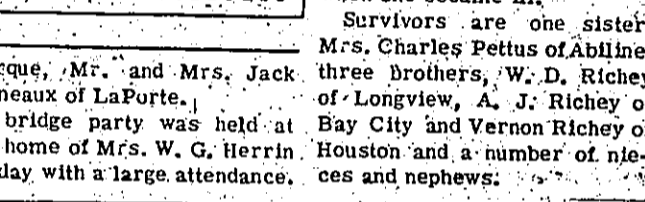

TYLER COUNTY SCHOOL TEENAGE NUTRITION EMPHASIS

All of the junior high schools in Tyler county are cooperating in a Teen-Age Nutrition Emphasis.

Twenty representatives from the schools met in the Community Room of Citizens State Bank on March 3 to plan the campaign.

The objectives are to:

1. To explain the nutritional situation with teenagers.
2. To identify wants of teenagers.
3. To plan activities to make teenagers aware of the importance of nutrition to health.
4. To plan an assembly program to reach all teenagers in the five schools in the county as a climax to these activities.
5. To help teenagers to recognize the need of improving teenage nutrition and plan ways of improving nutrition.

Although abundant food is available, teenagers need improved diets. Many of them are poorly nourished, some are overweight. From childhood to teenage, the percentage of young people with poor diets increased sharply.

Boys as well as girls need to improve their diets, as shown by research of every 10 girls, 6 have poor diets and of every 10 boys 4 have poor diets - poor diets we mean they receive two-thirds or less of the nutrients recommended for their age by the National Research Council.

These are the reasons teenagers give for poor eating habits: skip breakfast, eating poor snacks, drink no milk, fear fat.

Girls are more poorly fed than boys. Girls are often short of calcium, iron and Vitamin C. More girls than boys are overweight. The emphasis plans include:

- Exhibitions on nutrition in each school, posters in community stores, news articles and radio on campaign progress.
- Nutritional information in each school, posters in community stores, news articles and radio on campaign progress.
- All experiments in each school class for the purpose of determining results of good and poor diets.
- Assembly program in April and May in school for entire student body as a climax to these activities.
- Committees formed to carry out these plans to support the emphasis are:

Program: Debbie Key of Colmesneer, Peggy Wortham of Warren, Doug Roberts of Spurger, Brenda Bradley of Chesler, Meredith Canada of Woodville.

Refusal to Have Children

During his romance with Myrtle, Jack often spoke tenderly of the children they would have once they were married. But after the wedding he changed his tune. In fact, he insisted on the use of birth control measures.

Finally Jack confessed that he had never intended to have children in the first place. Myrtle could sue for an annulment on grounds of fraud, and the court awarded her a decree.

Myrtle's lawyer advised her that if a marriage is not granted lightly, but it is granted as a rule, if one of the parties has decided during the courtship that something "essential" to the marital relationship is the refusal to have children, the court will not annul the marriage.

In one case, a woman sued for annulment after 12 years of childless marriage. After all this time, she said, her husband had finally decided that he had decided her from the very beginning and had never meant to have a family. But the court ruled that the woman herself could not have been any too eager for children. Denying her an annulment, the judge said: "She allowed 12 years of her life to slip by without insisting on her right to a family. I do not think she can be heard to complain that she has not had children."

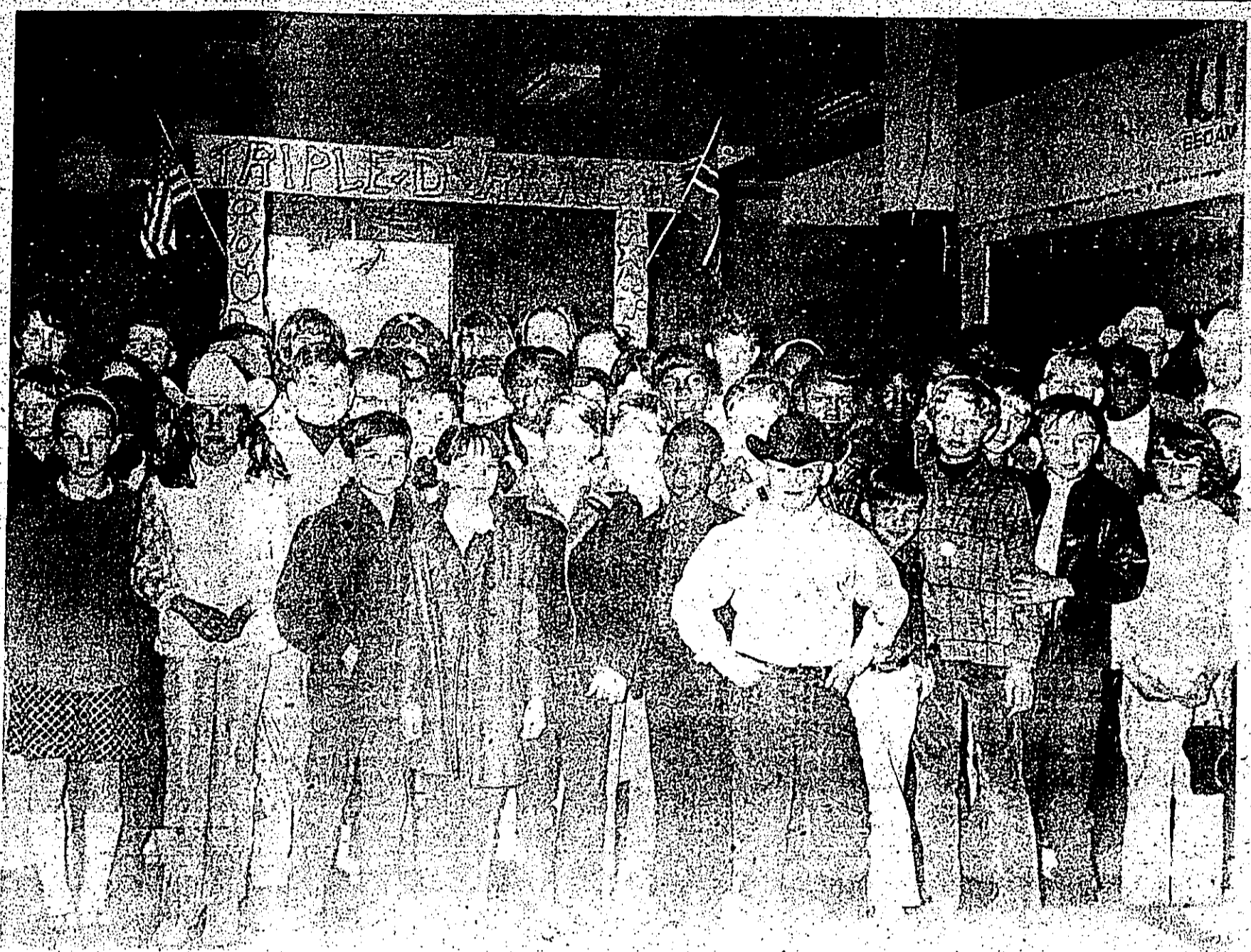

If you don't believe the thinking about "mental health" is almost "all", then check on what position our "Mental Hospitals" hold on the state's appropriation list. I believe you will find it just about at the bottom of the list, and by the time they get down to it they have run out of money and can only get them a little money by trimming off a little from what they call more important projects and sort of "padding" out a little to our Mental Hospitals.

Now, on the other hand, have you noticed what is happening in our State Correctional Institutions? The news media and state officials often refer to it as "rehabilitation". We believe the correct word would be "Coddling". Have you ever talked with a truly dedicated peace officer who has to take people to both the "Correctional Institutions" and the "Mental Hospitals"? Ask them about the different "strange treatment", and you will find out that the criminal is given "priority" over the mental patient. You may remember recently where an incident at the Reformatory in Gatesville almost brought all state activities to a screeching halt while everyone from Lt. Governor Ben Barnes on down, who could not get in the car, investigated to see if some of the inmates were being mistreated by being kept in a scheduled program had worn out a one inch one-half of those inmates in earlier years, they wouldn't have been there to start with. Sawyer said the tax office will remain open until 5:30 p.m. on the last registration day, March 31, but would have to close promptly at 5:30 in order to give his deputies time to check up on the day's receipts.

He also reminded those registering cars that they must bring their title and last year's registration receipt. He also wants to remind those bringing cash as the tax office cannot accept personal checks for auto tags.

Sawyer said he had wanted to work out a schedule to have deputies go to other towns in the county to issue tags, but that work in the office had been too busy to be able to spare the deputies from the office.

Inflation Halt Held Key To Rail Progress

Restraint of inflationary pressures held the key to railroad ability to progress and grow in 1969, the Association of American Railroads said in Washington, D.C.

Dr. Burton N. Behling, vice president, underscored the inflationary pressures which he said are increasing in wage levels and other labor costs within rail gains in productivity and efficiency.

"Unless this is done," he warned, "the objective to restrain inflationary excesses will involve grave risk of an eventual correction by recession."

Dr. Behling suggested that important remedial action for the railroads in particular "involves continuing efforts to maintain work rules which promote efficient and economical operations."

Railroads anticipate increased operating costs of \$400 million during 1969 - including \$300 million in wage boosts alone, \$28 million in higher payroll taxes and the balance as a result of higher material prices.

Dr. Behling reported the railroads' "improvement" programs are moving ahead, highlighted by installation of computer data systems and sophisticated communications equipment to provide management with more effective control of the nation's \$1.8 billion rail-owned and private freight cars.

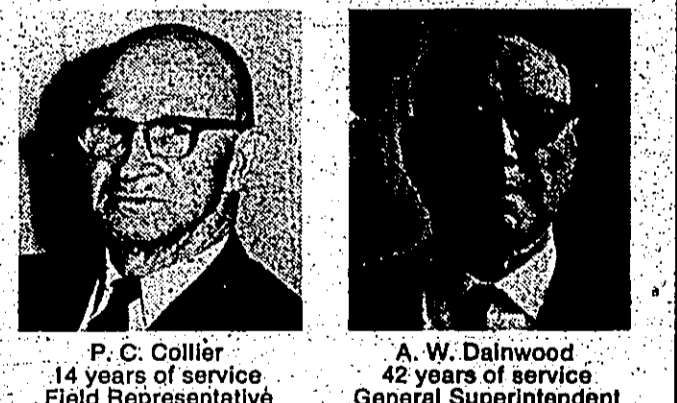

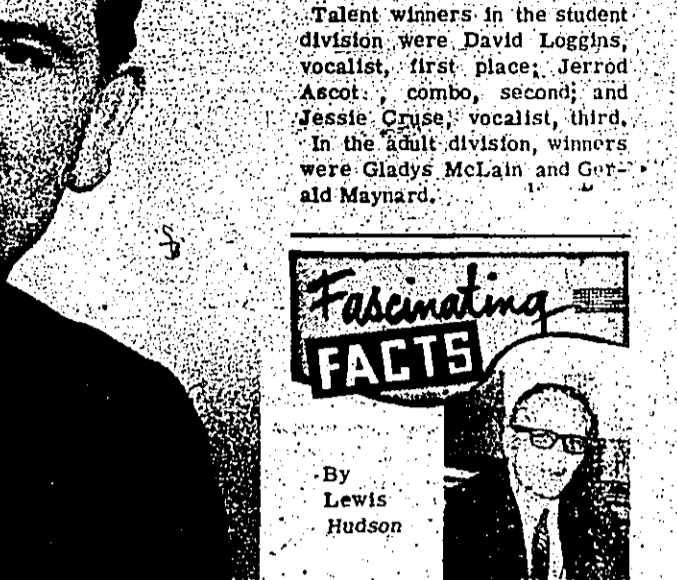

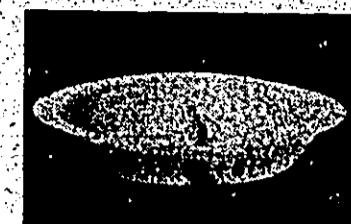
