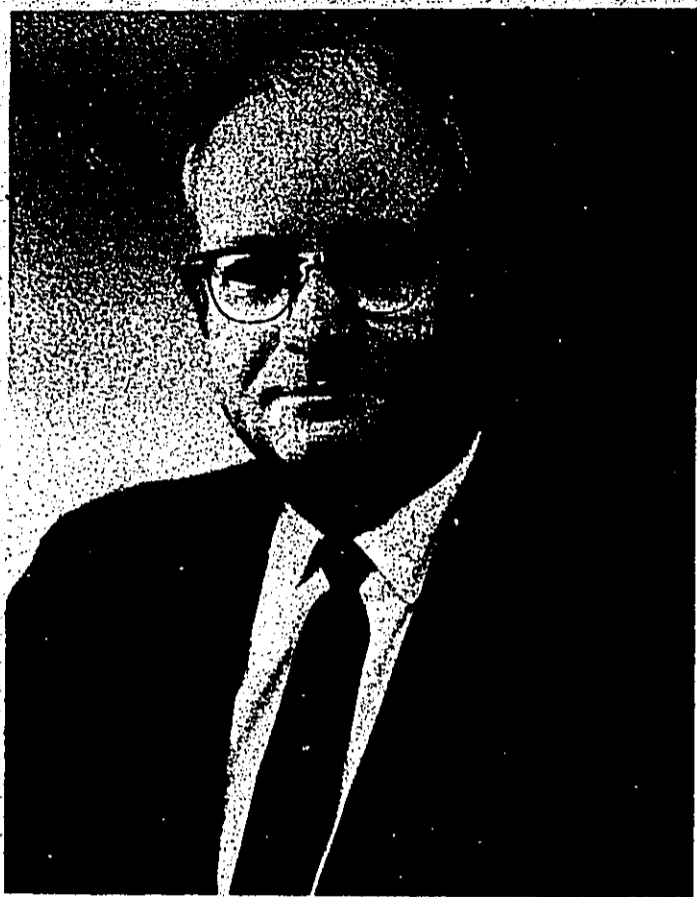

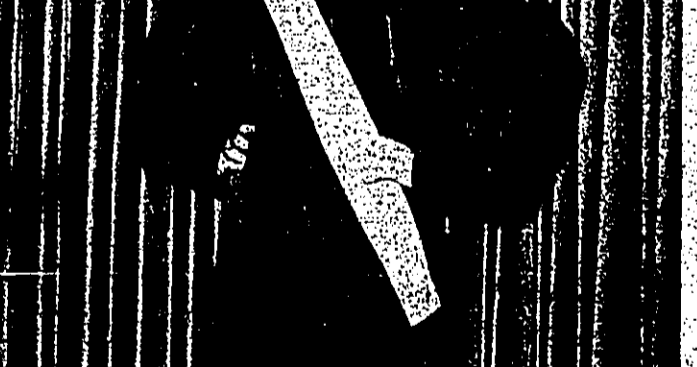
Beaumont's Miss Charro Places

Western Parade To Be Colorful Affair

The Western Weekend Parade on March 29 will be one of the most colorful and one of the largest ever held in Woodville. The addition of the famous, magnificent Owens Eight Horse Belgian Hitch team pulling a picturesque old freight wagon will add to the color, and the entry of ten trail rides will make the parade one of the largest to be held in this area for an event of this type.

The Eight Horse Belgian Hitch will participate in the parade through the courtesy of C. B. Owens, president of Owens Country Sausage, Inc., and are from his Spring Creek Farm near Richardson. They appear in many parades and are in such demand that Western Weekend officials feel fortunate in securing them. They will be driven by Don Shannon who is also their trainer.

The Big Belgian horses are powerful, intelligent and exceedingly gentle. They prance in perfect step with perfectly groomed manes and tails tied with bright red ribbons. The 100-year old freight wagon, used in the late 1800's, has been restored to its original beauty, trimmed with 450 feet of chrome and is now equipped with lights and hydraulic brakes. The Belgian horses range in size from the lead team's 17 hands plus to the wheel team (next to wagon) that stand 20 hands high and weigh 2700 and 3000 pounds respectively.

Already announced for participation in the parade is the Triple D Guest Ranch stage coach and the H. L. Davis Shetland ponies pulling buggies. The Orange County Junior and Senior Drill teams will be in the parade as well as performing during the special events which begin at 4 p.m. following the parade.

Ten trail ride groups will start the trek to Woodville Friday, March 28, and arrive in time to take part in the parade at 2 p.m. Saturday, March 29. They are the Wildwood Trail Riders, Rought Riders Horse Club of Baytown, Schwab City Trail Riders, Brush Riders of Spurger, Tyler County Youth Riders, the Trailblazers of Beaumont, Voth Night Riders, Texas Saddle Club of Colmesnell, Dogwood Trail Riders from Livingston, and the Corrigan Trail Riders.

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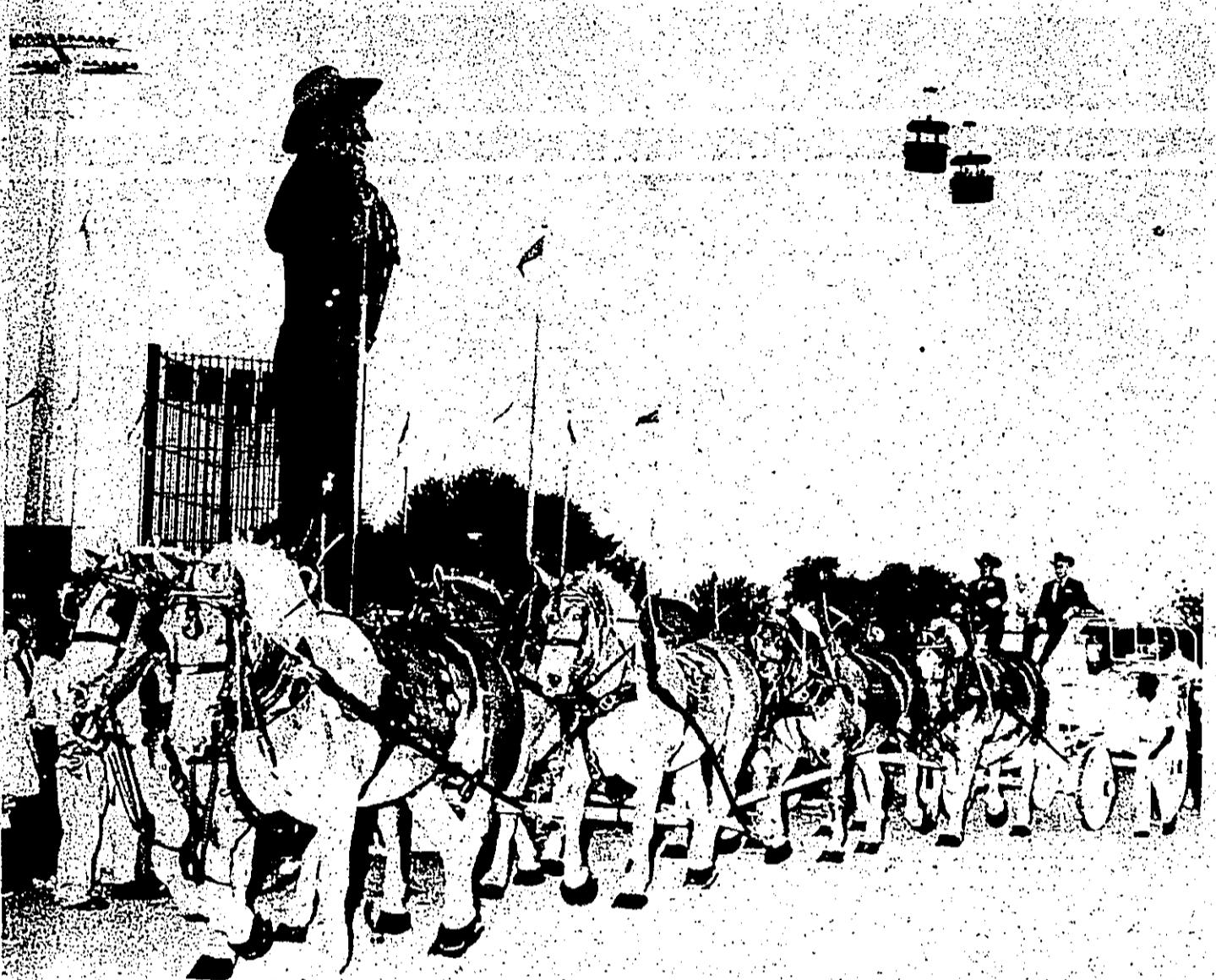
Service Clubs Set Ladies Night For March 27

Those in charge of the flower making activities say it is impossible to list all of those who have helped make the flowers this year but that each one deserves credit and praise for good citizenship in helping to make this annual project a success.

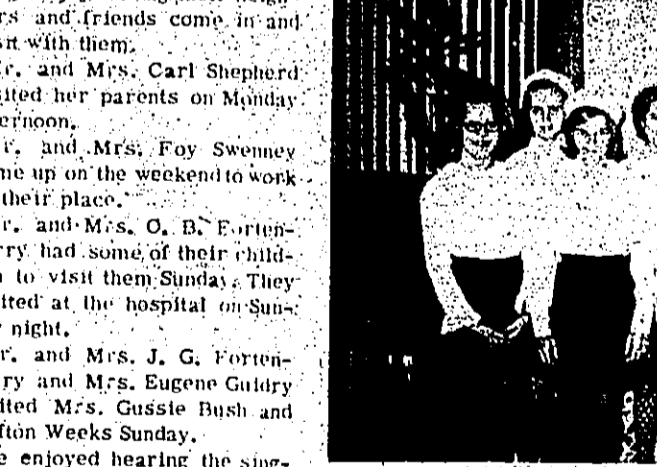
