Hopes for an early settlement of the strike against Air Control Window Corporation's plant north of Woodville by the Sheet Metal Workers Local No. 196 began to dim Wednesday morning as neither the company nor the union reported any progress in negotiation.

A majority of members of the local voted to strike Wednesday of last week and picket lines went up Thursday. Both the company and union leaders said that most of the workers in the window division are honoring the picket line although the company has said that all employees, union and non-union, can return to work regardless of the strike if they so desire.

District Judge H. A. Coo issued a temporary restraining order sought by the company against the union Tuesday. The restraining order prohibits mass picketing, acts of violence, and threats against non-strikers. Two tickets have

been walking at each of two entrances to the plant from Highway 69. A tent was set up across the highway and strikers cars lined the far side of the highway across from the plant.

Local peace officers and Texas Rangers were stationed near the plant entrance for about an hour Monday morning as a precaution as non-strikers returned to work. There were no incidents and the officers left.

In seeking the temporary restraining order, Air Control alleged that strikers had sprinkled nails at the entrance to the plant, that strikers had damaged autos entering the plant, threatened non-strikers who were entering the plant and also away from the plant, and had harassed company trucks and non-strikers' autos on the streets and highways.

Leroy A. Lenarz, the local's business representative, and Woody Woodall, International representative, are here assisting the strikers. The union is asking for a wage increase above the 10 cents per hour offered by the company, alleging that actually, under the last contract, the wage scale should have been raised seven cents per hour the past year and the company offer is really only three cents an hour more than employees should have been getting.

Mrs. Margaret Colwell, special education teacher in the Warren school, saw the possibilities in Bonnie if she were able to remain in the state school long enough to gain her voice and hearing. Mrs. Col-

well gave of her time and personal money to see that this brilliant child was given the opportunity. Citizenship Essay Winners To Be Selected

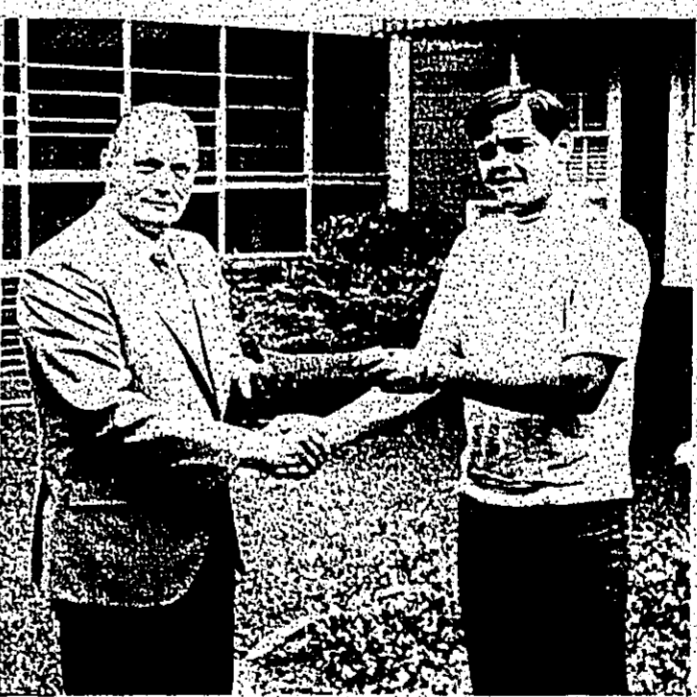

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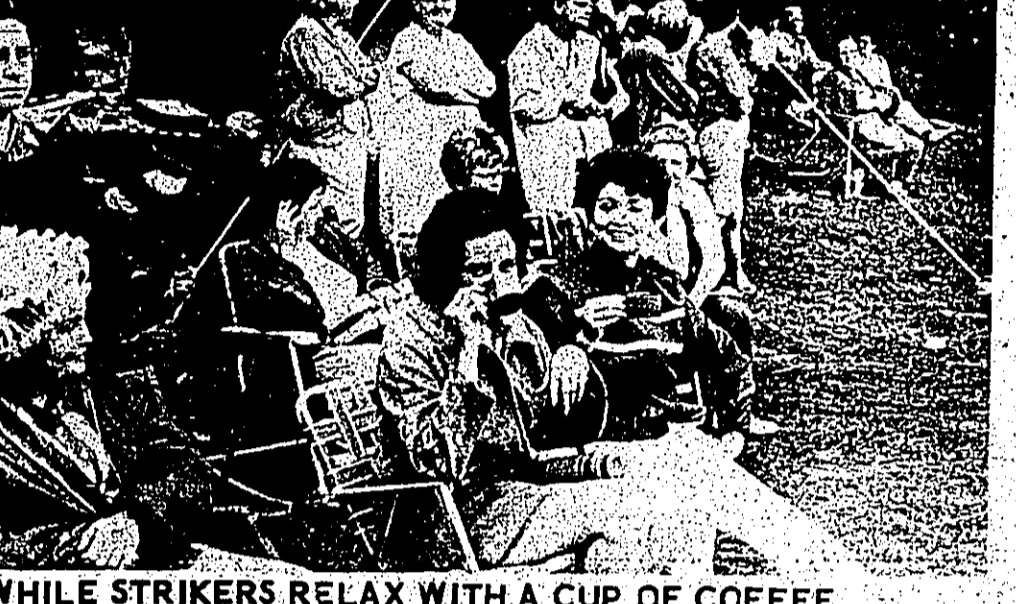
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AIR CONTROL OFFICIALS PONDER THE STRIKE...

The shelter behind them is the mess hall for the group. They were waiting for officials to come to them and officials were waiting for them to return to their jobs. Neither happened but police, highway patrolmen and Texas rangers kept the strike from breaking out.



An official of Air Control leaves the premises through the picket line. The strikers kept shouting at the officials and other workers that entered the premises, but that was the extent of it all. The reason for the peacefulness in the matter is depicted also by the fender of the car in the lower right hand corner. The car belonged to a Texas ranger who was watching the proceedings and kept the thing from getting out of hand.

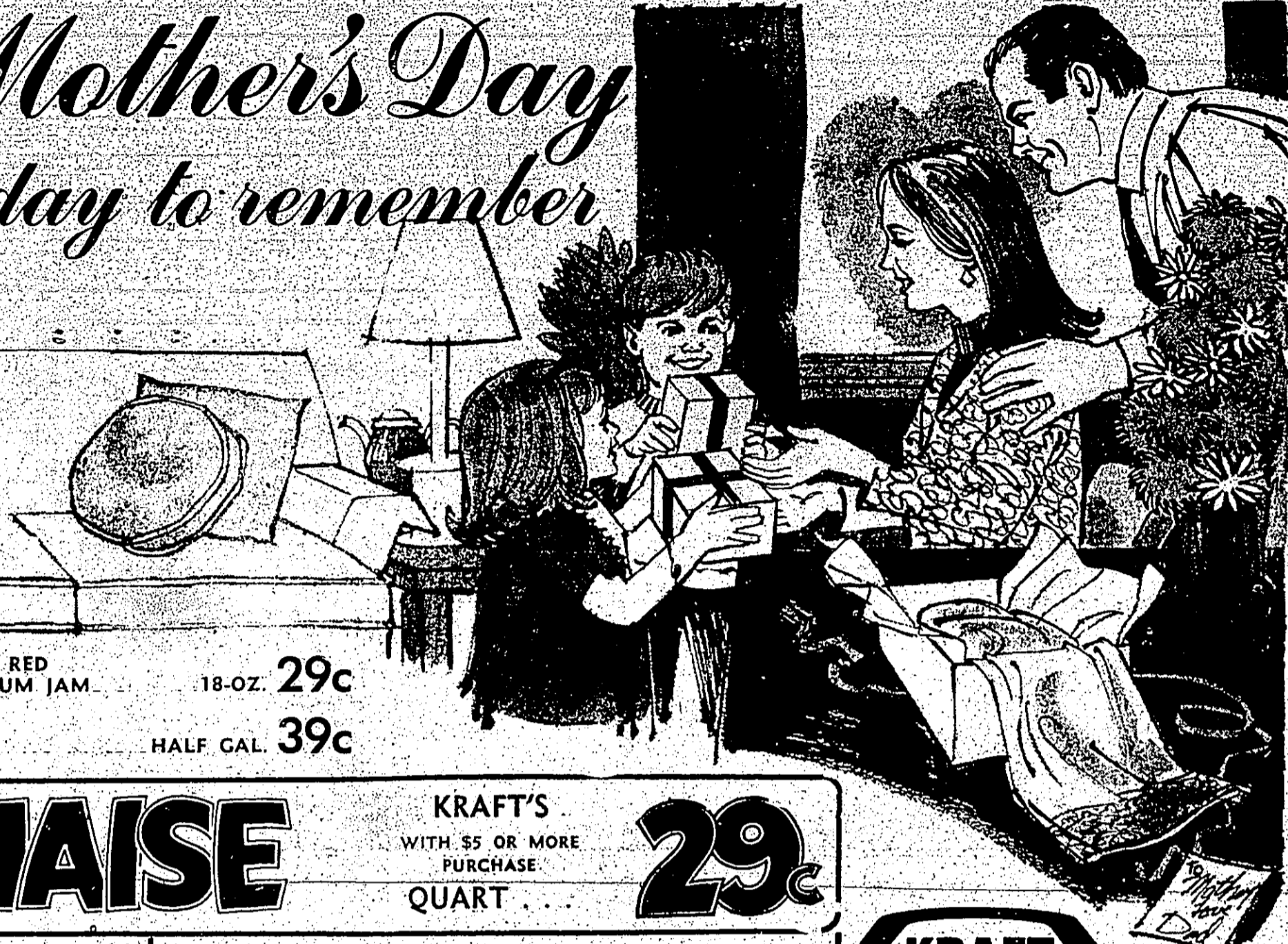
