Immunization Clinic Slated

The third pre-school immunization clinic will be held Saturday, June 7th, from 9:00 a.m. until 12:00 noon at the Woodville Elementary School on West Live Oak St.

Immunizations will be given only to children who will enter the first grade in September. School regulations require that each child registering must have the following immunizations: smallpox, 3 DPT (diphtheria, pertussis, tetanus), polio, and measles. Since the DPT series must be given at monthly intervals, parents are urged to start or continue these now so that they will be complete when school starts.

Peace Corps. The new director of the Peace Corps states he will seek citizens of foreign nations for recruits in the U.S. and bring them to the United States for training and instruction in the "rural poverty." The cost to American taxpayers of the Peace Corps is more than \$100 million per year. If foreigners are interested in helping solve our poverty problems, that we can import them to tell us how to conduct our affairs in this respect, it would seem to indicate we should be spending the \$100 million per annum we are spending to send Americans abroad for the same purpose in foreign lands.

Foreign Aid. President Nixon has asked Congress to authorize \$2 billion for foreign aid in fiscal 1970. This is more than \$1 billion increase of the amount dedicated to this program from their inauguration date. It seems that this is a plus, where we should be spending more dollars, rather than increasing spending in the vain effort to finance and police the entire world.




