The record of the lodge reflect that ten men paid dues in 1853 and are believed to be the charter members. These men are William Harrison, H. W. Carter, H. A. Wilson, Henry West, Jefferson Laird, William L. Mann, Benjamin Enloe, William Priest, Israel Sneed and William P. Sansom.

The meeting place was moved from Mt. Hope community to the new lodge building in Chester in 1892 and has been meeting in the same building ever since. Many pieces of the original furniture and accessories are still in use.

The regular monthly meeting is the fourth Thursday of each month and all brothers are invited to attend.

Judge Clyde Smith To Be Honored

State Bar president Ralph W. Britte of San Antonio will present the veteran jurist a citation in recognition of valuable and meritorious service to his community, state and nation as a member of the Bar for more than 50 years.

The presentation will be made at the closing session of the Texas State Bar's 87th annual meeting.

Judge Smith, a member of the Supreme Court since November, 1950, was admitted to the bar in 1919. In 1920 he was elected county attorney of Tyler County and served two years without seeking reelection. He was elected district attorney in 1926, serving for three consecutive terms without opposition. He served as assistant Secretary of State in 1935 under Gov. James V. Alfred, for several years as a district judge, and had just been reelected without opposition for another four year term when Gov. Allan Shi

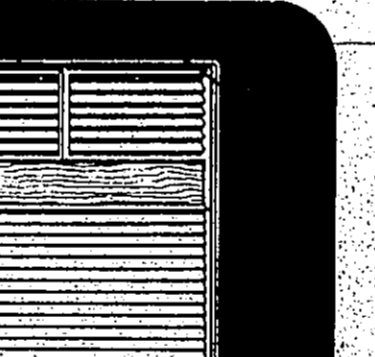
Students To Receive Reading Certificates

HOMEMAKING HINTS

Most homemakers with growing families like to keep a budget. One of the best ways to stretch the budget and keep a healthy food from being eaten at the same time is to utilize leftovers. Some of the more common leftovers are: green peas, roast beef and hot potatoes.

When cooked rice is covered and left in the refrigerator, it makes perfect rice for fried rice. When it was first prepared, reheat in a small amount of water and stir as you fry. For breakfast, you can add a few raisins. Rice goes well with soups and meat loaves. Combine green peas with other vegetables such as corn and beans of carrots. Any of these vegetables add variety to a meal of roast beef.

Leftover roast beef is commonly sliced for sandwiches whether served hot with gravy or cold with lettuce. Or it can be cut into small pieces and fried with sliced potatoes and onions for a hearty hot hash. Baked potatoes can be sliced for potato salad. They are also good fried alone or served with eggs and small pieces of ham. Sliced leftover mashed potatoes on patties and fry in margarine until crispy.

Food preservation cut into halves or cubes and flavored with just a touch of fresh lemon juice or cream cheese. Fried potatoes are also good. Soak with water or milk for a few days. It was the best way to save raw carrot sticks for the week. The best way to save raw carrots is to slice them into small sticks. They will be more tender and more flavorful than the raw carrots which you eat straight. They are also good in soups and stews.

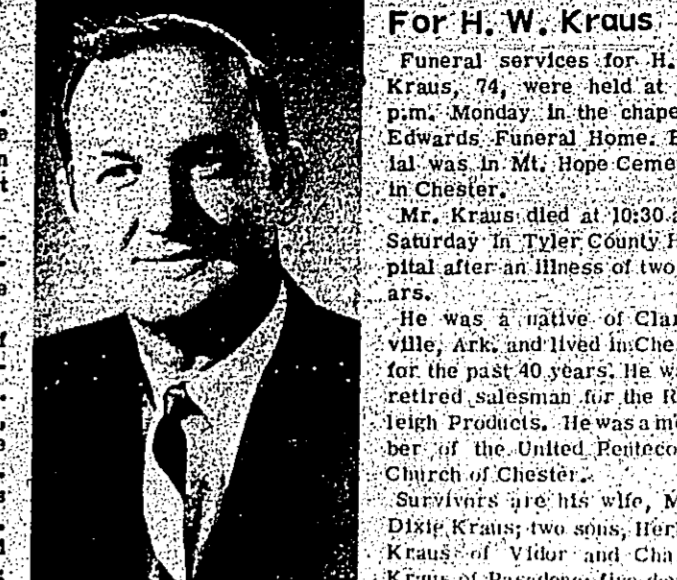
