A fourteen year old boy was killed instantly when the bicycle he was riding was struck by a car Sunday afternoon.

The victim was identified as Freddie Louis Dill. Investigating officers said he was riding his bicycle in the left hand lane of the highway when a car came from behind. Then the boy met an oncoming car and cut in front of the other car driven by 51-year old Edwin Earl Justice of Houston. Officers said that the boy was killed instantly by the impact of the car estimated doing a speed of 60 miles per hour.

The accident occurred approximately five and one half miles east of Woodville on Highway 190. It was about 2:45 p.m.

## Gainey Named To School Board Monday

Jim Gainey, Woodville business man, was appointed to fill the unexpired term of Jim Parks on the Woodville Independent School Board of trustees Monday night at the regular meeting of the board. The board went into an executive session for this and ask everyone other than the actual board members to leave the session. James E. (Monk) Grimes was also mentioned as a possible candidate for the position before the executive session was called. Mr. Parks was transferred out of the School District by his company and thus making the appointment necessary.

The Board voted to accept the bid of the Citizens State Bank for school funds. The bidders contract stated that they (Citizens State Bank) would pay 5% interest on less than \$100,000.00 on 30, 90, 180, 365 days on certificates of deposits.

Other actions taken by the board: Voted to release band director Jerry Brown from his present contract so that he could accept a position in another district at a higher rate of pay. The matter of Little League using the school busses for transportation to Houston for the players to see the Astro's play was brought up. It appeared that the Board could not let the busses be used due to the liabilities that could occur and in-as-much as it would not be a school sponsored project, the Board decided in the best interest of the school district, the busses should not be used.

The Booster reporter assumed that this action was necessary to relieve the board of feelings obligated to other organizations that might feel they too should be granted the right to use the busses. The board also voted to let a certain number of students from Indian Village be transferred into the Woodville school. The board also reviewed the financial statement, August 5th was set as the date for a special board meeting. It was also announced that August 11th (second Monday in August) would be the meeting for the public budget hearing.

Supt. McGuire told the board that a lot owned by R. A. Fortenberry, and across from the Scott campus was for sale and could be purchased by the Board for \$500,000. The board felt the price was more than they could pay at this time and agreed on a counter-proposal. It was also brought before the board that an existing building housing an industry in Tyler County was not on the school or county tax roll. The local businessman that brought this matter to the board's attention felt that if one building was exempt, others should have the same privilege. A member of the school board stated that this concession was made several years ago to get the industry here which provided employment for approximately 300 families, and at the end of the lease period, the building would be subject to taxation. It was also pointed out that the inventory of this industry was being taxed at this time. One board member made a motion that all real estate be put on the tax rolls but did not get a second to the motion.

Local insurance man Jimmy Freeman appeared before the board with regards to renewing the scholastic insurance with the company he represented. Mr. Freeman was informed that the Board had taken action on this matter in June and had signed an application with another company. However, the board said they would reconsider and try to place the policy with Mr. Freeman in-as-much as he was a local businessman.

The Board also agreed to let the FFA boys air condition the classrooms in the new vocational building and agreed to help as much financially as possible.

"Miss Tyler County" returned home Sunday night tired but happy and smiling. Linda Pate explains it this way:

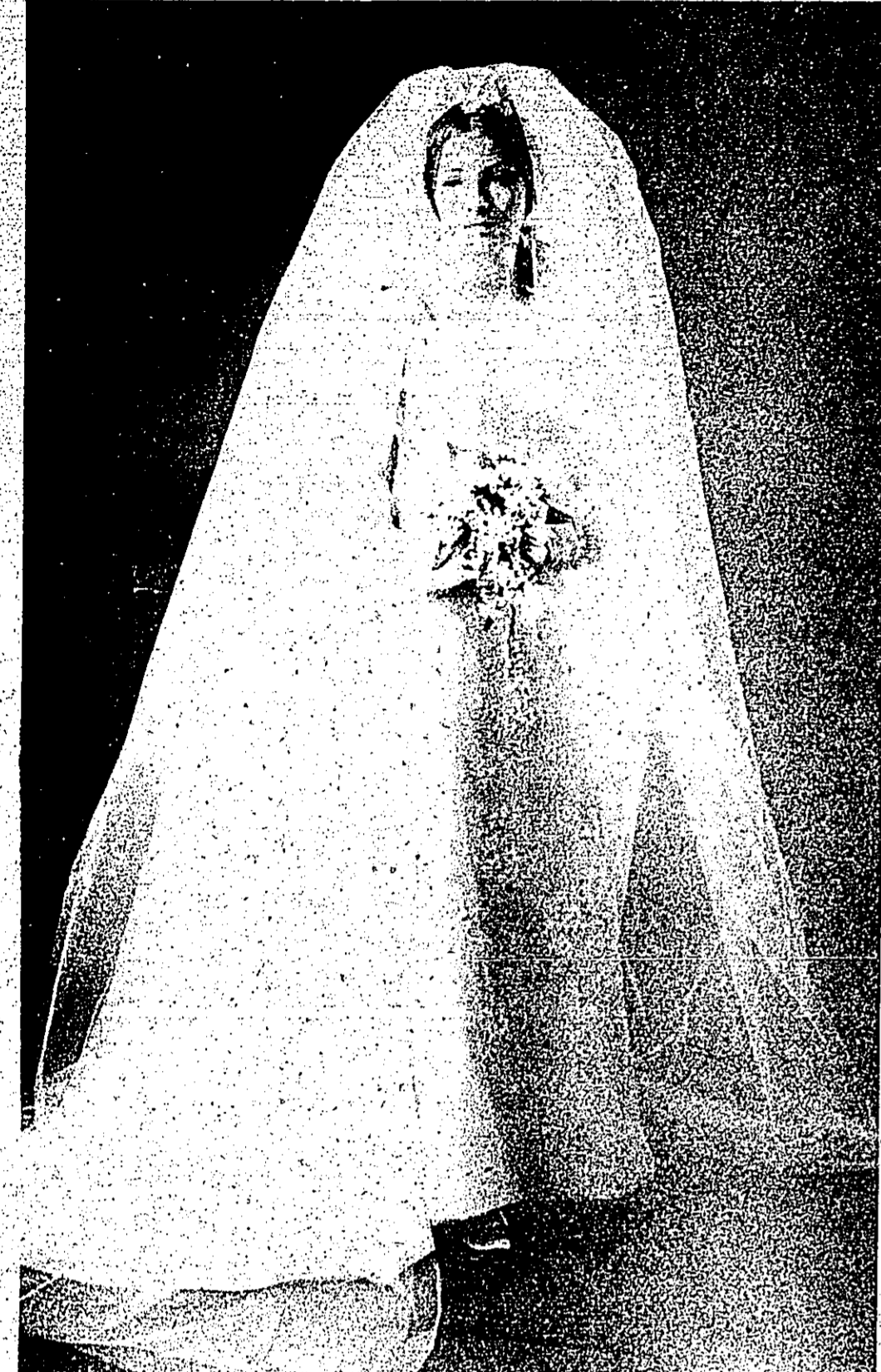
