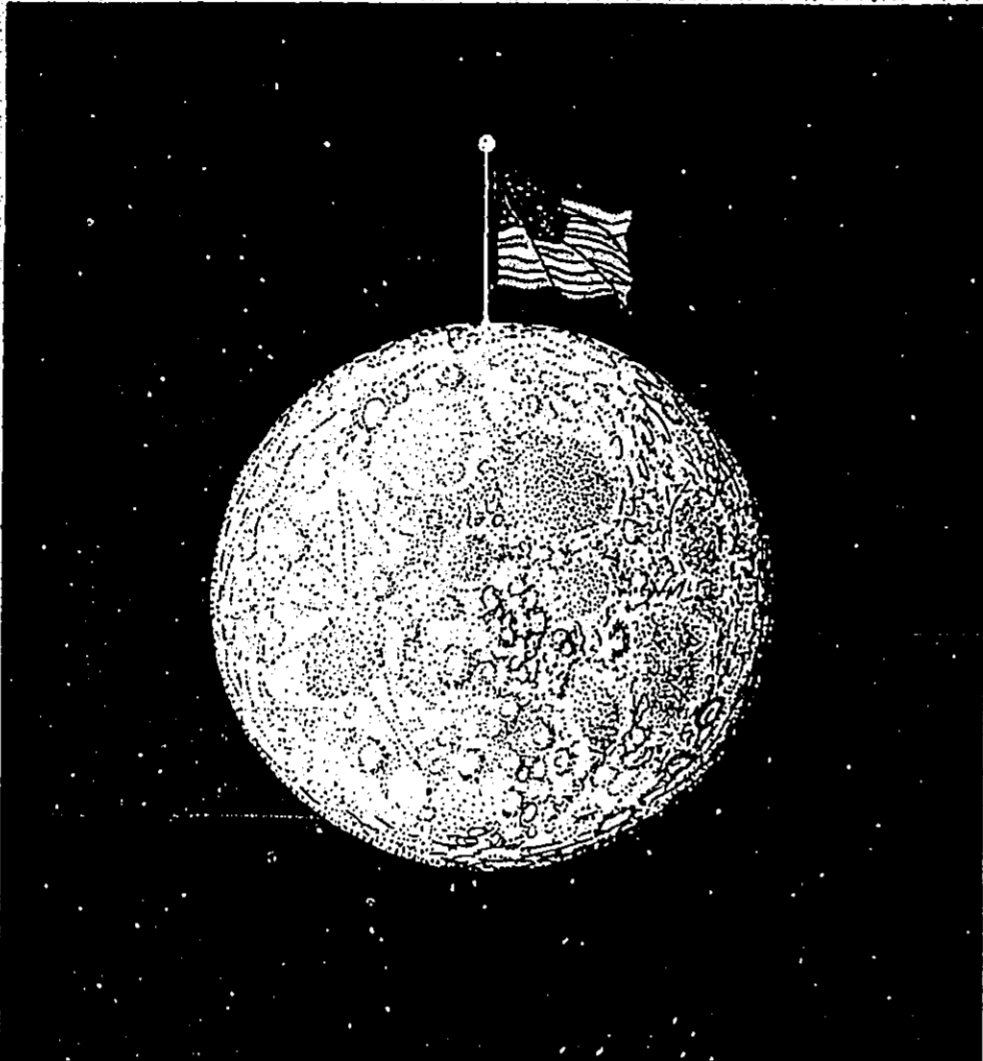
KIRBY HIGH BAND MARCHING CONTEST FILM TO BE SHOWN IN SEVEN STATES

Tyler Countians stayed home for the most part Sunday and Monday as they joined millions of other people around the world in following the progress of the Apollo and the first step of man on the moon.

Traffic was relatively light on the area highways indicating that most of the rest of East Texas residents also were watching television coverage of the moon landing.

Monday was a holiday in Texas although most Woodville business places were open. Closed were the post office, court house and city hall.

However, nearly everyone who did come to work Monday were heavy-eyed from a day and night of TV watching as the Apollo II Eagle made its landing on the moon Sunday night and sent back a spectacular show of Neil Armstrong and Edwin E. Aldrin exploring a small area of the moon. Armstrong had taken the cover off a television camera as he descended the ladder onto the moon, and later the camera was moved about 50 feet to allow the billions of viewers to watch the two astronauts as they set up an American flag, they set up an American flag, gathered rocks and heard a message from President Nixon. In what must have been the longest long-distance telephone call in history. Actually, the president's message started by telephone but was relayed via radio.

Early Tuesday the three astronauts were reunited in Columbia, the command ship, and were headed back toward the earth. They will splashdown in the Pacific at 11:51 a.m. Thursday, and again Tyler Countians will join the rest of the world to watch the end of the historic flight.

The names of Neil Armstrong, Edwin E. (Buzz) Aldrin and Michael Collins will be written indelibly in history.

An open horse show will be held August 2 at the Tyler County Youth Arena on highway 1013 west of Spurger.

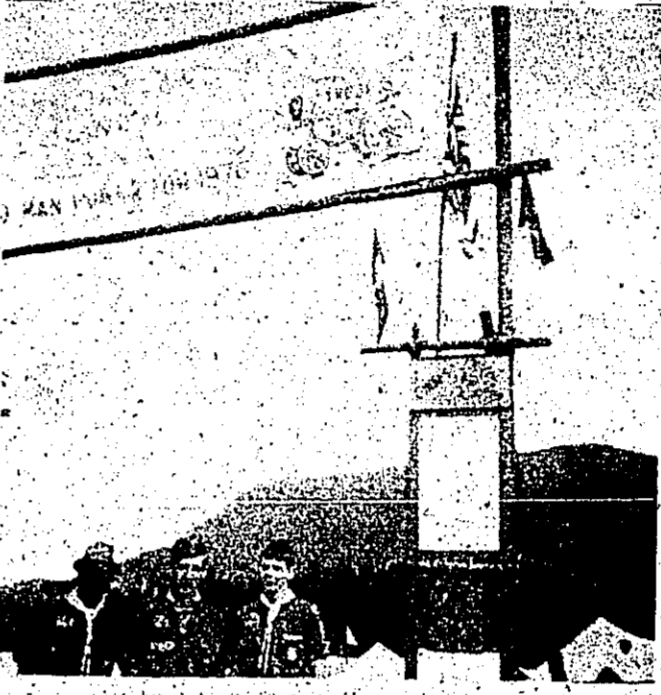

Amendments Election Set For August 5

Voters who will be out of the county on August 5 when the special election on nine amendments to the constitution will be held are reminded that absentee balloting will end Friday, August 1. That leaves only eight days in which to apply for an absentee ballot at the office of county Clerk Otha Miles.

New residents who are eligible to vote in Texas but who have lived in the county less than six months should also vote during this period.

A short explanation of each proposed amendment in the order in which it appears on the ballot follows:

Number one: This might be considered a clean-up amendment. It would eliminate certain sections of the constitution - it being specifically understood that the repeal of these sections shall not in any way make any substantive change in our present constitution.

Number two: This amendment would authorize the issuance of \$2.5 billion in general obligation bonds to be deposited in Texas Water Development Fund. This is another step toward a master water plan for Texas.

Number three: This amendment would increase salaries of all members of the Legislature. At present they receive \$4,000 per year - this includes the Lt. Governor and the Speaker. The amendment states: "The Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall each receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature, not to exceed one-half the annual salary of the Governor. Each other member of the Legislature shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary to be fixed by the Legislature, not to exceed the annual salary paid to a district judge from state funds. Members of the Legislature shall also receive a per diem of not exceeding twelve dollars (\$12) per day during each regular and special session of the Legislature. No regular session shall be of longer duration than one hundred and forty (40) days."

Number four: Exempts nonprofit water supply corporations from taxation.

Number five: This amendment increases the ceiling on welfare assistance to four classes of needy to a maximum of \$80,000,000 from state funds to match federal funds.

Number six: This amendment removes the constitutional interest rate limitations, subject to limits imposed by Legislature for bonds pursuant to constitutional authority. It permits the Legislature to set interest rates.

Number seven: Provides for payment of assistance to surviving spouses and minor children of governmental officers, employees, and agents, including members of organized volunteer fire departments and certain organized police reserve units, who have hazardous duties and are killed in the performance of those duties.

Number eight: Authorizes the Legislature to provide an additional \$200 million in loans to students at institutions of higher education under Texas Opportunity Plan.

Number nine: This amendment would provide for annual sessions of the Texas Legislature.

LOCAL OFFICERS FOUND INNOCENT IN CIVIL RIGHTS TRIAL IN BEAUMONT

A five-woman, seven-man jury in Beaumont returned a verdict of innocent in a Federal District Court civil rights case against three highway patrolmen and a Woodville policeman July 7-11.

A Negro man-41 year old Leroy Barlow of Woodville, had charged the four violated his civil rights in that they beat him on January 20th, 1968.

Found innocent by the jury were Highway Patrolmen Edward L. Phillips, Joseph Gary Hennigan, and J. L. Willmon and Police officer Edward Daniel Sumrall.

Selection of a jury came Monday and witnesses were heard on Tuesday and Wednesday. Witnesses by the prosecution and defense came on these dates.

During this time, Barlow testified that he was hit 25 or 30 times by the four. A. L. Thornton of Woodville and his brother Charles Thornton of Humble, testified that they were returning from a "hog hunt" and were nearby when the arrest occurred. They said they witnessed the four officers beating Barlow and that Barlow didn't strike any of the officers. Barlow testified to that fact, too.

Ed Phillips testified that he did strike Barlow after he had

been struck. The other three officers testified that they didn't strike Barlow.

The final arguments came Thursday, July 10, before the jury and Judge John V. Singleton of Houston who occupied the bench of Judge Joe Fisher who excused himself.

In his final argument, the prosecution once again briefed the case for the jury. He was allowed the first of the arguments according to law with the defense presenting their arguments between the prosecution's two. Both prosecution and defense were allowed thirty minutes to place their arguments.

After prosecution, defense opened their statements with Monroe Clayton, assistant attorney general, making the opening statements on the defense opening statements on the defendants behalf. He noted in his remarks that peace officers were "hard to find, and these were an example of how hard it is to keep good officers." Clayton also related that theirs was "a hard job and an underpaid job, one that doesn't get many friends."

Then defense attorney Joe Tonahill of Jasper made the closing remarks for the defense. He stated that "there

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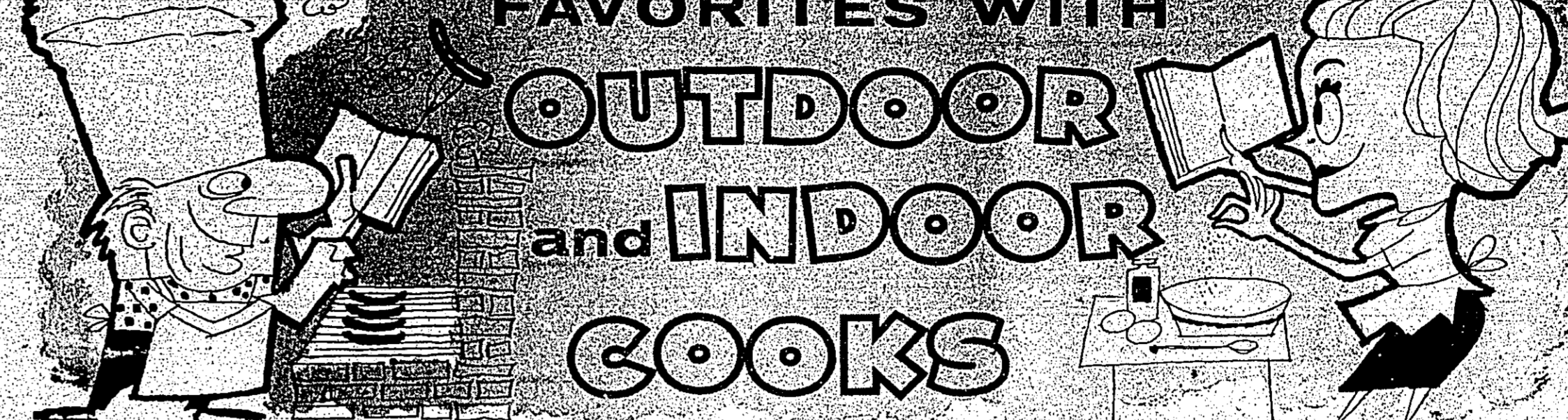

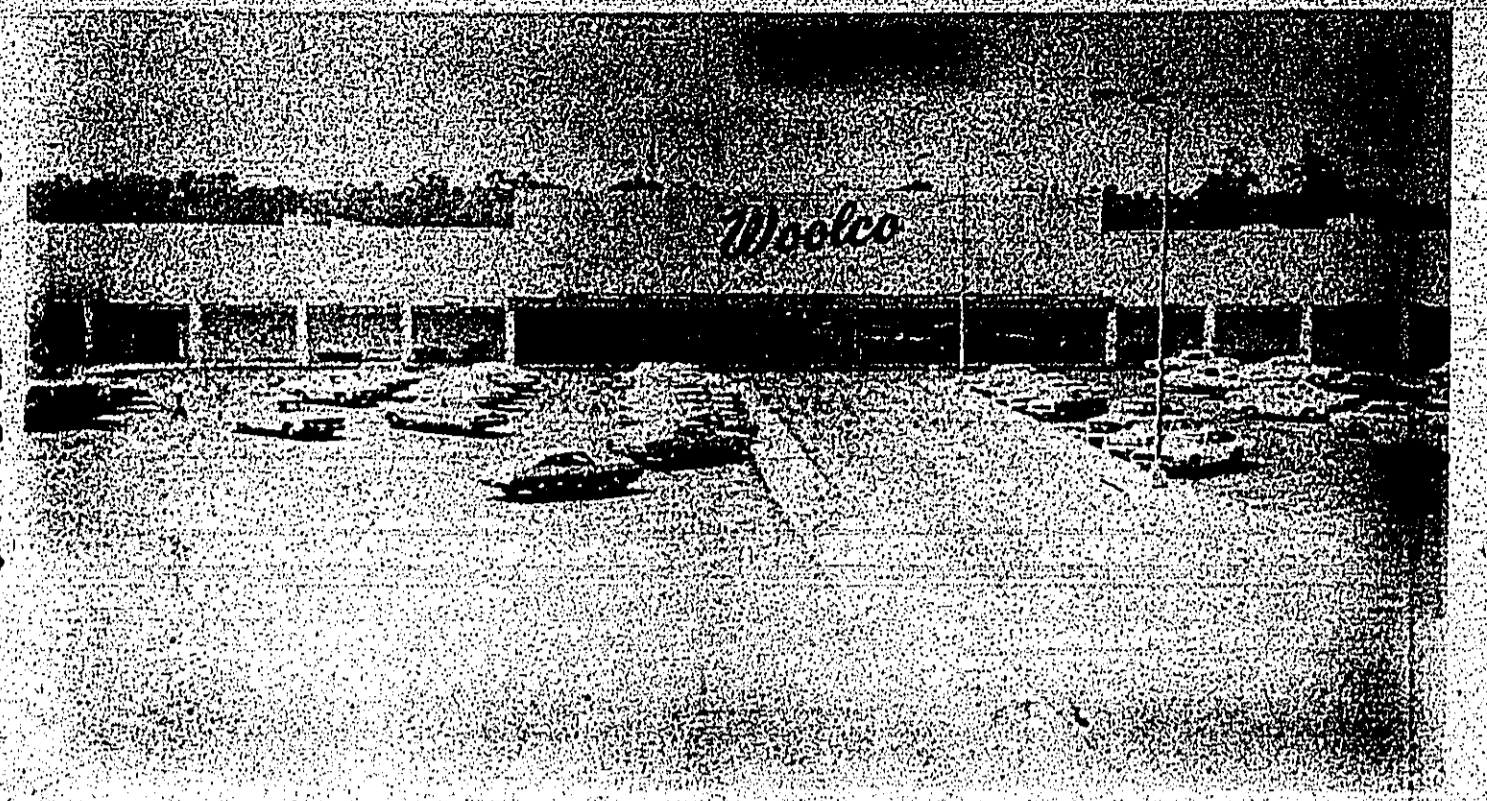

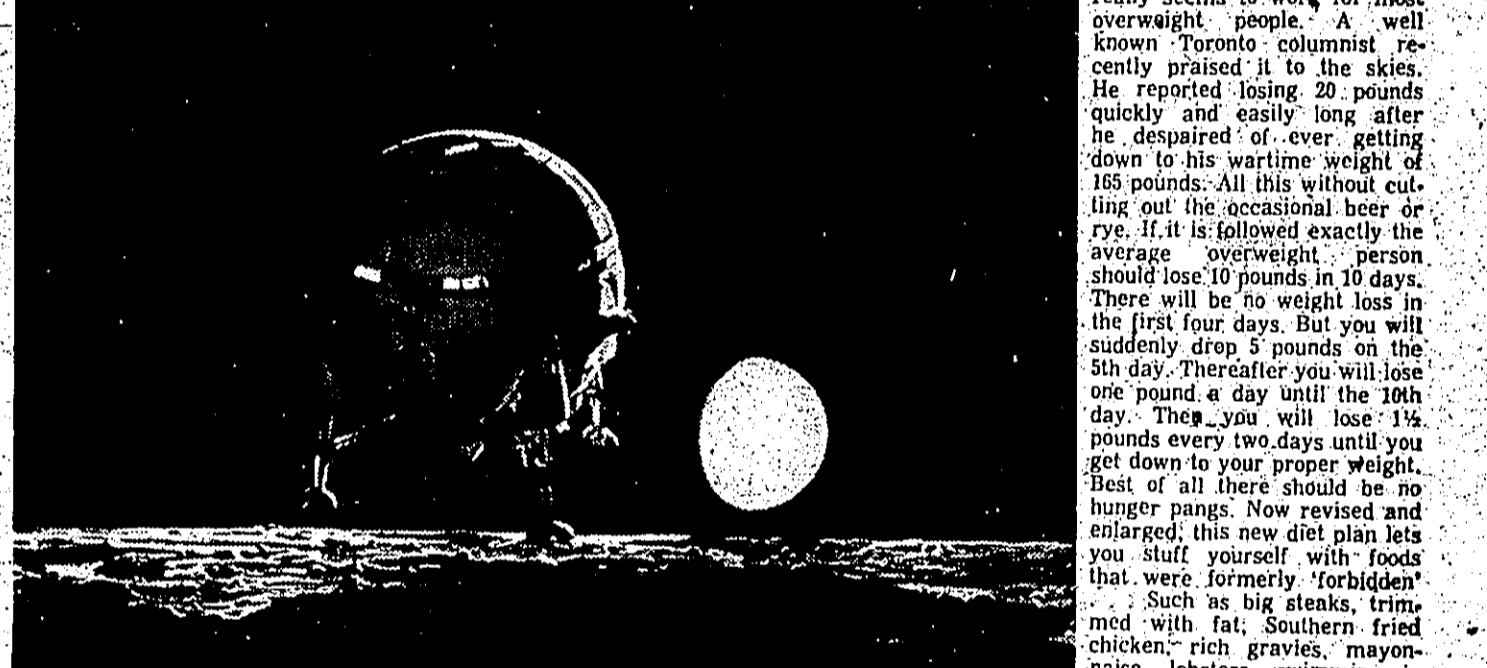

SHUTTLING PASSENGERS FROM SPACE STATION TO MOON



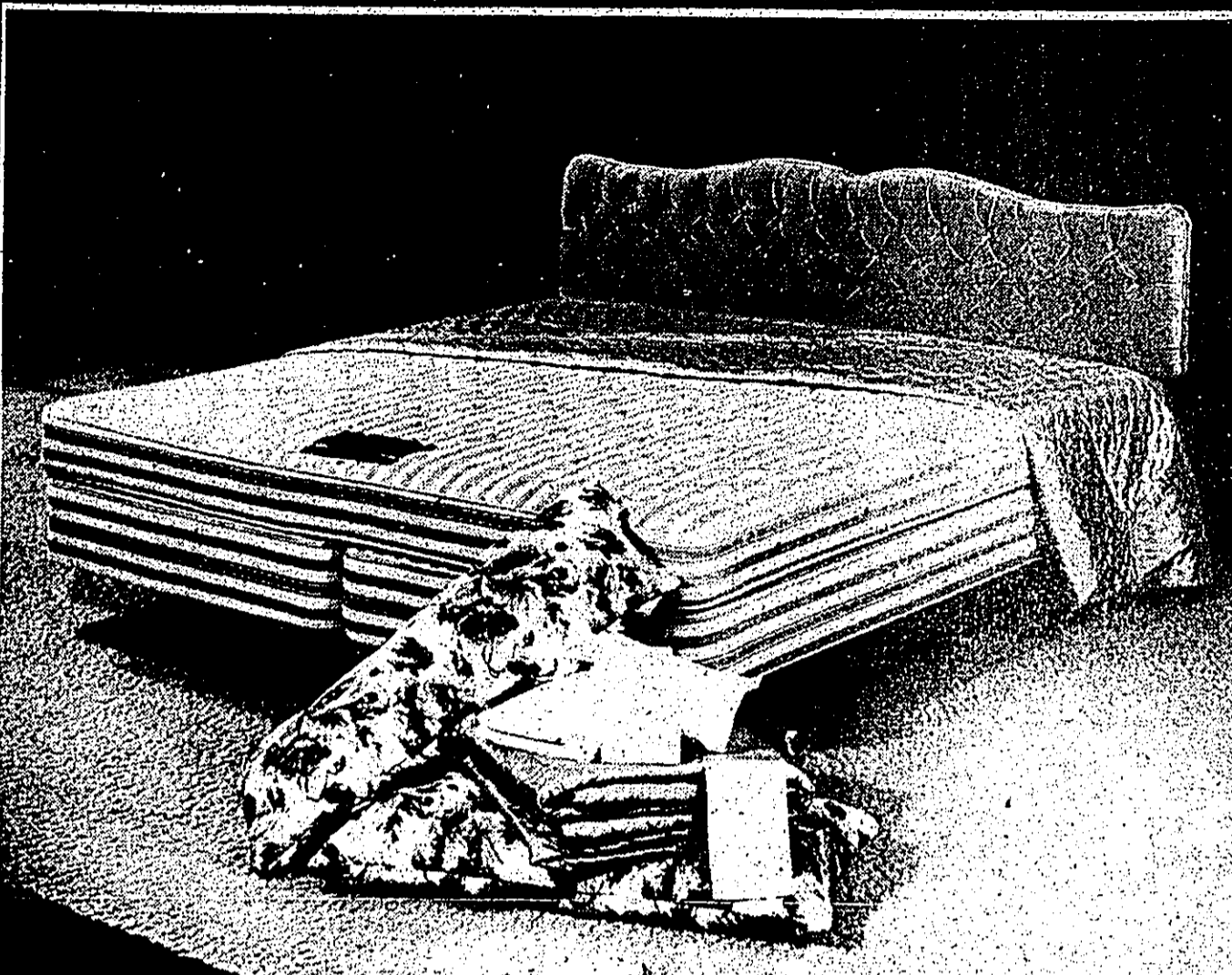

FOOD BUYING COURSE FOR HOMES

Having trouble making that food money stretch? Are you confused in today's supermarkets? If the answers to the above questions are yes or even may be, Mrs. Maurine J. Mooney, county home demonstration agent, has news that may interest you. The Tyler County Extension Service will conduct a free correspondence course in food buying for home food homemakers.

Some of the topics to be covered in the course are: How to plan your food spending wisely; menu planning; what, where, when and how to buy; how to evaluate convenience foods in food shopping; and how you are protected as a food consumer.

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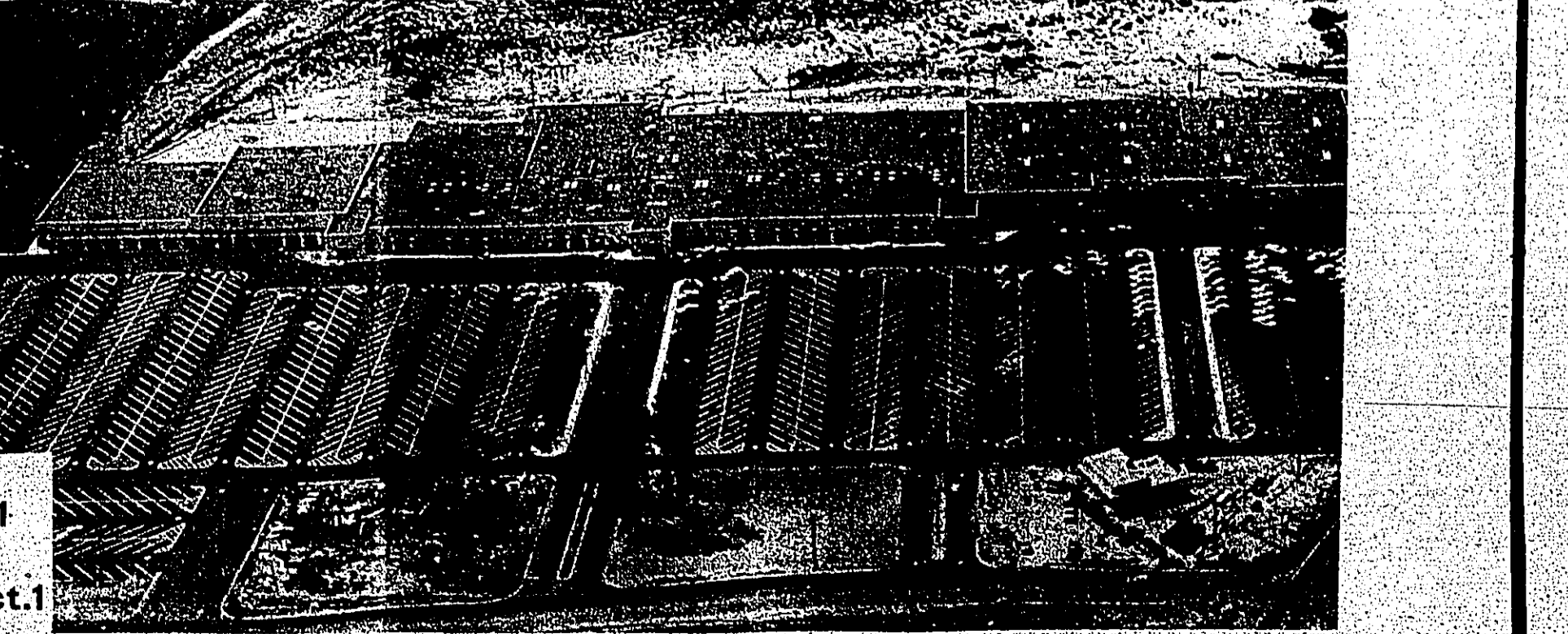

Thompson was the winning pitcher for the Dodgers and Kenneth Yafante was the loser.

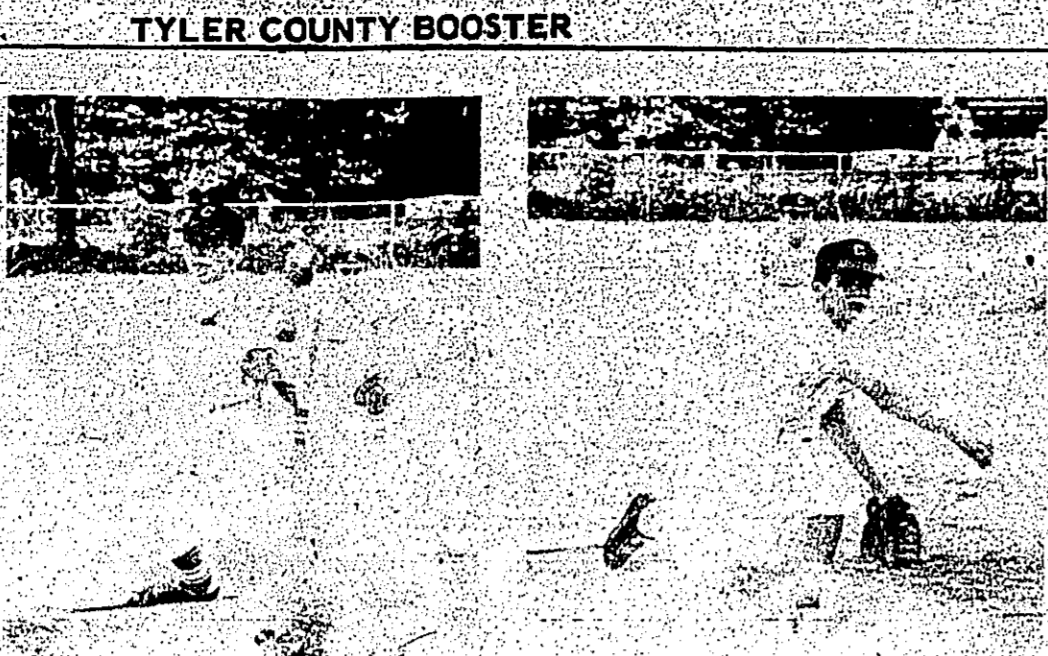

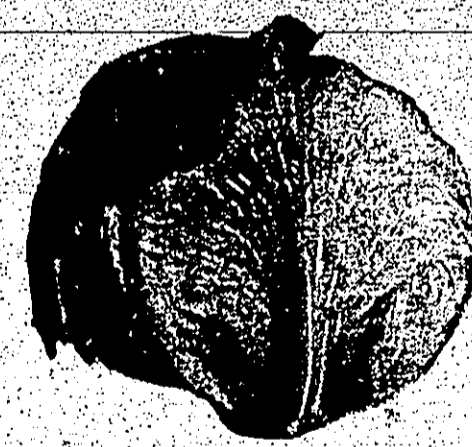
