## Ain't Gonna Rain No More?

Unless Tyler County gets some heavy rain during the next four days, August will go on record as one of the driest months in recent years.

The pluviometer at Texas Forest Service just south of Woodville has registered only 1.35 inches of rain so far this

month. July also was a dry month with less than three inches recorded.

August 22 is the wettest day so far with .80 inch being recorded on that date. Other recordable rainfall this month includes a mere .12 on August 12, while on August 17 a quarter of an inch was recorded. Au-

gust 19 just barely got on the record with .02 inch, while on August 23 the gauge measured .16 inch.

Of course, showers fell with varied intensity on the area. While some areas were getting a little moisture others did not get a sprinkle.

## Schools Start Fall Terms Tuesday

Back to the grind for over 3600 Tyler County students when their school districts begin classes for the 1969-70 term. Spurger began its school year Monday.

Registration of students in the Warren schools will take place Friday, beginning at 8:30 a.m., according to Jack B. Daniels, superintendent. Buses will operate on the same routes as last year and students will be returned home at noon. Classes will begin Tuesday.

Chester schools also will register students Friday, and

begin classes Tuesday. The registration of students in the Hillister schools will be completed Friday, with buses leaving regular routes. The Hillister schools will be open at noon Tuesday.

In Woodville, Superintendent McGuffey said that registration of school children will begin Friday. Junior high and elementary school pupils will report for registration and instruction Tuesday.

Tyler County schools had a total enrollment of 3009 during the last school year, and the enrollment this year is expected to be some higher in most districts.

## Social Security Pays \$184,000 Monthly In County

This month, with over 24 million Americans receiving \$2.5 billion a month in social security benefits and 20 million people insured by Medicare, the Social Security Administration will celebrate its 34th anniversary.

L. R. James, Social Security district manager in Lufkin, points out that the anniversary has special importance for some 2,600 Tyler County residents who are receiving monthly cash benefits under the program, with many also eligible for Medicare protection. The anniversary is being observed nationally with ceremonies and special displays in many social security offices throughout the country, as well as at the national headquarters in Woodlawn, Maryland, just outside of Baltimore. At the headquarters, an historical room is being opened this week showing mementos of the agency's history, including the desk used by all the heads of the Social Security system since 1935.

When President Franklin D. Roosevelt signed the Social Security Act into law on August 14, 1935, he called it "the cornerstone of a structure which is being built but is by no means complete."

"The original law," continued Mr. James, "provided for old-age benefits to retired workers in industry and commerce only. Over the years, the social security program has expanded so that it now provides financial protection for virtually everyone in the country."

The first benefits to retired workers were paid in 1940. By that time, amendments to the law had been passed to provide additional benefits for dependents and survivors of insured workers.

In 1950 and thereafter, coverage was extended to millions of other people who were not covered under the original law—farm workers, state and local government employees, domestic workers, ministers, self-employed doctors, profession-

als, and members of the Armed Forces.

In 1956, disability protection was added to cover the thousands of people who could no longer work because of serious illness or injury.

"In its first quarter of century," said James, "Social Security had already grown into a program that protected a worker and his family in the event of his retirement, death, or disability. But it didn't stop there."

In 1965, Congress created Medicare to help people 65 and older pay hospital, doctor and other medical bills. In just three short years, Medicare has covered 17 million hospital stays of elderly people. And there were more than one million admissions for skilled nursing home care. Older people have also received visits in their own homes from visiting nurses, physical therapists, and other health care specialists, paid for by Medicare. Payments under the hospital

insurance program totaled \$10.9 billion for the three-year period, and a total of \$4.6 billion has been paid under the medical insurance program, which helps pay for doctor bills and other medical services.

In 1967, still other changes were made. Disabled widows became eligible for benefits at age 50, people disabled before age 31 needed less work to qualify for benefits, and children became eligible on their mother's earnings record on the same basis as on their father's.

Through the years, increases in monthly benefit amounts were made to keep pace with the rising cost of living. Today's average monthly benefit to a retired worker is \$95, compared to \$63 ten years ago. The average benefit for a retired couple is \$168 a month, compared to \$111 ten years ago. "One out of every four beneficiaries are well below retirement age—young widows, children, and disabled workers and their de-

pendents," said James. The protection afforded American families in the event of a worker's death has a face value of \$60 billion in potential survivors benefits.

The latest available data, as of December, 1968, show 2,600 persons in Tyler County receiving regular payments at the rate of \$184,000 per month. "Of these, 725 were under the age of 60," James concluded, "illustrating clearly the fact that social security is not just a retirement program. It provides people of all ages assurance of basic income that they can receive with dignity since they have earned the right to it through their payments into the program."

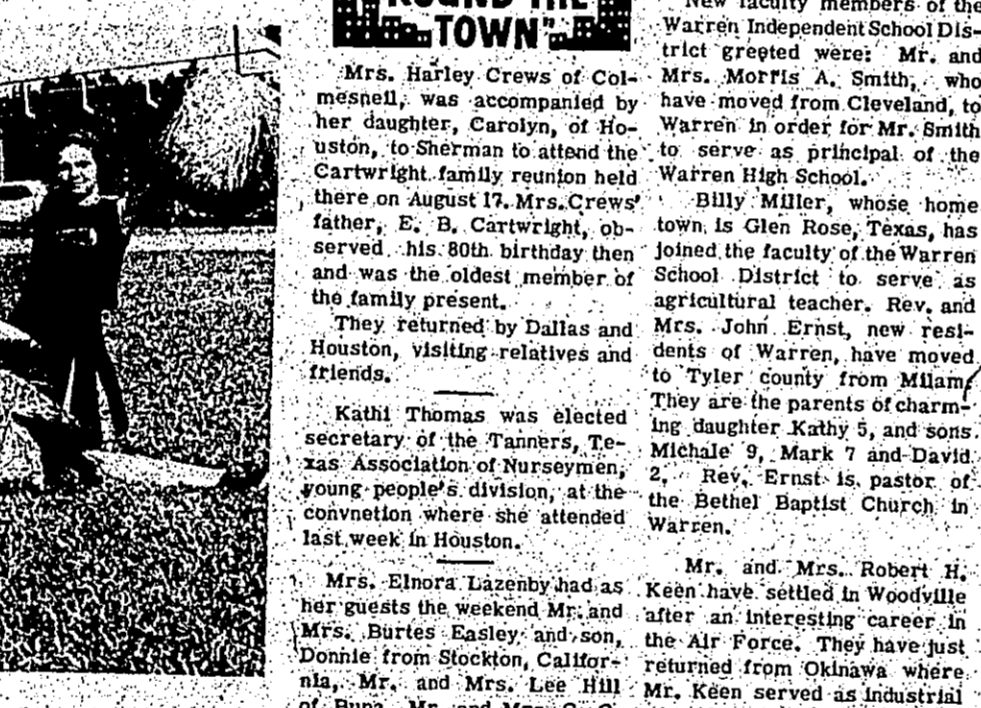
## Food Buying Course For "At-Homes" To Receive Degrees

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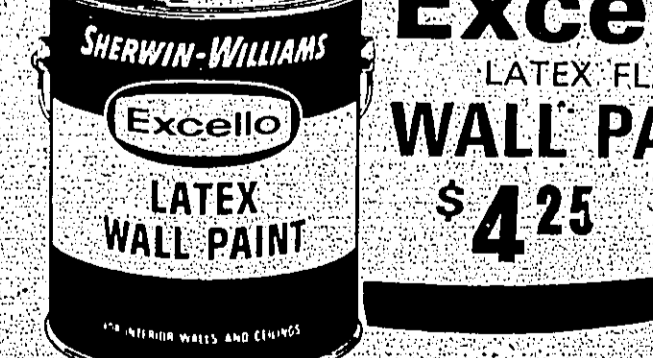

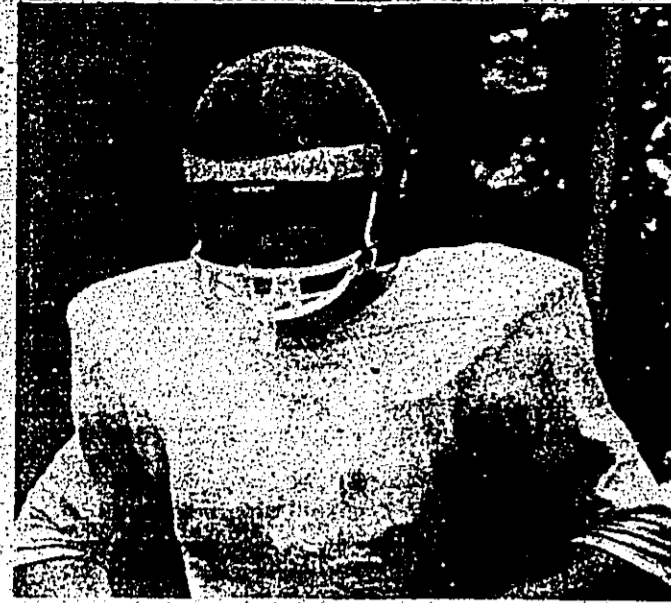

"KNOW IT ALL FISHERMEN" Did you ever notice how the fisherman who "knows it all" is usually the one with the fewest and smallest fish at the end of the day? It's also the guy who doesn't ask any questions, and probably wouldn't accept advice no matter how well-meaning it is.
