10. Be alert to give service. What counts most in life is what we do for others.

We might add a note to the above for the younger people. It is the story of the teenage son who thought his father was so stupid about everything. As he grew older, he was amazed at how much his father had learned in so few years.

And we might add that after some 40 years in the newspaper business we have found that the Ninth Commandment above is worthy of note. Most towns (and cities) have two or more factions who feel that their side to every question is the only correct one. The newspaper must try to be objective and give as nearly a true account as is possible. This usually satisfies neither faction. Newspaper people are like everyone else in that they do have their own opinions but must, in the ethics of the profession, keep them out of the news stories. We can write editorials (and columns) in which we express opinions.

## Chester Boy Is Now Bicycle Owner

Other boys and girls who are working to earn a bicycle are reminded that they have only until September 30 to finish selling 25, 30, or 35 subscriptions in order to earn the bike of their choice. Since school has started, selling time is at a premium with after school and Saturdays being the only time the boys and girls have to work. Persons who plan to subscribe at the old subscription price are urged to do so with the boy or girl of their neighborhood right away.

Several boys and girls have nearly enough subscriptions sold to earn bikes, and a number of boys and girls who have bicycles are working for the \$1.00 commission on each one-year subscription. This year's subscription has been very successful with the Booster circulation reaching an all-time high.

## School Board To Meet Monday

The board of trustees of the Woodville Independent School District will hold its regular monthly meeting Monday night in the school administration building on Kirby Drive. The meeting is scheduled to begin at 7:00 p.m.

The board held a special meeting Wednesday night of last week to which officers of the Tyler County Industrial Corporation were invited to discuss the property leased to Air-Control in 1959, and on which a tax moratorium was granted by the school board at that time. H. G. Sutton, president of the corporation, was present and called on Billy Mitchell, chamber of commerce president in 1959, to explain the details surrounding the acquisition of the property and circumstances of the tax moratorium.

Since Wednesday night was one of the few times a member of the Booster staff was not available to attend the meeting, a summary of the minutes of the called meeting, which will be approved at the regular meeting Monday, will be printed in next week's Booster.
