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## TOP OF THE MORNING

As we travel this vale of tears and triumphs we must look forward to tomorrow as we tread the paths of this day, but it is well to pause now and then to look backward. In retrospect we can view the paths we followed, yesterday and judge the progress we have made.

In the yonder when we first came to Woodville one of the annoying problems at the Booster office was to keep the machinery protected from the clouds of dust raised by automobiles rounding the corner of Charlton and Holly streets. Yes, it was an unpaved, sandy trail from the courthouse square to the Booster office.

And the late Joe Ramsey told us that when he moved here a few years before us that one of the problems of that day was the impassable and that, in rainy weather, made Bluff Street almost off-limits to automobiles of that day.

Our first meal in Woodville was eaten at the old Star Cafe which was located on what is now an empty lot between Smyly's Jewelry and Southeast Texas Savings and Loan. We almost wrote located between the frame building on the corner and the Palace Barber Shop. Anyway, as you entered it was necessary to maneuver just so in order to keep water which dripped from the fan above the door from hitting your face or cascading down your collar.

That water-cooled fan was the nearest thing to air conditioning we had in Woodville.

In the frame building on the corner was Lindsey's Dry Goods. Then the Star Cafe, the Barclay-Nellius building which then housed the barber shop and now is the home of the savings and loan. Next to it was the Citizens State Bank in the building now occupied by the school tax office and Globe-Human Insurance. These were the only two brick buildings on the block. There was a frame building just east of the bank in which the late Dr. P. Rock had his law office, and on down was J. O. Best's service station.

There were other differences too. Where the Mobil station now is located stood the old two-story Eden place. In the next block south was an old wood building in which A. & M. Motor, and Williams Electric. The Gulf station next door was an old frame building, too. Where Jarrott's is located today was Baker Motor Company, the Ford dealer.

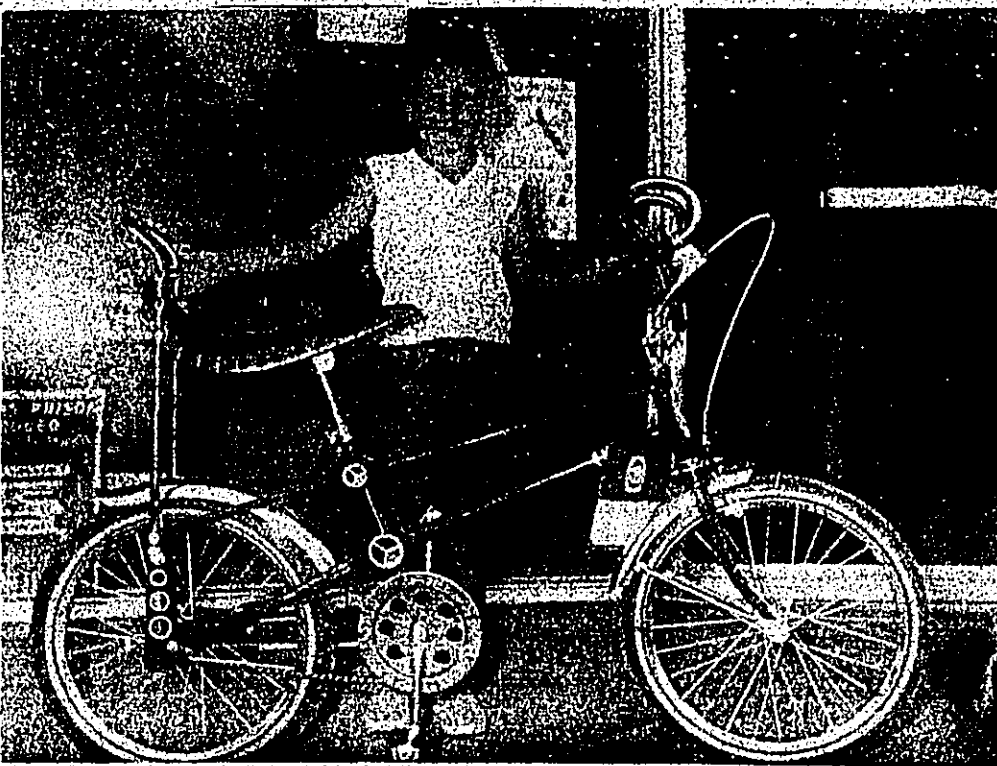
Well, we won't go on. Progress changes the face of a town, and today we can look upon brick buildings standing where once grass grew on vacant lots. Such as the First Baptist Church, the Methodist Church, the Booster building, even part of J. B. Best and Company's present building. There was a pecan orchard where the hospital is, and Mary Riley Hudson was just beginning to sell lots north of the orchard.

The census taker said there were 1800 persons, more or less, in Woodville in 1950. Today there are at least twice that many. Where there were only a handful of fine brick homes then today they are myriad.

Now that is not sensational growth. But the town has progressed. The man who came day before yesterday sees only today's landscape. He has no awareness of the bricks, so to speak, that have been laboriously laid by solid citizens through the years. The men who toiled to make a living also had some time to devote to their town. Often the tools with which they worked were few and the materials hard to come by.

They performed no miracle. But they did build a pretty good little town. Instead of knocking some bricks loose, perhaps it would be better to look around and see what can be added to it. It doesn't take a great deal of talent to qualify as a sidewalk superintendent.

## School Board Meets Monday

The board of trustees of the Woodville Independent School District held its regular monthly meeting Monday night which proved to be the shortest in several months. Mostly routine school matters were discussed.

On a motion by Richard Galbreth, the board voted to invest \$2,000 out of the sinking fund in 60 days certificates of deposit and voted to send Mr. Galbreth as a delegate to the meeting of the Texas Association of School Boards which meets in Austin Sunday and Monday.

Supt. B. H. McGuire reported that delinquent tax collections have totaled about \$17,000 or about 50 percent following efforts to make collections started last month.

## \$10,000 Damages Awarded By Jury In District Court Friday

A jury in 86th District Court awarded the plaintiff, Robert Keith Moore, a total of \$10,000 in damages as the result of a fatal motor mishap on FM 92 near Fred which occurred last year.

The jury made a \$5,000 award in the death of Moore's wife and \$5,000 to him for injuries as the result of the accident. The other \$600 was for loss of earnings due to the accident.

Driver of the other car, Darrell Moore, a cousin to the plaintiff, was defendant in the case. The jury also awarded him \$1,000 compensation for injuries to him and his wife and \$600 for loss of earnings.

The insurance company involved in the suit has not indicated whether it will appeal the case.

The judgment has not been entered by Judge H. A. Cox, who presided at the trial.

Four civil suits were settled without trial Tuesday of this week, and the final week of civil cases for this session will begin next Tuesday.

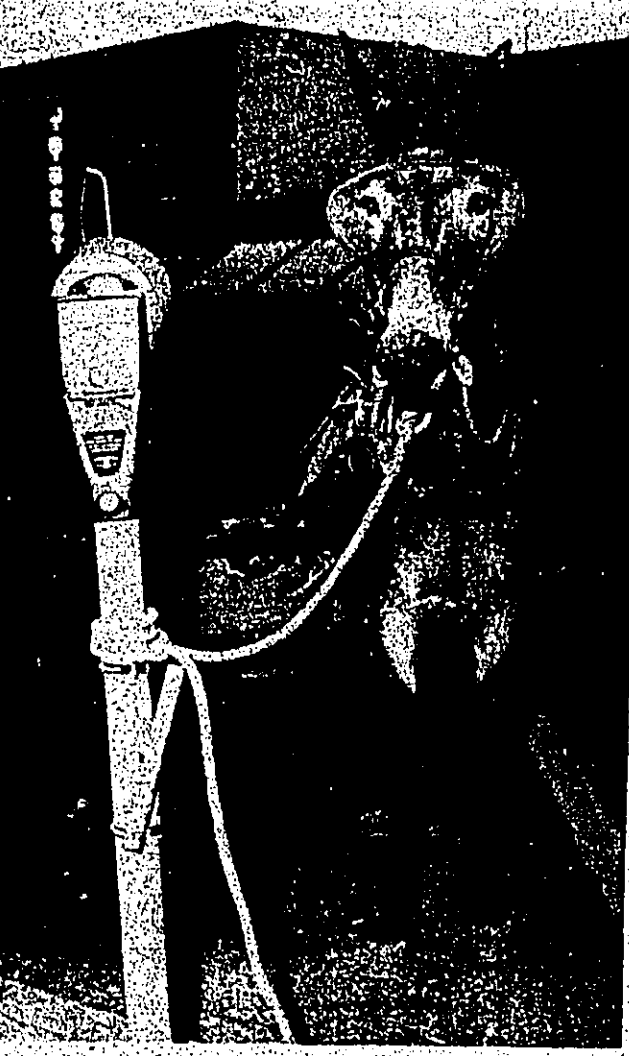
## HOME SOUGHT FOR FOUR PUPS

## SCHOOLS ENROLLMENTS UP

Total enrollment in the Woodville Independent School District as of Friday, September 12, was 1,642 students, according to Supt. B. H. McGuire. This is 66 more pupils than were enrolled in the same period last school year.

Broken down into classes, enrollment is 123 in the first grade, 141 in the second, 116 in the third, 138 in the fourth, 152 in the fifth, 115 in the sixth, 165 in the seventh, and 171 in the eighth.

Ninth grade enrollment is 143, tenth 126, eleventh 126 and twelfth 95. There are 31 enrolled in special education classes.

Approximately 40 more students are enrolled in the schools of the Warren Independent School District than at the com-

# America Still Is...

## ONE WOMAN'S OPINION By Mrs. Ethel O. Hill

America is as close to Mexico, on each side of the Rio Grande as it is to the Atlantic Ocean, at each end of the same city block. And personally the most pleasant weeks of this past summer were those spent exploring certain small towns or beauty spots across the border. Though the friends I was visiting in Harlingen had planned a trip to Mexico City during Labor Day holidays, the heat of the trip was, in my opinion, too much for them. They planned, however, to visit to

smaller, less publicized places. On any trip we make in the three weeks, I always regretted that I could not be traveling in my own pickup truck, so that I might load up some of the curios, antiques, odd rocks and beautiful plants. But of course there are still many rocks, plants and antiques in Texas that I would like to acquire.

And certainly there was plenty to see and do, and wish for in the beautiful cotton and fruit dotted Rio Grande valley, rimmed around for miles with stately 100 foot palms, embroidered along the bottom, as it were, with the unique variety of trees, countless other varieties all brightly decorated with the brilliant biogenetic blossoms along city streets, narrow highways and far out along the highways. I think that no where else in Texas is there a section where all the little towns between Harlingen and the border seem to be standing in friendly lines holding hands and cheering the highway traveler.

I think that my family had some odd idea that I was going to the valley to rest and get away from it all. Instead the friendly people swept me into the circle of their activities from the time of my arrival. An entire family greeted me as I

stepped off the big jet. I was going from here to Granddaddy's birthday party. The next day, Sunday, I was asked to be a guest, and speak to a youth conference group, about forty lively and inspirational young folks, working and planning towards useful, helpful lives. A few mini-skirts and youthful sideburns had no damaging effect on their earnest plans. The Harlingen council of Garden Clubs asked me to be guest speaker at their first-of-the-season meeting, to make up for having had to postpone their last spring. As the suggested subject was the Big Thicket, I was delighted, and at this and other meetings, and two local TV programs, I found that a deep interest in our Big Thicket park efforts had spread far and wide, and don't think I lost any time exploring our Dogwood Festival and the beauty of dogwood trees in East Texas.

Garden Clubs are planning a tour of our area during the festival and to take the historical tours. They were quite enthused with the idea, and I had some literature to back up my brag.

One day at Padre Island was disappointing as it rained all day, and I found almost no shells. Much less any signs of the Snappers, treasure, so I guess Jerry Sailer has it safely stashed away. And that marvelous place, the big market of Matamoros, Mexico is no more, and has been replaced by a new one some months ago. But they are planning to rebuild. My dog, entranced when

we visited a small, but richly supplied small museum in Matamoros, the Stillman Museum. The objects of art, the furniture and the memorabilia of the earliest valley settlement there was an historical treat. One gold-framed, 300 pound mirror was brought by early immigrants in 1860; without a scratch or a nick or the slightest blemish. The enclosed garden with various exotic fruits, shrubs and flowers, was like a small garden of Eden. And the elderly Mexican care-taker, beamed with pride and politeness, was a very evident love of every artificial or item in the whole place.

The entire Rio Grande valley is becoming more and more a cotton and grain country, though there is still plenty of citrus fruit raised. Of the many sides crops the most interesting to me, is the also, very, that marvelous, world-famous medicinal plant, known and used before the time of Christ. Many of the plants in the garden of Eden. Aboriginal tribes, earliest Indians and pioneers used it. But only of late years has it become widespread. I saw the thick, fleshy leaves being hand-harvested, ready to be put into refrigerated vans, to be taken to medical centers where it is processed into various potions, ointments, creams, etc. I figured with several people who say that it has relieved, or entirely cured, long-standing cases of arthritis and skin ailments. The plant has been discovered growing in our own Big Thicket, but not prolifically. So the valley

has not got much that East Texas has not got. And we have many medicinal plants that they do not have.

Some of this I hope to prove when I have an exhibit at our state federated Women's Clubs, board of directors meeting in Austin early in October. Mrs. Edna Jague and myself are to decorate the tables and will have the Big Thicket for such things as mammoth pine cones, curious pine knots, beautiful vines and leaves, native, fall fruits, and medicinal plants in season. I am going to display the enormous hornets' nest that Curt Trautman cured for me last year, with black bears, bob cats, rattlesnakes and butterflies. As the theme of the meeting is "Preservation of the Big Thicket" we must show them what we have. The speaker's tables to be decorated entirely in dogwood blooms, and as our Mrs. Wright and Mrs. Allison have charge of that, it is bound to be done up right. I wish we could have had all this interest forty years ago. The Big Thicket would already have been saved and a national park really.

Many a tree is found in the wood. And every tree of it's kind is good. Some for the strength of the gnarled roots, other for the sweetness of flowers and fruits, and some for a shelter against the storm. And some to keep the hearthstone warm.
