Things get pretty dull in a small town sometimes and often we strain to get a main headline for the paper. "Seldom do we get to run a banner in big bold type."

Even the little humorous things are hard to come by. We don't have the politics prevalent in Hardin and Jefferson Counties, just to name two, with which to fill our news columns or about which we can editorialize.

Of course it's fun to sit on the sidelines way up here and watch the plucky ploughs of the bigger boys. Such as the uncouth in Beaumont who pointed his finger (probably for emphasis) and the mayor snapping "Don't shake your finger at me." Television brings us inside the meeting halls so that we may view the frenetic antics cum grants salts.

Now we don't mean to imply that there are no differences of opinion in our own political arenas. But they are usually played in low key and responsibly presented without uncouth demagoguery. There are a number of things that we, on occasion, could get steamed up about to the point of wanting to shake our finger in someone's face. Such as that you do, too. But usually we settle such differences over a cup of coffee, as most of our readers do.

Responsible citizenship is practiced by, we guess, 90 percent of the American people. The ones who do not, the rioters, looters, sit-liners, and plain bums make all the noise and get the attention.

A speaker recently pointed out that we are paying attention to the wrong people. While 3,000 students were trying to take over a university, about four million were going about their business of trying to get an education at colleges and universities across the land. They were not making any noise and we didn't hear them. That's a pity, for they are the ones to whom we should give our attention.

Last week we were recalling the improvements and growth in Woodville over the past quarter century as we viewed it. Perhaps we should now mention that the other communities in Tyler County have made similar strides in progress toward better places in which to live. Colmesneil, Chester, and Warren have taken on new looks, as well as the other towns. And the community has greatly benefited from the Farm-to-Market roads which have been constructed. We remember when Spurger was reached over sandy country roads while today there are at least two good roads crossing there.

DPS Needs Men

For Highway Patrol

Colonel Wilson E. Spillman, Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety announced recently that the DPS is actively recruiting men to train for the post of patrolman.

The State Legislature, in the recently passed budget bill, appropriated \$1,000,000 to the Department to increase the strength of the Highway Patrol from 1,222 to 1,259 men. Those selected to enter training will be selected from those individuals certified by the state as eligible for DPS services.

Spillman said the next training school will begin October 31 at the DPS Law Enforcement Academy in Austin. This course lasts 18 weeks and includes some 800 hours of intensive classroom work and supervised study.

MINUTES OF

BOARD MEETING

Minutes of the September 3 special meeting of the Woodville Independent School District board of trustees, held at the school board room, are reproduced here together with a story concerning the meeting which appeared in the Beaumont Enterprise on September 6. Also enclosed in the minutes is a letter addressed to the Letters column which will be published in full to protect the identity of the writer.

(From the Beaumont Enterprise)  
September 6, 1969

WOODVILLE (S.P.B.) — The Woodville Independent School District board of trustees met yesterday at 7 p.m., with officers of Tyler County Industrial Corp. in attendance. The sole purpose of the meeting was to consider the tax-exempt status of the buildings occupied by Air Control Products Corp.

After due discussion by the Board of Trustees and the representatives from the Tyler County Industrial Corporation, P. M. Archer moved that the school district continue to honor the tax moratorium granted by the Board of Trustees of 1959-1960 to the Tyler County Industrial Corporation. The motion was seconded by J. W. Gainey.

R. C. Galbreth moved that the above motion be tabled. The motion to table was seconded by Dr. R. E. Swearingen. After further discussion by the Board of Trustees, a vote was taken on the motion to table and all members voted against tabling the motion with the exception of R. C. Galbreth, who voted for his motion.

In the spring of 1959 a non-profit corporation known as the Tyler County Industrial Development Corp. was formed to look for industrial business in Tyler County for the purpose of increased job offerings.

In September 1959, the Tyler County Industrial Development Corp. was reorganized as the Tyler County Industrial Corp., a profit-making organization, for the purpose of negotiating with an industry known as Air Control Wind Corp. to locate in Tyler County.

interested people, and

20 stockholders with \$10,300 of capital stock organized R. A. Mann provided 15 acres in Woodville for 22 stockholders, another 15 acres were acquired.

The industry provides an average of 300 jobs. Payments for the building as noted in the deed of trust were with Franklin and Son, Inc. of Dallas with impenetrable rotted paid by
