TOP OF THE MORNING

Things get pretty dull in a small town sometimes and often we strain to get a main headline for the paper. Seldom do we get to run a banner in big bold type.

Even the little humorous things are hard to come by. We don't have the politics prevalent in Hardin and Jefferson Counties, just to name two, with which to fill our news columns or about which we can editorialize.

Of course it's fun to sit on the sidelines way up here and watch the play-by-play of the bigger boys. Such as the councilman in Beaumont who pointed his finger (probably for emphasis) and the mayor snapping "Don't shake your finger at me." Television brings us inside the meeting halls so that we may view the frenetic antics our grants salute.

Now we don't mean to imply that there are no differences of opinion in our own political arenas. But they are usually played in low key and responsibly presented without four-trout demagoguery. There are a number of things that we, on occasion, could get steamed up about to the point of wanting to shake our finger in someone's face. We are sure that you do, too. But usually we settle such differences over a cup of coffee, as most of our readers do.

Responsible citizenship is practiced by, we guess, 90 percent of the American people. The ones who do not, the rioters, looters, sit-inners, and plain bums make all the noise and get the attention.

A speaker recently pointed out that we are paying attention to the wrong people. While 3,000 students were trying to take over a university, about four million were going about their business of trying to get an education at colleges and universities across the land. They were not making any noise and we didn't hear them. That's a pity, for they are the ones to whom we should give our attention.

Last week we were recalling the improvements and growth in Woodville over the past quarter century as we viewed it. Perhaps we should now mention that the other communities in Tyler County have made similar strides in progress toward better places in which to live. Colmesneil, Chester and Warren have taken on new looks, as well as the other towns. And the county has greatly benefited from the Farm-to-Market roads which have been constructed. We remember when Spurger was reached over sandy country roads while today there are at least two good roads crossing there.

BOOSTER EARN A BIKE CAMPAIGN IS TO RUN THROUGH OCTOBER

The Booster's earn a bike subscription campaign has been extended through the month of November in order to give the large number of boys and girls now selling subscriptions to complete their efforts to earn a bicycle.

A good many boys and girls have sold nearly enough subscriptions to earn bicycles but they have less time to devote to securing subscribers. To give them the opportunity to earn bicycles the campaign will continue through October.

So far 15 boys and girls have earned bikes, two have sold enough but decided to take commissions instead. One of these was a boy whose mother decided he was too young for a bicycle and the other, a girl, wants to apply her commissions on a pony.

Boys and girls who have not started to sell subscriptions but who want to start now have plenty of time in which to earn bicycles.

Three bicycle models may be earned. One is a regular bike for selling 25 subscriptions, another is a buzz bike which may be earned with 30 subscriptions, and another is a super-charger buzz bike which may be earned with 35 subscriptions.

The increase in Booster subscription rates, originally scheduled to be effective October 1, will not go into effect until November. They will remain at \$2.50 for subscribers in the county, \$3.00 for subscribers in Texas, and \$3.50 for subscribers outside Texas in the United States including FPO and APO addresses.

Three Historical Sites To Be Dedicated

The dedication of three Tyler County historical markers has been set for Saturday, October 4, beginning with Fort Teran at 9:30 a.m., Erbe Mill at 10:30, and the marker for the Woodville Academy located on the north side of the courthouse square in Woodville at 11:30.

Following the ceremonies a buffet luncheon will be served at the Woodville Inn. Everyone is invited to attend.

Fort Teran was named an historical site by the Texas Centennial Committee in 1936, 101 years after closing of the fort.

The mill was operated by members of the Erbe family,

and is located a few miles west of Colmesneil.

The Woodville Academy was organized in 1849 in the new county courthouse and offered advanced courses of study. Some of the subjects were astronomy, orthography (spelling), surveying and logic. In 1850 the school was moved 1500 feet southeast. It was old in 1856.

That same year the town of Woodville and Woodville College were chartered. The school in the old Masonic Lodge closed after a few years.
