In condescendingly engendered estasy the great city has drifted apart from the rest of the country. Not only drifted apart—the New York press (with one or two exceptions) finds more wrong with the United States than do the communist countries. So far as Washington is concerned it has become the natural enemy pounced upon daily by New York publications and politicians.

Now it is no sin to find fault with your own country. But it is something else when the detractors, for the most part, cannot see the other hand find some fault with those who have sworn to eradicate us from the face of the earth.

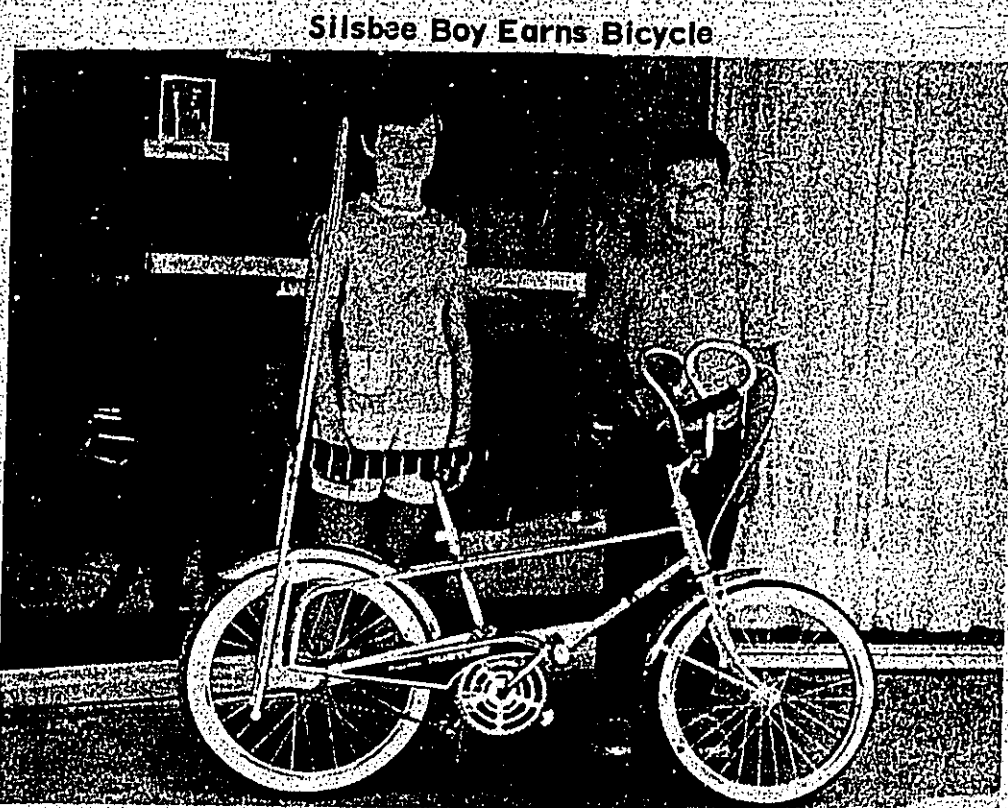
The great news media, The New York Times, prides itself on printing "All the News Fit to Print." Between the lines and on the editorial page are insidious insinuations and startling partiality to those who would not defend the country.

The Times proudly took credit for Castro in Cuba and has not unashamedly admitted the error of its ways. In pre-Red China days, the Times could see the Chinese Reds as nothing but agrarian reformers. Sadly, the first thing a despotic government puts out of business is the free press including both the printed word and the spoken word. The Times could never operate in Moscow, or Peking, or Hanoi. The fact that it prints all the news it sees fit is evidence enough that this country can't be as bad as it is sometimes depicted by some journals.

The most intensely patriotic Americans of all those who have come here to escape totalitarianism. Even the daughter of the late dictator Stalin finds the United States a place of freedom and liberty—and she wants to become a part of it. Those who hadmouth the United States at every opportunity

Announcement was made this week that a proposal to merge the Sabine Area Council and the Trinity-Neches Council, Boy Scouts of America, will be made to forthcoming executive board meetings of each council. This announcement was issued jointly by Charles B. Draper, president of the Sabine Area Council, and Alex Broussard, president of the Trinity-Neches Council.

Council. They indicated that the proposal to merge was the unanimous recommendation of the Intra-Council Study Committee which was formed this spring for the purpose of studying the feasibility of a merger.

The merger proposal will come before the Trinity-Neches Council executive board on October 7th and the Sabine Area Council executive board on October 10th. If approved, it would then be presented to the Sabine Area Council at their annual meeting on November 20 and to the Trinity-Neches Council annual meeting on December 9th.

Draper and Broussard indicated that the Study Committee had examined the merger question from every possible angle, and it was the committee's feeling that the merger of these two councils would improve greatly the extension of Scouting to more boys and would provide much better service to those institutions who are already sponsoring the Scouting program.

The Sabine Area Council now includes Orange county and all of Jefferson county, except Beaumont. The Trinity-Neches Council serves Beaumont, in Jefferson county, High Island in Galveston county, and the counties of Chambers, Liberty, Hardin, San Jacinto, Polk, Tyler, Jasper, Newton, Sabine, and San Augustine.

Adams, Wilson To Speak At Historical Site Dedications

Pollution Is Topic At RC And D Meet In Liberty

Chairman Billy Edwards of Stowell, Texas, presided at the Directors of the Southeast Texas RC&D regular meeting in Liberty. Featured at the meeting was an explanation of the Proposed Texas Water Plan by Paul T. Gillett, with the Texas Water Development Board in Austin and explanation of the Air Control laws by Cecil Bradford, with the Texas Air Control Board in Austin.

Bobby Roberts, Mayor pro tem, welcomed the directors and guests to Liberty. Bradford stated that air pollution is caused by five categories of activity: power plants, space heating, refuse disposal, industry and transportation. It was pointed out that burning of agricultural waste contributes a small amount to air pollution. All but six of the States now have Clean Air Legislation. Most of the major cities in Texas have Clean Air Programs in operation.

Texas Air Control Board has established six regions. In Texas, four of these are now staffed. The engineer located at Tyler, Texas Regional Office will serve a major portion of the Southeast Texas RC&D project.

Paul Gillett stated that he was sure the majority of the people who voted against Amendment 2 in the recent election did not properly understand the Amendment. He said that by the year 2020, Texas would need 32 million acre feet of water. Texas will be able to furnish 20 million acre feet of water from all sources, therefore we will need to look outside of Texas for 12 million acre feet. Gillett reminded the group that this was a plan with many parts and is like any other undertaking of this magnitude in that changes will become necessary.

Gillett said that Texas must have a water plan that will fit into the overall water plan for the nation. We must be able to set down our neighborhood States and bargain. He stated that it was not the intent of Amendment 2 to authorize the State Water Development Board to spend \$ 1/4 billion dollars in the near future. This amount is what will be needed to accomplish the water needs by 2020. Before money for any of the many phases of the Water Plan is authorized, it must be passed by two-thirds majority vote of both houses.

Don Staples, RC&D Forester with Texas Forest Service, gave a report on Texas Forest Service activities this past year; Don asked the directors of Southeast Texas RC&D to co-sponsor with Texas Forest Service, the Governor's Conference on Fire Prevention to be held at Beaumont, Texas on October 30. The directors were unanimous in their desire to co-sponsor this conference.

Jim Stribling and Carson Watt, with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, gave a report on recreation in the Southeast Texas RC&D project.

Chairman Edwards told the directors that Texas needs to appropriate \$500,000 per year for the next six years to match Federal funds to eradicate the Imported Fire Ant. A meeting held recently in Montgomery, Alabama, by the southeast states that have the fire ant problem, requested Texas to join them in appropriating the needed funds to eradicate these ants.

Troy Berry, project coordinator, presented a slide talk, showing accomplishments of Southeast Texas RC&D Project the past year.

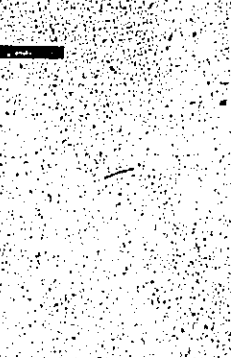
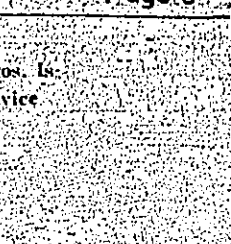

Salvation Army Kicks Off Financial Campaign in County

The 1969 financial campaign for The Salvation Army in Tyler county began on Tuesday morning, September 30, at 7:00 a.m.

Mrs. Janie Boykin, teacher of Special Education at the Woodville Primary School, is this year's campaign chairman. The work of the local service unit is to provide relief in emergency situations. Two boys from Woodville were sent to the Salvation Army's Camp Habitacion in the past summer. These boys went free of charge and the local Service Unit took care of transportation to and from camp.

During the past year, 46 families were provided with groceries through the local service unit. One person received medical aid and another received medicine through the help of this unit. Aid was also given to transient traffic and 11 families were given groceries or a meal. 14 people were helped with transportation and 10 were provided lodging for the night.

The local service unit committee is able to make its own decisions, while avoiding duplication of services of other existing agencies. One-third of the money which is given locally will remain with the service unit to meet the expenses of local welfare, without regard to the client's race, creed or color. The other two-thirds which is sent to Dallas headquarters is available upon request or in an emergency art. case.

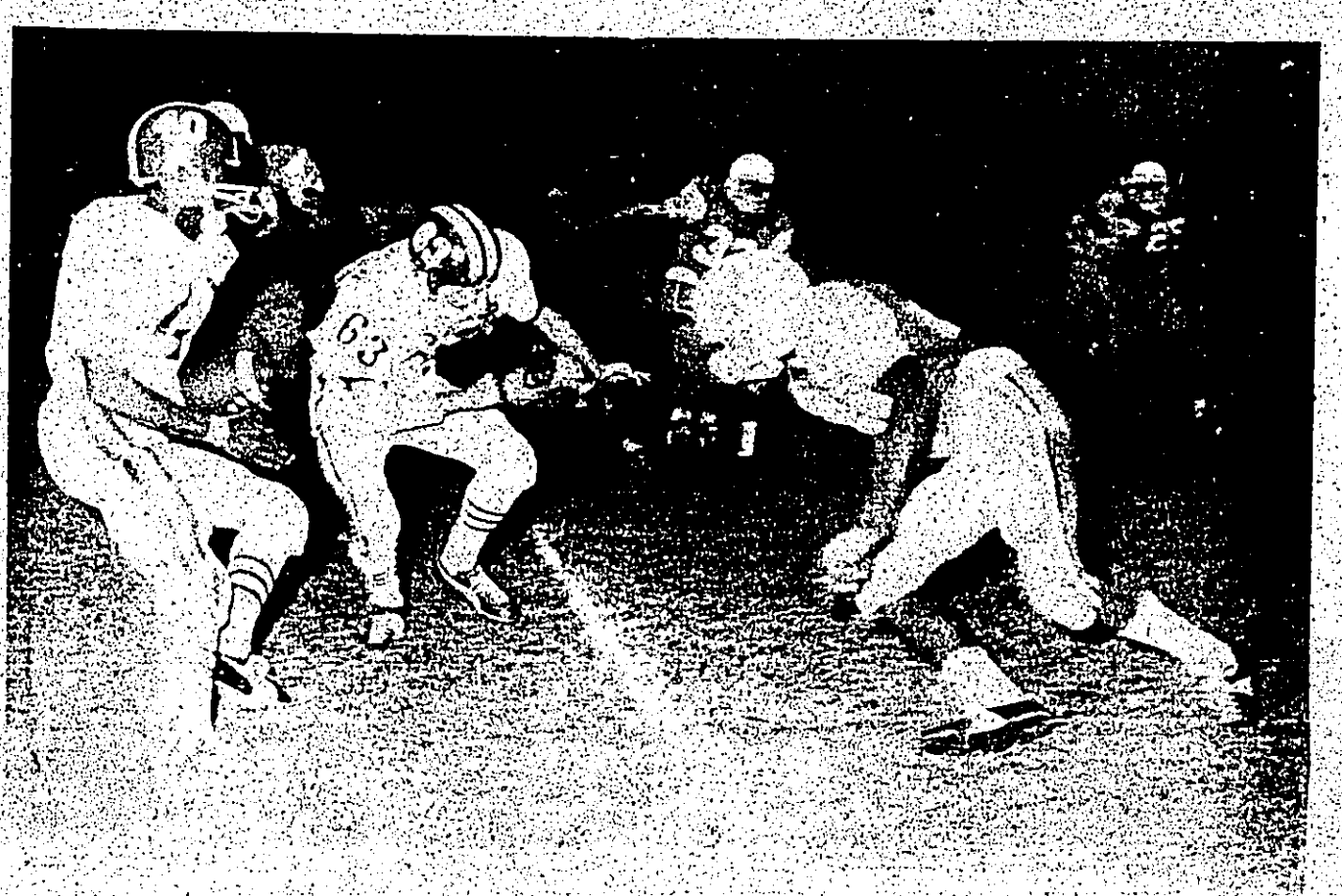
