All Voters Must Register To Vote In 1970 Elections

Registration of voters for the 1970 elections began October 1 and will continue through January 31, 1970. Tax Assessor Tom Sawyer reminded Tyler Countyans this week.

Mr. Sawyer urged voters to register early this year, since each voter must fill out an application before his registration certificate can be issued (an application is printed in this issue).

Mr. Sawyer said that application blanks will be available at his office in Woodville, school tax offices in Woodville and Warren, and at various business places in the county. Any business place at which application blanks have not been left are asked to contact Mr. Sawyer if they wish to pass them out to customers who desire them.

This year the general rule is that no one can vote who has not registered, according to Secretary of State Martin Dies, Jr. A former exemption from registration for persons over 60 years of age who live in cities of less than 10,000 population is no longer in effect, Mr. Dies said.

A husband, wife, father, son, daughter, mother of a voter may apply for registration as the voter's agent. No other person may apply for a certificate for another person except the blood relatives listed above.

There is no charge for registration.

State Highway Department Studies FM Road To Lakes

The State Highway Department is giving serious consideration to a request by representatives of three counties to build a road to market road through the counties to serve the Sam Rayburn and Toledo Bend Reservoir areas.

State Representative Don Adams, who appeared with the delegations at the hearing, said that the length of the proposed road and its cost is under consideration.

Along with Adams, State Senator Charles Wilson, and Secretary of State Martin Dies, Jr., appeared with the three county delegation.

All five members of the Tyler County Commissioners Court were present at the hearing in Austin last month. They are County Judge Jeff Mooney, Commissioners Carl Shephard, H. H. Powell, Robert R. Jordan, and Leon Fowler, were present. Frank Grimes of Tyler County also attended.

PTA Hears Panel Discussion Mon.

The program at the Woodville PTA meeting Monday, October 13, was a very informal panel discussion moderated by Jimmy Brown and with the theme "Looking In on Our Schools."

The program followed the outline of the PTA questionnaire, which had been distributed through the schools last year by Gerald Maynard, then PTA program chairman, and at last month's PTA meeting.

Among the questions of the survey and discussed at the meeting was "I would like most for the board of education to . . ."

... with "emphasizing academic progress" being the most frequent answer. School board members, Jim Galney and Dr. L. G. Burton discussed this portion of the survey and answered that our students are generally well-prepared at graduation to go on to college, however our school is not large enough to challenge our students by offering advanced courses and probably will not be able to offer such courses until we have some consolidation. Right now it is up to the teachers and the parents of the students to challenge them to make the best of what is offered.

This led to a question about the values the community thinks important. In answer, Dr. Burton stated that the admiration of security and material possessions above moral and intellectual excellence is of course a threat in our community as it is all over our nation, but being in a small town, our children have a distinct advantage for the threat is not as great here as in the larger cities.

"I would like most to see the school administration . . ." was the question next discussed by Bennett Hanna, high school principal, and E. H. McGuire, superintendent of schools. Discipline, textbooks, and grouping were the main subjects discussed under this topic.

"Top priorities" was then discussed with Rev. Ruben Tillery bringing the results of the survey. Parent involvement was cited as the greatest need but no solution was offered. After a lengthy discussion prompted by questions from the audience it appeared that elementary playground equipment was the greatest need that had a possible solution.

Kindergarten was also a subject with much interest being shown concerning those who need readiness training for the first grade.

Strengths of our school district were listed by Mrs. Ann Bowen with dedicated and conscientious classroom teachers heading the list.

The most difficult problems according to the survey were brought out by Mrs. Betty Job with inadequate funds, parent concern, the need for a code of wearing apparel, and keeping qualified teachers being listed. The emphasis on the coaching staff in our schools was questioned, with Dr. Burton stating that all the coaches, with the exception of the head of the athletic department, teach a full load of academic courses in addition to their coaching duties.

Suggestions for PTA that had been written in an earlier survey were given by Mrs. Myra Griffin with advice help to the schools receiving the emphasis.

In the PTA membership campaign the eighth grade now leads with 34 memberships to their credit, however the second grade is close on their heels with 32. The membership drive closed October 17.

The new PTA attendance banner was won jointly by the third and seventh grades as they tied in the number of supporters present at Monday's meeting. Both grades will enjoy the prize this month and each grade will keep the banner for two weeks.

The regular meeting date was changed to the fourth Monday of each month, making next month's meeting on November 24.

Club members said. Included in the items for sale to the public will be handwork, painting, crafts, soaps, jellies, and novelties. Everyone will be very welcome.

Toledo Bend project came to an end with dedication ceremonies held at Toledo Bend last Saturday. Master of ceremonies Calvin T. Walls, introduced dignitaries from the House of Representatives and Senate. Charles T. Wickham, president of the Sabine River Authority served as co-master of ceremonies. Principal speakers at the function were the honorable John McKeithen, governor of Louisiana and the honorable Preston Smith, governor of Texas. The Toledo Bend Reservoir is the outgrowth of a citizens' campaign which started in 1948. During that year community leaders in both the Louisiana and Texas segments of the Sabine River Basin set up unofficial organizations for the purpose of promoting a joint program for its development.

From the efforts of these people came the passage of laws by their respective legislatures creating official agencies of the state governments with broad powers for watershed development in areas of the basin over which they were given jurisdiction.

The Sabine River Authority of Texas came into being in 1949 and the Sabine River Authority, State of Louisiana, was established in 1950.

Toledo Bend Reservoir was a key project in a master plan and the two state river authorities had started joint discussion and planning of the ultimate construction soon after the ratification of the Sabine River compact.

After much planning the ground breaking was held when Governor Price Danieles of Texas and Governor Jimmy Davis of Louisiana turned the first spadeful of soil. The project was in the building stage.

Gov. McKeithen in his address stated, "I stand as surrogate for all Louisianians who have labored these past two decades on what was first a dream, then a hope, and now a reality. I know I speak for all of them when I say my principal feeling is one of great pride and accomplishment. I know I also speak for them in expressing my thanks to our sister state of Texas, our colleague in this venture, for its steadfast cooperation always during the long struggle to bring the Toledo Bend project to fruition. We could not have had a better partner."

This is the largest hydroelectric facilities in the deep south and belongs solely to the people of Louisiana and Texas.

Governor Smith in his address stated he wanted to thank those "all citizens of Texas and Louisiana, who by their authorizing votes, their spirit of cooperation, their words of encouragement and their unselfish faith that it could and would be done. The spirit of cooperation which has existed in this project for twenty years has made it possible for the almost insoluble problems to be resolved throughout."

Gov. McKeithen aimed up the feelings of all the people that had something to do with the project when he said, "to the millions of citizens of Louisiana and Texas who supported the vision of the law that all this indeed could be done, I present Toledo Bend Dam and lake as a monument to their self-reliance and stubborn pride of place and birth."

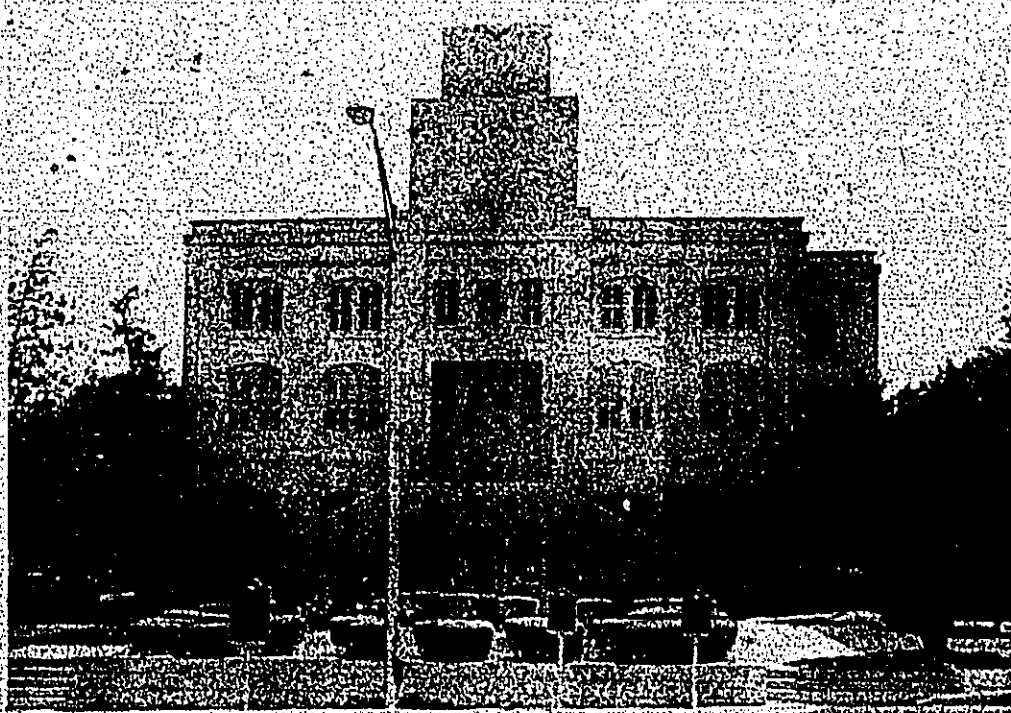
