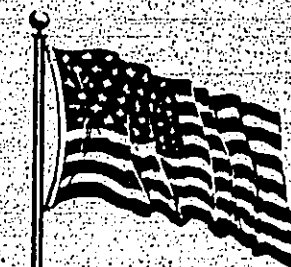

TOP OF THE MORNING

The Zeitgeist of this time are the Young Prentenders who are willing to lead us out of the limbo into which our society has stagnated.

They are the creators of the generation gap, the self-appointed supreme judiciary which relegates the accomplishments of elders to zero minus; who luxuriate in and at the same time split on the institutions of their fathers.

That the generation gap is today's happenstance is a myth. It has existed for, perhaps, as long as men have begot sons. In today's affluence, the new generation is noisier and more active, with more leisure and awareness with which to deride society.

Each new generation claims its own prerogative to redeem or purge society of its ills. The wheels of progress are greased, however, with experience.

Way back in the 1930s a generation came out of school in the depths of a worldwide depression. Many worked their way through college on a half-empty stomach. Some could not go to college at all since they had to work to help their families exist.

Factories were closed. There were no jobs. Freight trains hauled thousands of men and boys from one town to another who felt that, somehow, there might be a job—any kind of job—in the next town. In the arid plains the soil was blowing away. It was sometimes impossible to remain in one place and just as impossible to get to another. Hunger stalked the land. Bread and soup lines fed some of the hungry, others were fed by strangers who divided what little they did have.

It wasn't easy but the country worked itself out of the depths in slow and sometimes faltering steps.

We mention this because the young may feel that other generations have not known hunger, or have not faced problems. We mention it because some may believe that this country is not great enough to stand up to and solve its domestic ills. It has been through perilous economic and political crises, through wars and threats of wars.

Through it all we have had demagogues and dissidents, wise men and intellectual triflers, and always the new generation which, from a lofty tower, could solve all its problems. In time they too had to come down out of the tower and face up to the reality that change in a society made up of diverse groups is probable but not instantaneous.

The wheels of progress are greased by experience. Each generation has had its own problems, and this one, like the others, will have to solve its own with, perhaps, some counseling.

Dobbins Brings In Big 12-Point Buck For Lead

Bobby Dobbins of Colmesnell brought in a 12-point buck last Thursday to take the lead in the most points and widest rack on any deer brought in for a picture and to enter in the prize contest during the second week of the deer hunting season. Bobby killed his on Little Wolf Creek Hunting Lease with a 3-30 Savage at 75 yards. It had a 19-inch horn spread and field dressed 125 pounds.

Others bringing deer by for a picture and to enter in the contest were Eugene Ryals and Tommy Messer, also of Colmesnell, both of whom shot the 10-point buck. It was killed off the Livingston highway west of Woodville near where a paper company is clearing land. It had an 18-inch rack. It field dressed 122 pounds.

Harold Rebbe brought in a 10-pointer which he shot on the George E. Tubb place east of Hillister. It had a 15-inch wide rack, and field dressed 132 pounds. It is the heaviest brought in so far.

A nice small 9-point buck was brought in by Richard Best, son of Vernon Best, which he shot near Fort Teran in Tyler County Saturday.

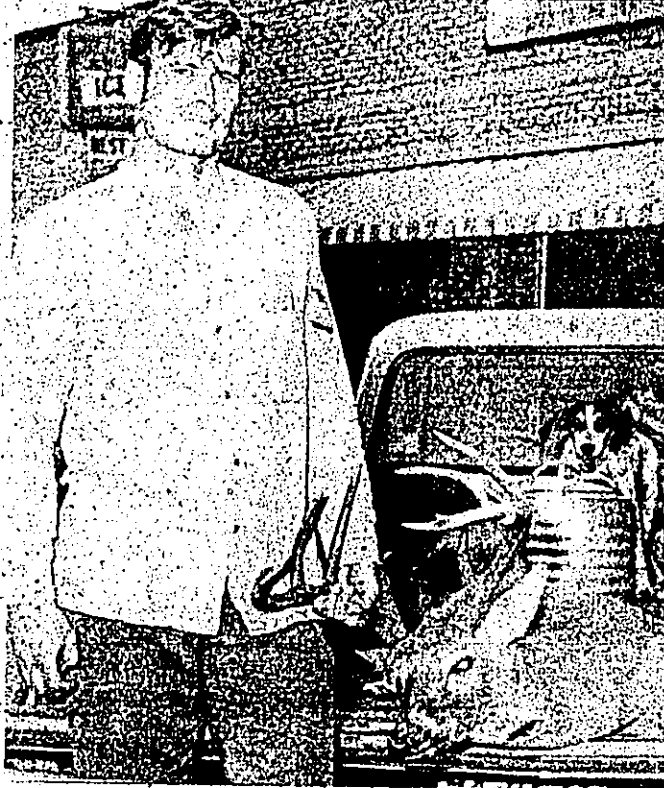
Hunters report that the deer have not been moving much the past week and not too many have been killed in the area.

Spiro Who? Bounces Back At Gag Writers

Those TV gag writers can now toss all those "Spiro Who?" jokes in the wastebasket. They are out of date.

Even those least conversant with politics can and will tell who Spiro is—and in this area, in full agreement with his latest blast at the TV-networks.

Vice President Spiro Agnew has voiced the discontent of a large segment of television viewers with network news presentation. Public mumbling over the coverage (and opinions expressed by newscasters) has been heard in the hinterlands since the Democratic convention in Chicago last summer. The public saw the howling mobs bent on tearing the city and convention hall apart—and they didn't like the spectacle of TV newscasters seeming to egg the mobs on. And the biased convention hall coverage was not taken favorably.

Perhaps because of the convention coverage, lifelong Democrats here quickly agree with the vice president that television networks need to use some restraint.

Adams To Speak At Scout Meet

Don Adams, member of the Texas House of Representatives, will be the guest speaker at the Dogwood District annual meeting Tuesday, November 25, at 7 p.m. at Camp Urrah.

Mr. Adams is a former scout and scouter, having been a cub scout, boy scout and served as a member of the organization and extension committee of the Neches District, which includes his home town of Jasper.

Mr. Adams serves the seventh representative district which is made up of Newton, Tyler, Jasper and Hardin counties, and was elected to the Texas House of Representatives for the first time in 1968.

Prior to his successful venture into politics, he had served in civic and professional organizations in the Jasper area, including the Jasper Kiwanis Club, Chamber of Commerce and the Angeline County Bar Association.

He is a member of the First United Methodist Church of Jasper and has served as president of the men's organization and on the board of stewards of the church.

Mr. Adams graduated from Baylor University Law School in 1963 and practices law with his father, T. Gilbert Adams, in Jasper.

The Dogwood District annual meeting will include adult scouter from Tyler, Polk and San Jacinto counties, and is being held in the dining hall at Camp Urrah, the Trinity-Neches Council Scout reservation, just south of Woodville.

Monday's rainfall was a mere sprinkle measuring .001 of an inch, but by 1:00 p.m. Tuesday 2:36 inches had been measured at the Texas Forest Service district headquarters south of town. 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School Trustees Accept Audit For 1968-69 Term

Approval of the monthly financial statement and the annual audit were the two principal items at the meeting Monday night of the board of trustees of the Woodville Independent School District.

The audit for 1968-69 was made by the accounting firm of Neuschaffer and Browning of Beaumont.

Other matters discussed included a discussion of the feasibility of adult education program, substitute teachers pay, and approval of the Kirby High School Band's trip to the Sugar Bowl on January 1.

A certification that the writing in the new vocational building met the city codes, following an inspection by L. E. Greenwood, was entered in the records and closed out the final item on the contract for the building.

The purchase of two new

buses was approved. These must be ordered through the Texas Education Agency and will probably be delivered in time for the 1970-71 school year.

The trustees also appointed Dr. L. G. Burton as its representative on the Allan Shivers Library board. The vacancy occurred when Jim Parks was transferred and left the school board.

Jim Galney was appointed as the board on the purchasing committee for the library.

The board voted to present an old World War II Jeep to the vocational program for use in training or, as they saw fit. Also discussed was a request from Pine Hills for some chairs which were damaged in the lunchroom fire in 1960. The 75 chairs have been stored and Supt. B. H. McGuire said that perhaps 25 of them could be made usable. The bo-

ard decided that before giving the chairs to Pine Hills they would ask if any other organization or church wanted them.

SW Bell Requests Rate Increase For Subscribers Here

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company filed a request for an increase in local Woodville telephone rates at last Monday night's meeting of the Woodville City Commission.

The request was filed by Jack Martin, local manager for Woodville, and was accepted for consideration by the council.

"This is," Martin said, "the first time we have asked for additional telephone rates in Woodville in more than 10 years. However, continued inadequate earnings on our operations leave us no choice but to ask for an increase in local rates."

Martin presented the City Commissioners evidence showing that Southwestern Bell is losing money on its present Woodville operation.

He told the City Commissioners that on December 31, 1959, there were 1,433 telephones in service in Woodville. Ten years later, on December 31, 1969, this figure had increased to 3,098.

"By the end of 1969," he continued, "we expect this figure to be more than 3,300, an increase of over 130% since the end of 1959."

"This means," Martin said, "that Woodville telephone customers can now call well over twice as many telephones as they could when the present rates were established over 10 years ago."

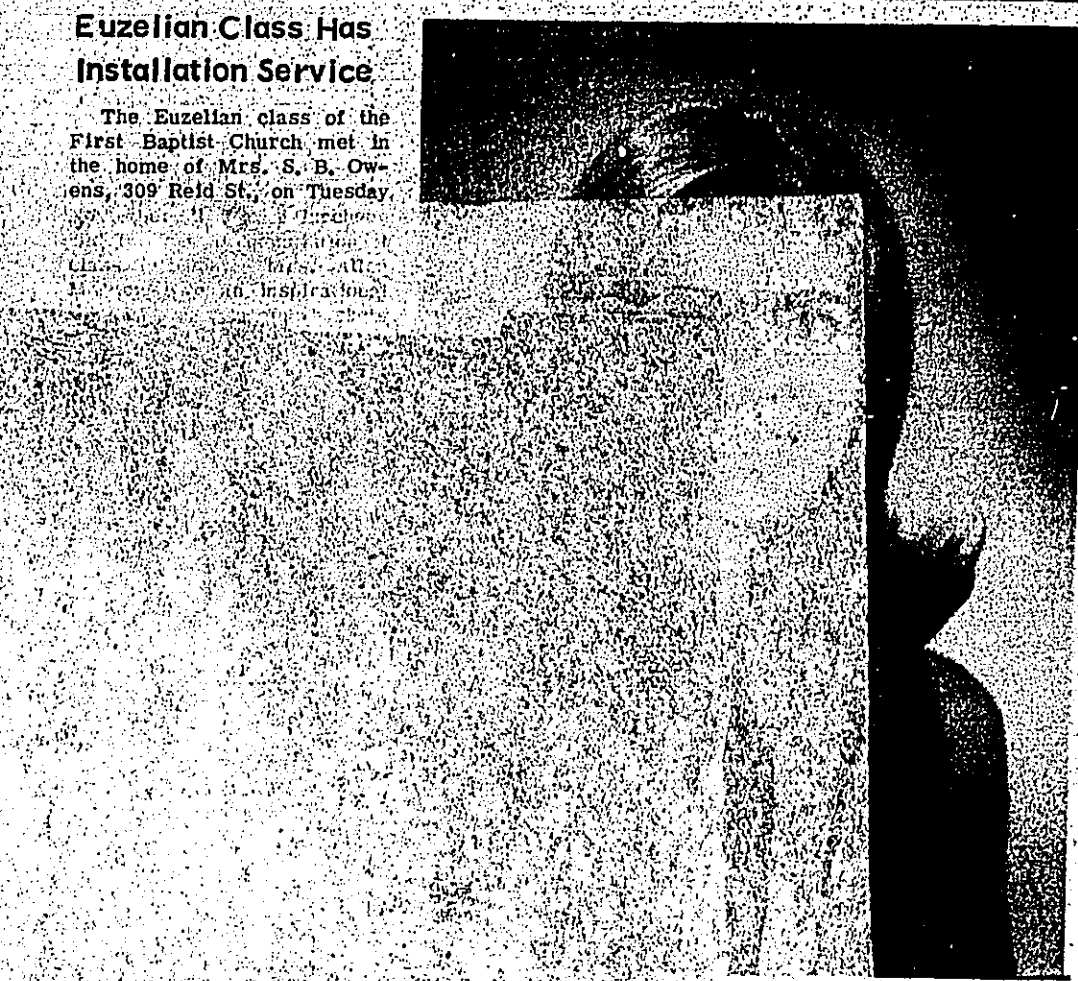

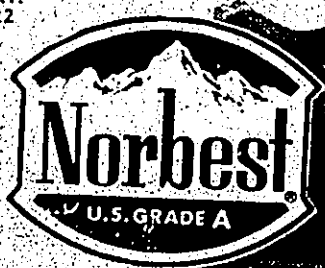
