**Bell Announces** Direct Distance Dialing will go into operation in Woodville and Spurger at approximately 12:01 a.m. on Monday morning, December 1st, Jack Martin, local manager for Southwest-

ern Bell Telephone Company,

said today. The new long distance service commonly called DDD, will enable approximately 2, 200 Woodville and Spurger telephone customers to place their own station-to-station long distance calls to more than 100 million telephones in thousands of cities across the United States as easily as they can now dial a local call across the street.

"Telephone customers in Woodville and Spurger have received a letter explaining in detail how DDD works, Martin said.

In addition to the letter, telephone operators are calling customers to answer any questions they may have about the new DDD service.

Martin gave this brief description of how DDD will

The new Direct Distance Dialing equipment will permit customers with one party, two party, or eight party rural service to dial their own station-to-station calls direct. The call will be made simper ly by dialing the figure "1."

and the three digit area code, if it is different from your own followed by the numbers of the distant telephone number.

The only difference between calls dialed direct from one or two party service and those dialed from an eight party rural line will be that an operator will come on the line briefly to ask what number the call is being placed from. This is because the automatic recording machine cannot identify the calling number on a four or eight party line.

"In case you are wondering," Martin said, 'how we keep track of long distance calls that are dialed direct, here is a brief explanation:

"When you make a DDD call, a special electronic machine will punch holes in a paper tape used for billing purposes. The holes in the tape, when read by a decoding machine, tell the date of the call, your telephone number, the length of the call and the telephone number that you called in the distant city.

"If the telephone number you dialed in the distant city is busy, or if no one answers, this information will appear on the paper tape. In this way, you are charged only for the calls you complete, and the length of each call is accurately measured electronically."



What her ideas of a traditional Thanksgiving is, on the other hand, is something else. For depending on where she lives and how she was brought up, you will find as many different answers to this as a turkey has pin feathers.

1 Envelope unflavored gelatin 14 Cup cold water 2 Egg whites 1/3 Cup sugar 1 Pint heavy cream と Teaspoon vanilla 14 Cup orange juice Few drops red food coloring Lady Fingers

Sprinkle gelatin over cold water in a cup. Beat egg whites until soft peaks form. Gradually add sugar; continue to beat until meringue is very stiff. Whip cream and vanilla and fold into meringue. Melt gelatin over hot water until completely dissolved; stir in orange juice. Cool and pour quickly into cream mixture, beating rapidly until well blended. Add food coloring

Line a bowl with lady fingers. Spoon in gelatin mixture. Chill several hours until firm.





Q-Do I have to pay income taxes on my social security

A-Yes. Your wages would be subject to social security taxes.

Q-Does a working wife lose her right to social security benefits as a result of her own work if she is also entitled to benefits on herhusband's work

A-She can't get both payments at once, but she is eligible to receive the benefit which would give her the highest amount.

Q-Are social security here paid at the beginning or at the end of the month?

A-Benefit checks are regularly paid on the third day of each month and represent payment for the preceding month. If the third day of the month falls on Sunday or a national holiday, you receive the check on the second day of the

Q-I have been married twice. Both marriages ended with the death of my husband. Is it true I can get social security widow's benefits on both men's records?

A-No. You get only one check, but you may choose the record that gives you the highest monthly check.

Q-My father will be 65 years old this year and has worked only a short time under social security. How many quarters does he need to be eligible for social security payments?

A-A man of your father's age needs 18 quarters or about 4½ years of work under the social security program to be eligible for monthly retirement payments. However, only 6 quarters of coverage are needed for him to qualify for hospital insurance benefits under Medicare.

Q-I will be 72 years old in November of this year. Will my social security, check be **Essumont Hwy.** 

A-Not because you became age 72. You are permitted to earn all of the money you can without giving up any of your social security checks, however beginning with the month you turn 72.






