Southwestern Bell Announces

Direct Distance Dialing will go into operation in Woodville and Spurger at approximately 12:01 a.m. on Monday morning, December 1st, Jack Martin, local manager for Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, said today.

The new long distance service commonly called DDD, will enable approximately 2,200 Woodville and Spurger telephone customers to place their own station-to-station long distance calls to more than 100 million telephones in thousands of cities across the United States as easily as they can now dial a local call across the street.

"Telephone customers in Woodville and Spurger have received a letter explaining in detail how DDD works," Martin said.

In addition to the letter, telephone operators are calling customers to answer any questions they may have about the new DDD service.

Martin gave this brief description of how DDD will work:

The new Direct Distance Dialing equipment will permit customers with one party, two party, or eight party rural service to dial their own station-to-station calls direct.

The call will be made directly by dialing the figure "1" and the three digit area code. If it is different from your own followed by the numbers of the distant telephone number.

The only difference between calls dialed direct from one or two party service and those dialed from an eight party rural line will be that an operator will come on the line briefly to ask what number the call is being placed from. This is because the automatic recording machine cannot identify the calling number on a four or eight party line.

"In case you are wondering," Martin said, "how we keep track of long distance calls that are dialed direct, here is a brief explanation:

"When you make a DDD call, a special electronic machine will punch holes in a paper tape used for billing purposes. The holes in the tape, when read by a decoding machine, tell the date of the call, your telephone number, the length of the call and the telephone number that you called in the distant city.

"If the telephone number you dialed in the distant city is busy, or if no one answers, this information will appear on the paper tape. In this way, you are charged only for the calls you complete, and the length of each call is accurately measured electronically."

training to the nursing staff, which is being geared to give the best in patient care.

Mr. John Karcher, who is well known for the many revivals he has conducted throughout East Texas, as well as for his radio and foreign ministry, is the acting administrator, and serves as Secretary-Treasurer of the Corporation.

## State News

96.1 MILLION board feet of timber was purchased by the Forest Industries from national forests in Texas during the fiscal year 1968-69.

Southern Forest Institute reports that Texas has 775,000 acres in national forests. Timber sold from this source was enough to build 9,610 three-bedroom homes.

Hardin County Savings and Loan Association of Silsbee has approved to open a branch office in Lumberton. A five-acre tract for the branch office has been purchased, reported Robert Neyland of Silsbee, president of the Association.

Ronald J. Mitchell has been named vice-president of the First National Bank of Huntsville. Mr. Mitchell, a former state bank examiner, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Troy Mitchell of Kirbyville.

Temple Industries' Bert Lindsey presented a check for \$3,500 to the Newton County Commissioner's Court, to be used to purchase a site for the proposed forty-four-bed Newton County Hospital soon to be erected with funds from a \$3,203,350 Hill-Burton grant.

Department of Public Safety reported Texas traffic accidents have killed 2,973 persons this year, compared with 2,848 in 1968. Fatal accidents by noon this past Friday totaled 2,928, when compared with prior period of 2,387.

## Atlantic Richfield Grants

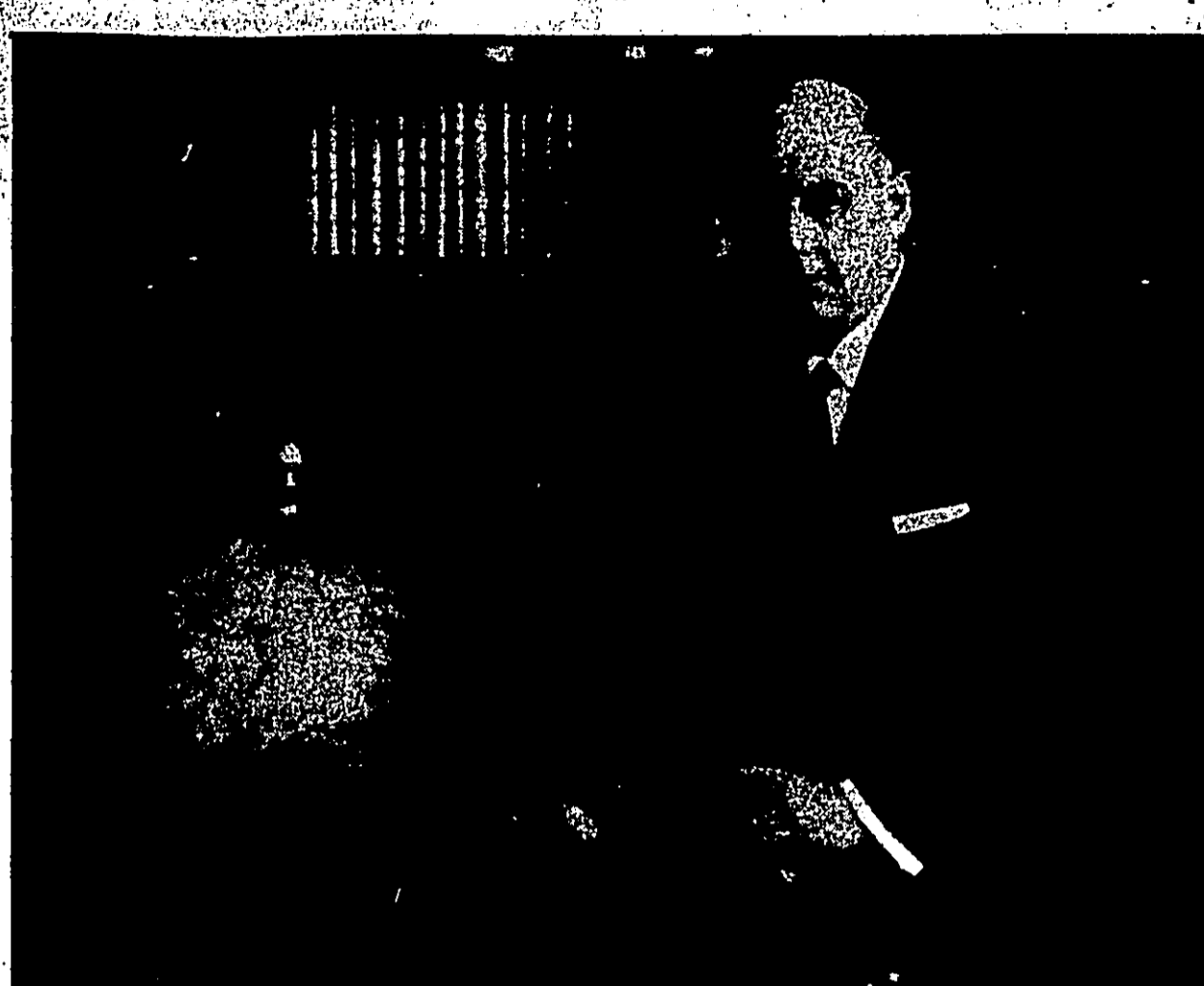

# Timberlands Yield More Than Lumber For Temple



Arthur Temple says his East Texas isn't a rural community

Arthur Temple, president of Temple Industries, Inc. of Diboll, gets every last dollar possible out of his nine trees. Bark, chips, shavings. Only the pine needles left behind in the company's more than 450,000 acres of East Texas timberland escape his thrif.

In the process, Temple has developed what was basically a large sawmill when he became manager in 1948 into a diversified forest products company with a net worth of about \$51 million. And for the nine months ended September 30th, the firm reported a net profit of nearly \$4.5 million.

Such by-products include bedroom furniture, wooden beverage cases, broom and mop handles, soil conditioners, laminated beams and arches, wood flour used in phonograph records and roofing, as well as molded wood toilet seats. Nonetheless, building materials still account for a large percentage of sales.

"Owning this large timberland area leads you into a great many fields, if you think about it," Temple says. "The 49-year-old Temple outlines his building policies with the decisiveness of a surgeon examining benign and malignant tumors.

relation; use debt in reasonable amounts but not to the extent that it jeopardizes the company's overall growth." A current roster of Temple Industries lists sawmills in Diboll and Fineland; panel board plants for fiberboard, plywood and particleboard (the latter is made of chips and shavings bonded together with synthetic resins); furniture and furniture parts manufacture; gypsum wallboard plant; wholesale building materials distribution, facilities in Saint Louis, Missouri; and retail outlets in Diboll and Fineland; two wooden beverage case plants; a general contracting company; and two mortgage investment corporations, also engaged in land development and real estate management of Temple properties.

One of Temple's current projects is a plant under construction for mobile and modular homes, which will tie in ultimately with his land development plans. He estimates the plant will turn out 2,000 units yearly and have annual sales of \$10 million.

Temple, who was born in Texarkana, Arkansas, (only one block from the Texas border), says there are no disadvantages to headquartered in Diboll with a population of 3,567. Telephones and four airplanes give him quick access to all points.

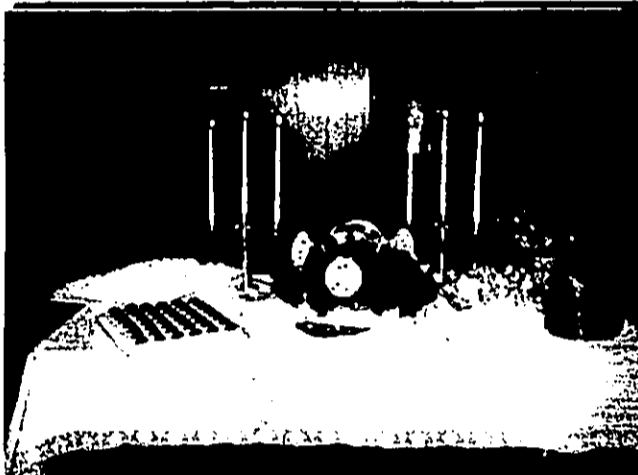

Internal Revenue Service

This column of questions and answers on federal tax matters is provided by the U. S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers.

Q-I'm a housewife and have just taken a part-time job in a department store for the holidays. Should I claim my exemption for withholding purposes?

Q-Half of my daughter's college tuition is covered by a scholarship. Is this considered income and will it affect my dependency deduction for her?

Q-Can I deduct anything for the fees I paid a real estate appraiser I hired when I sold some property?

Q-Is there any penalty for not paying estimated tax when you are liable for it?

Q-Yes, there can be an additional charge if withholding and estimated tax payments do not meet the last 60 percent of your income tax liability for the year.

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Hints

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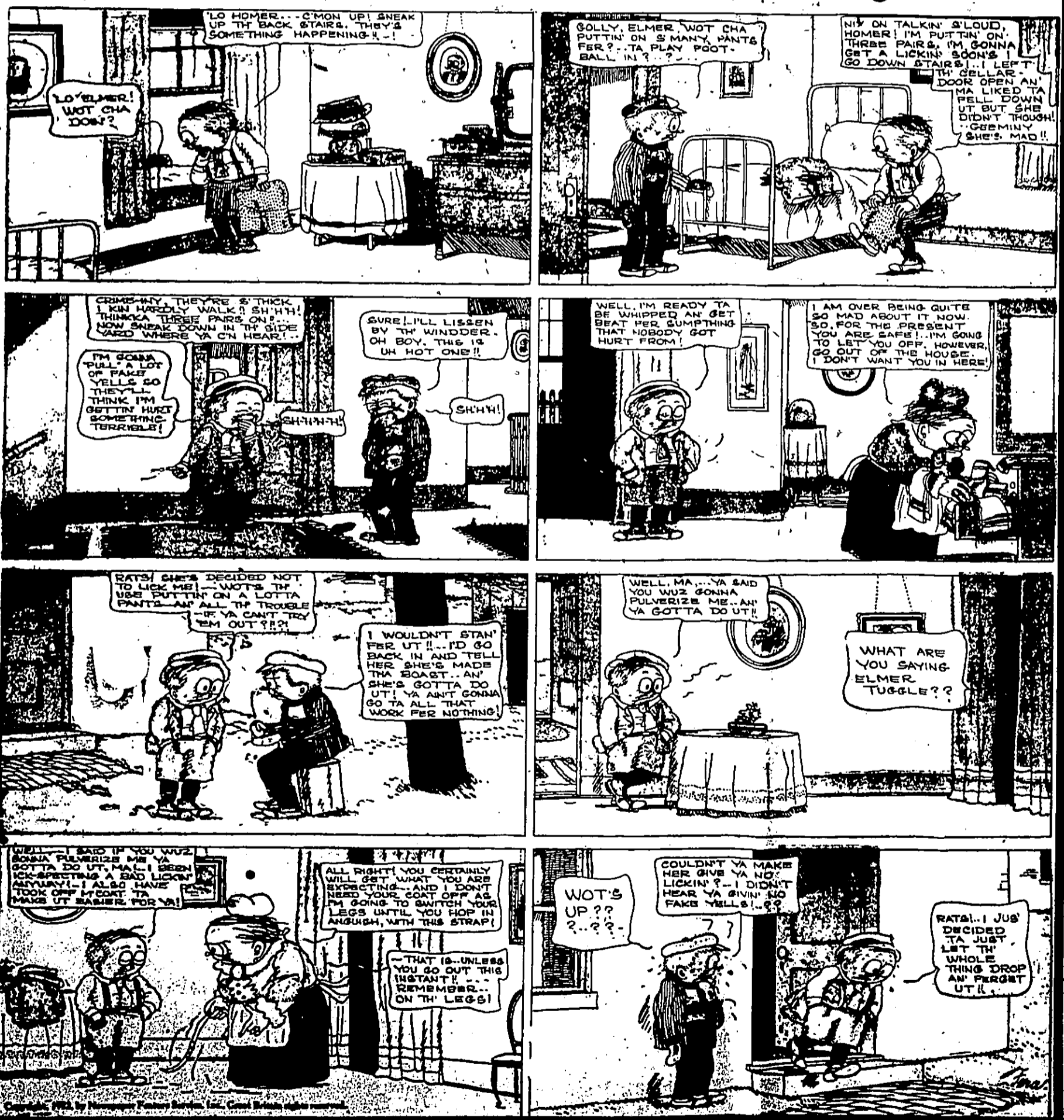

Radical Changes Take Place in Hunting

Without much fanfare, there has been a radical change in both big game hunting and upland bird shooting. The day of giving a boy a gun and pointing to the woods where he can learn to shoot safely and find something to shoot at has passed. As examples of how drastically hunting has changed, look at the following: At the Lake Copton Shooting Resort near Dallas, a hunter pays \$1.25 for a quail or \$7.50 per pair for pheasants, takes them out to a specified area, releases them one or more at a time, and then with his dog starts hunting. Or if he doesn't own a dog, for 25 cents more per bird, a guide will accompany him with a dog. In Central Texas, on the famed Y. O. Ranch in Kerr County, hunters can go after white-tailed deer and at least a dozen exotic animals, such as eland, oryx, mouflon sheep, and other foreign species. Owner Charles Schreiner charges \$150 for a white-tailed buck on a "no deer-no pay" plan. Professional guides are available, who will do everything from driving you to the deer in a jeep or pickup that is furnished to putting you up in a blind and loading your gun. And if you happen to kill a deer, they'll field-dress him for you. You need never even get your hands dirty. Hunting resorts had their beginning in the early 1900's. Today there are almost 3,000 of them, and they are rapidly increasing in number. They provide a service that is in demand, and under proper planning and management, they are money-makers. Many landowners are converting all or part of their holdings into facilities for hunting. It is a good way to supplement agricultural income; in many instances, income from hunting exceeds that derived from farming. Pete Copton and his wife Kathryn farmed their 650 acres for many years. Then a few years ago they decided they would raise quail and put the birds out for hunters who wanted to exercise or to train their own dogs. The idea was so successful the first winter that the Coptons added pheasants. They are now considering addition of a duck tower and breeding pens for mallards. A 50-acre lake, stocked with largemouth bass, crappie, and catfish, brings in still more revenue. Most any open field will do for resort shooting, Copton says. Owners do plant rows of cover—milo, millet, etc.—where grass is short. Ducks, usually mallards, are trained to walk up a ramp and to fly to a nearby lake for feeding. At evening they return to their pens. Blinds are put up between the pens and feeding lake, and hunters get natural-life shooting as the ducks fly overhead. White-tailed deer may be shot only during the regular season, but exotics are hunted year round. Resort bird shooting runs from September through April in Texas, about the same as in many other states. A special license is required, and the hunter must leave the resort band on any bird being transported to his home. Running a hunting resort is not all just jangling a cash register. Birds are susceptible to diseases, and anything that "spooks" the birds—such as a chicken hawk, dog, electrical storms, or hail storms—can cause the penned birds to bunch up and suffocate. Many of the hunters who are customers of resorts are limited in equipment and experience. Many do not own dogs; some don't even have guns. A successful resort must provide these things and must also have transportation and guides available to put hunters into position to hunt. Resorts located some distance from major metropolitan areas often must provide lodging and dining facilities to attract customers. The Y. O. Ranch is a very elaborate, providing both cabins and a restaurant. Landowners who use a seasonal lease or day-lake arrangement can get by with fewer facilities. Of course, liability insurance is an essential requirement for anyone getting into the outdoor recreation field. Get professional assistance from attorneys and insurance representatives. Demand for hunting resorts can be expected to grow as our population becomes more urbanized and as incomes and leisure time increase. For landowners with good "business sense" and the ability to work with people, it offers real challenges and opportunities. —Progressive Farmer

It would seem to us that with two good motels: a hotel; vast acres of land, and proximity to popular areas, Tyler County would be ideally suited for income of this nature.

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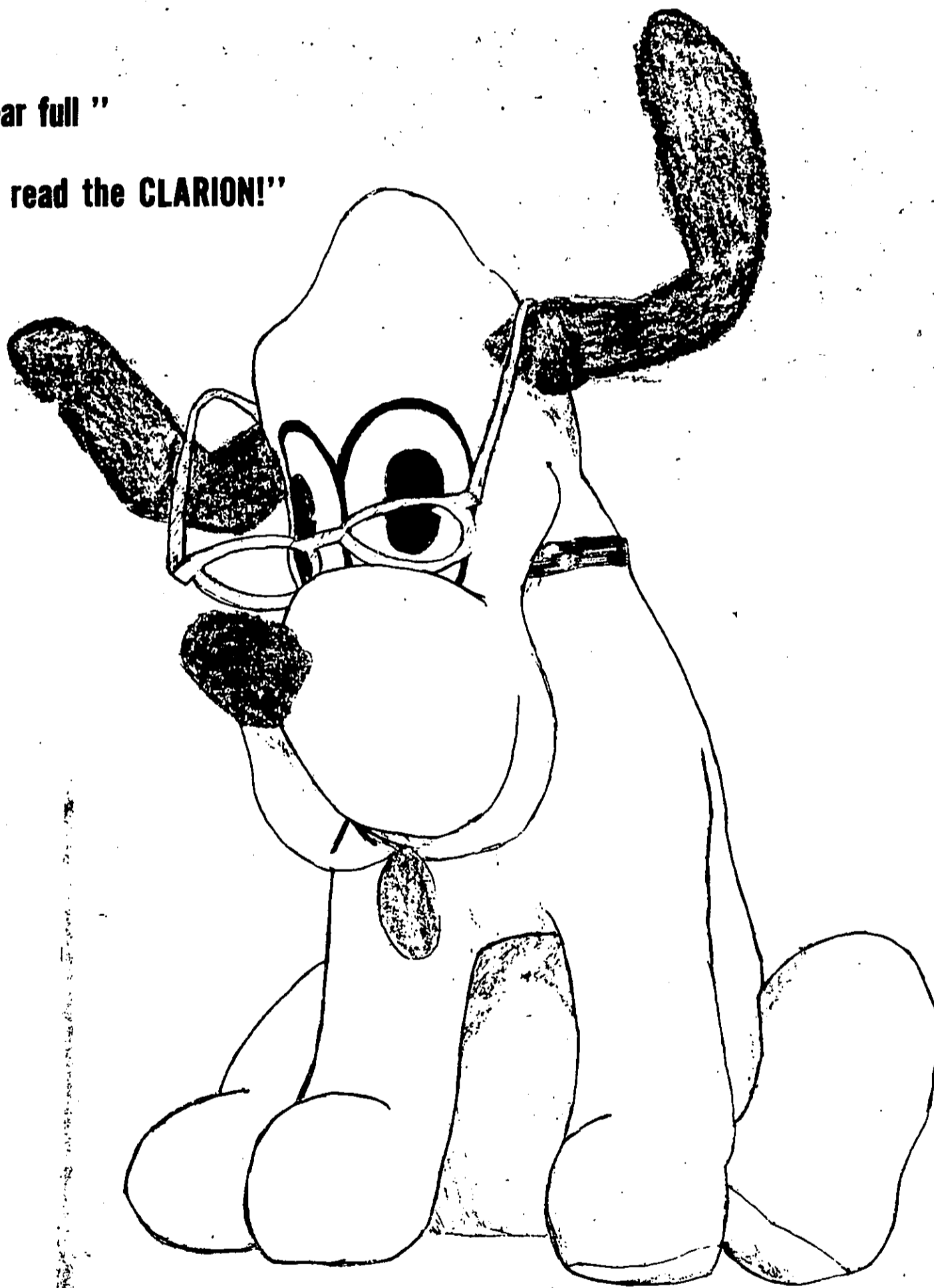


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
