The people in the Woodville area now have an opportunity to show their appreciation to an outstanding group of young people for accomplishments far above the average.

We mean the Kirby High School Band which has won so many honors in the past years that older folks may be taking it for granted. Now we can accentuate a positive attitude by stepping forward and in a material way giving the young people a well deserved boost.

The band has won so many honors that we will not try to give them here since they are listed on a special page inside this paper.

The 83-piece band has been invited to appear in the Sugar Bowl parade as representative of the state of Texas. While in New Orleans they will be taken on several tours and will sit in a special section at the game on January 1. During the parade they will be seen on national television over ABC whose outlet in this area is Beaumont's Channel 12. (By the way, the band will be on Channel 6 news this Friday at 6:00 and 10:00 p.m.)

When the invitation came, the Band Boosters Club knew it did not have sufficient finances to send the band to the Sugar Bowl. The Boosters had \$2,000 which it immediately committed for the trip. It hopes that the business men and individuals in the area will contribute the other \$2,000. Jim Dillion, the Woodville Inn man, has said he will set aside half the proceeds from the restaurant's dinner hours (10 to 2) on Thursday, December 11.

The football fans in the area have supported the Eagles with several \$2,000 gates—and may be watched the band march at halftime with little thought that they were seeing the outstanding high school band perform. So let's get with it. If we can have around \$2,000 gates for football games we surely are capable of putting that much into a great opportunity for the Kirby High School Band. And remember, this also is a great opportunity for this area. Several million people will see the parade on television. Maybe 100,000 will see the parade in person. That kind of publicity for Woodville can't be bought—it has to be earned.

And the Kirby High School Band has earned it for us. The least we can do is let the band know how much we are indebted to it.

## Dogwood Scouters Hold Annual Meeting

The Dogwood District of the Trinity-Neches Council, Boy Scouts of America, held its annual meeting Tuesday night, November 25, at the Council Scout Reservation at Camp Umland.

The meeting began with a covered dish supper followed by a program that included recognition of adults serving at all levels of scouting in the district; a report of the nominating committee on officers for the coming year; election and installation of these officers; a report on the proposed merger of the Trinity-Neches Council with the Sabine Area Council; introduction of the Dis-

trict Outstanding Scout for 1969; and a talk by Don Adams, state representative from Jasper.

Mickey Rely, district chairman from Corrigan, began the dinner by asking Eagle Scout, Mike Nichols of Troop 37, Woodville, to say grace.

Many excellent dishes, specialties of the scouters' wives, provided a real feast for those present.

After the dinner, Mr. Rely called the meeting to order. Reverend Ray Williams of the United Methodist Church, Woodville, gave the invocation.

Boy Scout Troop 54 of Woodville furnished scouts for the opening ceremony. A color

guard composed of Joey Wheat, Chuck Combs and Jeff Peiley presented the colors, led in the pledge to the flag and the scout oath.

Rufus Hickman of the Texas Forestry Service took all of the children to the Health Lodge for a showing of movies while the adult meeting continued.

Mr. Rely turned the meeting over to Max Graham, commissioner for Boy Scout Roundtable's, for the recognition and awards portion of the program. Mr. Graham recognized and introduced those persons present who make Scouting possible including the institutions which sponsor Scout

Units, Institution Heads, Institutional Representatives, Unit Committee Members and Unit Leaders.

Scoutmaster Harry McEwen of Troop 97, Livingston, received a roundup award for his Troop. They are the first unit in the district to reach their fall roundup goal, having recruited 13 new scouts. His Troop had also completed a 50-mile hike and fellow scouters presented him with a "special" award in the shape of a large foot commemorating the event.

Bill Gassiot, of Gassiot's Junior Department Store in Woodville, received a recognition award for serving the Woodville area Scouts as their Official Scout Distributor.

Mr. Rely then introduced the 1969 Operating Committee Chairmen of the district and W. L. Brough, district commissioner from Livingston, introduced the commissioner staff.

E. F. Fender, district camping and activities chairman from Livingston, gave a report on district participation at the National Jamboree and at Camp Umland, as well as other highlights of scouting activities this past summer.

The nominating committee chairman, Charles Franklin, of Livingston, gave the report of his committee, and in the following election officers were elected for the year 1970.

Carey Cruse, president of the Citizens State Bank of Woodville, will become the Dogwood District chairman. Ben R. Ogletree, Livingston, and Jim W. Gainey, Woodville, will be vice chairmen and W. L. Brough was elected again as district commissioner.

The officers for 1970 were officially installed by Kenneth Reinhardt, vice president of the Trinity-Neches Council.

Following installation of officers, Mr. Reinhardt, assisted by Bob Shoemaker, Council Scout Executive, gave a presentation on the proposed merger of the Trinity-Neches Council and the Sabine Area Council. This merger, already approved by the Sabine Area Council will be voted on by the Trinity-Neches Council at their annual business meeting December 9. All voting members are urged to attend.

Don Adams, speaker for the evening, was introduced by Mickey Rely. Mr. Adams, state representative and attorney from Jasper, shared with the group some thoughts relative to today's problems and the ideals of scouting in helping to build self-reliance in the citizens of tomorrow.

## Trash Burning Is Hazard Two Ways

The long spell of dry weather has made trash burning hazardous in both setting the woods on fire and to persons, especially the elderly, who may try to fight spreading fires.

Jerry Grimes of the Forest Service said that the latest instance of injury by fire to an elderly person occurred November 20 in the Dies community. Craig Marshall, 70, was burning trash when the fire escaped from the trash, and in trying to prevent the further spread of the fire Mr. Marshall suffered severe burns. He was attempting to fight the fire with hand tools and his trouser legs caught fire, burning them to the knees.

Mr. Marshall incurred third degree burns on both legs to the knees and is in Tyler County Hospital. The Forest Service crews arrived in 10 minutes after notification of the fire and extinguished it.

Mrs. S. J. Robles, Band Booster head, said the group must have the additional funds raised by December 19 in order to complete arrangements for the trip.

The band will travel on two Continental Trailways buses and has reservations for lodging at New Orleans. Besides the buses, several private autos will go along.

Band Director Jerry Brown was notified Tuesday that Channel 6 in Beaumont will tape the band Friday morning and have it on the 6:00 and 10:00 p.m. news tomorrow night (Friday). This is the first of many recognitions the band will receive for being chosen as the Texas representative in the Sugar Bowl parade.

## Highway Department Approves FM Roads To Lakes

The Texas Highway Commission has approved the designation of a Farm to Market Road extending from near Colmesnell in Tyler County across Jasper County to the Toledo Bend Dam on the Sabine River in Newton County.

The road will incorporate some sections of existing FM roads as well as four new connecting sections which were designated today. The new sections total 27.3 miles.

Funds are not now available for construction or reconstruction and the work will be undertaken in increments as funds become available.

A delegation appeared before the Highway Commission on September 30 requesting the designation of a road from US Highway 69 near Colmesnell to the Toledo Bend dam.

The Commission noted that there has been a tremendous increase in traffic in the area with the completion of the Sam Rayburn and Toledo Bend Reservoirs.

Some portions have been designated and constructed, but completed portions would require reconstruction to provide a facility adequate for anticipated traffic.

County officials have advised the Highway Department that all necessary right of way for new sections and sections to be reconstructed will be furnished free of cost to the State.

All required right of way will provide a minimum of 120 feet in width and all right of way on the entire route is to be acquired before any new construction or reconstruction is undertaken.

Funds are not now available for construction or reconstruction and the work will be undertaken in increments as funds become available.

## INDIAN CRAFTSMEN CAN USE DEER SKINS IN PROJECT AT RESERVATION

Deer hunters who do not want their deerkins may donate them to the craftsmen at the Alabama-Coushatta Indian Reservation 15 miles west of Woodville.

Roland Poncho, assistant superintendent, asked that those who will donate skins to call the reservation office and give their addresses.

The skins are used in the Indian Village decoration.

New sections designated include:

In Tyler County from the end of FM 2628, 4.8 miles east of US 69 eastward to the Jasper County line, a distance of 7.2 miles.

In Jasper County from the Tyler County line northeastward to FM 255, a distance of 4.1 miles.

Also in Jasper County from US Highway 96 eastward to the Newton County line, a distance of 6.0 miles.

In Newton County from the Jasper County line eastward to State Highway 87, a distance of 10 miles.

The work will be under the supervision of A. J. Cortez, supervising resident engineer at Woodville.

Work was authorized for this county as part of the 827 1/2 miles of Texas Farm and Ranch to Market Roads earmarked for development in the new program.

## HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT TO EXTEND FM ROAD 2992 SOUTH TO FM 1013

The Texas Highway Commission has approved development of 1.6 miles of Farm to Market Roads in Tyler County as part of the 1969 Texas Farm to Market Program. The project will extend FM Road 2992 from 5.2 miles southeast of FM 1746 south to FM 1013.

District engineer F. C. Young of the Texas Highway Department said estimated cost of the work is \$28,900.

The work will be under the supervision of A. J. Cortez, supervising resident engineer at Woodville.

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The program lists 214 projects in 138 counties. Estimated

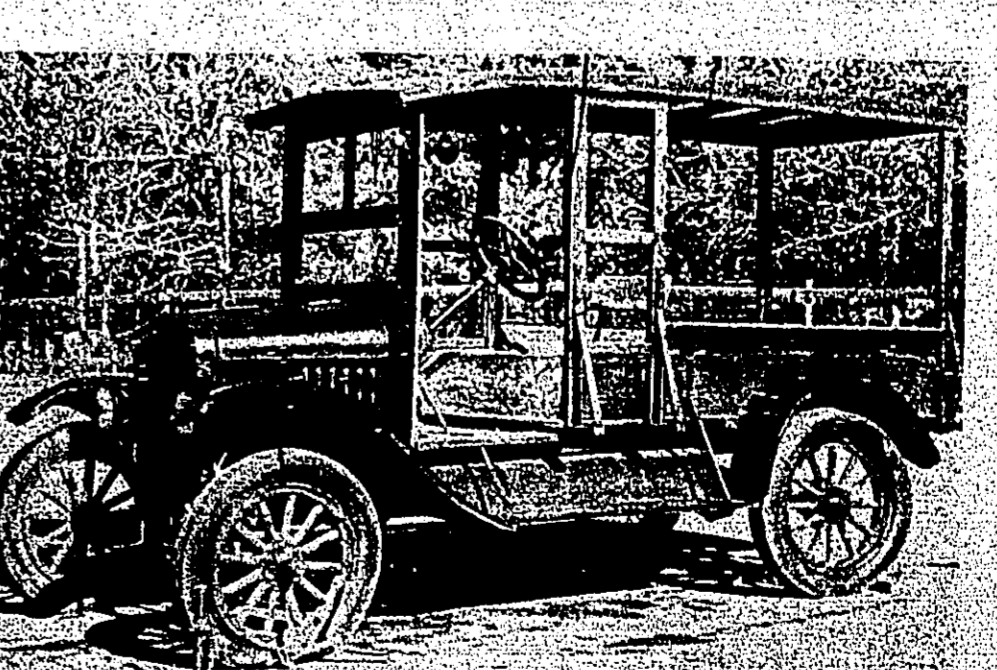
total cost is \$22 million. Mileage included in the program totals 237.3 miles of new roads with an estimated cost of \$10.3 million.

The remaining 569.6 miles, to be developed at an estimated cost of \$11.7 million, was designated previously and is being constructed in stages.

# County Agent Reports

The fire in the fireplace during the upcoming holiday season can be made to reflect the cheerfulness of the occasion even more by adding multi-colored flames, believes County Agent Currie.

Chemical treatment of the material to be burned can result in purple, red, blue, orange or green flames instead of the usual flame from wood.

Currie explains that calcium chloride can be used to produce orange colored flames, copper chloride-blue, potassium chlorate-purple, strontium nitrate-red, lithium chloride-carmine, and copper sulfate-emerald green. Dry pine cones, small chips or blocks of wood can be soaked in these chemical solutions for the multi-colored flames.

Most of the chemicals can be purchased from chemical suppliers or drugstores.

To treat the cones of wood, a plastic pail and an onion sack saw method. The cones or chips are placed in the sack and immersed in the solution.

The session in Texas A&M University's first annual Remote Sensing Conference for Recreation and Resource Administrators December 9-10 in the Ramada Inn.

George H. Harber of A&M's new Remote Sensing Center, conference coordinator, defined remote sensing as identifying something from a distance through instrument readings of energy given off by an object. The energy can be in the form of heat, light or other forms of radiation.

Instruments are infrared scanning devices, cameras with special filters, and radar. The equipment is usually carried in airplanes or satellites.

Currie said agriculture is interested in remote sensing because the system has demonstrated that it can identify areas over a large area, detect crop diseases, and study different soil types and moisture conditions.

A&M's Remote Sensing Center, established last fall, is conducting research and academic programs in the remote sensing field, as directed by Dr. J. W. House, Jr.

The conference being with general sessions, such as an introduction to remote sensing, environmental management, and the role of remote sensing in recreation and resource management. House will talk on "Primary Sensors Used in Remote Sensing Studies."

Talks with an agricultural slant will deal with plant species identification and the use of remote sensing in the study of forest and recreational areas. Further details on the conference can be had by writing to Harber in care of the Remote Sensing Center, Texas A&M University, College Station, Texas 77843.

The suspension fence may be the answer to reducing cattle fencing costs. Savings of 40 to 60 percent over conventional fences can be expected.

With a suspension fence, the

number of line posts required is reduced approximately 50 percent as compared to conventional fencing, thus reducing the cost. This suspension fence is generally satisfactory for cattle, however, there are certain limitations on its use.

The general practice is to use four to six strands of barbed wire. It is similar to conventional wire fencing, except the line posts are placed up to 100 feet apart. Wire stays, spaced approximately 18 feet apart, are used to hold the strands at proper spacing.

Because of the wire's resilience, animals are not likely to run through it or break a strand; and because of the suspending action, bulls are discouraged from fighting through it.

The suspension fence cannot be used on a contour. It must be straight between the brace assemblies. The nature of the fence requires strong diameter and 1/2 foot long, set two to two and one-half feet into the ground, are recommended for the line posts. The recommended spacing is 100 feet.

The barbed wire should be stretched to permit a stretch sag between posts spaced 100 feet apart when the temperature is 40 to 70 degrees. To secure the wire to the brace assemblies, wrap it around the anchor post and apply it. Do this at the beginning and end of each stretch section.

Local extension agricultural agents can supply additional information on farm fencing.
