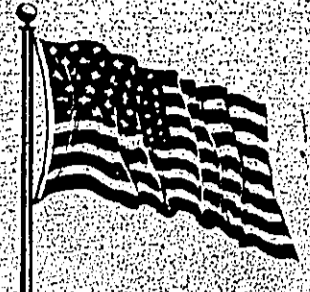

THREE-YEAR-OLD BOY KILLED WHEN PICKUP OVERTURNS

A three-year-old Port Arthur boy was killed and his mother seriously injured early Monday morning when a pickup truck overturned on Highway 69 five miles south of Woodville.

Killed was Anthony Francois, son of Mr. and Mrs. Rufus Francois. Mrs. Francois was brought to Tyler County Memorial Hospital with fractures of both legs and internal injuries. Mr. Francois, driver of the pickup, was not injured.

The accident occurred at 12:05 Monday when Francois, driving south, attempted to dodge three horses which were on the highway. He lost control of the truck and it overturned into a ditch on the right of the highway.

Alford Named Man Of Month By E-Tex Chamber of Commerce

Man of the Month in the December issue of the East Texas Magazine is Major F. Alford (Major is his given name - not rank). Since his return to Tyler County six years ago, Alford has become something of an "institution" with the Tyler County Chamber of Commerce. He is now serving his third year as president of the chamber.

According to the organization's bylaws, he will not be eligible to succeed himself for a fourth term, but few people expect him to quit chamber of commerce work.

Alford began his civic career in Joplin, Missouri, where he was manager of a wood

preserving plant for 17 years. He was also an active member of the Joplin Rotary Club during that period.

When he retired September 1, 1963, Alford had completed 42 years with Long-Bell Lumber Company and International Paper Company, which absorbed the Long-Bell interests.

Because of the beauty of East Texas and the congeniality of the people, Mr. and Mrs. Alford chose Woodville as their retirement home. Tyler is Alford's home county as he was born in Warren, a small town just south of Woodville. His parents moved to Singer, Louisiana, when he was seven years old, and he completed high school there.

In 1919 he moved to Shreveport, and in 1921 he went to work for Long-Bell as a bookkeeper.

After his retirement to Woodville, Alford continued his deep interest in civic affairs, which led him to become president of the Woodville Chamber of Commerce. The organization changed its name to Tyler County Chamber of Commerce during the first year he served as president.

Members and directors of the chamber soon found that if they needed to have any project started and completed in a quick and efficient manner, Alford was the equity representative, persistent man who would get it done, and so a pattern was formed which still continues.

It was a tribute to his bearing and ability that the directors chose him as president before many of the members were actually acquainted with him personally. He took office as president of the Tyler County Chamber February 3, 1967, and his third term will expire on approximately the same date in 1970.

While serving as president, Alford has also been its "unpaid" manager. He reports to the chamber officers regularly five days a week when not on a trip to advance his strong belief in tourism or in seeking new industry for the area.

Woodville citizens credit him with being responsible for the chamber becoming "tourism" oriented. Under his direction the organization has published brochures, maps of the area showing tourist attractions, and has placed advertising in the East Texas Vacation Guide published by the East Texas Chamber of Commerce.

He was instrumental in the establishment of information centers on all major highways entering Tyler County, and in an area rich in history he has also led the chamber of commerce in assisting the local historical survey committee in its work to mark many sites.

This tourism work knows no county lines with Major Alford, as he has strongly backed promotion of the tourist attractions of the Alabama-Coushatta Indian Reservation which is located 35 miles west of Woodville in Polk County.

Another lifetime interest of Alford is Missouri, in which he holds a 32nd degree.

Mr. and Mrs. Alford, the former Lucille Hatcher, are members of the Baptist Church. They have two daughters and four grandchildren.

When the East Texas Chamber of Commerce needed a representative from Tyler County on its board of directors, Alford was the logical man for the place, and the regional chamber is profiting from having him as a member of its "official family," reports C. Quentin Abernathy, president.

City Council To Consider Water, Sewage For Poultry Plant

Woodville City Council at its regular meeting Monday night heard a request for tax relief, obtained further information about the proposed telephone rate increase, and was presented a proposal to offer water and sewage service to a poultry processing plant.

Billy Mitchell, representing the Tyler County Industrial Corporation, told the council that Angelina Poultry Company is interested in building a poultry processing plant just north of Woodville. The city can furnish a large quantity of water and sewage facilities for the plant.

Mitchell said that Angelina Poultry Company is faced with updating its Lufkin plant and will consider building a modern poultry processing plant in Woodville. The plant will be built on a 400,000-gallon water daily and be provided with sewage service both at a reduced rate.

In talking with company officials, Mitchell said that they had suggested a 15-cent per thousand gallons water rate and a sewage charge of 15 percent of the water bill.

He said that Tyler County Industrial Corporation will build the plant on a lease-purchase plan. It will be located on the corporation property just north of the Roy Pace pasture on Highway 69. Target date for opening the plant will be August 1, 1970, provided details can be worked out.

Mitchell said the plant will employ about 150 persons on an eight-hour shift, with about 80 percent being women. Later another 50 persons will be employed if the company goes into packer cut-up chickens. The plant will eventually process about 7000 poultry daily.

Mitchell said that not all the water used will be dumped into the sewer system but that part will be used to make feed for the poultry.

The council took the proposition under consideration. City Secretary Walton Davis said that the city can supply the water without any problem, but would have to build another sewage treating plant in the area of the plant. Another sewage plant is under consideration to take care of the Chesswood subdivision but if the poultry plant was included in the plans it would take a large facility.

In discussion following the other business on the agenda, council members questioned whether the city could provide the water at the lower rate. City Secretary Davis said that if set between 20 and 25 cents to pump 1000 gallons of water.

The council decided to ask the city's engineering firm to look into the sewage disposal and determine if it is feasible to dump chicken waste into a domestic sewage system.

M. F. Alford, president of the Tyler County Chamber of Commerce, appeared at the meeting to invite the council members and their wives to the chamber's open house which will be held today (Thursday).

Jim Billion, representing the Woodville Inn, appeared to ask the council to lower three years of back taxes owed prior to its change of hands to the present owners. He pointed out that the tax had been reduced about 50 percent a few years previous to the current year and asked that the council accept a lower figure.

City Attorney Joe Wheat advised the council that as far as he could find in tax cases a city council cannot change a tax valuation set by a board of equalization. Billion asked for time to present some court findings and was given a week. He said his only other recourse is to go to court.

Jack Martin, local manager for Southwestern Bell, was present to answer further questions from council members regarding the increase in local telephone rates for which the company has asked the council.

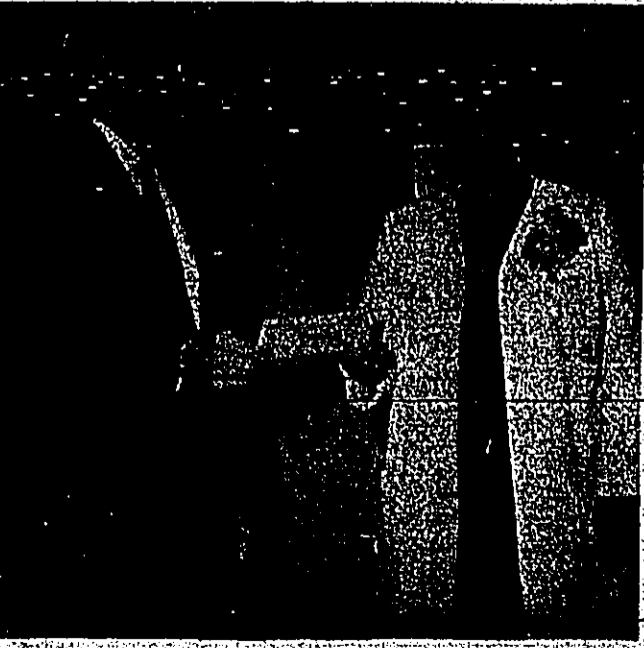
His selection by the East Texas group has been a well-kept secret and as this is written Tuesday Mr. Alford is still unaware of this honor.

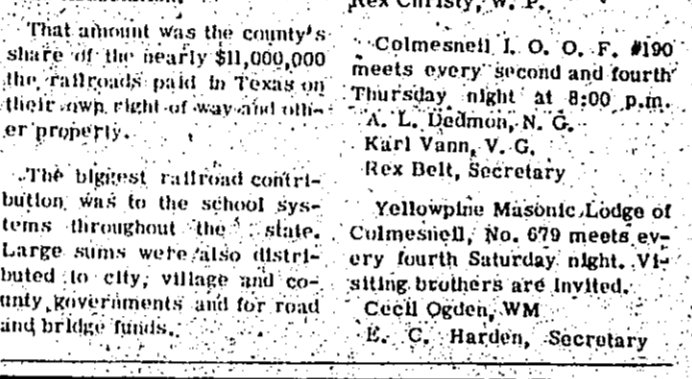
Railroad Taxes

Total \$12,397

Current annual taxes paid to the various government agencies by Texas railroads in 1968 for Tyler County totaled \$12,397, it is announced by the Texas Railroad Association.

The amount was the county's share of the nearly \$11,000,000 the railroads paid in Texas on their own right-of-way and other property.

The largest railroad contribution was to the school systems throughout the state. Large sums were also distributed to city, village and county governments and for road and bridge funds.

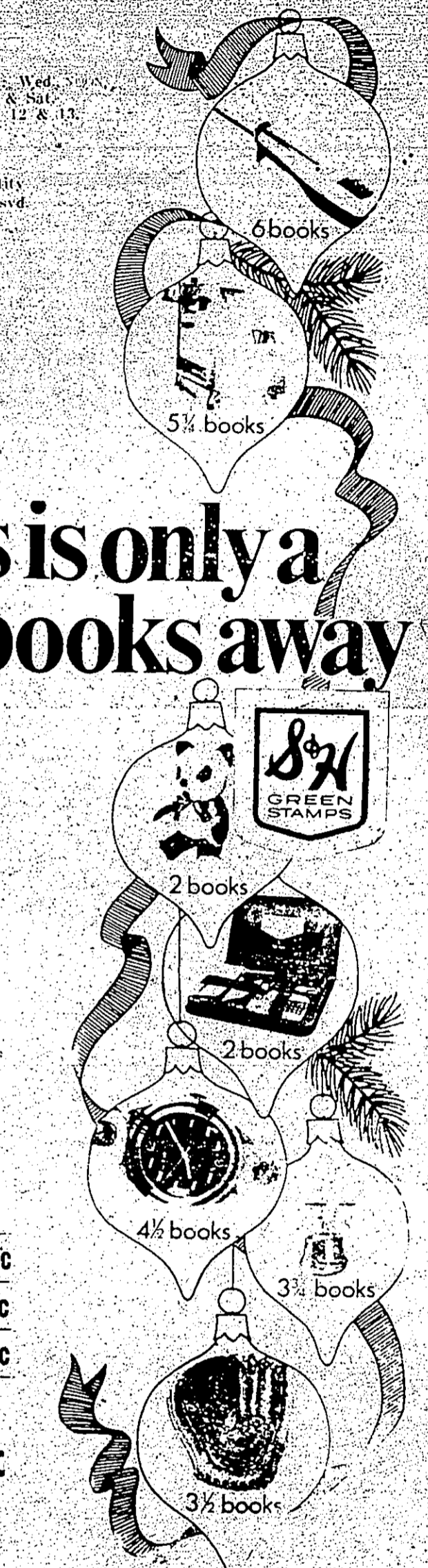

HOMEMAKING HINTS

By MRS. MAURINE J. MOONEY, HD Agent

Here are the three main types of pie you can make using your basic pie pastry. Single crust pies. Bottom crust and filling baked together. Example: pumpkin, custard, mince. Frequent problems: soggy crust. Solution: For custard pies, start baking in very hot (425-450 degree) oven, heated over 20 minutes. Serve soon after cooling. Never prick the crust. Seal all cracks to prevent filling from seeping through.

Double crust pies, filling top and bottom crust baked together. Example: fruit pies. Frequent problems: Overcooked. Note: Placing foil paper in pan is not recommended because of heat circulation as well as absorption by the pie pan. Collapsed top. Reduce amount of filling, to allow room for bubbling. Cut large enough slits in the top crust to allow steam to escape. Do not overcook. Fruit fillings are due when they will bubble vigorously. Pie must be stored in a cool place.

Single crust pie. Single crust pie is filled with a variety of meats, fish, or vegetables. Chicken, lemon, and other fillings. Frequent problems: soggy crust. Solution: Seal all cracks to prevent filling from seeping through.

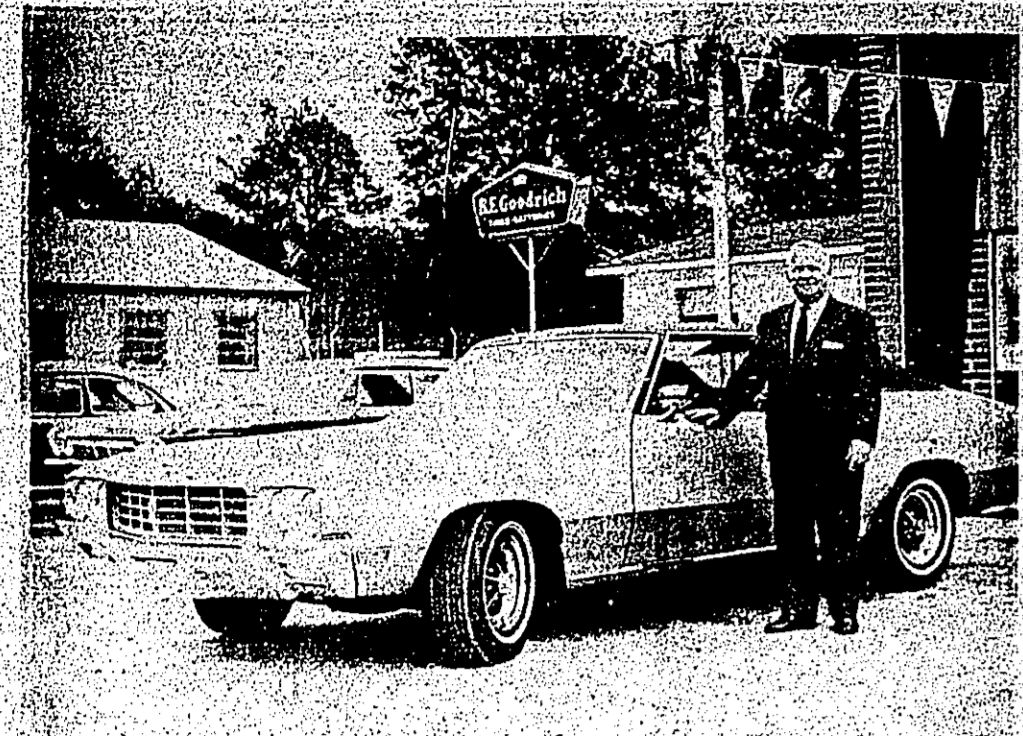
