ACROSS THE NATION

The House passed President Nixon's NATIONWIDE voting rights bills this past week as a substitute for the existing law which applies only in the South.

House vote by Texas Democrats FOR: (11) Bureson, Cable, Casey, Dowdy, Fisher, Mahon, Pickle, Poage, Roberts, Wright, Yound.

House vote of Texas Democrats AGAINST: (7) Brooks, De La Garza, Eckhart, Gonzales, Kazen, Patman, White.

House vote by Texas Republicans FOR: (3) All voted for.

All eight (8) Louisiana congressmen voted FOR.

The Senate passed the tax reform bill this past week, which now goes to the 3rd house, so to speak, to be refined for finalization.

The chief municipal judge of Newark, New Jersey, was suspended this past week for refusing to answer questions of a federal grand jury investigating alleged corruption in city government. Also, the Mayor and at least six of its nine city councilmen have been subpoenaed to appear before a federal grand jury that is sitting in the middle of investigating corruption in the state of New Jersey.

The National Commission of the Causes and Prevention of Violence, under the leadership of Dr. Milton S. Eisenhower, after 18 months of extensive research and look-see, wrote in its report the quoted warning: WE SOLEMNLY DECLARE OUR CONVICTION THAT THIS NATION IS ENTERING A PERIOD IN WHICH OUR PEOPLE NEED TO BE AS CONCERNED BY THE INTERNAL DANGERS TO OUR FREE SOCIETY AS BY ANY PROBABLE COMBINATION OF EXTERNAL THREATS.

This quote was made as the need for a serious attempt to switch the United States from a "preoccupation" with war, foreign affairs and the conquest of space to its own DOMESTIC PROBLEMS.

The report stated that for three decades, the national defense has ranked first by far in our scale of priorities, and much of the time necessarily so, however, while serious external dangers remain, the commission considers the internal threats graver, i.e., disfiguring of the environment, unprecedented interdependence and the dislocation of human identity, haphazard urbanization, racial discrimination and motivation created by the affluent society—all resulting in a rising tide of individual and group violence.

The commission was comprised of a cross-section of American intellectuals, totaling 13, that included two Negroes.

Vice-President Spiro T. Agnew has criticized the nation's emphasis on higher education and wants to get going on the restoration of the manual arts "to their rightful place of esteem."

Agnew wants to quickly de-emphasize the need for college degrees in today's scheme—stating over-emphasis has prolonged the period of de-

pendency, disenfranchised our young adults, discriminated against non-college youth and directed others in disregard of their desires, into higher education.

Agnew called for the government business and academic communities and parents to inventory their thinking on "major academic reform," de-emphasizing the need for a college degree in order to achieve a good life.

Economic slow-down will continue through the first quarter of 1970, but will take off at an accelerated pace come spring of 1970. The pause until spring will not deflate the inflation much, but could affect unemployment. It has been stated that unemployment could reach 4.5 to 5.0%, as compared to about 3.7% this year.

The Ford Foundation has announced a \$250,000 program to train present and incoming mayors, as well as other elected officials and staffs in urban management during the next two years.

General Motors announced their cars are now being equipped with an anti-slip device, which reveals any tampering in order to reduce car mileage. The cable is also irreversible so that mileage cannot be lowered by spinning it backward.

General Motors Corporation, Detroit, Michigan, announced that they were recalling about 500 early-production 1970 LeSabre, Wildcat and Electra Buicks for modification of disc brakes, and 835 Tempest, Pontiac and Grand Prix models for changes in the electrical circuits of window defrosters.

School Board Meeting Held Monday Night

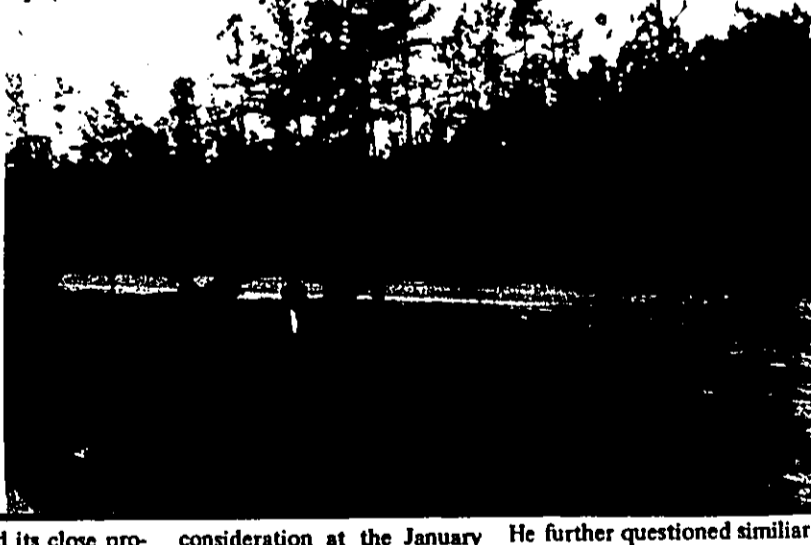
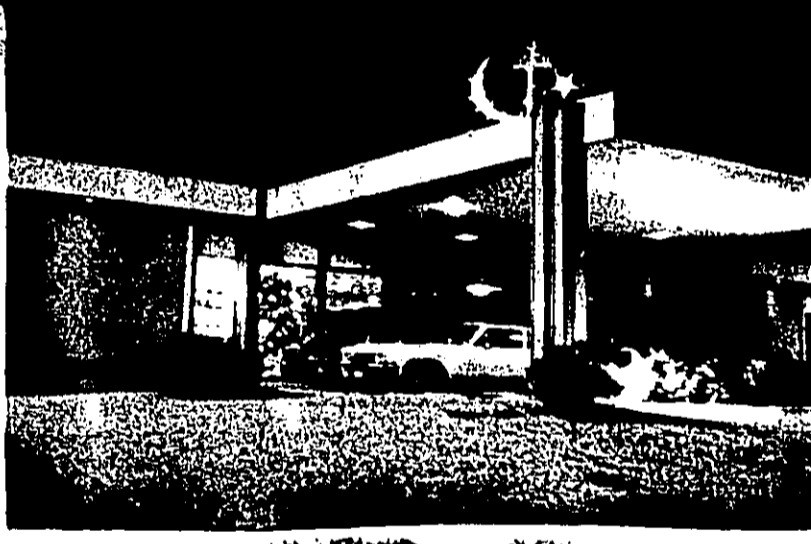
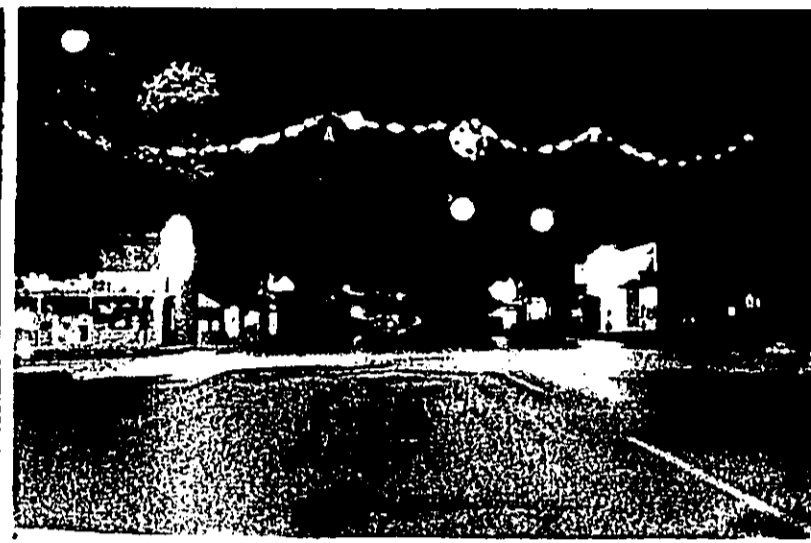
The board of trustees of the Woodville Independent School District met in regular monthly session with the following members present: W. S. Jarrott, F. M. Archer, R. C. Galbreth, Dr. L. G. Burton, Dr. W. S. Nichols, Dr. R. E. Swearingen and J. W. Gainey.

Not on the agenda, but the first action taken up by the board was an audience to representative of the Tenneco Pipeline Company of Houston, Texas. Mr. Glynn Nance, Bill F. Gilbreath and Jack Snowden stated that they received notice from the tax office on July 24, 1969 to appear if desirable with the school equalization board on August 5, 1969. They claimed that they did not take time to present their evidence because of a gentlemen's agreement with the members of the equalization board, mainly Mr. Luther Owens, that if an increase of overlast years evaluation was to stand that they (the pipeline company) be notified to reappear for another hearing with the equalization board. They never received another notice. On

October 20, 1969, they requested the Board to ask the equalization board to reconvene. It was inadvertent that no school board meeting was held due to a lack of quorum, but those board members present listened to Mr. Gilbreath's plea at that time.

A motion by board member, R. C. Galbreth to provide copies of all correspondence to and from the Pipeline Company, as well as all other legal matters to all board members, died for lack of a second. Dr. L. G. Burton moved that members of the past equalization board, the tax assessor-collector and legal counselors, with the minutes of the equalization board, be asked to attend the regular January meeting of the school district so that the board could be informed of their intentions in this matter. The

motion was seconded by Dr. R. E. Swearingen and the board voted its approval. Minutes of the meeting of November 17, 1969 were considered by the board. Mr. R. C. Galbreth requested to change his vote of approval in the minutes of the 1968-1969 Annual Fiscal Audit. It was stated that the minutes of this meeting would note this change of vote. F. M. Archer moved that the minutes be approved subject to this change. Dr. L. G. Burton seconded the motion and the board voted its approval.

Superintendent B. H. McGuire reported a discussion with Mr. Walton Davis, City Secretary as to the response of the State Highway Department to the request of the school for a traffic survey to be made at the junction of Highway

287 and 69 and its close proximity to the entrance of the new school vocational building. The survey showed that (3) three blinker lights were recommended due to pedestrian traffic rather than vehicular traffic. The response from the Highway Department further showed that they would install all the lights, but the cost would be approximately \$750.00, which must be carried by the city or the school district. Mr. Davis had stated, as reported by Mr. McGuire, that the city council had already considered and refused to underwrite the cost of the lights. It is so ironic that this same day there were two traffic fatalities at this location. With this in mind, possible discussion of board members and city councilman can be held informally and the matter will be scheduled for consideration at the January Board meeting.

Superintendent McGuire further reported two additional requests for 75 old folding chairs. One request had been made in November by the Pine Hill Recreational Development Club, and the two additional ones were made by The Saint Lawrence Catholic Church and the Cobb Mill Baptist Church. Mr. Jim Gainey made a motion that the chairs be divided equally 25 per each request. The motion was seconded by Dr. R. E. Swearingen and the board voted its approval.

The general financial statement for the month of November was considered by the board. Mr. R. C. Galbreth questioned the summary of expenditures not being the same as actual expenditures for the month of November.

Car-Truck Accident Kills 2 Rockland Women

Two persons were killed, one instantly, and another of injuries received in a two-vehicle accident in Woodville Monday. Mrs. Myrtle Elliott Barclay, 63 of Rockland was killed in the accident. Mrs. Arthur Brown, 63, Mrs. Barclay's sister, also of Rockland, died about 9 p.m. Monday in Tyler County Hospital.

Funeral services for Mrs. Barclay and Mrs. Brown are pending at Edwards Funeral Home in Woodville.

The accident occurred at the junction of U.S. 69 and U.S. 287 on the north side of Woodville.

Mrs. Barclay was driving a 1964 automobile which collided with a truck driven by Robert James Riedy, 52, of Collins, Ohio, who was traveling south on U.S. 69.

According to Edward Sumrall, assistant chief of police Mrs. Barclay was attempting to cross 69 and was in collision with the truck.

John Grammer, chief of police assisted with the investigation.

Riedy was not injured according to police.

Mrs. Barclay was a native of Tyler County and lived in Rockland for the past six years. She was a Baptist.

Survivors are two sons, Billy Bruce Barclay of De-Ridder and Buster Haley; mother, Mrs. Emma Elliott of Woodville; one sister, Mrs. Nora Smith of Woodville; two brothers, Roy Elliott of Lake Jackson and Odell Elliott of Colmesneil and eight grandchildren.

Mrs. Brown is survived by her husband, Arthur Brown of Rockland, two daughters, Mrs. W. E. Daniels of Colmesneil; and Mrs. Elzie Dean of Rockland; one son, Olen of Kirbyville; nine grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren.

District Director of Internal Revenue R. L. Phinney said today that household employers in the Austin District will receive through the mail on or about January 2 pre-addressed Forms 942.

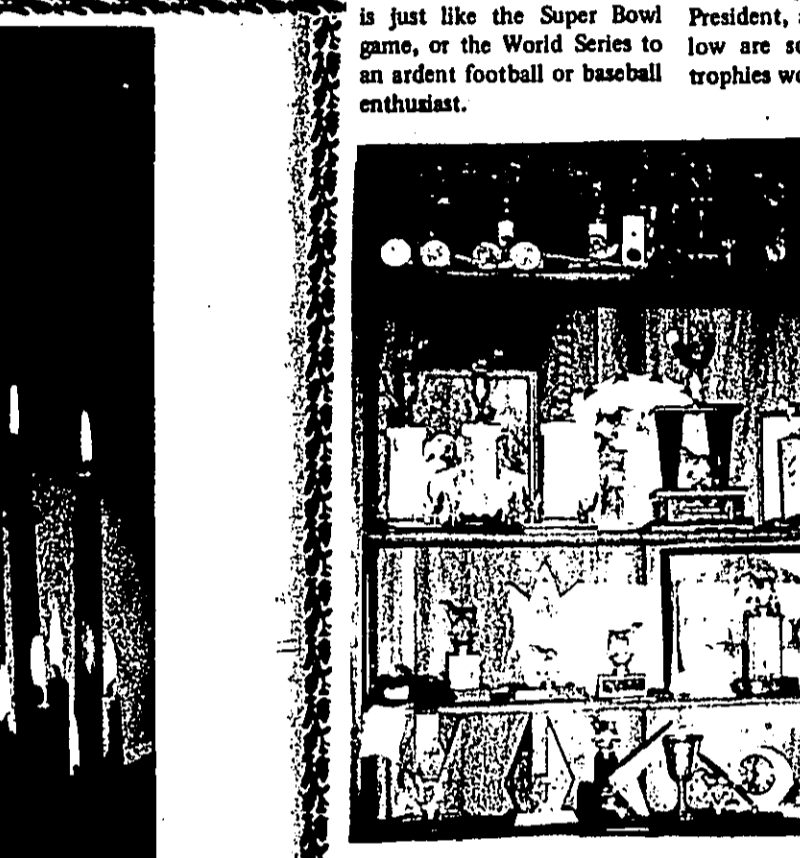

We have been told by an old-time drummer that he had eaten more different kinds of pumpkin pie than anyone else in the world.

Combine all ingredients except eggs and milk. Beat eggs and add, then gradually add evaporated milk, beating smooth with wire whisk.

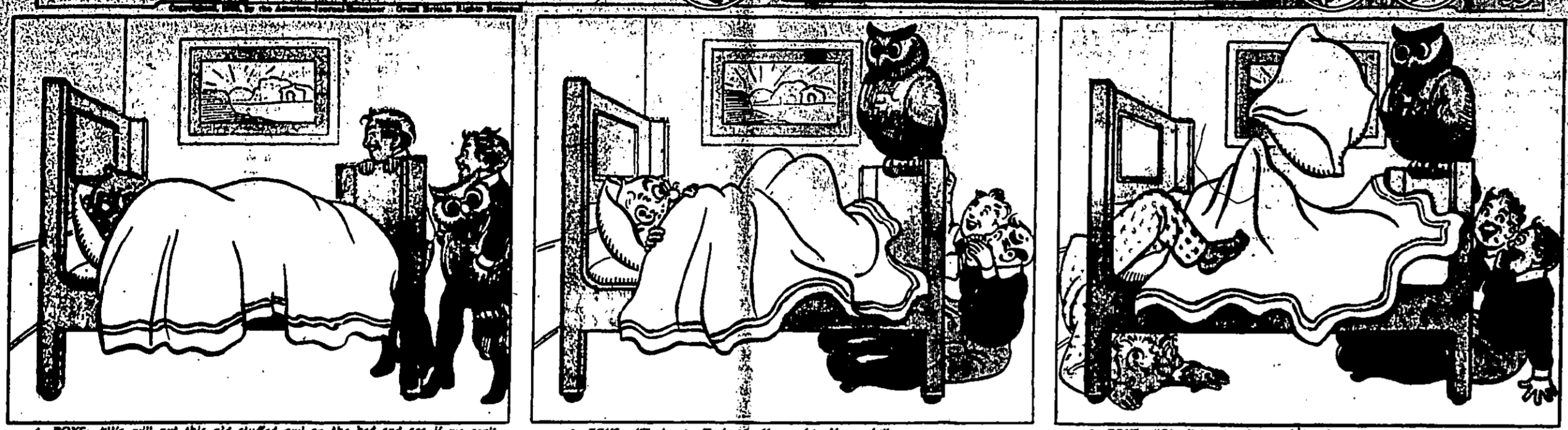

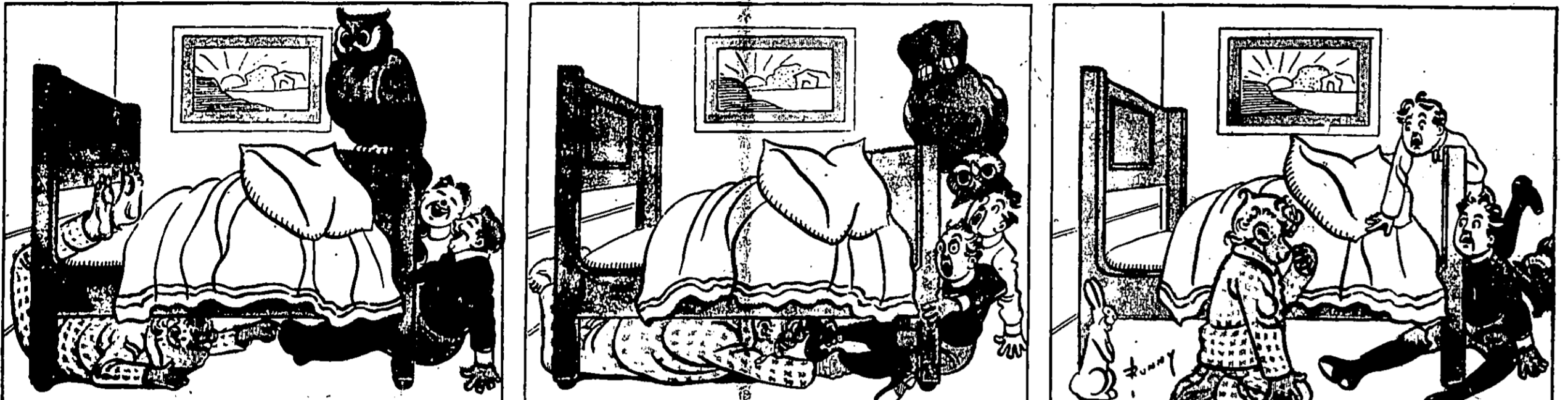

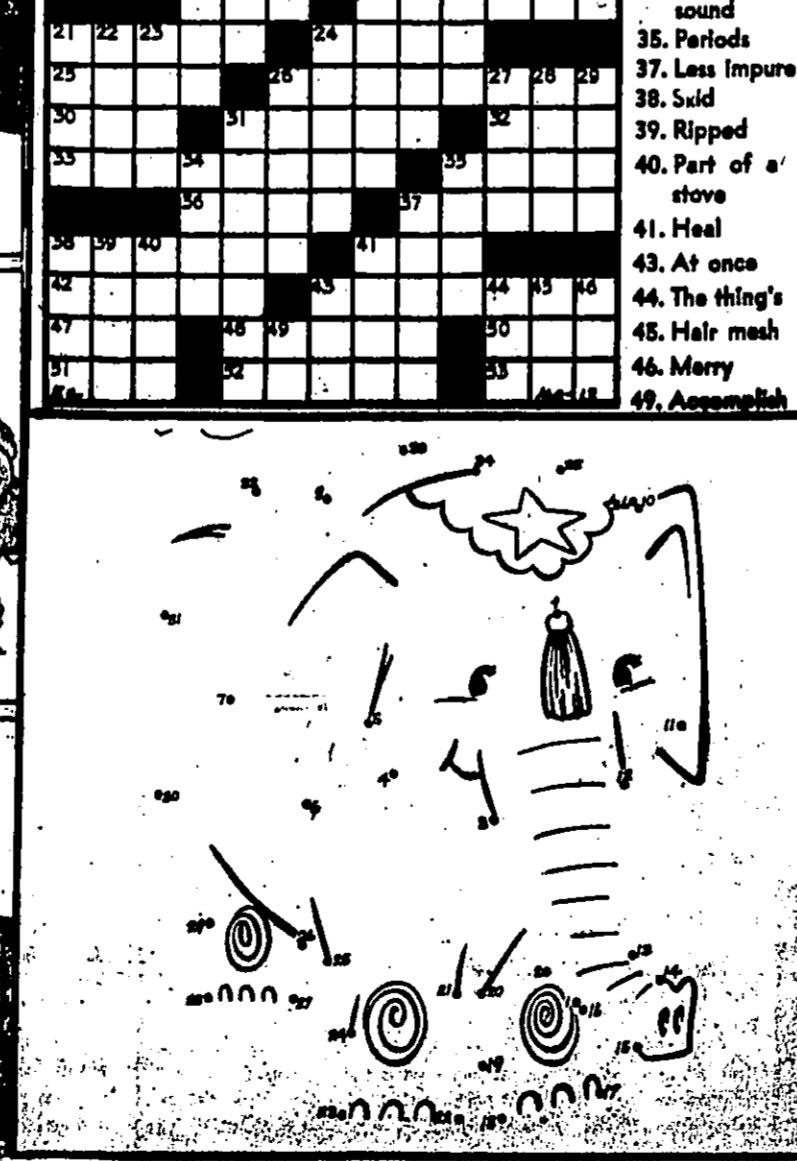

Hymns

"Nearer My God To Thee" was written by Mrs. Sarah Flower Adams (1805 to 1880). She was richly endowed, acknowledged God as the giver, and gave him in return the fruit of her talents. Her youth was happy, though her mother had died when Sarah was very young. Her father was a companionable friend. Sarah had literary ambitions. Robert Browning was one of her understanding friends. She was a member of the Unitarian Church. She died of consumption two years after the death of an older sister. They had been friends as well as sisters, one setting the hymns of the other to music. "Nearer My God To Thee" was Mrs. Adams' thirteenth hymn. It was published in 1841.

Many dramatic incidents are connected with this hymn. The dying words of President McKinley is one of them. He, remarked with his dying breath that it had framed his constant prayer. It was sung all over the land at Memorial services for him. Also when the steamship Titanic sank in 1912, the ship's band stood in formation playing "Nearer My God To Thee" as they sank with the ship.



Social Security Questions & Answers

If you're a woman, you should know about social security benefits as better than those of your husband or your brother," according to L. R. James, district manager of social security in Lufkin. "Fifty-one percent of our beneficiaries are adult women," said James, "while only 34 percent are adult men. In addition, it is women who manage most of the benefits paid to children, who make up 15 percent of all social security beneficiaries."

"A woman who works builds valuable retirement and disability protection for herself and her dependents," James pointed out. And payments are payable to her children in the event of her death just as in the case of a man. A woman who has not worked outside her home may qualify for social security benefits on her husband's record.

James said, "what the social security law recognizes that being a housewife and mother is a special career."

Some of the ways you can qualify for social security payments as a woman, according to James, are:

- (1) As a wife, when your husband is getting social security benefits and you are 62 or older, or have children under 18, or disabled children in your care;
- (2) As a widow at 60 or older or as early as age 50 if severely disabled;
- (3) As a young widow, if you have children under 18, or disabled children in your care;
- (4) In certain cases, even a divorced wife may qualify for payments.

"Since the possibility of a woman getting social security benefits is greater than that of a man, it is needed for a woman to find out about social security, no matter whether she is a working woman or a housewife. Your social security office has a number of booklets with general information about specific parts of the program," James said. "He suggested the booklet 'Your Social Security' for an overall view of social security and also "Social Security for Young Families" as good reading for the working woman and wife and mother. The social security office in Lufkin is located in Chestnut Village Shopping Center. The telephone number is 634-6633.
