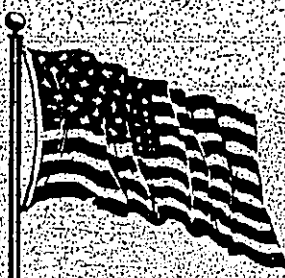

Indians To Install New First Chief

Chief B. Cooper Sylestine died in February, 1969 after having served as Chief, Alabama-Coushatta Indians, since 1936. It is traditional for the Tribes to elect their Chiefs for life and have the Inaugural Ceremonies on the first day of the year.

Fulton Battise, born March 10, 1909, who has served as Second Chief for the past thirty-three years, will become Chief on January 1, 1970. The election results for the new Second Chief will not be known until December 31, 1969. Both Chiefs will be installed by the Traditional Customs and Ceremonies seldom witnessed. This occasion happens only once in a lifetime.

At 10:30 a.m. on January 1st distinguished guests will welcome the visitors, Governor Preston Smith, Senator Ralph Yarborough, Congressman John Dowdy and other officials have been invited to speak. At 11:00 a.m. the Traditional Chiefs' Inaugural Ceremonies will take place in the same manner as performed by the Tribes through hundreds of years of history. The knowledge of the ceremony is handed down from generation to generation.

After the Ceremonies, at 12:00 noon, the Bar-B-Que Building, Dining Room, Museum, Arts and Crafts Shop and other activities will open.

Gas Lines Protest School Tax

The board of trustees of the Woodville Independent School District heard representatives of Teneco Gas Company, who are protesting their tax valuation by the school's equalization board, at the regular meeting Monday night.

The board told the Teneco representatives that it will discuss taxes with the equalization board members and bring the question up again at the January meeting.

Teneco and United Gas Company have filed up payment of taxes to the Woodville district pending their efforts to lower their valuations set by the school equalization board.

Board members also discussed getting a traffic light installed at the intersection of Pine Street and North Magnolia (Highway 287 and 69) which is near the access road to the new vocational building. The State Highway Department set the cost of the installation at \$750 and the City of Woodville has declined to stand the cost. The board voted to discuss the installation with the resident engineer of the highway department.

The financial report for September, October and November was presented to the board. They were reviewed and Trustees Richard Galbreath questioned the correctness of some figures. Supt. B. H. McGuire said he would check these and bring the report back to the January meeting before asking approval.

A report on delinquent tax collection progress was made by Harry Stafford, attorney, representing Wheat, Wheat and Stafford who have a contract to proceed with back tax collections.

Two Women Killed In Truck-Car Wreck

A car-truck collision in the city limits of Woodville at 2:55 p.m. Monday claimed the lives of two local girls.

The girls, Myrtle El-Jon Barclay, 62, and Mrs. Evie Brown, 69, who were riding in a light sedan which was struck on the driver's side by a tractor-trailer driven by Robert J. Rouse of Collins, Ohio. Mrs. Barclay, who was driving, was dead on arrival at Tyler County Hospital, where she was taken in an Edwards ambulance. Mrs. Brown died at 9:00 p.m. Monday night at the hospital.

The accident occurred at the intersection of Pine and North Magnolia streets (Highway 69 and 287) when the car driven by Mrs. Brown attempted to cross Magnolia (Highway 69). The light car was dragged several yards by the heavily loaded truck.

The accident was investigated by Assistant Police Chief Edward Sumral assisted by Chief John Grammer, Sheriff Grady Ray and deputies assisted in directing traffic around the wreck scene.

Joint funeral services for the victims will be held at 11:00 a.m. Thursday at Edwards Funeral Home chapel.

Dr. Raymond Parker, pastor of the First Baptist Church in Woodville, will officiate at services for Mrs. Barclay. The Rev. Rowat Smith, pastor of the First Baptist Church in Doucette, will be officiant for the services for Mrs. Brown.

Interment for Mrs. Barclay will be in Mt. Pisgah cemetery and for Mrs. Brown in Gregory cemetery near Colmesneil.

Mann Buys Controlling Interest In Waco Bank

A transaction involving the controlling interest in the First National Bank of Waco, the city's largest, was concluded Friday by Robert Allen Mann of Woodville.

Mann purchased 92,000 shares, about 51 percent of the bank's stock at a cost of \$75 per share for a total of about \$6.9 million.

In competing the transaction, Mann confirmed that his bank management firm, now headquartered in Woodville, will be transferred to Waco. The firm, Fidelity Services Corporation, manages Citizens State Bank of Woodville along with Sabine National Bank of Port Arthur, The First Bank and Trust Company of Richardson, East Texas Bank and Trust Company of Longview, Kilgore, National Bank of Kilgore and Fidelity Savings and Loan Association of Port Arthur.

Mr. Mann also announced in Waco that he and his family will move to Waco in January.

All employees of Fidelity Services Corporation have been asked to move with the firm to Waco. About six families are involved.

Mr. Mann is a native of Woodville and a graduate of Kirby High School. He is a graduate of Southern Methodist University with a bachelor's degree in banking and financing. After graduation from SMU he was with the State Banking Commission. He succeeded his father, the late Dave P. Mann, as president of Citizens State Bank in Woodville at the latter's death in 1959.

Mr. Mann is serving on the Finance Commission of Texas with a term expiring in 1973. He is director in the Tyler County Industrial Corporation. He is a member of the Methodist Church, the Rotary Club of which he is a past president, and the Tyler County Chamber of Commerce. He is a former regent of Lamar Tech, and a member of the Boy Scout Finance Committee.

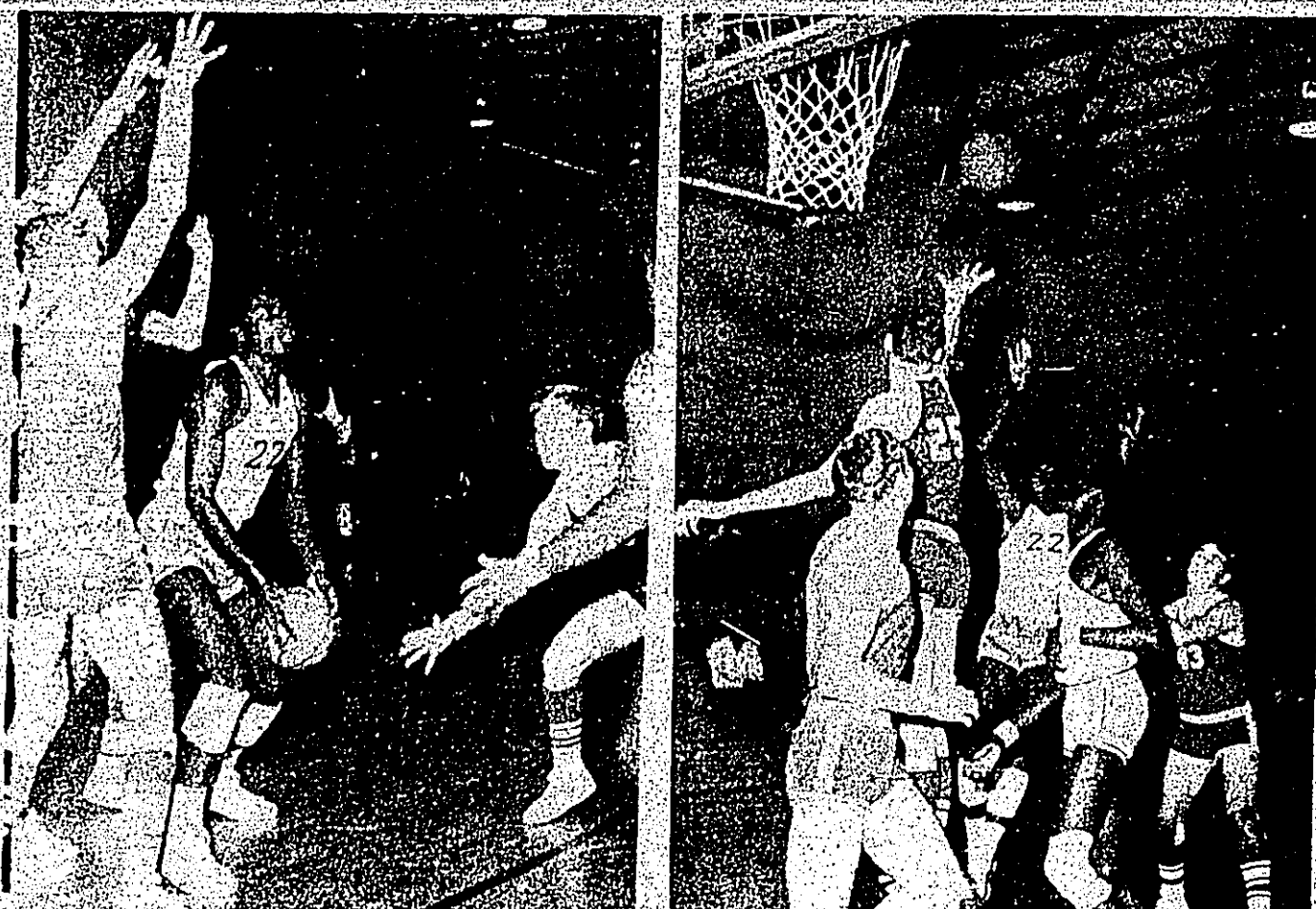

The need for identifying and tagging bull ticks is a necessary and periodic observation during the breeding season. Annual checks are a necessity and periodic observations also advised.

Many of the problems of soil gardening can be eliminated before they begin by fertilizing the planting soil.

The simple test heat treatment involves getting the soil to a temperature of 160 degrees.

First put the soil to be treated in a pan and make sure it is level. Cover the pan with foil and seal around the edges.

Set the oven at 270 degrees and watch the temperature. When it reaches 160 degrees, cut back the oven setting to maintain the soil heat at that level.

Soil temperatures higher than 280 degrees will destroy the soil structure and burn up organic materials, causing the empty space.
