# 5,000 Gospel Singers Expected At Fete Here



(The following is taken from the Lima (Ohio) News and gives one fighting man's views of the Vietnam war. It was sent our way by former Woodville resideni Jerry Gafford):

The Christmas "Star of Peace'' in one more paradoxical grim jest that. marks our modern existence once again shone over Vietnam this past week, calendaring another year in the struggle now several decades long that has ravaged the southeastern Asian nation.

And once again Lima's J. Gregg Mikesell, son of Mr. and Mrs. Edwin E. Mikesell 64 Sherwood Ct. finds himself spending another Christmas season amid the blood stench, filth, humidity, heat and death. It is his second duty tour in South Vietnam:

In December 1966, he was 2nd Lt. Mikesell, a shavetail Army infantry officer wounded twice and decorated with the Bronze Star and

He returned to this country to his family and his Korean wife Azea Kim, also residing in Lima. He underwent helicopter pilot training, was advanced to captain and went back to war.

Earlier this month word was received Capt. Mikesell was awarded the "Air Medal for Valor" and five other air

Capt. Mikesell knows exactly why he's in Vietnam and why he and the United. States are fighting this war. But the captain is also "confused" and admitted it in a letter this past week to News city editor George Dunster.

know there are many sad stories of Vietnam and I truly can understand how our people at home could believe them. I know that right now there are people in Lima that are confused about the My Lai story (site of alleged U.S. troops massacre of Vietnamese civilians) and I can understand that,

"What confuses me is the lack of stories about all the good that has been done by our men here," Capt Mikeseli wrote.

He contends, "No one ever talks about the miles and miles of Toads that have been built ... the hundreds and hundreds of homes that have been constructed . . . the many and varied and new farming methods the

Americans have brought to the Vietnamese people! No one ever talks abou the hundreds and hundreds of Vietnamese Lives—that—havebeen saved because of improved medical treatment the American doctors (civilian and military) have enlightened these people

"No one ever talks about the one American soldier that gives his last bar of soap to a small Vietnamese child," the letter stated.

Unequivocally Capt. Mikesell declares, "I have never witnessed any act that would come near being dishonorable, or distasteful to the American people except, (Continued on page 10)
