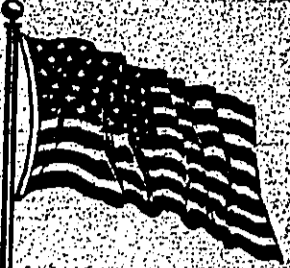

City Council Discusses Poultry Plant Bid Monday

The Woodville City Council Monday night at a special session discussed the proposal of Angelina Poultry Company of Lufkin to move its plant to the Woodville area if satisfactory water and sewer rates can be obtained from the city.

Billy Mitchell, representing the Tyler County Industrial Corporation, said that the corporation would invest about \$500,000 in the new plant for the poultry firm. He recently appeared before the council with a request for figures on water and sewer rates and told the council that a rate of 15 cents per 1000 gallons on water and 15 cents on sewer were recom-

mended as being what the poultry plant could operate on.

At Monday night's meeting a representative of the city's engineering firm was present to give the council statistical estimates on the cost of a sewer plant large enough to handle the poultry firm and figures on what the city could sell water and sewer service to the poultry plant.

He told the councilmen that the city can furnish the water and sewer service at 25 cents per thousand gallons for each minus any special consideration ratewise for the boost in the economy the establishment of the plant will bring to the city.

He told the councilmen that a plant large enough to handle the poultry plant waste plus the Chesswood addition will cost \$495,000 and that 8/10's of the cost would be caused by the poultry plant necessitating such a larger plant.

The councilmen then were advised by the engineering representative that they should consider with a company which sells the city's bonds to determine the possibility of selling them and the rate of interest the bonds would have to draw to be marketable.

Councilman Gardner Parks said that the city is almost up to its present limit in bonded indebtedness and that the state law restricts interest payable to 6.5 cents for all agencies of government. He doubted that the city could sell bonds at that rate since on the present market large companies are having difficulty selling bonds at 7 cents and above.

Mr. Parks moved that the city "decline the opportunity" and Councilman J. G. Anderson seconded it. However, before it could be brought to a vote Councilman Leroy Davis said the city needed the plant and the city should make some kind of proposal to the company.

The city engineer representative said it would take over \$28,000 annually to pay out the plant in 20 years providing the bonds can be sold. City Secretary Walton Davis said that it will cost about \$14,000 annually to operate a plant as large as proposed. This would necessitate a return of at least \$32,000 annually from the poultry plant, and City Attorney Josiah Wheat asked Mr. Mitchell if Angelina Poultry would guarantee that amount as a minimum.

Leroy Davis made a motion that the city make the poultry company a proposal to that effect contingent on the city's ability to finance the plant. The motion passed.

Other business brought before the council included the purchase of a pickup truck after bids are let, the purchase of another car radio, and a proposal to include mandatorily all firemen in the pension and accident program with a stipulation that each fireman make a certain percentage of fire calls to be eligible.

There are three deadlines which many of our readers may be interested in. One is the end of the voter registration period Saturday. A man or woman otherwise eligible cannot file Gripping Rights for one year, just by registering to vote—and then voting when the opportunity arises.

Another deadline is the time in which a political aspirant may file for a place on the Democratic or Republican primary ballots. That is February 2, and Morris Clemmons (Dem.) or Allen Coats (Rep.) will be happy to fix you up if you have the money.

And of course your taxes should be paid by January 31 (that's Saturday also) to avoid penalty.

Voter Registration Ends Sat.

Tyler County's tax office will remain open all day Saturday for the convenience of persons who have not filled out a voter registration application. Tax Assessor-Collector Tom Sawyer announced Monday.

Mr. Sawyer said that eligible persons are urged to fill out an application at once and not wait until the deadline Saturday. However, his office will remain open to take care of those who have not yet filled out an application. Hours will be from 8 a.m. until 4 p.m.

There is no charge for registering to vote but applications for registration slips must be filled out and signed before Saturday night. Application forms have been left at business places throughout the county. Mr. Sawyer said, but if they are not available in your area you may fill one out at the tax office, Sawyer said. A form is printed in this week's Booster which may be filled out and mailed to Mr. Sawyer.

Persons who have filled out

applications and have not received their registration slips are urged NOT to fill out another as that will confuse the tax office records. The tax office staff is making out the registration slips as fast as possible and they will be mailed to the applicant as quickly as possible—even after January 31, as long as the application was made previous to the deadline Saturday.

Mr. Sawyer said that applications at the various stores in the county will be picked up early Monday and registration slips mailed to the applicants as soon as possible.

In other words, he said, anyone who has already made out an application is asked to be patient and he will receive his registration slip by mail soon.

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LICENSE PLATES TO GO ON SALE AT TAX OFFICE FEBRUARY 16

License plates for 1970 will become available at the office of the tax assessor-collector on February 16, according to Tom Sawyer.

Owners whose autos were registered in 1969 are being registered in 1970 which they may fill out and either take to the tax office or which may be mailed, Mr. Sawyer said. This will greatly facilitate the registration of cars this year.

The forms must be returned to the tax office with the proper amount for registration and if the motorist wants his tags mailed to him he must enclose an additional \$1.00.

The slim white envelope is sent by first class mail with an address window and is plainly printed "This is your license plate renewal application." Car owners have only to follow the instructions enclosed to complete the application.

reading: "Important -- This is Your License Plate Renewal Application."

2. The envelope will contain a three-part form. Do not separate the three parts.

3. You may renew your motor vehicle license registration during January and February by mailing the three-part form (in fact) and your check to your county tax collector. Add \$1 for postage and handling charges for each vehicle. License plates will be mailed February 1 and thereafter.

4. You may renew your motor vehicle license registration during February and March by taking the three-part form (in fact) and your check to the tax collector's office or substitution.

That's it. Now see if you are one of the seven million-plus Texas motorists who can follow those "easy-to-follow instructions."

The Texas Highway Department is sporting a red face. In recent news releases announcing the new computerized motor vehicle registration system, Department information specialists wrote:

"Easy-to-follow instructions are printed on the three-part form."

That must be a mistake because a lot of motorists haven't been following instructions. And mistakes generate confusion.

This is the first year that the Department has gone to the new system, which includes an order-by-mail program for obtaining 1970 motor vehicle license plates.

But just to make sure that motorists do understand the "easy-to-follow instructions" they are:

1. Each motorist whose vehicle was registered last year has or will receive in the mail a long narrow envelope with a printed message on the front

1040 U.S. Individual Taxpayers Ask IRS

This column of questions and answers on federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U.S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

Q Can you claim someone as a dependent who is not related to you but who is a member of your household for the entire year may be claimed as a dependent when the other tests are met. You will find these tests listed on page B-2 of the 1040 package mailed recently. The handy index on the inside cover of the package indicates where instructions on a particular subject may be found.

Q When am I going to get my estimated tax forms? I didn't see them in the 1040 package you sent.

A) An estimated tax form package will be mailed in January to all those who filed estimated declarations last year. It will contain four pre-addressed vouchers to make sure estimated tax installment payments are properly and quickly credited to the taxpayer's account. Four envelopes have also been included in the package for the taxpayer's convenience in mailing payments.

Q I lost the 1040 statement I received from a part-time job last year. Do I need it?

A) Yes. Copy B of Form W-2 from each of your employers must be attached to the back of your Form 1040. Contact your former employer and ask for a duplicate copy of your missing W-2.

Q I earned interest from several savings accounts last year. According to the tax form I got, it looks like I don't have to show the interest amount from each bank. Is that right?

A) If your interest income is \$100 or less, you may simply enter the total amount on line 13 of Form 1040. When interest income is over \$100, amounts should be listed separately on Schedule B. This Schedule should be attached to Form 1040 when you file.

Q Are Social Security benefits taxable?

A) No. Social Security benefits are not taxable.

Pine Seedlings Donated To Young People By SWT

This year 140,000 free pine seedlings were donated by Southwestern Timber Company of Jasper, and purchased from the Texas Forest Service were distributed by the Texas Forestry Association to East Texas youths.

The pine seedlings distribution program, according to G. R. Crawford of Jasper, TFA president, "is one of the major educational projects of the TFA." Crawford also said, "The purpose of the project is to encourage young people to plant trees of their own, thus creating an interest in forest fire prevention and the great economic importance of our forest resources. Each \$1.00 from standing trees adds \$1.00 to the fund."

Q Do you have to itemize your medical expenses to be able to deduct one-half of Blue Cross or other medical insurance premiums?

A) You don't have to itemize your medical expenses to claim this deduction, but you have to choose the itemized method of claiming your deductions. In other words, you can't use either the standard or minimum standard deduction if you want to deduct medical insurance premiums.

Q One-half your medical insurance premiums (not more than \$150) should be shown on line 1 of Schedule A and added to your other itemized deductions and the Schedule attached to the Form 1040 you file. Instructions for filing this Schedule A are printed on the back of this form. Copies of the Schedule are provided for your convenience in the 1040 tax package.

Q My wife and I are filing separate returns. Can I itemize while she takes standard deductions?

A) No. Married couples filing separate returns must handle their deductions the same way. If one itemizes deductions, the other must also itemize.

Q Married couples filing separately must also take the same type of standard deduction. If one takes the 10 percent standard deduction, both must take it.

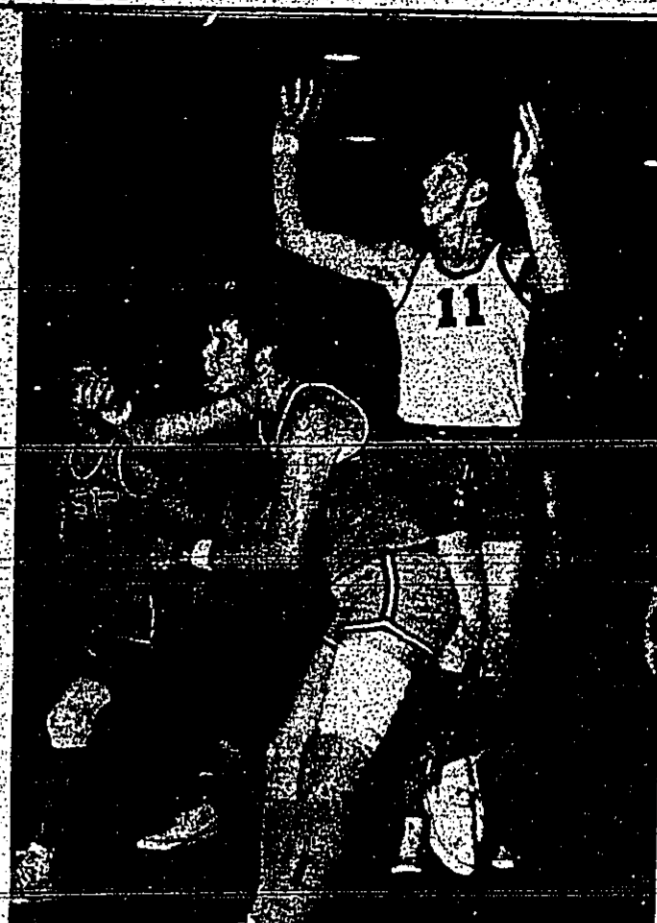
