"Now when I was your age, we didn't have all the advantages you kids have today," each older generation has told the young people from as far back, perhaps, as Adam.
And we suppose as society has progressed and become more affluent that the statement, to some extent, has been true.
Certainly in this country the pioneers cleared the wilderness, built homes, established cities and towns, and left them as a legacy to their children and grandchildren. Other men pioneered in science, in mechanics, in medicine, and in other fields. Succeeding generations took these legacies and advanced them until today we have a highly sophisticated society within which some people feel stymied and therefore frustrated.

This has been that each succeeding generation has had more advantages than its predecessors.
Granddad reared six children on a blackland farm and since his work day was sun to sun he probably didn't have time to meditate on his hardships. At least he didn't complain about any. In fact he seemed proud of what he had accomplished and even, at 85, wasn't too bitter toward the Yankees for shooting him out of his saddle during the Civil War.

In the next generation, my dad was a little more inclined to look back at some periods of his youth with discontent. Mainly the custom of leaving school out in the spring so that the boys could help chop and plow cotton, then holding school in the summer so that they could let out again while it was being picked. Then after he was a young family man there was the Model T Ford which, on cold mornings, was started with a kettle of cold water, the rear wheel jacked up, and cranked with a strong right arm. As his first-born, it was my duty to sit under the wheel and, when the motor began sputtering, to quickly pull the spark lever down. (The spark lever had to be up when cranking or the motor would backfire with enough force to break an arm, and many a Model T driver suffered that fate).

Now my own generation had a great deal to complain about. The long walk to school, rain or shine. Having to earn our own spending money by working after school on Saturdays. Not being allowed to drive the family car (now with self-starter and gear shifts) as often as we thought we should. And others, but we won't go into them here. The point we want to make is that as society becomes more affluent and we have more and more advantages we also seem to develop a greater number of grievances.

Of course, tomorrow's young people will have their problems. One of them may be that all the other kids are spending the weekend on the moon and they can't go.

Registered Voters In County To Set Record Number

Total voter registration in Tyler County for the 1970 election year evidently will set a new record of approximately 5650 or more, according to Tax Assessor-Collector Tom Sawyer.
Tuesday the tax office had about 250 applications to check and write registration blanks. Sawyer said it would be several days before the office could give an accurate count. The highest previous total was 5251 in 1968, a presidential election year. Registration in 1969 was 4032.
The county has had many more registered voters since the poll tax was abolished and free registration began with the 5251 total in 1968. In 1964 the county had 2566 poll tax holders while in 1965, an off year, only 1685 bought poll taxes.

Credit Volume Of Tyler Counties

County Savings Bond Sales In 1969 Short Of Goal
 United States Savings Bond Sales during 1969 in Tyler County totaled \$123,918, according to David A. Feagin, chairman of the Tyler County Savings Bonds Committee. The county achieved 50 per cent of its goal of \$250,000. Discount sales totaled \$2,224, 249. Tyler County is one of 108 counties in Texas that have achieved their 1969 goal. Texas has achieved 100 per cent of its goal of \$70.1 million in 1969. This was a two percent increase over the total issued in 1968.

The record volume in credit volume in 1969 was established despite a decline in consumer credit activity during the last half of 1969. Mrs. Reynolds explained, "The national average is expected to come from a general upturn in consumer spending predicted for the latter half of the year."

"Research by our national trade association indicates consumer credit will maintain a sideways pattern in the first quarter of 1970 and perhaps will show added strength in the second quarter of the year," Mrs. Reynolds said. "Performance during 1969 was not consistent throughout the year. The first six months recorded an increase in credit, reporting nationally of 5.7 per cent over 1968 while during the last six months, there was a 1.1 per cent decline from the 1968 level. On the local level, however, there was a consistent increase throughout the year."

Interest Must Be Reported On Income Tax Returns
 All interest received or accrued during 1969 must be reported on Federal income tax returns unless it is specifically exempt from tax, said Wesley G. Belcher, administrative officer of Internal Revenue Service, Jasper.

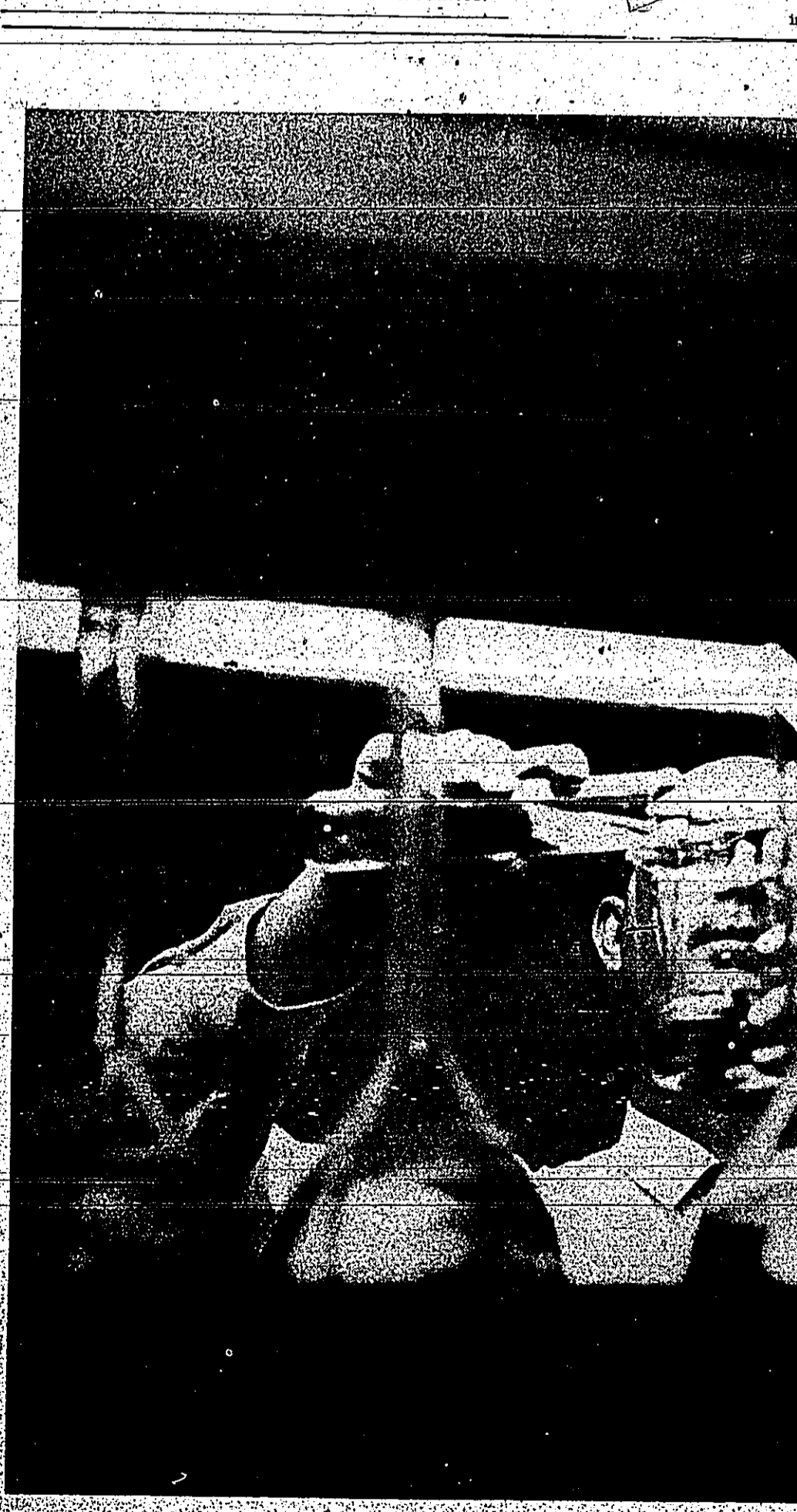
James M. Lagrone Is Commissioned Ensign In Navy

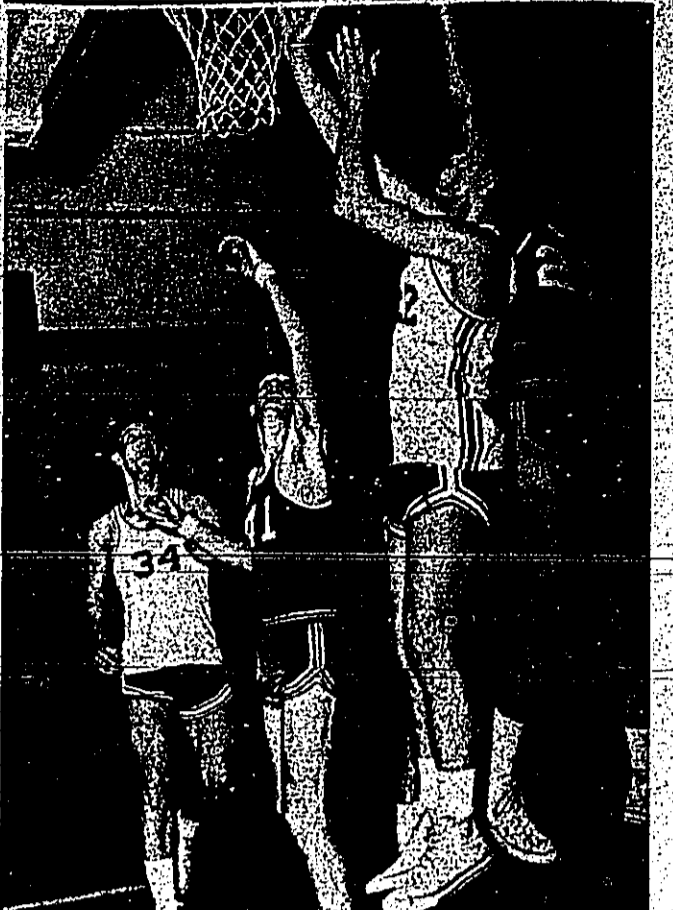

U.S. Individual Taxpayers Ask IRS

This column of questions and answers on federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

Q) On tax returns sent in now, about how long does it take to get a refund?

A) If the return is normally taken care of, it will be held within 10 weeks from the time they filed or a letter explaining why it is delayed. For this reason, taxpayers should wait 10 weeks before contacting IRS about a refund which has not been received.

Q) What records should you keep when you are claiming someone as a dependent?

A) Your records should include the total cost of the dependent's support, and the amount that you provided. Also, you would have to show whether the dependent meets the other dependency tests.

Q) Can anyone use the envelope in the tax form package or just those expecting a refund?

A) The envelope is provided for your convenience and should be used whether you are expecting a refund or not.

Q) There is a mistake on my tax package. How should I correct it?

A) Make a correction in name and address on the label. If the Social Security number is wrong, cross out the number on the label and enter the correct number in the box.

Q) All my income is from wages. Will I need any other forms besides the 1040?

A) No, complete for an income tax return.

Q) I need a car for use on my job. How do I handle the expense for the car?

A) You may either deduct your actual operating expenses for the business use of the car or 10 cents for every mile of actual business use up to 15,000 miles. Mileage over 15,000 may be deducted at 7 cents a mile. Tolls, parking and similar expenses may be deducted for the mileage deduction.

Q) If you use the actual expense method, you may include depreciation, gas and oil, insurance, repairs and other operating costs. However, if you use the same car for business and personal travel, you must apportion the operating expenses. For example, on a car driven half for business, just half the operating expenses may be deducted.

Q) I'm all set to file my return but my W-2 hasn't come. What should I do?

A) Wait until your W-2 arrives. The law requires employers to issue tax withhold-

Double Treat: Chocolate Oatmeal Cake

Two old favorites, chocolate and oatmeal, are combined in this double scrumptious cake. Crunchy oatmeal and praline sprinkled between the layers and over the chocolate-topped top complement the nut-like flavor of oats in the cake.

For crunch, heat oven to moderate (350°F). Combine oats, brown sugar and butter until crumbly. Place in a shallow baking pan. Heat in preheated oven (350°F) about 10 minutes, stirring occasionally. Cool 15 minutes. Sprinkle lightly with a fork to form crumbs. Stir in peanuts. Reserve for later use.

For cake, pour boiling water over oats; stir to combine. Cover and let stand 20 minutes. Beat butter until creamy, gradually add sugars, beat until fluffy. Blend in vanilla, eggs, and chocolate. Add oats mixture; blend well. Sift together flour, soda and salt. Add to creamed mixture; blend well.

Put batter into a well-greased and floured 8-inch square baking pan. Bake in preheated oven (350°F) 50 to 55 minutes. Cool 15 minutes; remove from pan, cool thoroughly. Split cake horizontally into 2 layers. Spread bottom layer with trunch. Place second layer on top of bottom layer. Frost top and sides of cake with remaining crunch; sprinkle top and sides with remaining crunch.

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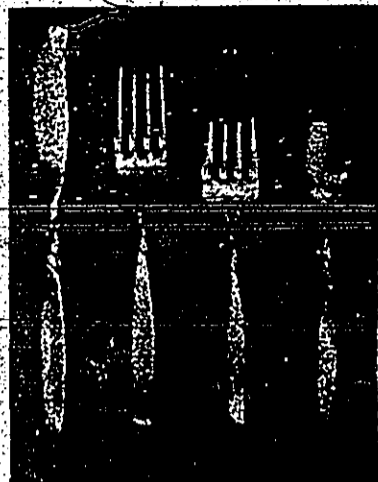
