The plant would employ about 150 persons, eighty percent of them women, with a primary payroll of about \$150,000 a year. In addition it would bring about the building of perhaps \$500,000 worth of growing building with Income to growers of \$120,000 to \$150,000 annually, and would also require the purchase of trucks and the hiring of drivers. Chicken catchers, used when houses of chickens are ready for market, would amount to about double that received now which is \$200 weekly. This is mostly employment for teenagers 17 years old and up.

The total payroll impact would be approximately \$750,000 per year, they claim. However, the City of Woodville is faced with the responsibility of building and paying for the extra sewage disposal unit of which the poultry plant will be the principal user.
