Workers Needed In Census

N. M. Flournoy, district manager of the 1970 Census of population and housing, said this week that he needs residents of this area to help in taking the census.

Needed are people who can work from three to five weeks in April and May visiting homes and interviewing some member of the household. Every effort will be made to assign census takers to their own or nearby neighborhoods, he said.

Pay will be on a piece rate basis designed to average \$2.00 an hour. However, he said, earnings will vary depending largely on the individual cen-

sus taker. Some will earn well above the average while those who work less effectively will earn less.

Census takers must be United States citizens 18 years old or over. They must pass a written test to demonstrate their ability to follow printed instructions and do simple arithmetic. It is preferable that they have a home telephone and automobile.

Those who would like to help take the "big count" may write or apply in person to the Census Bureau District Office, 125 West First Street, Lufkin, Texas.

The election to fill four positions on the board of trustees of the Woodville Independent School District will be held in the new Kirby High School Building on April 4, according to action taken at a meeting of the board January 19.

To be filled are Position three, Dr. W. S. Nichols, incumbent; Position 4, W. S. Jarrott, incumbent; Position 5, Dr. L. G. Burton, incumbent (all for three year terms); and Position 7, Jim Galney, incumbent, for a one year unexpired term.

The four incumbents have filed for re-election.

Final date for filing for a place on the ballot is March 3, 1970, at 4:30 p.m.

Election judges and clerks for the election were also named. Marie King will serve as absentee balloting judge and Dorothy Prescott will be absentee clerk.

For the regular election, Roy Peterson was named election judge. Clerks named to serve are Sue Bracken, Marguerite Pate, Jim Ferguson, R. E. Allison, Lillie Owens, Nell Philmon, and B. B. McPheeters.

Retail Merchants Discuss Lighting, Street Sweeper

The retail merchants committee of the Tyler County Chamber of Commerce met Monday night at Woodville Inn to discuss a cooperative advertising program, street lighting, and street cleaning problems.

Fred Sullivan, co-chairman of the committee, presided at the meeting which began with a discussion of a joint advertising program for all retail merchants in the county.

Also discussed was the poor street lighting in the downtown area, and the problem of keeping the city streets clean.

Committees were named to meet with Woodville city officials on the street lighting condition and to take up with them the feasibility of the city acquiring a street sweeper.

The problem of reaching an agreement on closing hours was discussed but due to the various kinds of businesses involved, it was concluded that no uniform hours are probably possible.

Help Needed In Flower Making

Mrs. Gatling King, chairman of the flower-making committee for the Tyler County Dogwood Festival the first Saturday in April, this week issued the following progress report on the start of the big task facing the volunteer force:

The workshop was opened on February 2 at 610 Reid Street, recreational building on the school campus. Mrs. Sue Bracken, co-chairman of the committee, had cut more than half of the 200,000 flowers needed for decorating the amphitheatre where a dogwood queen will be crowned, and a historical pageant presented, on the evening of April 4.

During the first week, the chairman, Mrs. Gatling King, outlined and organized the committee work for this year. Mrs. J. U. Feagin, Mrs. George Fredricks, Mrs. Edwin Schouville, and Mrs. Tom McQuire will be in charge of workshops activities from Monday through Friday, hours 9 to 4. Arrangements have been made for a telephone to be installed in the workshop, and the number will be announced later. If supplies are needed by those in the county unable to come for them, please contact one of the above named women.

It is heartening to be able to report that an excellent start in flower making was made during the past week. Several hundred flowers were made by

daily workers in the shop. Supplies for making over 30,000 flowers have been taken out by those who will make them at home. Neighbors and friends of Mrs. Sue Bracken have begun to make flowers in her home at any time they are free to work.

Civic workers in Colmesneil, Warren and Rockland have been contacted and invited to the workshop for supplies. Every community is needed and should be represented. Those in charge of the workshop will be glad to offer assistance if needed.

A new type of flower will be made for the first time this year. Moon flowers will be added to the dogwood, wisteria, yellow jasmine, magnolia, and azaleas usually made. Perhaps we need more of the spirit of NASA and the conquest of the moon to remind us of what can be done through effort and cooperation.

Progress reports will be made as the flower making gets into full swing. We cordially invite all women in the county to work with us and share in the satisfaction of accomplishment. The faithful workers of many years agree that when festival time draws near they forget how hard they worked and remember only how beautiful the amphitheatre was last year. The decoration, including the making of flowers, is primarily the women's part in the festival. Let's make this the best and prettiest festival we have ever had.

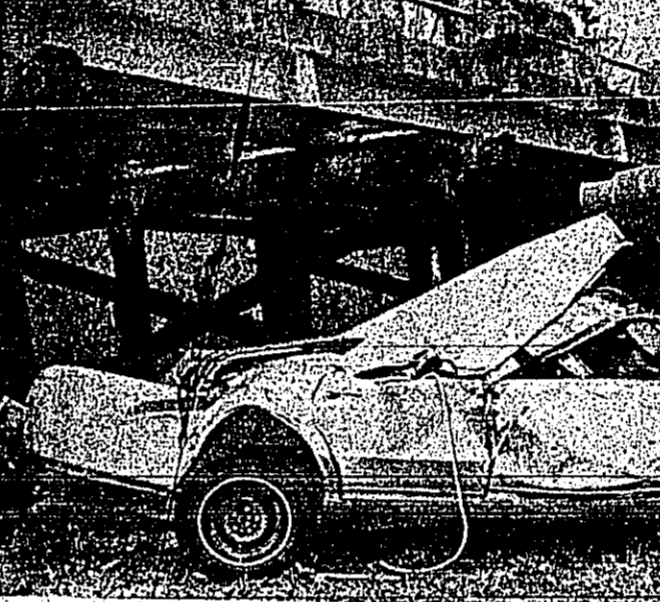

Woodville City Council and officers of the Tyler County Industrial Corporation again discussed the proposed Angelina County Poultry plant at a meeting Monday night at city hall.

The city council is wrestling with the problem of how to build a sewage plant and furnish water for the plant at a rate acceptable to the poultry company, which has proposed to move operations here to a new \$500,000 plant to be built by the Tyler County Industrial Corporation, provided that sewage and water facilities can be furnished.

The city can furnish the water but would have to build a sewage disposal plant to take care of the poultry plant. Details of financing the new plant and the matter of water and sewage rates has posed a major problem.

However, Tuesday Mayor Jimmy Freeman said he believed that details are not too involved but what the city can find a way to build the plant. The city wants to finance the expansion of the sewer plant with revenue bonds, which would pay out through payments from the poultry company over a period of 20 to 30 years.

Mayor Freeman said that the council may decide to put the whole thing to a vote of the people of the town, including the method of financing.

Proponents of the plant say that the economic impact on the county will more than offset the cost of the sewer plant and expansion of the water system by the city.

The plant would employ about 150 persons, eighty percent of them women, with a primary payroll of about \$150,000 a year. In addition it would bring about the building of perhaps \$500,000 worth of growing building with income to growers of \$120,000 to \$150,000 annually, and would also require the purchase of trucks and the hiring of drivers. Chicken catchers, used when houses of chickens are ready for market, would amount to about double that received now which is \$200 weekly. This is mostly employment for teenagers 17 years old and up.

The total payroll impact would be approximately \$750,000 per year, they claim.

However, the City of Woodville is faced with the responsibility of building and paying for the extra sewage disposal unit of which the poultry plant will be the principal user.

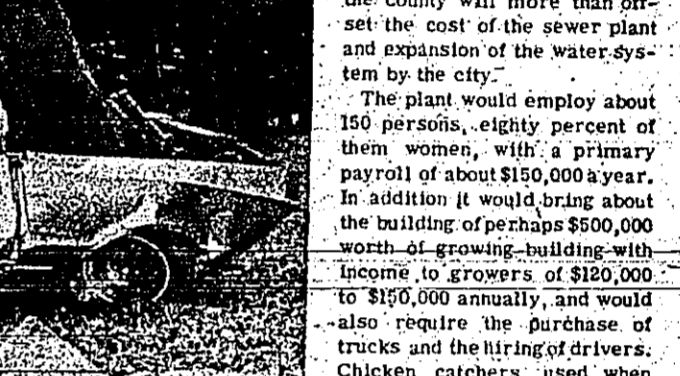
Mayor Freeman says the solution to the financing of the sewage plant, has seemingly been worked out several times but has been shown to have flaws forcing a new approach. The city council and officers of the industrial foundation have another meeting planned within the next two weeks in another attempt to reach a decision on the sewage treating plant and the rates for the poultry plant which will be satisfactory to all concerned.

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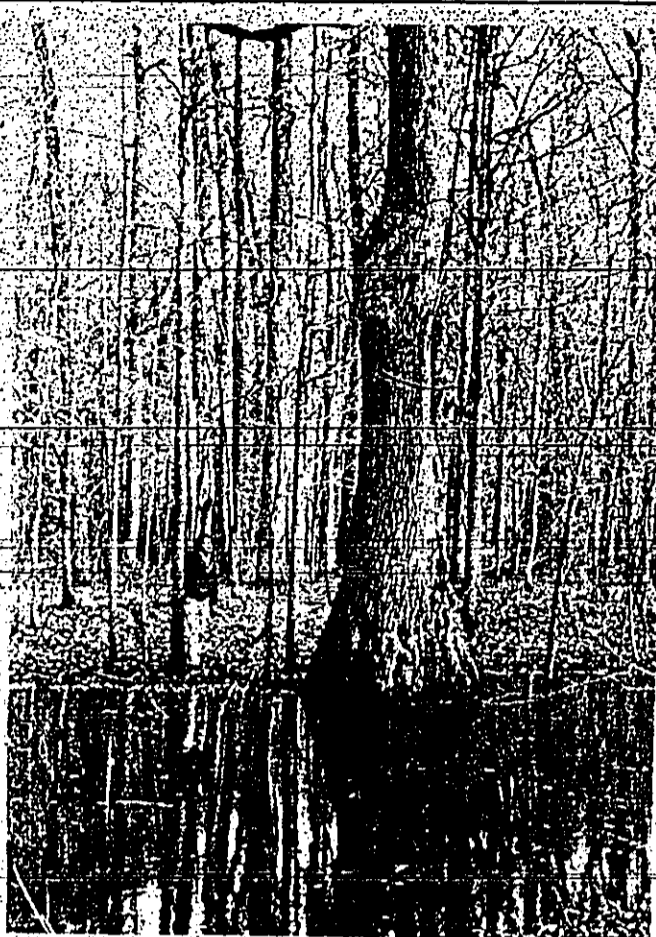


NEWS FROM EAST OF DOUCETTE

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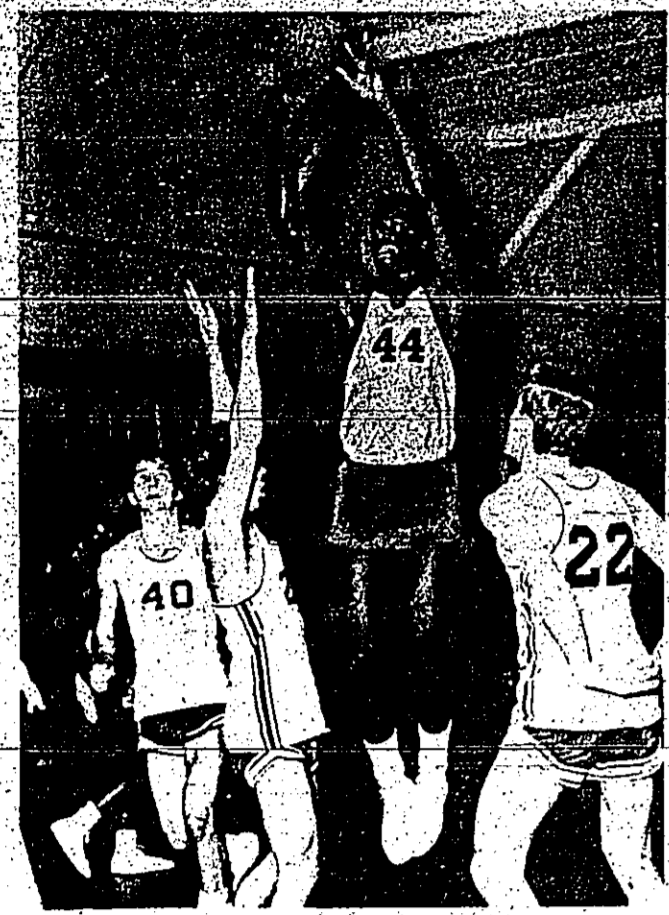
