Western Day will be on the last Saturday in March, barely six weeks away, and the coronation and pageant and first Saturday in April is a scarce two months from this third Saturday of February.

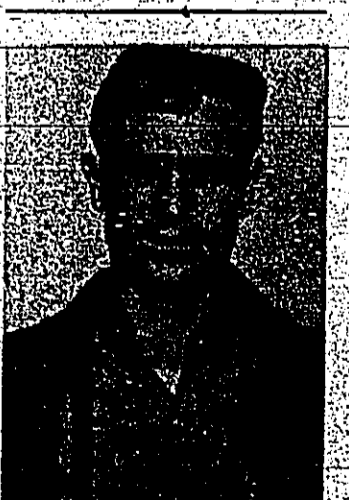
Armstrong Heads Easter Seal Drive

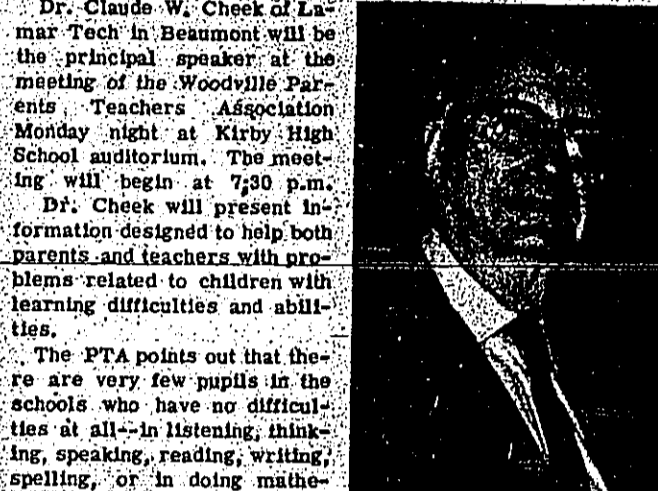

Country and Pop Jamboree Stars Nashville Groups

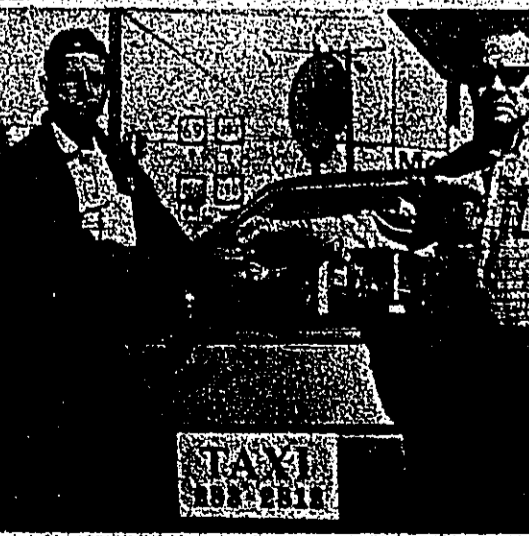

Taxi Service Now In Operation

Some of the board members also pointed out that the Woodville district should fare better in taxation with the completion of proper tax records for the county and school district. The trustees voted to eliminate two holidays in March so that the ending of school will fall on the scheduled date. The school lost two teaching days due to missing two days during the flu epidemic. In introducing the recommended calendar for 1970-1971, Mr. McGuire explained that the state will require 180 teaching days next year, no more and no less. A minimum of 175 days previously has been required including this year. In addition to the 180-day teaching schedule, 10 days of teacher work sessions are required beginning next school year. The recommended 1970-71 school calendar was adopted by vote on a motion by Gaine and seconded by Nichols.

The January financial statement was approved following some discussion of the amount shown spent on athletics. Mr. McGuire explained that this included all sports as well as physical education equipment expenses. Mr. McGuire told the board that the district has placed another \$30,000 on interest bearing deposit, making a total of \$40,000 on which the district will receive interest for three months or until needed. He said that tax collections are now at the 91 percent level, which is normal for this time of year.

Alcohol, Narcotics Education Association Being Formed at Dam

The Lakeside Alcohol and Narcotics Education Association was organized Sunday night at a meeting at Fairview Baptist Church. A committee of eight with Carl Russell as chairman was named to compile a constitution and bylaws and also to recommend a slate of officers for the association which will include a number of young people.

Organizers said that it will be incorporated as a non-profit information and educational association sponsored by individuals and organizations in the Dam B area. They plan to schedule speakers and show films to inform young people and adults about alcohol and narcotics, and the organization is open to everyone in the area who are concerned about the potential threat of drugs to young people and the adverse effect of alcohol to the economic and social life of the community.

Advance Scouts of purple martins have arrived in Woodville and are currently surveying the housing situation here, birdwatchers report. There are quite a few purple martin apartment complexes maintained here by bird lovers who hope that the advance scouts will report favorably to the main body of the birds as they migrate northward.

SOCIAL SECURITY ? ? ? QUIZ ? ? ?

Question: Did the recent legislation providing for a 15% increase also increase the amount of social security tax deduction?

Answer: No. The tax deduction continues to be 4.5 percent on the first \$7,800 of your wages in 1970. The tax rate for the self-employed person remains at 6.91 percent.

Question: A friend of mine became disabled and applied for social security benefits for himself and for his family. He died four months after he had stopped working.

Answer: Social security disability benefits are not paid for the first six months following the month a worker becomes disabled. If he dies before the end of the six-month period, no payments are made based on his disability. However, any survivors who qualify for benefits will be paid beginning with the month of his death.

Drive With Traffic

Drive with traffic, not against it, the clerk reminds the Texas Safety Association.

Question: A college friend of mine receives social security student benefits. Since I'm having a tough time financially, I wonder if I can qualify, too?

Answer: A student's benefit is payable to a son or daughter of an insured worker who is retired, disabled, or deceased. The student must be unmarried and under age 22.

Question: What do you mean by "an insured worker?"

Answer: We mean one who has enough credits (quarters of coverage) under the social security program for himself or his survivors to qualify for monthly payments.

Question: Are retirement payments based on just the last five years' work prior to retirement?

Answer: No. Generally, payments are based on the best earnings years during a person's working life.

Question: Is there a fixed monthly allowance for all children under the social security program?

Answer: No. The amount of social security payments is determined by the parent's average earnings covered by the social security program. The amount of the child's payment is one-half of the amount of the living parent's full social security payment. If the parent is deceased, the amount of the child's payment is 75% of his parent's payment. Also, there is a limit in the amount which can be paid to a family unit.

## County Agent Reports

### By Clinton R. Currie

Texas entered Phase 3 of the program on August 1, 1969, he noted. This is the active phase of the program and brings into play the cooperative State-Federal indemnities which are used to pay for hog depopulation because of cholera outbreaks.

Since last August, Thomas said approximately 200 hogs have been depopulated in Texas. The state's share of the indemnities has amounted to over \$200,000.

The interstate shipment of hogs vaccinated with modified live virus vaccines has been prohibited since January 1, 1970. Also, Phase 3 prohibits the interstate shipment of modified live virus vaccines after the supply within the state is exhausted, he said.

Indemnities, Thomas explained, are based on the market value of the hogs and will be paid to producers with confidence of arrival of authorized veterinarians.

The practice, says County Agent Clinton Currie, is to recommend chemicals are safe and easy to use.

The chemical forms a protective coating around the seed and during the period of germination. However, seed treatment will not control damping-off after seedling grows out of the soil. It does not protect the seed from insect damage under unfavorable conditions and causes growers to associate it with a preservative.
