This year Texas public schools are celebrating their 116th birthday. Even before that the pioneers, after hewing the logs for their homes, turned to establishing schools in their communities, however sparsely settled, often the school was a log cabin and the teacher was safety. qualified to teach only the three

Texas public schools have come a long way. From the log cabin we have advanced through the little red schoolhouse to what has become our complex elementary schoolcomplex elementary and secondary educational institutions of this day. We may have Telephone Science local schools that fail to measure up to the educational needs Demonstration of the 1970's but as we look back we realize that progress schools.

Today our public schools are faced with the problems that beset the other facets of society in The disruptive elements. that have caused turmoil in so many universities and colleges are moving into junior and senfor high schools. The purpose these groups certainly is not to improve the quality of education. In fact their aim is inversive to quality education.

We suggest that you visit a public school the week of March 2-6. If you haven't been inside a school for several years, it will be a pleasant surprise to_find that they are going into the '70s with courses in the essential fundamentals as well as the elementary propaedeutics for the space age.

But more than anything else, it will show the young people that we care about their future -manifest first in strong support of the public schools. And while you are visiting the school why not speak a kindly word to the teachers? Their lot is not an easy one these days.

And we suggest too that you to the men who serve on the District Census Office school districts in Tyler Co-unty (or in whatever county you may live). Don't pick out the Opens in Luikin trustees who adhere to your point of view. All of them, regardless of viewpoint on school matters, are dedicated men serving without remuneration in a thankless position with a single objective -- to see to it that your child receives the best possible education.
