### OF THE MORNING

The week of March 2-6 has been designated as Public Schools Week by Governor Preston Smith. This is an annual practice and we become so accustomed to it that we tend to let it slide by with little or no recognition, just as we do too many other observances. This year Texas public schools are celebrating their 116th birthday. Even before that the pioneers, after having the logs for their homes, turned to establishing schools in their communities, however sparsely settled, often the school was a log cabin and the teacher was qualified to teach only the three R's.

Texas public schools have come a long way. From the log cabin we have advanced through the little red schoolhouse to what has become our complex elementary, school-complex elementary and secondary educational institutions of this day. We may have local schools that fall to measure up to the educational needs of the 1970's but as we look back we realize that progress is steady in even our smaller schools.

Today our public schools are faced with the problems that beset the other facets of society. The disruptive elements that have caused turmoil in so many universities and colleges are moving into junior and senior high schools. The purpose of these groups certainly is not to improve the quality of education. In fact their aim is inverse to quality education.

We suggest that you visit a public school the week of March 2-6. If you haven't been inside a school for several years, it will be a pleasant surprise to find that they are going into the '70s with courses in the essential fundamentals as well as the elementary, propaedeutics for the space age. But more than anything else, it will show the young people that we care about their future, manifest first in strong support of the public schools. And while you are visiting the school why not speak a kindly word to the teachers? Their lot is not an easy one these days.

And we suggest too that you speak a word of appreciation to the men who serve on the boards of trustees of the five school districts in Tyler County (or in whatever county you may live). Don't pick out the trustees who adhere to your point of view. All of them, regardless of viewpoint on school matters, are dedicated men serving without remuneration in a thankless position with a single objective—to see to it that your child receives the best possible education.

## City Voters May Decide On Poultry Plant

The Woodville City Council in a special meeting Monday night came to an agreement on the basic figures and conditions under which they will enter into a contract with Angelina Poultry Company to furnish the company water and sewer for their proposed poultry processing plant here. On a motion by J. G. Anderson, the council by a vote of four to one agreed on a rate of 18 cents per thousand gallons for water and sewer service but with the stipulation that the company pay a minimum of \$14,000 for this service annually plus a payment of \$1275 annually in lieu of taxes on a 30-year contract renegotiable every five years, and agree to

## Contracts Let On Three Highways

Contracts for highway construction in the Beaumont district including one in Tyler County have been awarded by the Texas Highway Commission. The work will be under the supervision of District Engineer Franklin Young and will be in Tyler, Jefferson, and Orange counties. In Tyler County, Central Construction Company of Longview was awarded a contract for grading, structures, asphalt concrete base, and one-course surface treatment on 2.2 miles of US Highway 190. Low bid was \$399,182.55. The project extends from near Farm to Market Road 92 westward 2.2 miles. A. J. Corbett of Woodville is the Highway Department engineer in charge of the project which will take an estimated 170 working days. The department also awarded a contract for 155.3 miles of seal coating in the Beaumont district. Included are two projects on Farm to Market Roads in Tyler County totaling 6.5 miles. On Farm Road 92, the contract is for seal coating from Spurger north 4.5 miles. On Farm Road 103 seal coating will be applied from Spurger west two miles. Both will take an estimated 45 days to complete.

## Four Candidates File For Trustee In Woodville

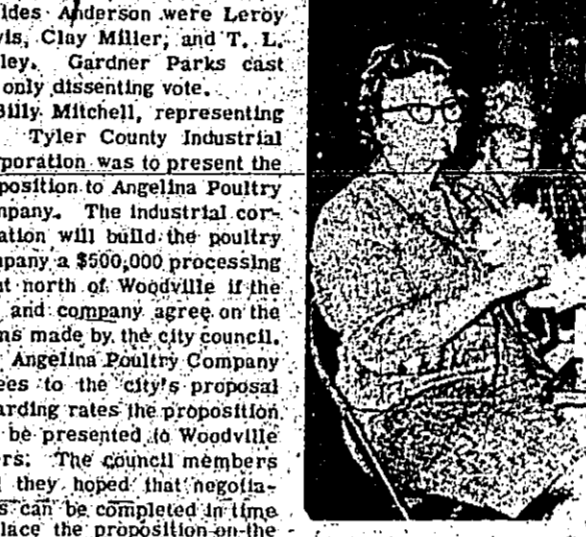

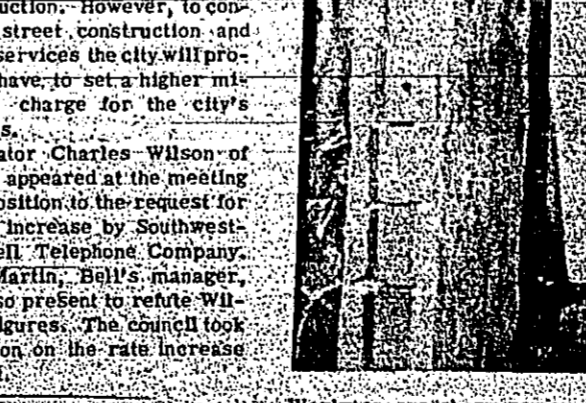
## Fourth Monday District Court

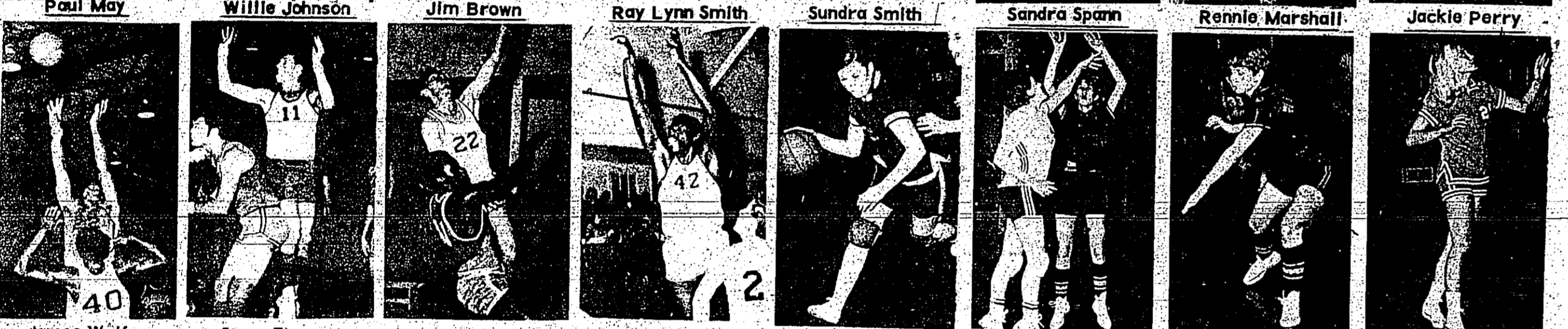
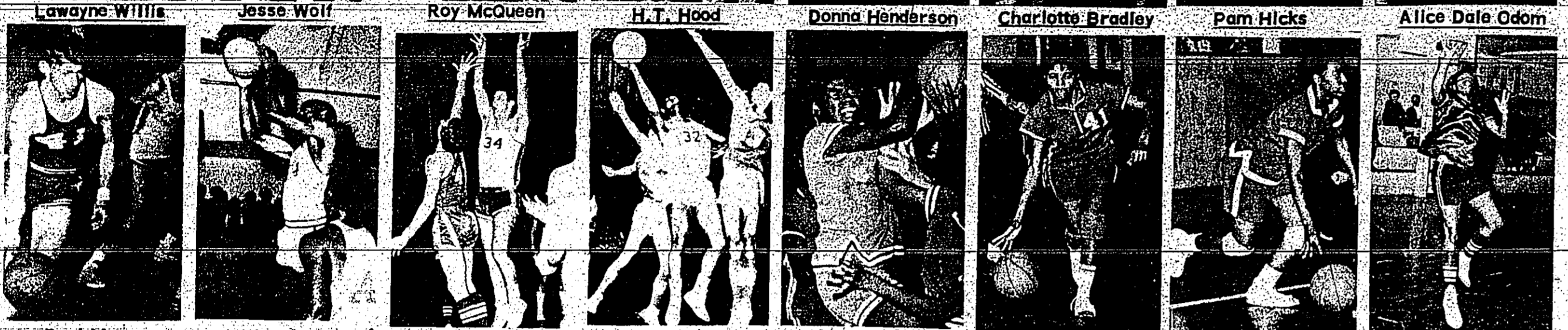
