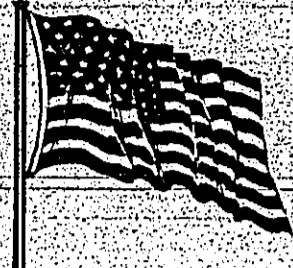

We were present at most, if not all, of the city council meetings at which the question of supplying water and sewer service to the proposed poultry plant was discussed by the councilmen and other interested persons...

Thus we could see that the city council, also aware of the need, was trying to work out a satisfactory solution to the poultry plant's water and sewer needs...

After all, the poultry plant DOES NOT have to come to Tyler County. There are other places that would be happy to secure it and at least one town is actively seeking it.

Another objection we hear is that the poultry plant will create bad odors - or, if you prefer the word, stink.

Modern poultry plants, such as this will be, have eliminated the stench formerly associated with them. Today's plants are inspected by a department of agriculture inspector stationed at the plant.

The plant will put an estimated \$750,000 in payroll and grower contract money in circulation in the county. This money will be spent, mostly, with local merchants.

Angelina Poultry Company is financially responsible, but even if something happens to them someone else will be happy to step in and operate the plant.

We have thought it over and we feel that the passage of the revenue bonds by the voters of Woodville is in the people's best interest.

Chamber Commerce Endorses Poultry Plant At Meeting

Woodville's proposed chicken processing plant was unanimously endorsed Monday night by the members of the Tyler County Chamber of Commerce who were present at the regular monthly meeting.

During discussion that preceded the endorsement, it was shown that in addition to eventually paying for itself through a sizeable utilities contract with the City of Woodville, the plant would add to the economy of the entire county by employing more than 100 persons with an annual estimated payroll of \$750,000.

To situate the plant in Tyler County, existing sewage facilities in Woodville must be expanded and it was noted that a city bond election, set for April 4, would provide funds to accomplish this job.

The bonds will be revenue type, which means that they will be retired using income from the facility they are issued to build. The bond issue will total \$500,000 and will provide additional sewage facilities to handle not only proposed poultry plant, but also Cobb Mill Road and Cheswood additions.

In handling its part of the bond retirement, the Angelina Poultry Company will pay the City of Woodville a yearly minimum \$20,315. This will include \$14,040 for water and sewer service, \$5,000 for gas and an additional \$1,275 in lieu of payment of city taxes.

Plant production capacity will eventually run nearly 10 million birds per year.

To handle questions that could arise concerning the poultry plant and the accompanying bond issue, Chamber president Jim Galney set up an answering service in the Chamber of Commerce offices. The office will be open from 9 a.m. until noon and from 1 to 3 p.m. weekdays.

Persons having an unanswered question may call 283-2832 during these hours to have the question taken down. All questions will then be answered in the next issue of the Tyler County Booster.

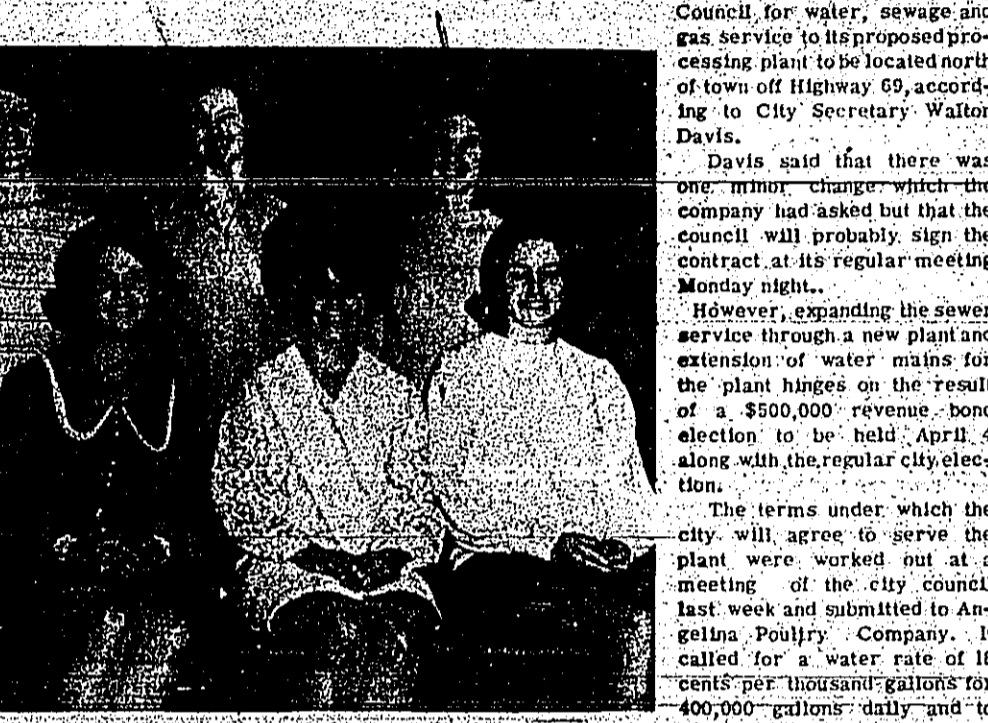

Merchants Begin Bargain Weekends

Retail merchants this week begin a series of pages in which they endeavor to demonstrate that customers not only can help the county economy but can save money by trading at home.

They are asking that Tyler Countians discover for themselves the fine service and low prices available at local retail businesses.

On the special page each week, cooperating merchants will offer extra low prices on which customers can save money while checking the other values in each of the stores.

The first series of ads are found on a special page in the Booster with 24 local establishments offering merchandise at prices far below the normal sales price.

The merchants decided on the advertising campaign as an effort to educate the buying public that prices here are on a level with prices in the larger cities, and that local merchants, who pay taxes and support local projects, are deserving of patronage not only out of loyalty but from a price standpoint.

Angelina Poultry Company has said that all employees except about four key men will be hired locally.

The revenue bonds will be paid off from charges paid the city by the poultry plant and are not to be confused with tax bonds. Establishment of the plant here will not effect the city tax rate.

Dr. Burton told the members that there is an acute shortage of doctors who are willing to come to a small town and enter general practice. He said there are large numbers of medical school graduates, but most of them are going into special fields, clinics and hospitals in metropolitan areas.

Although three medical schools have recently been established in Texas, Burton said the doctor shortage will continue for about 10 years.

He said that it seemed that the best way to get a physician is to grow your own. He said that there are in all health medical school students who have family connections here and he suggested that one of these might be persuaded to come here.

Homemaking Hints

Special care—Are you conscious of what it takes to make up the clothes you buy? A garment which needs special care may not be worth it.

Some garments consist of fibers which change drastically under normal cleaning processes. One such fiber is "Wool," a heat sensitive fiber which will stiffen and shrink when exposed to even moderate heat.

Garments containing nylon must be cleaned in a special "cold" process. Before you buy, decide if the excess trouble caused by the special cleaning process is worth the garment.

Remember, to find a real bargain, examine the clothing care and content label. If the garment tag is labeled or tagged for fiber content or care, you are taking a chance in buying it.

Warmer Blankets—Does that big woolly blanket seem less warm now than when you bought it?

One of the most important factors affecting the relative warmth of the blanket is the nap.

The metal hangers in the wardrobe are provided by the cleaner as a vehicle to help you get your clothes home. Clothes should be removed from the metal hangers, and placed on wooden or plastic shaped hangers. Shaped hangers help your garments maintain their original contour, since hanging stress is spread over a larger area.

Here's a hint: Several metal hangers taped together may be bent to form shaped hangers. They are covered with paper and decorated in limitless ways. Their "creations" are fun to make, and will help insure long life for your wardrobe.

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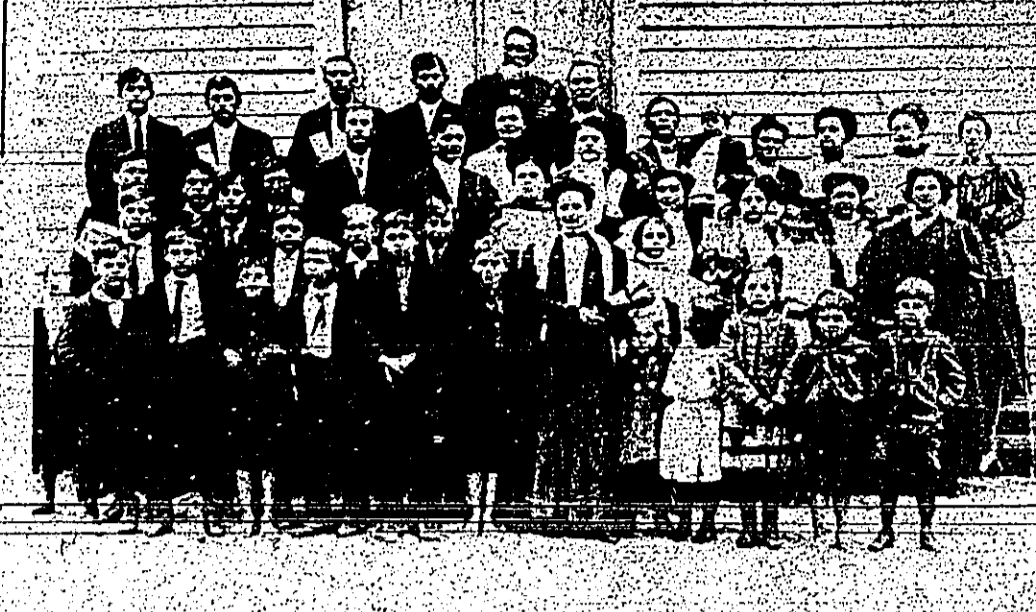
