

Chester Wins State Title In Class B

Chester played the role of underdogs as they shook the basketball and won the Class B honor roll by defeating the Henrico Midway's five 75-53 in the final tilt.

Midway possessed one of the finest records in the tourney with a 45 win and 1 loss record with that coming in a warm-up game with conference AA Quanah. Chester wasn't even chosen to get by the first round of the affair with Laramie-La Poyner because the latter was chosen to win the game and supposedly the title.

Chester rallied from an 18-6 deficit to nudge La Poyner 54-52.

Al Bryan hit from twenty foot to give the Yellow Jackets the win. Willie Johnson was the high point scorer for the winners with 21 markers.

Midway on the other hand ran up the score against Ackerman, Sams 82-55 in the morning affair.

Chester opened the contest taking an early lead 17-13 and increased it at intermission with a tough defense for a 35-24 score. After the third period the score was 54-42 and Chester forced Midway into their favorite means of disposing of an opportunity by making them make mistakes and that what was going to happen.

Jamie Cowley, the star of the Midway five fouled little Cyrus Martin to give him five personals for the game and elicited him from the floor. After that it was Chester all the way. Willie Johnson was the leading scorer for the winners with 32 points followed by H. T. Hood with 20.

Mr. Sawyer said that his office, after checking for duplications, has issued a total of 5,638 registration certificates to Tyler County voters.


The previous high number was 5,251 in 1966 which was a presidential election year. Last year, 4,032 voters were registered in the county.



celebrated programs to provide incentive for the gifted child as well as remedial programs and vocational opportunities for handicapped children. Mr. Jarrott said that the present plan of the district call for additional vocational subjects, including speech and language classes as provided by recent state legislation.

"The continued effort will be to develop a school program that will be available to tax payers of the United States," County Engineer Cut down inventory of equipment to amount that can be used to the best advantage with the least expense to the taxpayers. Another question, "Is there any way you have thought of as soon as the idea of hiring a County Engineer was mentioned is where will the money come from to pay his salary?"

Very simple. Should the County Commissioners and the County Judge get the same amount of money for doing half the work as they do for doing all of it? No, answer, I think that the county could hire a qualified engineer.

How engineers help a school system? By getting the school system to hire a person who has been with the welfare of each child in mind, to help with the employment of capable teachers, the construction of school facilities, the acquisition of the equipment supplies for learning, and the operation of the district on a sound financial basis."

Mr. Jarrott has been helping the taxpayers of Tyler County to do their duty and at the same time get the school has routes in the county blacktopped which would be a great help to the different school districts.

By cutting the salaries of the County Commissioners and the County Judge by \$2,000 each per year I feel sure a substantial amount of money can be saved and extra help is available.

What about the poor old County Commissioners and County Judge? Well, in my way of thinking and according to my math, if a person can work for \$1,000 per year (\$ 50 per week) he surely would be getting well paid at \$600 per year if he had to work no more than two days a week.

Now, I am sure many of the taxpayers of Tyler County are much to be said concerning this issue, however, I do not feel that all of them would be able to work about this and evaluate the situation, then perhaps you might consider electing R. E. Jackson your next County Judge.

and changes in state school laws. It is my opinion that the schools of this district should continue so that all legal adjustments can be made.

I am aware that the district has a number of needs, but I am also aware that we have a superior school program in Woodville that does not meet all the accreditation and legal standards.

Changes in school organization and curricula content in the immediate future will include the addition of a guidance program, the addition of vocational courses to prepare the non-college bound students for adult life, the addition of special education units to meet the needs of the educationally disadvantaged and handicapped pupils, and an up-grading of the basic academic programs so that every child will have a sound education in the fundamental subjects.

I stress the need of a comprehensive educational program, but I firmly believe that it is the function of the school to teach children to read and write.

I attended Baylor University and Mississippi College for my pre-medical training and graduated from Baylor University, College of Medicine, in 1948 in Waco, Texas. I did post-graduate work at Baltimore City Hospital for two years. I have been practicing medicine in Woodville since 1950.

I have two children in the Woodville schools and am pleased with the education program that they have and with the work of the dedicated teachers who have insight into what has been done in the area of education.

I am a member of the Chamber of Commerce and the First Baptist Church of Woodville.

I ask your support of my candidate for re-election to the Board of Trustees. If elected, I will work hard to direct my energies toward the development of a better school program than the good school program that now have.
