

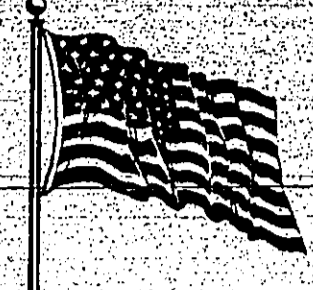

Chester Wins State Title In Class B

Chester played the role of underdog as they shook the basketball and won the Class B honor roll by defeating the Hemletta Midway's five 75-53 in the final tilt.

Midway possessed one of the finest records in the tourney with a 46 win and 1 loss record with that coming in a warm-up game with conference AA Quannah. Chester wasn't even chosen to get by the first round of the affair with Larue-La Poyner because the latter was chosen to win the game and supposedly the title.

Chester rallied from an 18-6 deficit to nudge La Poyner 54-52.

Al Bryan hit from twenty foot to give the Yellow Jackets the win. Willie Johnson was the high point scorer for the winners with 21 markers.

Midway on the other hand ran up the score against Ackery. Game 82-55. In the morning affair.

Chester opened the contest taking an early lead 17-13 and increased it at intermission with a tough defense for a 35-24 score. After the third period the score was 54-42 and Chester forced Midway into their favorite means of disposing of an opportunity by making them make mistakes and that what was going to happen.

Jamie Cowley, the star of the Midway, five fouled little Cyrus Martin to give him five personal fouls for the game and evicted him from the floor. After that it was Chester all the way.

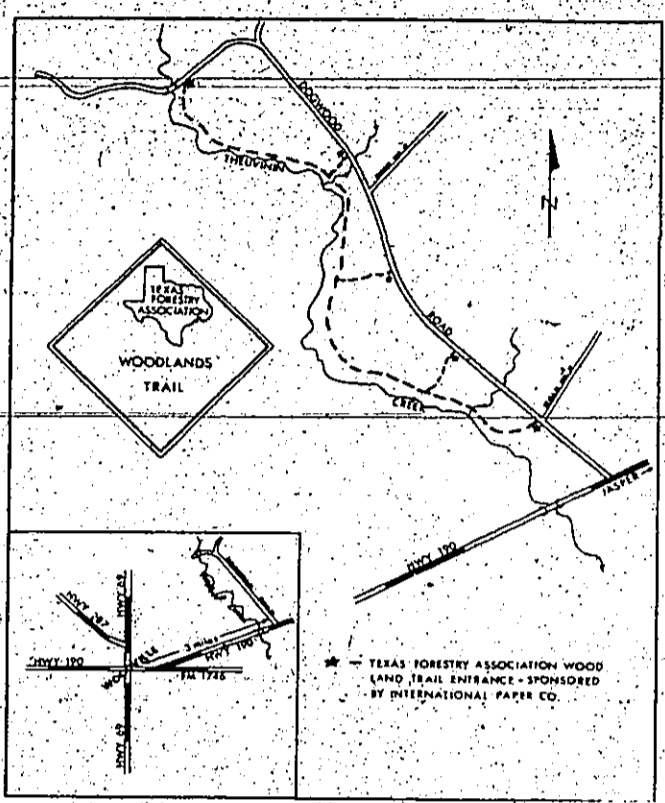
Willie Johnson was the leading scorer for the winners with 32 points followed by H. T. Hood with 20.

Voter Registration Figure Sets New Record With 5638

More voters are eligible to participate in the 1970 elections than during any other in the history of Tyler County, according to final tabulation by County Tax Assessor-Collector Tom Sawyer.

Mr. Sawyer said that his office, after checking for duplications, has issued a total of 5,638 registration certificates to Tyler County voters.

The previous high number was 5,251 in 1968 which was a presidential election year. Last year 4,032 voters were registered in the county.



Woodlands Trail To Be Dedicated Tues.

The fourth in a series of TFA Woodlands Trails will be dedicated near Woodville at 3:00 p.m., Tuesday, March 24 by O. R. Crawford, Jasper, president of the Texas Forestry Association. The new nature trail is located three miles east of Woodville just off Highway 190 on land owned by International Paper Co.

The new TFA Woodlands Trail parallels Theuvenin's Creek, a clear, spring-fed stream. The public is invited to the brief dedication program and to inspect the new Dogwood Trail.

The first of the series of TFA Woodlands Trails was dedicated at Oil Springs in Nacogoches County last fall. It is the site of the first oil well west of the Mississippi River. The second and third trails were dedicated in Polk County near Corrigan and Camden. The latter features one of the finest old growth pine stands remaining in East Texas, containing many 225-year-old longleaf pine and numerous 170-year-old loblolly pine.

Each of the series of TFA Woodlands Trails has been carefully selected on privately owned industrial timberland for its scenic values for walking and hiking, and will be open to the public according to Crawford.

"Additional TFA Trails are nearing completion in Cherokee and other counties. This is another example of how Texas Forestry Association industrial members are making multiple use of their timberland by opening their forests for public recreation," Crawford said.

Dogwood Tickets Now On Sale At Business Places

Tickets to the coronation and pageant of the Tyler County Dogwood Festival are now on sale at six business establishments and are also being sold by members of the Woman's Reading Club and the Heritage Club.

Business places selling the tickets are Citizens State Bank, Jarrott's Pharmacy, Best Pharmacy, Warfield's Grocery Store, McGuire Furniture, and Woodville Inn.

Those planning to attend the coronation and pageant are urged to purchase tickets early. On the night of the coronation and pageant long lines usually form and by buying the tickets early those attending are able to secure better seats.

Council Gives Bond Election Details

The Woodville city council at its meeting Monday night approved the following information to be presented to voters of the city on the coming bond election:

On April 4th Woodville citizens will vote on a \$500,000, 30-year revenue bond issue for water and sewer expansion.

If the bond issue is approved an estimated \$192,000.00 of the bond proceeds will be used to construct facilities to serve a part of Woodville's residential area not now receiving sewer service. The residential area to be served would be in Northwest Woodville, North of U. S. Highway 287 and part of the Cobble Mill Road area east of Cobble Mill Road Baptist Church.

The city proposes to amortize the bonds sold for this purpose from revenue realized by increasing the minimum water rate and the minimum sewer rate by \$1.00 each, which would bring in approximately \$20,000 yearly with any deficit to be made up from revenue from the sales tax.

If a satisfactory contract is entered into with Angelina Poultry Company, this contract to be guaranteed by the signature of the stockholders of that company, the city will use \$308,000.00 of the proceeds of this bond issue for the purpose of constructing water and sewer facilities to serve the poultry processing plant which Tyler County Industrial Corporation has agreed to construct for Angelina Poultry north of Woodville.

The cost of these facilities would be amortized from a guaranteed annual minimum payment of \$20,315.00 to be paid by Angelina Poultry, including an annual payment of \$1,275.00 in lieu of city taxes (the plant being outside of the city limits) with any deficit being made up from sales tax revenue.

The city proposes a thirty-year contract with Angelina Poultry, the rates to be renegotiated each five years. The payroll from the poultry plant will generate more sales tax revenue for the city. Revenue from the poultry plant should be considerably above the minimum when the plant is operating at full capacity. It is estimated that operating cost will be about \$14,000.00 annually. However, the city would still have a part of this expenditure for serving the residential areas of Woodville. There is a good possibility that the city will receive one or more Federal grants to help with the cost of the project.

Woodville Trustees Have Routine Session Monday

The board of trustees of the Woodville Independent School District attended a few routine matters at the regular monthly meeting Monday night.

Supt. B. H. McGuire presented the list of books which had been recommended by the textbook committee and the trustees approved the recommendations without change.

Mr. McGuire also presented the state's mandatory kindergarten program which will begin next year.

Mr. McGuire also reported that the school tax office collections are now better than 91 percent for the current year, which is about normal.

Monday through Friday of next week has been designated "City Cleanup Week" in preparation for the annual Dogwood Festival.

City Secretary Walton Davis said that city trucks will pick up trash during the week when it is boxed on packages and set on the curb. Tree branches and bushes will be picked up if cut into short pieces which can be easily handled.

Those setting trash out next week are asked to call the city office if it has not been picked up by noon Friday.

Fourth Monday District Court Session Slated

The regular fourth Monday session of 88th District Court during which Judge H. A. Coe hears divorce petitions, child support cases, and other non-jury matters which come before the court.

The third week's docket in the March session of district court which was set to begin Tuesday was adjourned early when all cases on the docket were either settled or continued. The fourth week's docket will be taken up next Tuesday with civil cases set, and the fifth and final week beginning March 30 has a number of felony cases set for trial. Last week a civil suit brought by Myrtle Cooney against Ray Barney Greer was heard by a jury and took up most of the week.

Youth Riders Make Plans For Annual Dogwood Trail Ride

Tyler County Youth Riders are completing plans for their second annual trail ride to the Western Week parade Friday and Saturday, March 27 and 28. The Youth Riders will assemble north of Spurger on FM 92 about 3:00 p.m. Friday, March 27, and will ride to the Tyler County Youth Arena on FM 1013 west of Spurger where they will camp for the night after engaging in Playday events beginning at 7:00 p.m. These events, divided into Peevee, Junior and Senior age groups, will consist of barrel racing, pole bending, flag races, potato race, ribbon race and relay race.

Trophies for first place winners and ribbons for second through sixth places will be awarded.

The Youth Riders will name a new sweetheart to replace Cynthia Lynn Thomas of Spurger, who has served the post for 12 and 18 years of age.

The trail ride to Woodville will begin at 7:00 a.m. Saturday, March 28, and will participate in the Western Week parade which begins at 2:00 p.m.

Following the parade, the Youth Riders will go to the Tyler County 4-H and FFA Arena at Tyler County Airport west of Woodville for the youth rodeo which will begin about 3:30 p.m. In two divisions, junior riders through 12 years of age and senior riders 13 through 16, the contestants will try for trophies in bareback bronc and calf riding, barrel racing, and pole bending. Trophies will be awarded to winners of the first six places.

Indians To Open Spring Schedule On Saturday

The Alabama-Comshatta Indian Reservation Tourist Activity will open the Spring Season Saturday, March 21, which will be Chiefs' Day. Chief Fulton Battise will be at the Museum all day in his traditional dress to meet guests and give autographs. Candid camera friends will be welcomed to have him pose for shots about the Indian Village.

The first Spring colors are starting out with the railroad already in full bloom. Dogwood branches are swollen and all the shadows of green are expected by the opening date. The forest trails, used by the Big Thicket Tour and the Historical Tour, will offer an opportunity for seeing much of the reservation flora.

Program schedules will be operating from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. on Saturdays and from 12:00 noon to 6 p.m. Sunday. The week day programs will be limited to the Tours and Train until June 1st when the dances and Living Indian Village will operate every day in the week. The Museum, Arts & Crafts Shop and Restaurant will be open full time starting March 21st.

Program director Lester Battise will be directing the activities for the first summer of the tourist activity. It's his sixth year. He reports advanced youth group reservations are above last year. Thousands of school children will round out their Indian Study Units by stepping into the past for the rich historical and cultural Indian background at Texas' only Indian Reservation, 19 miles west of Woodville.

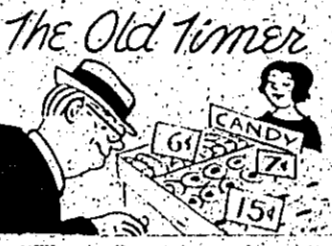

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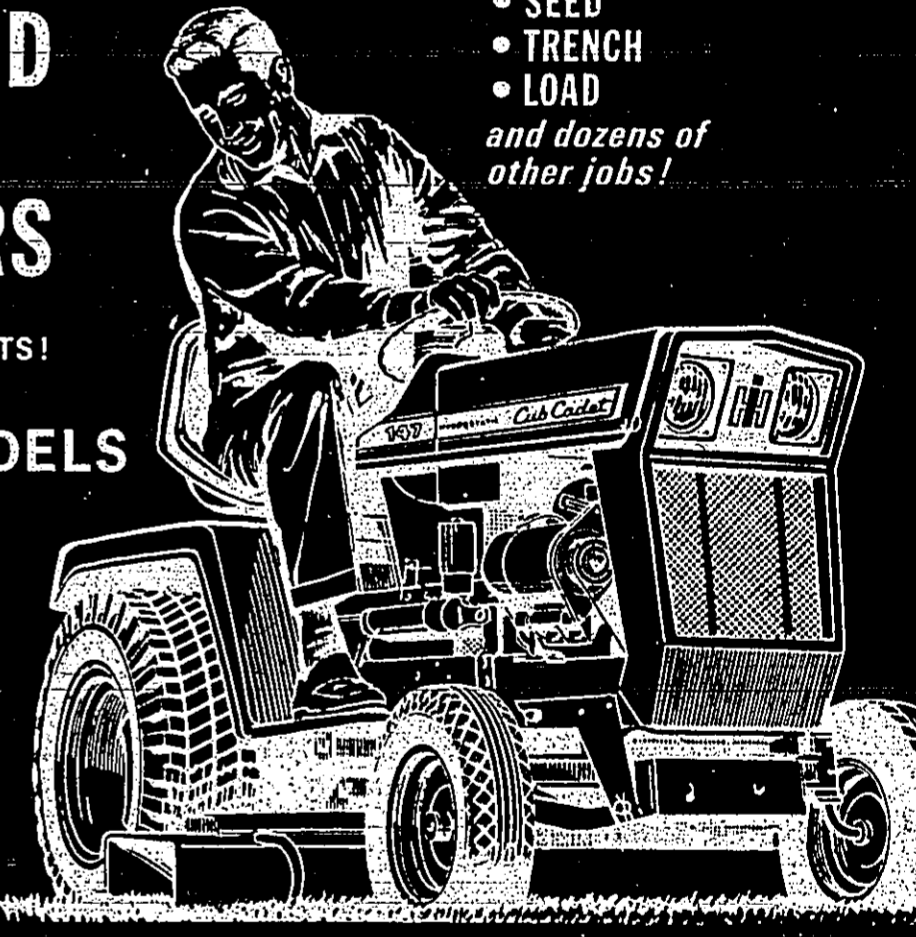

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

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I am in favor of the Unit System.

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How?

It is really very simple. First, hire one man to take over the supervision of the equipment and personnel that are involved with the maintenance and construction of roads and bridges throughout the county. This man will be the County Engineer.

To those people that may not be familiar with road construction and maintenance, I will give you an example of something else that may give you an idea of what I have in mind. For example, if you were requested to

serve food to 100 people, wouldn't it be much easier and cost much less money if you purchased all the food from one place, hired one cook to supervise the preparation of all this food, ONE place and serve all the food from one place than it would if you were required to serve all these people at the same time from FOUR different places?

Now, after you have thought about that for a minute, it does seem very logical that it would cost less to serve the entire group from one location than it would from four different locations, doesn't it? The same thing applies to the operation of equipment in a central location, buy all the supplies and have it stored at one location. Merge the two forces and then there will be enough help to do a job and get through with it. At present the four commissioners have approximately sixteen men working. There is another

celebrated programs to provide incentive for the gifted child as well as remedial programs and special programs for the handicapped child. Mr. Jarrott said that the present plans of the district call for additional vocational subjects, more special education opportunities, and for kindergarten classes as provided by recent state legislation.

"The continued effort will be to develop a school program that reaches all children. This program includes one that has been developed in the district that prepares a high school graduate to go to college, a variety of vocational courses for those students who do not plan to go to college, special education classes for the handicapped child, and a variety of pupil activity programs and aesthetic programs, such as art and music, and a sound physical education program," Mr. Jarrott said.

Since 1964 Mr. Jarrott has been active in helping to plan and implement the various building obligations of the district and to assist the professional staff in the task of curriculum development. He stated, "I consider that my real service to the schools as a board member has been, with the help of each child in mind, to help with the employment of capable teachers, the construction of adequate facilities, the acquisition of the equipment and supplies for learning, and the operation of the district on a sound financial basis."

and changes in state school laws. It is my opinion that the schools of this district should operate so that all legal and accreditation requirements are met. I am aware that the district has a number of needs, but I am also aware that we have a superior school program. I am sure that we can meet all accreditation and legal standards.

Changes in school organization and curricula content in the immediate future will involve the addition of a kindergarten program, the addition of vocational courses to prepare the non-college bound student for adult life, the addition of special education units to meet the needs of the educationally disadvantaged and handicapped child, and an upgrading of the basic academic programs so that every child will have a sound education in the fundamental subjects.

I stress the need of a comprehensive educational program, but I firmly believe that it is the function of the school to teach children to read and write.

I attended Baylor University and Mississippi College for my pre-medical training and graduated from Baylor University College of Medicine in Houston, Texas. I did post-graduate work at Baltimore City Hospital for two years. I have been practicing medicine in Woodville for 18 years.

I have two children in the Woodville schools and am pleased with the education program that they have and with the work of the dedicated teachers who have taught them. I have been active in a number of community and civic endeavors, including service as president of the Chamber of Commerce and Lions Club. I am a deacon of the First Baptist Church of Woodville.
